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

Victoria Police said a report will be prepared for the Coroner following the death of a man in Cape Woolamai on Sunday, November 5.

"Emergency services were called to an incident on Sunnyside Avenue about 4.30pm," a police media spokesperson said.

"Paramedics worked on the man, but he was pronounced deceased at the terests over the years. "There have been some characters over

"A man believed to be in his 40s was airlifted to The Alfred in a critical condition with an upper body injury."



# New Cowes boat ramp opened

The upgraded Cowes boat ramp was quietly opened last week, with boaties quick to launch their vessels and give it a "reserved" thumbs up.

However, while the ramp has been extended and raised, there were questions about the adjoining jetty, which was set to be extended about 15 metres but instead appeared to be unchanged.

Among the first anglers to test the new ramp last Wednesday morning (November 1) was David Thompson, who launched at low tide, which would have been "almost difficult or impossible" in the past.

"Day one looks ok, a thumbs up, but time will tell," David said. Boatie Tas Roussos said it was now important to see how the ramp handled the sand fluctuations over time. "It can't be judged by a single

day, week or month, but through the seasons because of the continual changes here," Tas said.

However, Tas added there was a 90-degree drop off at the end corners of the ramp at low tide - rather than a curved finish – that could catch some trailers in a hole, especially on the easterly side which tended to lose sand.

"I'm not sure why they made a right angle rather than a curved finish at the end, because a trailer wheel could get caught there and tip."

Mark Richardson confirmed the new ramp "works as it should"

"Launched and retrieved solo today with no issues."

The \$2.8 million upgrade of the Anderson Road boat ramp began in June, with a temporary cofferdam built to help crews build the new ramp in dry conditions.

The ramp was then extended and raised to provide boaters better access at a greater range of tides and reduce sand accumulation.

## Jetty

The adjoining jetty was to be extended 15 metres beyond the current jetty to create more space for temporarily tied boats, and the lower landing was to be raised to improve access to and from vessels.

But as boaties pointed out, the jetty appears the same as before construction.

Jetty looks like it never

moved," wrote Richie Jongejan on social media.

Roger Hansen agreed saying "it still finishes in the same spot".

The original plans had it going out another 10 metres. They pulled the jetty out and stuck it back in the same place as before," Roger commented.

The Advertiser last Wednesday asked Better Boating Victoria and a spokesperson said the contractor had confirmed the jetty had been extended by 20 metres and one of the lower landings has been raised to make it more accessible.

Bass Coast Shire oversaw the project as ramp manager, with work undertaken by Bridgewater Marine.

The project was funded through the investment of boating licence and registration fees.



## "Galaxy" domes

San Remo's Chinese restaurant has applied for a planning permit for building works and a liquor license.

The restaurant, at 163 Marine Parade, plans to build two proposed domes or "galaxy houses", including a deck, alongside the restaurant, valued at \$8000.

The permit, which is currently open for public comment, also includes an application for the sale and consumption of liquor.

#### Caravan park construction

The San Remo Beachfront Caravan Park has applied for retrospective approval for the installation of 11 cabins, at a cost of \$800,000.

The cabins, at 1 Davis Point Road, are for longterm, but not permanent residency, with annual leases available to residents.

"Over the past 18 months, the San Remo Beachfront caravan park has experienced a gradual refurbishment of the site, with new cabins replacing old dilapi-dated structures," the permit states.

"Of the new cabins, 10 have been completed with one to be completed post permit. These works were in recognition of the on-going corrosion caused to the buildings by the salt in the air."

## **College tennis courts**

Newhaven College has applied for a \$400,000 planning permit to erect light towers for existing tennis courts.

The permit is for 1770 Phillip Island Road, Rhyll and will include four towers.

# The Block: worst kept secret confirmed

Channel 9 has made a rare announcement, in the past week confirming the 2024 build will be on Phillip Island.

Entertainment; both Sneesby and Launders were signatories on the Justice Road contract of sale.

"We've purchased a holiday park just around the corner from the world-famous Penguin Parade, and so far the community has shown huge support for us and we are hoping for a really warm welcome for our new crop of contestants in the 20th year," Mr Cress said.

"I'm really thrilled to bring show down there. I mean. how can you go wrong making your 20th season on an island by the sea with penguins?

# Cashing in on trash

About 700 cans, bottles and cartons were recycled in Cowes in the first day of Victoria's new Container Deposit Scheme (CDS) last week.

IGA Cowes manager Phil Behre said their new CDS reverse vending machine began operating last Wednesday (November 1), with local residents cashing in on their stockpiled recyclables.

"For kids it is good pocket money. I've seen them picking up cans and bottles on the side of the road and even raiding bins," Phil said.

"For households it's both financially and environmentally a good thing, saving recyclables from the bin to give more space."

People can return eligible drink cans, bottles and cartons for a 10-cent refund at the Cowes IGA, San Remo IGA and Can Collect Cowes at 14 Harvey Drive, with more reverse vending machines, depots, over-the-counter sites, and pop-up refund points growing in 2024.

To claim the refund, download the app by scanning the QR code on the vending machine.

Depending on the type of refund point, people can choose whether they want to receive the refund in the form of cash, a retail voucher, or an electronic refund, or donate the funds to a registered charity. Bank details may also be required, depending on the option chosen.

The vending machine does not take wine and spirit bottles, milk containers, paperboard cartons over one litre and cordial bottles.

Items accepted include: aluminium cans, plastic

bottles, glass bottles, steel bottles and cans, and paperboard cartons under one litre.

#### Stockpile

Phil said the Cowes IGA was approached to host the vending machine and they were supportive of the environmental project, although prices of bottles and cans had risen to counter the CDS.

"You get that money back as long as you return it," Phil said.

IGA staff member and Cowes resident Ben Lee said he had been stockpiling cans and bottles for four months – "because I drink a lot of Coke and Sunkist" – and he had earned \$7 in his first refund.

Phil said cans were flattened by the machine and then stored, and Phil sent a notification by the machine when it was full.

"It took two days to fill once it was operational and we store it until it's picked up. "We are happy to have it. Anything to help the environment."

Environment Minister Steve Dimopoulos said the CDS will reduce the state's litter by up to half and turn used drink containers into new, recycled products.

VicReturn is the Scheme Coordinator, while Zone Operators Return-It, TOM-RA Cleanaway, and Visy will establish and oversee the refund points and refunds to customers, as well as ensuring proper recycling of the containers.

The operators are each responsible for the refund point network.

# Playgrounds up for refurb

Playgrounds in Cape Woolamai and Cowes are being upgraded and the community can vote on designs for the new playspaces.

The playgrounds are at Woolamai Park on Sunnyside Drive in Cape Woolamai and McKenzie Views Park on Katherine Circuit in Cowes.

A new playspace is also being installed in San Remo at the Anderson Street park.

In July, Bass Coast Shire Council asked for community input on what the new spaces should look like. The results are in and Council is now asking for feedback on the draft designs for each playspace, via their engage website.

"Each playspace is unique and has been designed using what we heard back in July," the website states.

To explain the new designs, two pop up consultation sessions will be held at the parks on November 14. The Cape Woolamai session in Sunnyside Drive runs from 4pm – 5pm. The Cowes session in Katherine Circuit is from 5.30pm – 6.30pm.

Council said several of the suggestions for the new space at Cape Woolamai were "outside the scope" of the project, such as a running track, rock climbing and football goals. The community also called for a pump track, which the council said will be considered as part of a project with a community reference group looking at pump tracks across the shire.

A request for a splash park and water play was also not included in the draft de-

sign. "Splash parks cost a significant amount

to install and maintain. They are reserved for regional spaces that have high visitation all year around," the council said.

Requests for toilets, BBQs and shelter were also not included.

"These playspaces are all local level facilities which cater to the community who live within walking distance of the park," the council explained.

"As such the playspace standards for these facilities does not include toilets, BBQs, shelters or art installations."

In Cowes, the feedback included a request for a giant arbour, which council said was not within the scope of the renewal project.

A request to have "old play equipment that was around 20 years ago" was also not incorporated, with the council saying it was not possible due to current Australian Standards.

As the playspace design includes retaining the existing slide, the council said requests for a bigger slide/tunnel slide were "not relevant".

A new playspace is also being installed in the Anderson Street Park in San Remo. There has been a delay with the design, which will hopefully be available later in the year the council said.

# Parking, growth key issues for San Remo: residents

San Remo's road intersections "are complete madness", parking is a "major" problem and new housing subdivisions need more trees.

That's according to local residents who have given feedback to Bass Coast Shire's creation of a San Remo structure plan.

Community consultation on the plan is open until December 8, with the feedback and technical reports guiding the town's development to 2041, including planning controls, transport, infrastructure, and services.

An online map has so far received dozens of comments, with parking and roads a common theme.

"We need more parking in San Remo", said one respondent, with another agreeing: "Parking in San Remo is a major issue and needs to be addressed. There is vacant land where the caravan park was that could be purchased for parking."

Another commented intersections were "complete madness and dangerous too", with the Back Beach Road and Marine Parade intersection "difficult to navigate".

"Marine Parade streetscape needs a total revamp ... half Marine Parade has underground power, the other half hasn't, as well as different light poles," commented a resident.

One person said a second separate bridge to Phillip Island was needed.

"Totally crazy so much traffic but nothing is done and with more (people) moving here each year where is the planning to support traffic, power and water," Nicko wrote on social media.

Others were concerned about the number of housing estates. "Bigger blocks – let's stop creating Pakenham by the bay",

wrote one respondent. "More green spaces and walking links through now develop

ing links through new developments". Others agreed more landscap-

ing, vegetation and open space in new estates was needed.

"Sanny is no longer and never again will be the characteristic, beautiful little place it was," Wayne said.

Many supported protecting the environment, including the marine ecosystem off San Remo, which is "important on a global scale", and more coastal vegetation.

One person suggested more picnic spots with seating because when we "consistently promote the asset that is our gorgeous coastline" it leads to "environmentally conscious efforts to protect our home".

#### George Bass

There were several comments about the George Bass Coastal Walk with people calling for amenities such as toilets, while the walk should also be extended to San Remo township, and access to cliff fishing should be permanently banned because it was a safety and environmental risk. Community facilities should

also be improved.

"A big investment in the recreation centre would attract more sports teams to the area and take the pressure off Cowes ... the amenities are poor and need to be upgraded," commented a respondent.

There should be beach access for disabled people, as well as dog parks and more play areas.

One person suggested an ampitheatre – similar to the one in Inverloch – to allows schools and community groups to hold concerts and performances.

#### Plan

Over the next 20 years, San Remo is projected to have up to 2100 new permanent residents, with the structure plan serving as a "roadmap" for services.

The plan is not only seeking community feedback but there will also be a community reference group, with in-person workshops in early to mid-2024, that will include permanent and seasonal residents as well as business owners.

Mayor Michael Whelan said community members can now shape the future direction of San Remo.

"We want to ensure that the changes align with the services, upgrades, and planning controls that meet the needs and aspirations of our residents," he said.

"This is your opportunity to influence the plan from its inception and guide it in the right direction."

# Car ferry: off or on again?

After previously stating the Cowes to Stony Point car ferry "doesn't stack up", a tourism plan is now saying it is "still a consideration".

Destination Phillip Island (DPI) draft Destination Management Plan (DMP), released at the end of October, was open for feedback until November 8, with the final plan expected to be completed by the end of this month.

In September, a precursor to the DMP stated the Cowes to Stony Point Car Ferry "has been a long term, controversial project".

"The business case doesn't stack up and stakeholders have asked for its removal (from the new tourism plan)," the September plan said.

However, the new draft DMP now says the car ferry "is still a consideration if external conditions aligned, as it would support increase capacity of passenger traffic to the destination".

"However its business case is not a current priority for destination stakeholders," the draft concludes.

The draft also flags:

- Phillip Island could have a new wellness festival, that is driven by industry;
- Advocacy for Vietnam Veterans Museum expansion;

• The ongoing delivery of the MotoGP and the Superbike World Championship events beyond the contracted date of 2026 "is an important priority for the region"; and

• Make Cowes jetty the future arrival point for cruise ship tenders, although "accessibility and visitor amenities are still a challenge".

## Go green, electric

The draft DMP also proposes a focus on environmental initiatives, including a program where visitors can contribute money or time to support local conservation and community projects.

It states Phillip Island should move "quickly" towards achieving waste free and carbon zero, following the Greek island of Tilos, which was the world's first island to close its landfill and become energy self-sufficient.

The draft states there is "strong community sentiment around too many cars" on the island, particularly at peak times.

A solution should see "a conversation on how the destination is going to support the transition to electric vehicle future", with accommodation and attractions to invest in electric vehicle charging.

The draft reiterates the possibility of introducing peak-season, location specific parking charges for non-residents.

"The infusion of Artificial Intelligence into the tourism industry has revolutionised the way people travel and how custodians care for destinations," it states.

Once the new Isle of Wight opens, there should be schedule improvements to the Stony Point to Cowes ferry.

#### Uncertainty

DPI says the draft DMP is "being released during incredibly tense economic conditions across Australia", "putting more pressure on businesses to do more with less, operating with competitive uncertainty, whilst also delivering value for their guests.

Combined with the workforce skills challenge, and travellers looking for increased value, businesses face "fatigue and burnout, and in some cases, closure".

A Phillip Island and San Remo Workforce Plan will explore labour solutions, including working with schools to promote tourism as a career.

It states Phillip Island's population grew by 32 per cent from 10,387 in 2016 to 13,799 in 2021, exceeding targets, with the total number of dwellings not growing at the same rate.

"This accelerated population growth, as well as the large proportion of unoccupied dwellings may be contributing to the sense of angst facing the community," the draft says.

The draft takes on board feedback from survey responses, interviews and workshops with industry, community and government.

Consultants The Tourism Collective is gathering the data, to prepare the final Destination Management Plan.

Feedback on the plan closed at 5pm, November 8.

# ommunity orchard tenth birthday celebrations

The Phillip Island Community Orchard (PICO) held its 10th birthday celebrations on Sunday, with the magnificent spring weather drawing a large crowd to the Wimbledon Heights site.

The now well-established orchard has come a long way since its inception in 2013, with over 100 fruit and nut trees, shrubs and vines growing organically on what was once a one hectare neglected block, now thriving on unlimited Class A recycled water provided by Westernport Water.

Westernport Water's Geoff Russell and Bass Coast Shire's Mayor, Cr Michael Whelan, both spoke at the official opening of the celebration, to which PICO president Annette McKenzie Transformation warmly welcomed everyone.

Annette described the thriving orchard as a "fabulous testament" to the vision of a small but dedicated group who came together 10 years ago to make this happen, and paid particular tribute to Westernport Water and its representative Geoff Russell, also a founding member of PICO, as the key to the orchard's success over its ten years in operation.

"Without Geoff, this would not have happened," commented fellow founding member Kate Bennett. Annette thanked both the founding group and the 200 members who have worked on the orchard at various times over the 10-year period, to develop what is a real showpiece.

Speaking at the celebration's opening, Geoff recalled the site's early beginnings, and its subsequent transformation from vacant overgrown land into the vibrant and bountiful orchard it is today, where every imaginable type of fruit tree thrives; and where individual plots of land are tended by PICO members.

He recalled the role played by school children from San Remo Primary in the early days. They planted a shelter belt of indigenous trees to protect the site from the prevailing wind, under the guidance of Landcare's Lisa Wangman. And the support given by nearby farmer Bob Davie who ploughed the rough, hard land up in the first place, to give the venture every

chance of success.

Mayor Whelan commended everyone involved over the 10 years of the orchard's development.

"This place is special. It is about community and the drive to get things done," Cr Whelan said. He emphasised Westernport Water and Bass Coast Council had a role to play in supporting

the efforts of groups like PICO. He commended the fact that produce from the orchard, and also from a community garden being established by PICAL on council land, is used in the prep-

aration of meals at the PICAL Pantry for distribution to those down on their luck. Four guest speakers spoke during the day. Tim Sansom, CEO of the Diggers Club Foun-

dation; Craig Castree, edible

gardens guru; Jude Mayall of Outback Chef fame; and local beekeeper, Gary Morton.

Travis Local musicians. Thompson and the Bass Coast Pickers entertained; the kids loved the Animal Oz area: and a delicious selection of wholesome hot foods, fresh seafood, vegetarian and salad options, connoisseur cordial drinks, homemade cakes and slices and barista coffee kept everyone well fed.

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# Five elections, three CEOs: Cr Le Serve's service recognised

## COUNCIL

Western Port Ward councillor Clare Le Serve has been recognised by Victoria's local government peak body for a decade of service.

Cr Le Serve – who lives at Corinella – was first elected to what was then Leadbeater ward in 2012, the same year she became mayor. The mother of two and grandmother of seven has subsequently been successfully re-elected in two further council elections, while also standing as an independent in two state elections.

The Municipal Association of Victoria recently recognised her 10 years of service, alongside 36 other Victorian councillors.

"I do it because I genuinely love it," Cr Le Serve told the Advertiser, adding that "at this stage" she did not plan to stand for the 2024 council elections.

"It's still exciting to be part of new projects and meeting lots of people.

"But I do think it's important to get fresh eyes and new values. I would still like to be involved in the community though through mentoring and leadership, particularly for women."

#### Cynicism

Cr Le Serve said she first put up her hand for what some would describe as an unenviable job because childcare facilities were desperately needed in Bass.

"Young mums were desperate for facilities. I wasn't a political monster but someone had to do it, so I stood for election.

"I wasn't thinking about second or third terms. In the end we secured funding for the Bass Valley Children's Centre in my first term and it was opened in my second term.

"I didn't do this alone but with the community's support and by being on council I was able to talk the talk with my fellow councillors. You have got to be at the table, to put your hand up and vote."

Like all new councillors, she found the job initially was a "steep learning curve".

"My background was community development," she said, explaining she had worked as Bass Valley

Community Centre's manager and then for a disability services organisation before being elected.

"All councillors come with different skill sets and we need to learn all aspects, especially legal requirements.

"But the most important aspect is building relationships with the CEO and staff."

Cr Le Serve said she understood some voters were cynical that councillors were voted in to represent the community but soon become part of the bureaucracy.

"There's a fine balance. The system doesn't work as fast as people want it to and also we have to work according to the Local Government Act and planning scheme.

"I make sure I make myself available to the community. I attend meetings and answer emails and phone calls and give honest answers.

"You have to be active in

your community."

She admitted local government had become more hostile in the decade she had served and she had even been personally threatened.

"There has always been people with the loudest voices who want to lord it over you. I find that difficult to deal with, because once they get angry so do I and then I'm not listening to what the real issues are. Then we all just get angry ... it's then difficult to achieve a positive outcome.

"I try and be nice and respectful but sometimes it's not reciprocated."

#### Achievements

Clare moved to Bass in 1972 to marry her dairy farmer husband Neil – who is now the postman for French Island, with the Le Serve family also owning the freehold to the French Island General Store.

The family eventually sold the farm in the early 1980s when Clare began working in community development, a career that ended when she suffered a serious car accident.

"I still live with the re-

sults of that accident today.'

She said the three greatest achievements in her time on council had been securing a rate differential for farmers, support for arts and culture, and work to progress First Nations' reconciliation.

She admits council "does not always get it right" and some of the most difficult issues have been dogs and horses on beaches, as well as the most recent special charge scheme at Surf Beach and Sunderland Bay, which is in her ward.

"There are often two opposing forces and so there won't be a good outcome that makes everyone happy. There are emotive issues and I feel it as much as anyone else."

Cr Le Serve has worked with three CEOS – Allan Bawden, Paul Buckley, and Ali Wastie – now awaiting a fourth.

Even though she doesn't plan to stand again, she still hopes to work for and with the community.

"I have found mentoring to be rewarding and I'd like to work for a community organisation, even voluntarily."



# Church Street development amended

#### **PLANNING**

Local residents have negotiated amendments to a housing development at 100 Church Street in Cowes, after going to VCAT with their concerns.

In June, Bass Coast Shire Council approved a permit for 10 dwellings and removal of vegetation, despite receiving 17 objections

At the time, the objectors said their concerns included overlooking, loss of views and privacy, overdevelopment, and they said the townhouses were inconsistent with the character of the area, would be noisy, and used for short stay accommodation.

Denzil Griffiths was one of the objectors to the proposal and decided to take his concerns to VCAT saying he was quite satisfied with the compromise achieved through the VCAT process.

After several compulsory conferences at VCAT, an agreement was reached with all parties signing off on draft final consent orders

He said the VCAT orders included:

• A reduction of one in the number of units, from 10 to nine, but down from three to two along his boundary

· Increased first floor set-

backs for rear units and those along the shared boundary

- Increased setback and screening for the third story deck in the rear two units
- Documented commitment to obtaining an engineer's report before finalising form of retaining wall along the shared boundary; retaining wall now to be as high as his ground level and not below it as originally approved by Council
- Complete revamp of vegetation plan, including removing Council requirement to plant two 15 metre high trees in each courtyard, replacing with one four – six metres
- Vegetation now included along rear boundary, up to three metres in height (none included in Council-approved plans)
- Change in colour of roof from white to grey to make less glary.
- Tree protection zones (TPZs) now observed and strengthened with site excavation and retaining wall modified accordingly (the Council-approved plans did not observe any of the TPZs for trees on neighbouring properties, had retaining walls built through the TPZs and included the removal of trees on neighbouring properties).

#### VCAT process

"Prior to lodging our appeal with VČAT, we had read and heard many negative stories about VCAT and its handling of planning disputes," Mr Griffiths said.

"Many told us it would be a waste of time and money. Indeed, Councillor Ron Bauer, when declining to intervene when we appealed to Council, along with over 15 others, said he would not refuse Council approval since VCAT would only approve the plans anyway.

"Thank goodness we did not listen to Cr Bauer. "We know that at least two residents refrained from appealing to VCAT because of his comment."

Mr Griffiths said he and

other objectors had advised council of the "many errors in the plans" it approved, as well as advising the three Island Councillors prior to the council meeting dealing with the objections.

councillors "These never acknowledged our emails and refused to intervene. So much for looking after the interests of ratepayers.'

He said objectors to other planning applications should not discount taking their concerns to VCAT.

"At the end of the VCAT proceedings, we actually thanked the presiding Senior Member for the manner in which he conducted proceedings.

"Although we were

novices in planning matters, he accorded us courtesy and respect and gave us every opportunity to present our arguments.'

Mr Griffiths said the successful outcome was due to the parties being required to attend a Compulsory Conference.

"Apparently, about 75-80 per cent of planning disputes are now required to attend a Compulsory Conference ahead of a formal hearing.

"It was made very clear to all parties that the conference provided a valuable opportunity to discuss their differences in a very informal manner. They could achieve a very significant benefit by reaching an agreement which afforded both par-

ties certainty about the outcome, and a quicker and less costly decision," he explained.

"Any full hearing required (estimated to take two days in our case) would necessarily involve adhering to more formal procedures and evidentiary requirements, with an uncertain outcome at the end.

"All parties took this advice on board and made concessions to reach an agreement.'

Mr Griffiths said the only drawback with the VCAT appeal process is the cost.

"Initially, this cost looked like being shared by three parties, but two did not proceed thanks to Cr Bauer's comment about VCAT, leaving us with the whole bill.

"Was it worth it? Without any doubt whatsoever.

The VCAT permit has 37 conditions, including the permit will expire if building does not commence within two years and finish within four years of the date of the permit.

Landscaping work must be carried out within three months of completion of the dwellings. Amended plans must also be lodged and approved by Bass Coast Shire Council.



There are over 10 raffle prizes and lots of local handmade crafts "all things ukulele" for sale.


The major raffle prize is over \$700 in value and includes a Tanglewood Ukulele with gig bag donated by National Music Australia.



# Work on Phillip Island bridge

#### **INFRASTRUCTURE**

Work is due to begin in mid-November on work to upgrade the bridge pipeline, which supplies drinking water to the island.


Westernport Water is upgrading the main drinking water and sewage infrastructure connected to the underside of the San Remo - Phillip Island Bridge.

Work will commence on the \$5.5 million San Remo Bridge Pipeline Bracket Renewal Project in mid-November 2023, and will be completed by October 2024 (excluding peak periods throughout December and early January).

Westernport Water said significant stakeholder consultation, planning and approval has occurred to minimise impacts to customers, visitors, the economy, and the local environment.

"The underbridge pipelines are a critical part of our region's water infrastructure, supplying drinking water to customers on Phillip Island, and transporting wastewater from San Remo to the Cowes Wastewater Treatment Plant," said Westernport Water Managing Director, Dona Tantirimudalige.

"The brackets that connect the pipelines to the underside of the bridge and fittings are deteriorating and in need of

repair. Refurbishing and replacing these items now will extend the life of the pipeline for another thirty years.'

Suspended scaffold will be used under the bridge so workers can safely access the pipes while minimising impacts to traffic.

Only on rare occasions, one lane of the bridge may need to be closed at night while navigational markers for marine users are relocated.

Reduced clearance under the bridge

from the scaffolding will impact tall vessels, however one of the three centre spans will remain at full clearance height at all times to enable safe passage.

A temporary site compound will be established at San Remo Foreshore Reserve. As the works progress over the bridge, the temporary site compound will be moved to Newhaven near the bridge.

Water and wastewater services will continue as normal while the works are happening. Pedestrian access across the bridge will remain open at all times, as will the pedestrian access tracks under the bridge.

This project is being delivered as part of Westernport Water's capital works program, addressing customer priorities for water quality improvements, environmentally responsible operations, and sustainable services between now and 2028.

#### **Cultural Centre foolishness**

Cultural Centre finally opening. Really has taken an extraordinarily long time, at extraordinary cost, Despite no community hall for so long and cost for such an uninspiring big box building, no doubt Shire expects our gratitude.

But how much of a bargain did we get? One comparison is recently constructed gym at Cowes Primary School, the kind of rectangular box you expect for a gym. Cost was \$5.5 Million. Comparing size and cost, Cultural Centre is bigger but pro rata cost \$8.3 Million V \$32 Million.

Bricks were supposed to be white, special white sand and cement with finely ground recycled glass instead of sand. What happened to this?

Obviously care and attention paid to heating/cooling inside but how about outside? In efficient building design, don't you need main wall to face the sun, with plenty of window space to catch winter warmth? Then, especially anticipating El Nino extreme heat, don't you need eaves/awnings to shade walls from heat? Cultural Centre is going to be a sizzling heat island on outside, almost vertical barbecue. Inside insulated by almost 0.5m of structural foam, fresh out of petrochem industry!

Passivhaus means low energy consumption. But based on Germany/Northern Europe, main criterion is less than 15kWh/m2/year energy consumption, which is good in long winter and outdoor temperatures as low as -40degC. How relevant is that in Bass Coast? Here stan dard is 0.125kW/m2, which means running efficient heat pump no more than 60 hours per year. In our backyard, zero energy flow through ventilation is recommended. Where are opening windows for warmth of northerlies and cool of south westerlies, between seasons? New Council asap. #### Surf Beach – where's council?

Council has posted on their website that the project will 'not proceed', and sent personalised emails to those that lodged a submission advising "under the Local Government Act 1989 legislation, the project will not proceed" and emailed in response to questions that "a report closing out the Surf Beach Sunderland Bay Proposed Special Charge Scheme will be presented to the December Council Meeting".

In response to a question to the October Council meeting if Bass Coast councillors were advised of this announcement prior to the release on the engage website, we were told yes, the councillors were advised prior to the announcement.

My question then is this. Why is Council not putting the report up at the November Council meeting? Council made the call to not proceed a mere two days after the deadline for objections, so surely the report is a slam dunk?

Maybe the Mayor does not want this debacle on his watch. After all, it's a million dollars of rate payers' money that this Council has wasted, ignoring all the signposts along the way in the form of three petitions, letters to the editor, questions to the Council meetings, phone enquiries and the avalanche of emails seeking further information and expressing genuine concern. It remains to be seen how and when Council is intending to let all rate payers that have had to live through this debacle for the past 18 months know that the project has been abandoned. The Say No group has acted as the conduit for information for the community through their FB page and monthly community meetings. It would be an appalling indictment on Council if they were also going to leave it up to the Say No group to inform the community of the outcome. Council, we urge you to put your community front and centre at this time and show us some respect and let the community know sooner rather than later that this scheme has been abandoned. # Community volunteer honoured at RSL dinner

Guests were welcomed to the annual dinner by RSL president Chris Thompson, and MC for the evening was RSL Vice president Peter Paul.

Mr Paul commended all present on their service to the island community, and said this is what the RSL is also about.

"Service to others is part of RSL history. That is what the RSL is about," he commented.

He spoke of the Men's Shed which has been established in the RSL grounds for the last 20 years, The RSL Day Club for seniors, and other programs, sponsorships and grants provided by the RSL to commuawith this philosophy.

A highlight of the night was a special presentation made to two long serving RSL staff members, Sharon Kerr and Sarah Marshall, by RSL General Manager Chris Simpson. Both women have worked at the RSL for over two decades, Sarah in administration and Sharon in hospitality, and were thanked by Chris for their dedication and service.

An announcement was also made of a \$21,000 grant by the RSL toward three dialysis chairs in the new Community Hospital, currently under construction.

"Currently, residents re-

quiring dialysis must travel off the island to access this life saving treatment. This will make a huge difference for them," Mr Paul said.

Guest speaker at the event was well know Australian actor Gil Tucker.

Now an island resident, Gil started his acting career playing a loveable young police officer in Cop Shop, and went on over the next four decades to work alongside many industry greats, in film, TV, stage and radio, including appearances in Mad Max, Power Without Glory, and the Flying Doctors.

Phillip Island Football Netball Club President, Chris Ross, spoke at the dinner, acknowledging the support given by the RSL over a long period. "Without your support, we do not function," said Chris.

The contribution of 23 individuals who fought long and hard for improved health services after the closure of Warley Hospital in 2008 was also recognised. The concept of PIMHAG (Phillip Island Medical and Health Action Group), established in 2009 for the sole purpose of the establishment of public health services locally, started in the boardroom of the RSL, PIMHAG member John Matthews told those present.

"The RSL boardroom hosted all PIMHAG meetings, and members met here with federal and state health ministers, opposition leaders, and regional health providers, while lobbying for public health services over a ten-year period.

"The fight was eventually won with a magnificent Health Hub providing 24-hour health care opening in 2018, and a pledge for a community hospital followed. Its construction is now underway.

"Twenty-three members of PIMHAG were involved over a 15-year period and have achieved what they set out to do," John said.

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
