# Hospital due to open 2025

## **HEALTH**

Minister for Health Infrastructure Mary-Anne Thomas visited Cowes last Wednesday (April 10) to inspect the progress of the new community hospital.

Minister Thomas said the first stage of the hospital will be an expanded Urgent Care Centre, expected to open in early 2025.

The existing Urgent Care Centre will be transformed into a public dental treatment area.

Originally due to open in late 2024, Jan Child, CEO of Bass Coast Health (BCH) was still hopeful the first stage of the Community Hospital would be handed

over to BCH in later this year.

However she said slower than expected delivery times for some key equipment arriving from overseas, had delayed the project timeline.

The expanded Urgent Care Centre will be located on the ground floor of the new hospital, with day surgery theatres and an area for chemotherapy and dialysis located upstairs.

The new hospital, being built by construction company SJ Higgins, will also include a radiology precinct offering CT scans, ultrasound and general X-ray, and a central sterile supply department.

The final hospital will also of-

fer mental health services, allied health and rehabilitation and pharmacy services.

After the site tour, Minister Thomas described the visit as an "absolute delight".

"I've been blown away by what I've seen."

She described the hospital as an example of a "new and different way of delivering healthcare services", saying since Covid the health system had to adapt to the changing needs of the com-

The focus was on growing the amount of "ambulatory care" (services performed on an outpatient basis).

"That means expanding nonbed-based care and that's exactly what will be delivered here at this community hospital."

She said the spaces in the hospital were very flexible and able to adapt to the community's needs.

Despite state-wide shortages of healthcare workers, the Minister said the workforce was "up for the changes".

CEO Jan Child said BCH was working with healthcare partners like Alfred Health to bring nurses to work at the facilit

"We are out recruiting all the time, and doing well," she said.

"This is a pretty nice place

Ms Child also said BCH had a strong commitment to working with students and "growing nurses locally".

## Game changer

The new hospital was described as a "game changer" for cancer and dialysis treatments.

Phillip Island's Stephen Fullarton is setting out to walk 76km or more in May, raising money for the Stroke Foundation.

In 2021, a surf at Crazy Birds turned out to be a life-changer for Stephen who suffered a haemorrhagic stroke while on his stand-up paddle board. Thanks to quick thinking from local surfers and a rapid response from local paramedics, Stephen survived the potentially lifethreatening incident.

Since then he's been an outspoken advocate for the work of the Stroke Foundation. In May, he intends to let his feet do the talking, and signed up for the Stroke Foundation's 76km in May challenge.

An app will track his progress over the month.

He's hoping the local community will sponsor his efforts, saying "every contribution makes a difference in the fight against stroke".

As well as raising valuable funds for the founthe challenge dation, promotes health and wellbeing and increases stroke awareness.

The 76km distance reflects the 76 people who suffer a stroke every day in Australia.

"There are so many people down here who have survived strokes," Stephen said.

"It's something you want to keep in people's minds.'

Already walking around three kilometres on his

daily walk to the office and back, Stephen plans to clock up some extra kilometres on the weekend. He said some other locals are signing up to join him in the challenge.

The plan is to tackle some of the island's more scenic walking trails over weekends, including from Cowes to Rhyll, Pyramid Rock to Barrys Beach, Swan Lake, Cape Woolamai, Scenic Estate, Churchill Island and the Summerland Peninsula.

# Air winched from Cleeland Bight

## **RESCUE**

Air Wing and local police officers rescued a man and woman in Cape Woolamai on Saturday evening (April 13).

Police said it's believed the pair veered from a walking trail onto cliffs near Cleeland Bight Beach about 5.40pm.

They struggled to make their way back through thick bushland when they noticed the ocean tide getting higher.

Police, SES, Ambulance Victoria, CFA and Surf Life Saving Victoria attended to assist with the rescue.

Air Wing winched the 47-year-old woman and 37-year-old man to safety about 6.45pm.

The duo from Lower Plenty did not sustain any injuries.

The Woolamai Beach car park was blocked off to the public, with emergency vehicles, including the helicopter, attending. This is the second rescue in the area in a month.

On Saturday March 30 at around 4.45pm, police and members of the Woolamai Beach Surf Lifesaving Club, rescued five people stranded on the foreshore at Cleeland Bight, near Spew Hill.

The Life Saver helicopter was also in-

volved in the rescue operation.

In that incident, Police say they believe the three adults and two children went into the scrubland at Cape Woolamai, and were then marooned by the high tide and unfriendly terrain.

## Chopper search for missing man

A police helicopter circled over Cowes last Thursday trying to find a missing 30-year-old male.

At the time, Wonthaggi Police Acting Senior Sergeant Ryan Burns said police were concerned for the welfare of the "high risk missing person", who may be injured.

The man has lived in Cowes previously but is currently not local.

Acting Snr Sgt Burns said the Pol-Air helicopter circled Cowes early Friday morning and throughout the course of the day.

# Basham seeks to appeal his sentence

## **COURT**

Convicted murderer Adrian Basham last week secured funding for a lawyer who will investigate whether there are grounds to appeal his conviction.

The hearing in the Supreme Court on Thursday is yet another blow to the Fraser family, with their separate application for compensation further delayed.

A jury in 2022 found Mr Basham guilty of murdering and staging the suicide of the mother of their three children, Samantha Fraser, 38, at her Cowes garage on July 23, 2018.

In February last year Justice Lesley Taylor handed Mr Basham a sentence of life in prison with a minimum 30 years before he is eligible for

Mr Basham last year flagged he would seek to appeal both his life jail term and his conviction, with Victorian Legal Aid (VLA) now obtaining funding to start his application.

The barrister representing the Fraser family, Sheeana Dhanji, last week confirmed the application for compensation would not be progressed until Mr Basham's appeal had been finalised.

'The applications are contingent on a finding of guilt, which at present, we have," she said.

Judicial Registrar Timothy Freeman said Mr Basham's appeal application against sentence and conviction would "be imminently filed" after delays following initial lodgement in March last year.

"There could be a number of outcomes (from an appeal application) that could be, for example, an order for a new trial," he said.

Whilst the applicants, I'm sure, are keen to progress their applications for compensation, it's to be balanced against the risks of incurring unnecessary costs which could be thrown away.'

The court heard that Mr Basham, who appeared via video link from prison, has no funds for legal representation in the compensation case and so he may also apply for VLA funding in that matter.

The Judicial Registrar agreed to adjourn the application to another directions hearing on May 23, which would give Mr Basham's lawyers time to assess grounds for appeal.

In November last year in a separate judgement Mr Basham failed in his bid to keep the Cowes home in which he killed Ms Fraser, with the house forfeited to the state.

Mr Basham's father James also lost his fight to retain the \$15,000 black 2018 Kawasaki Ninja motorbike used by his son as a getaway vehicle to and from the island crime scene.

Once these items are forfeited to the state, the proceeds are likely to go to Basham's children and Ms Fraser's parents, who are now raising the three children.

A convicted person has 28 days from the date of sentence to start an appeal, so Mr Basham must now apply for an extension of time.

# Resident frustration at San Remo's poor planning legacy

## **POPULATION GROWTH**

The Advertiser's recent front page about San Remo's poor planning legacy has received a strong community reaction in the past week.

The article quoted a San Remo resident who called for better planning of new subdivisions, saying a legacy of poor planning was impacting existing neighbourhoods, with parking, access and infrastructure problems.

The resident said increasing subdivision of large blocks meant residents were now parking on roads, turning them into one lane, while new estates had no green space for children to play.

resident's comments come as San Remo is set to almost double in size, with Bass Coast Shire councillors in February recommending the State Government approve new land for housing through to Punchbowl Road, "with appropriate urban infrastructure to accommodate growth".

Former Tourism Victoria CEO and chair of Phillip Island Nature Parks Jeff Floyd commented on social media saying the approach to Phillip Island through San Remo was "dreadful", with no trees and graffiti, with one resident, John, agreeing: "the magic of arriving in San Remo has

John asked given the subdivisions were approved by Bass Coast Shire, "I wonder if they can explain the lack of green open space?"

Andrew said it was likely "developer contributions that probably disappear into some other project", with several respondents arguing green space should be mandatory in new estates.

Others were critical of the shire – "turning Bass Coast into a mini-Cranbourne" prioritising increased rates funding over the community's "living standards".

"In five years' time it's going to take an hour to get area with specific wildlife.

to the bridge," Matt commented.

Eve and others were concerned for the displaced wildlife, including wombats and kangaroos.

"The wildlife hasn't been considered at all."

## Response

A shire spokesperson responded saying there was a recognised shortfall in public open space in some areas of San Remo, saying new spaces were being made at the Anderson Street Reserve, to be completed in June.

"As subdivisions near completion, pedestrian links from the new northern estates will be established and create pedestrian linkages for the Island Views Estate through to the Anderson Street Reserve," the spokesperson said.

They said the San Remo Structure Plan was also considering the provision of community infrastructure.

"The plan will review existing open space including the foreshore reserve and Lions Park as well as explore opportunities for new open space in newer areas of the town."

Following the first round of consultation for the plan late last year a community reference group was formed to guide the draft plan, which will be released for community consultation later this year.

## Housing shortage

On social media many, such as Robert, highlighted the housing shortage.

"There is a massive housing shortage if no one noticed. Have to build houses somewhere," he commented.

However, Natasha replied respondents were "not saying no new housing".

"They are saying yes build housing but include appropriate green space, appropriate block sizes that are sensitive to the environment, streetscape spacing and local infrastructure,' she said.

"It's a regional, coastal

Make it appropriate.

"We all want new housing, not to destroy the reason we all moved here; that it's not changed beyond recognition."

Rob said he bought in to Whytesands Estate in Cowes, which originally showed a number of green areas on the plan "but they are actually water retarding basins totally unusable as parks".

Tom said the biggest planning mistake was Silverwater Resort being built on land "zoned rural land at the time, well beyond the then town boundary," Tom

Pearl concluded it was "only going to get worse".

"Goodbye little green paradise, hello concrete chaos."

As reported last year during the Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) panel hearing, where 747 public submissions were presented, the owners of 140 Punchbowl Road, Springway Corporate Group, believed to be a Chinese investor, were seeking for their 124ha property to be included in San Remo's town boundaries.


Two neighbouring landowners on the Phillip Island Road, who have a total 78 hectares (Adrian Abrahams and Franlaw Pty Ltd) between the Springway property and the Silverwater Resort, were also seeking for their land to be open for housing development.

The lawyer for Springway at the time argued the lack of community opposition to more housing development in San Remo showed there was support for an extension of the town's boundaries.


Cr Rochelle Halstead in February responded to this assertion.


"Don't make the mistake of thinking the silence of San Remo residents equates to their acceptance," Cr Halstead said.

"People have to travel hours every day and it makes their health outcomes harder," said Ms Child.

"For them to be able to get this care locally is just going to be so significant for the people of Phillip Island and for people who want to holiday on Phillip Island."

She said travelling for treatments, that could often stretch out over weeks and months. impacted the entire family.

"But if you come to your local town and have that care, where you can dropped off and picked up at the end of the day ... if you know you can get home within 15 minutes of having that cancer treatment - that is significantly different."

The Minister praised the layout and location of the treatment area on the top

floor, saying patients would be able to enjoy beautiful views while receiving treatment.

The Phillip Island Community Hospital is part of the first round of hospitals delivered under the State Government's \$675 million, 10 community hospital commitment.

Three hospitals – Sunbury, Craigieburn and Cranbourne - are due to open this year, with a number following in 2025 including Phillip Island, and the remaining sites expected to be open by 2026.

The government said the Phillip Island project will create up to 100 jobs during peak construction and 32,000 hours have already been worked on

# Bass Coast Health not hit by cuts says CEO

### **HEALTH**

Earlier this month, leader of the opposition John Pesutto stated regional and rural health services were facing forced amalgamations, service cuts and closures due to the State Government slashing millions in health funding.

"Reports have indicated Labor is forcing unrealistic savings targets on all of Victoria's 76 health services, which will collectively see millions cut over coming years," Mr Pesutto claimed.

"These funding cuts follow confirmation that more than a dozen regional health services suffered operating losses across 2022-23, with projections that by June 2024 more than half of Victoria's health services face negative daily cash balances."

However CEO Jan Child has said Bass Coast Health (BCH) will continue to grow local services.

Ms Child said BCH was "actively and constructively" participating in the Health Service planning consultation process being undertaken across the state by the expert advisory committee.

"BCH recognises that the Victorian health system, with over seventy individual health

services, is out of step with munity Hospital construction other National and International health jurisdictions.

We also acknowledge that BCH and its community has benefited significantly from its more formal partnerships with other health services over the past seven years, and are keen to ensure these successes are embedded into future health care design."

Ms Child said the Bass Coast community had enjoyed a significant increase in state funding over the past seven years, growing from a \$50 million funding base, to 140 million recurrent funding this financial year.

'This growth has delivered significant increases in the clinical services provided to the Bass Coast and South Gippsland communities," she said.

"This operational funding increase has been enabled by funding which saw the completion of Stage 1 of the new Wonthaggi Hospital, the Phillip Island Health Hub, and the new Phillip Island Community Hospital which is due for completion in 2025.

"BCH has also commenced work with the Victorian Health Building Authority, to commence planning for the Stage 2 election commitment."

The Phillip Island Com-

is progressing, with the first stage of the new building expected to be largely completed by the end of 2024 (see separate story).

Ms Child said like all public health services, BCH was focused on delivering care "in a financially responsible and sustainable manner".

'We continue to look for opportunities to ensure our funding is directed to high priority clinical service and this means we focus on efficiencies in oth-

"For the 20 plus years I have worked in public health as an administrator, we have instituted Financial Management Improvement Plans (FMIP) to ensure that tax payer funds are used appropriately," Ms Child said.

"This is good governance, and I think the expectation of community members who pay

Two of the key priorities for BCH in this year's FMIP is the reduction of rental properties for staff accommodation, and recruitment of permanent staff to facilitate the shift from casual and locum workforce.

"Both of these strategies have made good progress this financial year and we anticipate being able to reduce those costs

next year," Ms Child stated.

"Bass Coast Health has agreed the BCH Priorities with the Department, and like previous years, is aiming to break even at the end of this financial year."

BCH has always had a strong focus on fundraising, with the local auxiliaries and community contributing millions of dollars over the past five years to fund equipment and service infrastructure.

We strongly encourage our community to give to their local hospital" said Ms Child.

"It is this funding that allowed us to build the L Rigby Cancer Centre at Wonthaggi, and it is the community's local generosity that helps BCH provide upgraded infrastructure and state of the art equipment, and also ensure health department funds are directed to support clinical care."

She said BCH has always had a history of low cash reserves, but stated "this is managed proactively and transparently with the Department of Health, who have provided strong support so that BCH can continue to grow local services".

"BCH's budget planning for 2024/25 has commenced and we will continue to review opportunities to balance efficiencies with service delivery."

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# Customers, pharmacy protest parking plans

### **COWES CRD**

Hundreds of customers have rallied in support of a Cowes pharmacy petition urging Bass Coast Shire to re-think plans to reduce carparking in Thompson Avenue. Priceline Pharmacy since January has had an instore petition asking customers whether they found it "exceptionally difficult to navigate through traffic and find a car park?".

The petition, which has so far been signed by more than 500 people, explains under the shire's Cowes streetscape master plan, Thompson Avenue will be one way in a northerly direction, with one way either east or west along the Esplanade, which was passed at the March council meeting.

Under the plan Thompson Avenue between the Esplanade and Chapel Street will lose 42 car parks – down to 24 from the current 66

This section will also change from the current angled parking to parallel parking, with time restrictions on parking.

Priceline managing partner Greg Kossena said while the streetscape plan was initially released in 2022 for public consultation, he created the petition this year in advance of the rollout of proposed changes (see separate story), particularly after councillors voted in support of Thompson Avenue going oneway.

The petition states "most concerning is car parking in this area of Cowes alone will be reduced by almost 40 per cent".

"Just imagine how much more difficult finding a carpark will be once these changes are made," the petition reads.

"There will be no further increase in disabled parking with only two parks in this entire area."

## Support?

Greg said in January he received an email from the shire seeking his support – "to dem-

onstrate the widespread community backing for this initiative" – for an upcoming grant application for the streetscapes plan.

"I said I support beautifying a somewhat tired-looking Cowes main street, which is generally wanted by everyone," Greg said.

"But I see a problem in that both traffic flow and car park availability will be heavily impacted."

Greg said even now traffic and parking were "in chaos" in peak time, with Thompson Avenue congestion leading to a snarl in the parking at the rear of the pharmacy. "Just yesterday there was an accident at the back with someone trying to get a car park," he said

"Another customer was given a parking fine when she double parked in summer because she couldn't find a park and had to run in here to get antibiotics.

"That kind of thing happens all the time."

Greg said he was also concerned the streetscape plan proposed closing the existing laneway from Thompson Avenue to access the rear of shop carparking (next to Anerie restaurant), making the only entry/exit point Warley Avenue.

"This means more difficulty

for customers to access businesses and in the case of the pharmacy elderly or frail patients require easier access and more parking – rather than reduced parking – for vital medication and vaccinations."

Greg said feedback from customers and visitors signing the petition was that the shire was "making car parking the

enemy".

"This will hurt businesses.
"Apart from people who ride
their bike to get a coffee, generally people drive to Cowes, especially elderly customers who
come from a distance.

"It's frustrating. The shire needs to be explaining how this is going to be rolled out and how they think it will work. How are people going to get here? It's imaginary."

## 2022

When the streetscape plan was released in 2022 for community consultation, locals at

the drop-in sessions said while they liked a pedestrian-friendly Thompson Avenue, they predicted a parking snarl.

The plan also proposes that parking will be at the transit centre, the existing carparks behind Pino's off Bass Avenue and behind Priceline off Warley Avenue.

Bass Avenue currently has six formal and 42 informal parks, and under the plan will have 40 dedicated parks.

Thompson Avenue south – between Chapel and Church streets – currently has 73 parks and under the plan this will drop to 61. Chapel Street – between Warley and Bass avenues – will lose about five parks

A significant number of car park spaces in Thompson Avenue and on the Cowes Esplanade are currently being leased on an annual basis by the Bass Coast Council to four restaurateurs for use as outdoor dining spaces.

## What changes to expect to Cowes CBD

Cowes street masterplan project timelines, starting from 2022:

## Projects in the first three years include:

- formalise one-way vehicle traffic east and west from Thompson Avenue;
- implement trial for one-way vehicle access northbound only on Thompson Avenue from Chapel Street;
- transition car parking on Thompson Avenue between Church Street and Chapel Street to short-term managed parking restrictions (length of stay, time limits);
- reduce speed limit to 20km/hr along Thompson Avenue north of Chapel Street; and reduce speed limit to 30km/hr along Thompson Avenue between Church Street and Chapel Street.

## Projects in three to 10 years:

- transition vehicle traffic to one-way access northbound on Thompson Avenue from Chapel Street;
- retrofit Chapel Street roundabout to accommodate change to vehicle access to Thompson Avenue;
- install a new public toilet at Olive Justice Place, ensuring the design and location can be incorporated into a future overall upgrade to the broader Olive Justice Place area.



# Home destroyed in **Smiths Beach inferno**

A house in Marlin Street, Smiths Beach, was engulfed in flames last Tuesday night (April 9)

Phillip Island Fire Brigade said they responded to a "fully involved house fire" at approximately 9pm. It took around an hour to contain the fire, which was attended by 25 volunteer fire fighters and three appliances from Phillip Island, plus one each from San Remo, Kilcunda and Wonthaggi.

Unfortunately the house could not be

Two occupants in the house were taken to hospital with non-life-threatening injuries. One neighbour said when he realised the house was on fire he called Triple 0, but the CFA were already on the way.

"I thought the house next door was going to go. The flames were lapping on it," he told the Advertiser.

Then the CFA crew arrived and they could see it was going to catch the next

"It was amazingly brave – they just charged in. It was so hot and scary.

"They risked their lives to save that next

He said with the windy conditions and the big trees on the property, it's amazing only one house was lost, and no one was

"It was great work," he said, praising the expertise of the local fire crews.

Crews were called back to the site at 1.30pm the next day, after the fire reignited.

Police have since confirmed a man has been arrested, after the fire was deemed suspicious.

A crime scene has been established and an arson chemist attended the scene.

A 53-year-old Phillip Island man is currently assisting police with their enquiries.

## Lights out for shearwater migration

### WILDLIFE

Phillip Island Nature Parks is enlisting the help of local businesses and communities to protect short-tailed shearwater chicks on their first migration north.

This year, the annual campaign, Dark Sky So Shearwaters Fly, will run from April 19 to May 10, and will ask residents and businesses in the bird flight path to switch off their lights for up to 10 nights to minimise risks to the seabirds and to motorists.

Each year, shearwater chicks make their 14,000km first flight to Alaska in late April or early May. Bright manmade light sources can be a fatal attraction for the young seabirds as they learn to fly. They are drawn to street lighting and land on roads, becoming a hazard to themselves and to motorists, particularly on the San Remo bridge.

Phillip Island Nature Parks Senior Scientist Dr Duncan Sutherland said it had been a tough year for shearwater breeding, so all help was needed to ensure the fledglings made a safe, successful trip north.

"Monitoring of our research nest boxes in February suggested it would be a less productive breeding season this year," Dr Sutherland said.

"Not only were there fewer eggs laid in De-

cember than the past few years, but the hatching success of those eggs was also lower. This means there are likely to be fewer chicks migrating this April."

Last year, 419 short-tailed shearwater birds were rescued from roads, of which two had to later be euthanised due to extensive injury. Another 237 birds were found dead on the roads after being hit by

Cape Woolamai and the Penguin Parade were hotspots for live rescues, while dead seabirds were retrieved at Forrest Caves and the start of The Esplanade in Surf Beach, with the sites accounting for more than half of the deceased birds in the area.

To minimise casualties and fatalities of the chicks, Phillip Island Nature Parks has partnered with the Department of Transport and Planning, Bass Coast Shire

Council, AusNet, WE-EF LIGHTING, Bunurong Land Council Aboriginal Corporation, the Victorian Ornithological Research Group and the local community as part of the Shearwater Rescue Program.

"Our target is to have 35 businesses sign up to our campaign and pledge to turn their lights off in the interest of keeping the shearwater chicks and the community safe," Dr Sutherland said.

"Turning off artificial light sources at night and being vigilant when driving during this short period will give young shearwater chicks the best chance of a safe departure this year."

AusNet Services will switch off the lights on the San Remo bridge for up to 10 nights during the peak departure period to minimise the number of birds flocking to the bridge, causing a hazard to drivers.

# Debt

## - The Good, the Bad and the Ugly!

his editorial will dive into the topic of debt and how they rank on a scale of good to bad and even ugly. All debt involves the same basic principle, borrowing money in the present (to buy things) and pay it back in the future. The cost of debt is the interest (and other fees) you have to pay for the benefit of using the money in the present.

The purpose of the funds borrowed can usually determine whether it is good or bad debt as well as your financial circumstances and objectives. If you use debt to increase your wealth then it would be seen as good debt, whereas if the money borrowed is used to purchase a depreciating asset it would be classified as bad debt. Moreover any debt becomes ugly if you can't pay it back! Therefore debt can be a double-edge sword.

An example of good debt would be borrowing money for investment purposes, such as buying shares, as the reason for doing so is to increase your wealth. Additionally the interest payments are taxdeductible. The caveat and risk to this is if the return of the shares purchased does not cover the cost of interest for the borrowed money then the shortfall must be paid via other means which could be selling down the shares.

A loan to build a business including equipment finance, also generally tax-deductible, would be seen as another type of good debt provided the loan is used to grow the enterprise. However if the funds were used to keep the business solvent and pay salaries or debtors it would be bad debt.

Similarly a home loan could be seen as good debt, although interest payments are not tax deductible, as the funds are used to buy a home to secure your future and ultimately own an asset thereby increasing your wealth. It is generally a necessary evil because for most Australians buying a home with cash outright is very difficult. As the debt is paid down you build equity which can be released for investments outside the home and thus accumulate even more wealth.

A home loan can also become bad debt

if the debt to income ratio (monthly debt repayments divided by your monthly income) is high and circumstances change. such as increasing interest rates or inflation, that places financial stress on repayments, or if there is a property crash and the debt is greater than its value.

The final debt that could also be classified as good debt is a student loan (HELP or HECS) because they are an investment in your future to enhance your career options that may have higher earning potential. The repayments are based on your ability to pay it back meaning you have to earn a certain level of income first and then it is scaled.

As for bad debt, any loan that's used to buy an asset that decreases in value can be viewed as bad debt. As mentioned this could be the case for investment and home loans if shares or property fall in value, but generally speaking it is car loans that fall into this category as they are notorious for depreciating the moment you drive out of the dealership. Having said that, many people can't afford a car outright but need one to drive to work so a car loan may be the only choice.

Lastly, the ugly debt that is commonly well known but still widely used are credit cards, and personal loans as well as buy now, pay later services. These kinds of debt are predominately used to fund things that don't increase your wealth, plug a cashflow gap or in some instances fund the costs of existing debts. You can easily over-commit to spending what you can't afford and with interest rates anywhere from 6% to 20% or more, it is just another reason to avoid this type of debt.

To conclude, as debt can be good and bad, it is important to consider how debt will impact your lifestyle and wealth before making a financial decision to borrow money. And as there are many types of loans to choose from it is prudent to do your research as well as seek professional financial advice to make an informed decision on whether to take on

# Minister's planning intervention criticised

The government's new Development Facilitation Program (DFP), to expedite faster planning approvals for larger commercial developments that have "significant economic benefits", has again come under fire.

The objector who took the Isle of Wight developer to VCAT, has spoken out about the Victorian Planning Minister's intervention in the case describing it as undemocratic.

As reported, Planning Minister Sonya Kilkenny last month used new powers to make an amendment to the Bass Coast Shire planning scheme to green light the \$85 million Isle of Wight development, which was approved by councillors to go ahead in September last year.

The Minister's intervention came after the development was delayed when one of the objectors to the proposal appealed to VCAT, with mediation scheduled for March and a hearing scheduled for May 20.

"A major judicial system has been eradicated from

Victoria. Her decision has eroded the state's legal system," the objector said.

"We have had our legal rights taken away. Everyone in the state has.

"Developers just want to make money – good luck to them – but it's got to be done appropriately and that appropriateness now rests with one person, the minister."

The objector said they didn't oppose the construction of the hotel, but rather wanted to "elevate the architecture in line with the natural surroundings".

They said while there were significant disappointments in the outcome, a victory was gained when a condition was placed on the developer to ensure external lighting must follow best practice national light pollution guidelines for wildlife.

Earlier this month, Island Voice planning spokeswoman Linda Marston said the "unprecedented" intervention by the minister should be "of enormous concern to everyone".

She cited "the loss of transparency, the lack of reporting back on the amendment to a third party and loss of ability for members of the community to be heard by an independent panel in cases that are accepted for DFP".

"It also concerns me the State Government has over-ridden its own process at VCAT. Is this the start of phasing out how people challenge planning decisions after council consideration?"

Previously Phillip Island Conservation Society president Greg Johnson said the minister's intervention was "regretful" and the normal planning process protected the community's best interests and "should not be undermined".

"PICS does not support site-specific ministerial interventions," Greg said.

It is unclear how the minister's DFP powers can more broadly be used to intervene in any major project, with the minister required to provide a report to Parliament at least every 12 months, detailing the nature of the interventions.

In the past year, the State Government has been moving to take planning controls away from

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
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

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

Mr Barberio later told the Advertiser he did not consider the decision "a loss nor am I unhappy with the result".

"We voiced our various concerns, we followed due process and a decision was made," he said. "We were realistic and

dock is open for residential development." Mr Barberio said several concerns, including that there should be a second entrance/exit for safety

reasons, were not consid-

"We felt that our concerns had substantial merit however VCAT considered otherwise and rigidly stuck to the letter of the existing planning laws," he said.

"We were disappointed with the attitudes of BCSC and the developer/owner in not having a more sympathetic community approach, but the lure of maximum profit from the developments was paramount to them.

'The five per cent contribution showed disregard for the community facility within the subdivision that would enhance community spirit and social exchange."

# The science of reading

## **EDUCATION**

Newhaven College Prep students celebrated a very special milestone at the end of Term 1 – the presentation of reading folders, marking the beginning of their journey towards becoming proficient readers.

The students' families participated in the much anticipated celebration by joining in a book reading party.

The junior school has introduced a new reading program into its curriculum this year, based on the Science of Reading Program.

The program addresses how children learn to read, how to ensure every student learns to read, and what to do if a child encounters difficulty with reading, said Cath Huther, Head of Junior School, as she explained the change.

"Our commitment to implementation of the Science of Reading program aims to ensure that the best possible literacy instruction is delivered to every student, based on the research undertaken.

"Research demonstrates that there is a known pathway to reading in the brain, which relies on connecting speech sounds to identify the printed word, and the program is based on this finding.

"Instead of asking children to memorise words, letter sounds are introduced to students, who learn that a particular letter, or sequence of letters, has different sounds. After these are taught, words can be successfully sounded out.

"Children with disabilities, dyslexia or no challenges at all benefit from this method," Cath

"As the Science of Reading research points out, if a child memorises ten words, the child can read ten words. But if a child can identify the sounds of ten letters, and letter sequences, the child will be able to read 350 three-letter words, 4320 four-letter words, and 21,650 five-letter words.

"Children can pick up a reader with relative confidence, when they have the tools to identify words in the books they are presented with."

Cath said a lot of time, focus and accumulation of resources has been spent at Newhaven College in implementing the Science of Reading approach, and that results at this early stage reflect a very positive impact.

"Our dedicated teachers have been working to build up our resources to run this program, and results are impressive", she says.

All Junior School students are given decodable reading folder to take home which is designed to help children and parents build on what has been taught at

Additionally, Year 3-6 students are also benefiting from a new program called Spelling Mastery, which combines with the new reading program.

Cath is enthusiastic about the early results, and pleased to see nightly reading habits with parents flourishing at home.

"Our ultimate aim is simple: to foster a love for reading; growth in literacy skills; and to ensure that every child at Newhaven College learns to read and reads well.'



# SpeedSeries makes stellar Round 3 return

The Shannon's SpeedSeries kicked off Round 3 of its calendar season at the Phillip Island Circuit over the weekend.

Six categories, including the Fanatec GT World Challenge Australia, Supercheap Auto TCR Series, Trico Trans Am Series, Monochrome GT4 Australia, First Focus Radical Cup and the Porsche Michelin Sprint Challenge all took to the track across the three days.

The three-day event saw the largest crowd ever recorded on the island for a SpeedSeries round, with a total of 17,869 in attendance across the 72 hours.

Free practice Friday (plus an end-of-day qualifying session for both the Porsche Michelin Sprint Challenge and Trico Trans Am Series) gave fans a taster of the weekend to come.

Saturday morning wrapped up the remaining qualifying sessions, making way for the varying races across the afternoon and Sunday.

## **Trico Trans Am Series**

The Trans Ams hit the tarmac on Friday morning for the first of two practice sessions. James Moffat (Team Valvoline GRM) took timing honours during the opening wet session, piloting his Ford Mustang to a best of 1:42.0272

Picking up the pace by 10 seconds during the second, afternoon dry session, James Golding (CTE Custom Transport Equipment) lapped a 1:32.3428, setting Supercheap Auto TCR Series him in good stead for qualifying. Golding took out pole position and wrapped up Friday's on track action with a 1:31.3807. Moffat took second place on the grid to make up row one.

Saturday afternoon's shortened first race for the Trans Ams (a crash in the Fanatec GT's causing delays) saw Moffat claim to victory after pouncing on Golding's pole position during the first lap, relegating Golding to second place by the end of the 11 lapper.

Following on in third place more than five seconds later, Elliott Cleary (The Racing Academy) crossed the finish line, making Race 1 a triple Mustang podium.

Sunday morning's second race of the weekend, saw Nash Morris (Supercheap Auto Racing) take the top five by storm after two stellar overtakes during lap one, setting him as race leader and winner by the time the checkered flag was waved. Just over half-a-second later, Moffat crossed the line in second, along with Golding in third.

Closing out the weekend's Trans Am track time, Race 3 saw Friday's pole-sitter Golding, victorious after starting from third on the grid, earning him the overall round win.

Just seven-tenths later, Todd Hazelwood (TFH Hire Services) took out second place, charging his way through the field after starting the race from fifth place. Morris went on to take third place after a tricky race start.

## Fanatec GT World Challenge Australia

The GT Challenge kicked off with a wet practice on Friday morning.

Brad Schumacher and Will Brown (Shaw & Partners/Kelso Electrical) piloted the Audi R8 LMS to top spot with a best of 1:34.9456.

Ticking into the afternoon however, Chaz Mostert (Arise Racing GT) produced the best time during the second practice session - along with taking fastest on the combined session times clocking in a 1:26.2569 in the eagerly anticipated Ferrari 296 GT3.

Saturday's qualifying sessions saw the Arise Racing GT team on pole, along with a double first and second podium place during Race 1.

Mostert and Liam Talbot piloted the Ferrari 296 GT3 to a debut victory, with teammates Jaxon Evans and Elliot Schutte in second. Schumacher and Brown crossed the line just seven-tenths of a second behind the second-place getters.

Sunday's second and final GT race for the round, saw New Zealand duo Brendon Leitch and Tim Miles (Dayle ITM/ Team MPC) take first place on the podium in the Audi R8 LMS.

Realta/Tigani Motorsport duo, Paul Lucchitti and Jayden Ojeda took out second place, with Schumacher and Brown placing third for the second time across the weekend.

The hot hatch TCR's took to the track for the first of two practice sessions late on Friday morning.

With weather conditions improving, the turbo charged bullets set rapid times on the charts, Zac Soutar (Tufflift Racing) and the Audi RS3 LMS claimed best with 1:36.6598 during lap nine.

However, taking timing glory during both Practice 2 and the combined sheets, was Honda Wall Racing's, Tony D'Alberto, tipping the Honda Civic R FL5 into the 1.35s.

D'Alberto would continue his good run into qualifying, taking out pole position as well as an all-time lap record for the TCR's (1:35.2163).

His luck during Race 1 however, would run out after an incident at Turn relegating him to the back of the pack.

HMO Customer Racing's Josh Buchan piloted the Hyundai i30N to a race victory, with Soutar and Dylan O'Keeffe (Autoglym/Ashley Seward Motorsport) in second and third.

Race 2 and 3 saw Brad Harris (Exclusive Switchboards) reign victorious in the Honda Civic R FL5 - claiming both race wins, along with the overall round

Taking out second and third place, teammates Aaron Cameron and Ryan Casha piloted their Peugeot 308's to a double podium, respectively.

In Race 3, Ben Bargwanna (Hangcha Racing) crossed the line more than a second after Harris, followed by Buchan in

Offshore, there has been quality bigger model gummies but are seeming to be a rare sight within the bay.
