Get the motors running

It was a day of highs and lows pionship bodies continuing. last Thursday with the news of a new Motorsport super event scheduled for Phillip Island in October followed quickly by the announcement of the state's sixth

While even the lockdown couldn't take the shine off what potentially could be a lifesaver for the local economy, it did highlight just how precarious the current Covid situation is, and the difficulty of scheduling events and attracting visitors to the area.

The new event, dubbed the Bass Coast Festival of Motorsport, will see Supercars and Superbikes arrive on Phillip Island from October

Replacing the MotoGP, it's described as a weekend of elite motorsport action, headlined by a round of the marquee Supercars series.

The Minister for Tourism Sport and Major Events, Martin Pakula said the event will attract thousands of visitors to the Phillip Island Grand Prix Circuit and the wider Bass Coast region in October.

In addition to the Supercars' Phillip Island Supersprint, the Bass Coast Festival of Motorsport and Porsche Carrera Cup championship racing.

added with talks with other cham- Pakula said.

The government described the new event as "a major fillip for local businesses in the wake of the cancellation of the 2021 Australian

GP cancellation a blow

When the Moto GP was cancelled in July, Bass Coast Mayor, Cr Brett Tessari described it as a "real blow", saying the MotoGP was the biggest sporting event in regional Victoria and major event on the Bass Coast event calendar.

'The economic benefit it brings to Bass Coast Shire is in excess of \$30 million," Cr Tessari told the Advertiser at the time.

"The decision to cancel on the back of last year will compound the major negative economic impact for the whole region and especially for Phillip Island.

"For some industries, the event represents up to 10 per cent of their annual income."

The announcement of the new event will be welcomed by hospitality and accommodation providers in the region, who have been hard hit by the pandemic impacts.

"This new weekend of motorswill boast Australian Superbikes port action is going to be a major winner for race fans and will provide a real boost for businesses Further attractions could be across the Bass Coast," Minister

Australian Grand Prix Corporation CEO Andrew Westacott described the opportunity as a bonanza, having "championship rounds of Supercars leading into Bathurst and one of the final rounds of the Australian Superbike Championship", while Sean Seamer, CEO of Australian Supercars said fans and drivers loved the Phillip Island track.

"It's exciting to be getting back there for the first time since 2019."

The Australian MotoGP is contracted to be held at Phillip Island until at least 2026.

Business impact

The new event has been welcomed by Bass Coast Shire Council, with Mayor, Cr Brett Tessari saying: "It's just wonderful to see action back at the greatest grand prix track in the world. The island and the whole Bass Coast will be rapt. It's uplifting and fantastic."

The council said it was pleased "the work we have been doing behind the scenes" had paid off.

However details of what that be put in place to keep everyone as involved, or any plans the council safe as possible. had to help businesses capitalise on the Motorsport festival, were not forthcoming.

"The Bass Coast Festival of Motorsport is a welcome initiative Coast Festival of Motorsport inand an important step towards our economic recovery," a Council

spokesperson said.

"We are still in the very early planning stages and we will have more information as soon as the details become available."

For Kim Storey from Destination Phillip Island, the announcement was welcome news.

"Forty-four percent of our local economy is based on the tourism economy," Kim said.

We're ready to welcome event visitors and be back in the spotlight for our iconic motorsport venue – the event will deliver a vibrancy we have missed.'

Local traders groups agreed. Craig Edmonds, president of the San Remo District Tourism and Business Association, said once

Lockdown lifted

With no cases in regional Victoria, the lockdown in regional areas lifted on Monday night.
But the regions will still operate un-

der restrictions, including no private gatherings at home, and visits to Melbourne only for permitted reasons.

'While we continue to get on top of this outbreak in Melbourne, minimal primary close contacts and no new cases means we can ease setting in regional Victoria," the Premier Daniel Andrews said.

'This outbreak is an important reminder that until more Australians are vaccinated, we cannot afford complacency to creep in – we must

stay safe to stay open."

The Premier and the Chief Health
Officer called on regional Victorians to get vaccinated as soon as possible.

"One of the most important things regional Victorians can do as we ease restrictions is to get themselves vaccinated to protect their family, friends, and their community.

Eligible Victorians can book in at one of 50 open access sites across the state, through a Commonwealth clinic or a GP.

There have been no new coronavirus cases in regional Victoria and thousands of primary close contacts have been cleared from the regions over the last few weeks.

From 11.59pm on Monday night, the five reasons to leave the home were removed in regional Victoria and there is no limit on the distance regional Victorians can travel from

home. Face masks are mandatory in-

doors and outdoors.

People will only be able to travel to Melbourne for a permitted reason and must follow the Melbourne restrictions once there.

In what will be a blow to local families keen to catch up with friends and relatives, private gatherings are still not permitted at home.

However, outdoor gatherings in public spaces can occur with up to 10 people.

Dine out

Cafes and restaurants have reopened, but only for seated service with strict density requirements of one person per four square metres and a maximum of 100 people per venue.

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Offshore break in

Offshore Theatre Phillip Island is reeling from the theft of thousands of dollars of equipment.

The group's storage shed was broken into between August 2 and 3, with sound and lighting equipment stolen. Other items, including hand tools and torches were also taken.

Police believe the break in occurred at the same time as a burglary at the Council's Cowes depot, where tools including chainsaws, were also sto-

Offshore's president Amanda Price said the robbery was devastating, given the hardship the theatre group is already enduring due to Covid.

"Entertainment is taking a big blow because of the circumstances we are in," Amanda said.

Then to have someone come and take what the community has built up over all these decades ... you just feel winded.'

The theft was discovered when Amanda visited the shed last Tuesday to return lights that had been borrowed by the San Remo Primary School.

"When I opened the front door, I saw the back door was swinging

"I tried to shut it, but then realised it had been jimmied and broken."

Amanda went straight to the shed's electronics room, where she was confronted with empty walls. The thieves targeted the collection of sound and lighting equipment, which has been

amassed over many years.

The theatre group is still trying to work out exactly what was taken.

"Our treasurer made a registry of all our equipment recently, but there were also tools stolen," Amanda said.

"I found empty toolboxes, empty shelves. They've even taken the little torches we use backstage.

"It's quite a bit of stuff when you add it all up.'

As a community theatre group, Amanda said they don't have the funds to go out and buy new equip-

"This is stuff we have acquired over many years. As we earn cash, we buy

And although the group does have insurance, any claim would attract an excess, and could potentially bump up its insurance premiums.

Now the group has to work out exactly what has been taken, and look at ways to replace it.

"It will probably cost us at least \$5-6000 to replace it all."

The financial stress could not have come at a worse time, with the group struggling to put on performances, due to the loss of the Cultural Centre and the pandemic restrictions.

"At the moment, with no Cultural Centre, we've been doing readings in local halls, so when we do that, we have to light it ourselves," Amanda explained.

À reading scheduled for August has now been moved to October, due to the current lockdown.

Fortunately, Amanda had several lights and some equipment at her home at the time of the break in.

"I'm grateful that I can at least light

lights I had taken home to help put together a lighting plot."

The group is keeping a sharp eye online, in case any of the stolen equipment comes up for sale.

This is the irony. Everybody is saying to us, go to the buy and sell sites.

'Number one, to see if our stuff gets listed there for sale, and two, to replace what was stolen," Amanda said.

"But I worry if we go on there, are we buying stolen goods? I don't want to buy equipment that's been stolen." Amanda said the next step is to contact the insurers.

"I don't know what we are going to do, but we have to replace the equipment if we want to keep operating.

"And we have to be insured, so we

don't want that to go up.' With little prospect of income from

that little show, using the minimal upcoming shows - "these are not profit-making, they're just keeping us relevant and giving members an outlet" - Amanda said it was hard to see how the costs will be covered.

"This Covid thing hits all community groups.

"We have to pay rent on our shed, we still have to pay for insurance,

"There are thousands of little bills that come up, sucking up the monetary resources we've built up over the years."

Bass Coast Criminal Investigation Unit is investigating the break in and said any information from the public is appreciated.

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

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Cowes east steps up erosion battle

blocked to the public for the next three months to make way for new groynes - followed next year by a rockwall - to protect against increasing erosion.

Construction of eight timber groynes - measuring 30 metres long and spaced about 60 metres apart is set to start from August 23 east of Rose Avenue and be finished by early December, "subject to weather, tides and Covid-19 restrictions".

A planned 300 metre rockwall to be built between Rose Avenue and Coghlan Road will start after summer in February and will finish by December 2022, with the tender for

construction set to be released by the shire.

A pathway will be built at the rear of the rock wall to connect Cowes with Silverleaves in a coastal walk.

The \$2.58 million project received a \$1.05 million Australian Government grant, with the remaining \$1.53 million coming from Bass Coast Shire, with the groynes costing \$730,000.

Local residents say the short-term pain is worth the long-term gain with six years of lobbying finally resulting in the works to stop erosion.

Last year the residents celebrated after a green light was given to the groyne and rockwall construction, following the release of an engineers'

report and Federal government funding, promised at the last election.

Cowes East Foreshore Preventative Action Group (CEFPAG) chair Ken Hailey said the project took on board all the recommendations from the engineers' report.

"We are fully supportive of the work being done. Full credit to the shire for pursuing such a major project," Ken said.

"While the rockwall will prevent erosion, the groynes will keep the beach there. If you don't have them, there will be no beach.

"This will solve erosion problems from Erehwon Point to Coghlan Road. Locals appreciate the inconvenience. It's a necessary evil to get vulnerable assets it completed."

Erosion

Cr Michael Whelan said he supported the formation of a community reference group to keep locals up to date on developments.

We have effectively had that with the East Cowes Foreshore group," Cr Whelan said.

"It has represented the community on this issue very well, they make sure they are well informed, and effective in their advocacy.

"The locals in that area have been alarmed at the impact of the rising sea level and the loss of the dunes.

Shire mayor Brett Tessari said erosion had increased significantly over the past 10 years.

"The existing structures that were built at Cowes east to minimise erosion are now degraded and are no longer working effectively," Cr Tessari said.

"The new groynes and seawall will offer a long-term solution to help protect the beach and public assets from further damage.

Up to now the shire has protected Cowes east from erosion by beach scraping, using machinery to move sand and placing it in front of the

This is considered "sacrificial sand" as it is washed away but provides temporary protection.

Beach scraping will continue until the rockwall is built.

A site shed will be built on the road reserve near Rose Avenue and beach access restrictions will be in


"The project will result in noise and vibration from heavy plant and machinery, including offshore pile driving from a 40-tonne excavator and use of trucks and cranes," a notice at the beach states.

The shire notice states the eight grovnes will accumulate sand on the beach and reduce the size of waves that damage the foreshore, stopping the beach from being washed away.

Two existing groynes will be replaced and six will be new, each longer than previous beach groynes.

In 2018 the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning constructed three 24 metre groynes west of Rose Avenue, with successful results.

Locals will be kept up to date with the current project via letter box drops or at basscoast.vic.gov.au.



Goose plan imminent

A final plan to control Phillip Island's growing populations of Cape Barren geese, wallabies and possums is expected to be released soon.

Earlier this year a draft Wildlife Management Plan – produced by Nature Parks with Bass Coast Shire, farmers and the state government - was released for public consulta-

The draft proposed a range of control options for these three animals and came in response to criticism by farmers and other groups - such as the golf course and Newhaven College – where Cape Barren geese were "pooing and chewing" their way through the landscape; with residents and businesses also reporting significant damage from wallabies and possums.

Control options included geese egg removal, the introduction of native predators on Phillip Island such as owls and quolls, the use of browsing repellents on revegetation areas, and access by Indigenous Australians for cultural use such as harvesting eggs.


The draft did not rule out lethal methods, although it stated "the number of applications for lethal control (of geese) have increased in recent years"


Last week Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning senior wildlife officer Carolien Schoenborn provided an update saying since the public consultation, the department had been working to review and finalise the plan.

'We are pleased to advise that we are now in the final stages of the process and look forward to sharing the plan with you soon," Carolien said.

Preliminary survey results released earlier this year showed the community was divided in its support for the draft plan, evenly split for and against when asked whether they supported managing wildlife to balance conservation, public safety, social and economic

Of those submissions received, about 60 per cent supported research on understanding wildlife's impact on the community.

Daffodils bloom online

The popular Daffodil Day fundraiser held last year due to Covid, which means less each August has had to move online, due to Covid restrictions.

Instead of donating via local stalls, on August 27, Cancer Council is encouraging Victorians to donate online, and fund vital cancer research.

For the past 21 years, Jacqui Luscombe and Mel Marks have run a stall - or sometimes two – in Cowes to raise money for the Cancer Council.

This year their fundraising efforts have again been upended by Covid

'Our last stall was in 2019 and we raised \$2950, our biggest year ever," Jacqui said.

Over the years, Jacqui estimates the stall has raised over \$33,000, "which is incred-

ible for a small community". As well as the bunches of daffodils and the usual Daffodil Day merchandise, the Cowes stalls stocked a selection of Mel's homemade jams and lemon butter, as well

as locally grown fresh fruit. On average, they raised \$1500 each year. Jacqui is hoping the local community will take their generous support online and

make a donation. According to the Cancer Council, it lost close to \$15 million in fundraising revenue money to fund cancer research, prevention programs and support services.

This is such a great cause, so anything people can do would be wonderful," said Jacqui.

"Everyone has been affected by cancer in some way.

"Some of the stories we hear on the street at our stalls have been heartbreaking."

Jacqui is hopeful with vaccination rates rising, next year the much-loved stalls will be able to return.

With help from Janine Courtis, Jacqui and Mel usually set up two stalls - one in the arcade near Woolworths and one on Thompson Avenue in front of the National

"The money we raise does make a difference. The cause is very beneficial to a lot of people," Jacqui said.

On average, 303 people are diagnosed with cancer in Bass Coast each year.

In 2020, Cancer Council invested \$23.7 million in cancer research and supported 72 people in Bass Coast diagnosed with cancer.



Too much Saltwater at Newhaven?

A battle appears to be confusion. bubbling at the site of the proposed hot springs in Newhaven, with the new business calling itself Saltwater Hot Springs on social media recently.

The announcement, a post on the Phillip Island Bathing and Wellness Facebook page, caught the eye of Ben Dennis, who runs the popular Saltwater restaurant and bar in Newhaven.

With the new hot springs set to include a restaurant and located a few kilometres from the Saltwater restaurant on the Newhaven Jetty, Ben believes the name double-up is ripe for

"I totally support what they're doing and I don't mind having competitors, but I'm not happy about them using that name," Ben

As the hot springs is yet to be completed or officially launched, he is hoping a new name can be agreed on.

Ben and his staff already deal with name confusion between Saltwater and Silverwater, including deliveries for his restaurant ending up at Silverwater Resort in San Remo.

"Having two Saltwaters in the same postcode, just down the road from each other, both restaurants and

wedding venues, it's going to be non-stop confusion, he said.

His initial attempts to resolve the issue have fallen on deaf ears, but Ben is still optimistic a solution can be found that suits both busi-

The owners of the hot springs did not respond to the Advertiser's request for comment.

Carnival owners extend their stay

been given a short-term lease to stay on their former 16ha property, despite the sale of the land being finalised on June 30.

Bass Coast Shire paid the Watkins family the final settlement price of \$2.7 million in instalments for the carnival land, on the corner of the Phillip Island and Ventnor roads, after a final agreement earlier this year, avoiding the need for compulsory acquisition.

The land will be home to the Phillip Island Aquatics and Recreation Precinct, which according to the shire "will provide Phillip Island with essential recreation and aquatics facility to improve the health and wellbeing of the local community and visitors to the Island".

The Watkins closed the carnival for the last time at Easter after more than 20 years at the location, and after about five decades of visiting the island, which had become a home base while they travelled Australia through the year with the carnival.

Shire CEO Ali Wastie told the Advertiser the site purchase was finalised on June 30, 2021 and was now owned by the

"Council has supported the former owner's request for a short-term lease while they finalise their arrangements to vacate," Ms Wastie said

Owner Brian Watkins in June told the Advertiser he still had nowhere to move his amusement rides and he may overstay the deadline.

Background

The carnival site was originally part of 32ha owned by the Phillip Island Shire, at the time mooted as a recreation hub, but was sold to the Watkins family by the commissioners at the time of council amalgamations in 1994.

Eight years ago the shire again identified the land as a location for a sports hub, aiming to turn the clock back to pre-1994.

The shire that same year bought back 16ha of the original land from the Watkins, calling it the Hilton Chadwick Reserve - which lies immediately to the west of the carnival site – for future use and development as part of a sporting precinct.

Draft concept designs and a feasibility study for the as-yetunfunded Phillip Island pool on the site were released to the public for feedback in May and

Based on that feedback, the designs and study will be finalised and adopted by council in coming months, with funding currently being sought from state and Federal governments.

Resident continues legal threat against shire

Last week the Advertiser reported Genista Street had failed in their bid to claim damages for flooding from the developer of the neighbouring Panorama estate because of a legal technicality.

The unit's residents had been seeking damages from Panorama estate developer, TCG Doreen Pty Ltd, at the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT) for "unreasonable flow of water"

But the claim was withdrawn last month, with the developer to pay its own costs and no order for costs against the body corporate.

Resident Trevor Fothergill said the claim had been withdrawn because all 95 Panorama lots were now not owned

owners who would soon start construction, and are expected to move in by Christmas.

Despite the loss, Mr Fothergill last week said he was seeking quotes from solicitors to take court action for an residents of a San Remo unit block on enforcement order against the shire and the developer to comply with the estate's planning permit.

Mr Fothergill said a claim for damages against the shire could still be pursued because he believed the shire consented "unlawfully to vary or change" Panorama's VCAT imposed permit conditions.

He said he believed this contravened the Planning and Environment Act, which does not allow councils to change VCAT imposed permit conditions except by further application to VCAT, "something which council did

Mr Fothergill said "the evidence was compelling for a claim against the shire" for "fixed events of unlawful

ment - and not subsequent developer activity

"Such a claim can still be brought within six years, so it is not ruled out," he said.

"About 20 other Victorian council websites warn permit seekers that permit conditions cannot be changed, once a permit is endorsed, other than by application for a new permit, so I am perplexed as to why the shire considers

it does not have to abide by the law."
Shire CEO Ali Wastie last month told the Advertiser drainage at the development was working and no rectification works were needed.

"While the planning permit has been amended, drainage requirements directed by VCAT were not changed," she said, adding the planning permit was issued by VCAT in 2014.

Emergency funding boost

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


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Petition calls for dust solutions



Cycling support

A petition for Council to construct a short bike path to connect Shelly Court and Shoalhaven Road in the Shearwater Estate in Cowes has attracted over 110 signatures.

However less than a quarter of those who signed live locally, with just 21 of the people listing their address as Cowes.

Most signatures came from visitors and keen cyclists from Melbourne or interstate who voiced their support for improved cycling infrastructure on the island.

'I ride my bike on Phillip Island and I think any developments that make riding safer for riders should be supported," said Steve Milton.

Rob Jarvis said councils should encourage cycling activities. 'Blocking cyclists is effectively discour-

aging opportunities for people to develop a healthy lifestyle," he said.

Melbourne visitor Matthew Katzen said: "I would certainly spend more time on holiday in Phillip Island if it had safer cycling infrastructure. Good for your health and the local economy.

Earlier this year, resident Madeleine Pitt complained about a rope barrier constructed by Bass Coast Shire Council on a nature strip in the Shearwater Estate.

Ms Pitt claimed the barrier was creating an unsafe junction with poor sight lines and started the petition to pressure council to change the barrier.

"We need an intelligent solution that reflects the needs of all residents," she said.

She launched the petition, which has now been forwarded to Bass Coast Shire Council and the Member for Bass Jordan Crugnale.

Neighbourhood concerns

However another Shearwater resident told the Advertiser they didn't have a problem with the current layout and Ms Pitt's campaign does not reflect the wishes of the majority of residents.

The resident, who preferred to remain anonymous, said the area in question is a council managed area and recreational vehicles and golf carts, are not permitted to use it.

"Bollards are present to stop this. Golf carts are for the road, not paths," they said.

"I do believe that a shared/dual path would be beneficial to all, but just use the current path, like the one on the other side of the estate.

"It works well and I see no reason why it wouldn't work here. But leave the carts on the road, where they are designed to be used."

They disagree with many of the statements raised in the petition and believe council is correct about the dangers of creating a new path, which would be a waste of ratepayers' money.

'The area was never designed for bicycle or golf cart use, it's a drainage area."

They also dispute the claim a new pathway would create a link between cycle paths to Cowes central and Rhyll.

There is no cycle path on this side of the estate or connection to any for this idea. Some are alluding to this as fact, but it's not true.

"A dedicated cycle path is already present to create this link and it's on the other side of the estate, 300 meters away, by way of a dual path. It appears some are suggesting this doesn't exist.'

Is this the road to ruin?

ratepayers being shortchanged with their roads?

Surf Beach resident Lou Pecora has accused Bass Coast Shire Council of using sub-standard material on its gravel roads.

Lou, a former engineer with VicRoads, says the new "shire blend" a combination of class three to four crushed rock - makes the dust issue worse, adding insult to injury for areas where the dust suppressant seal has been removed.

At a recent Council meeting, Lou asked "why has class two crushed rock - which is traditionally used for roads - been replaced with a class three to four "blend", which has a higher clay content".

He described it as "low quality" and said class three and four crushed rock is commonly used for base layers in light traffic, commercial site works and backfilling.

He described its use on busy residential roads as "unusual and totally inappropriate".

CEO Ali Wastie said a class three shire blend had been "specifically tailored" by the shire "to ensure optimal performance".

'Given the unbound nature of a class two crushed rock and its performance history on council's unsealed network this material type is not suitable for this application," Ms Wastie said.

"Cost savings was not a consideration over differing rock material types for these works."

Dust suppressant

In May, Lou and other residents of The Esplanade at Surf Beach unsuccessfully lobbied council to stop the removal of the dust suppressant seal.

However the seal was removed at the start of June, in line with Council's urban road management strategy.

In February 2020, General Manager James Stirton told the Advertiser the dust suppressant seals were undertaken as a trial between

to be low cost and temporary"

He said analysis of the trial in 2010 showed the seal was not sustainable over the long-term and in 2013 council adopted a strategy to manage the situation. That strategy was to rip up the seals when the roads reached "intervention level" and replace them with crushed rock.

There was analysis undertaken at the time of the review which indicated costs to maintain the primer seal dust suppressant roads to be approximately six times that of an unsealed road," he said.

Now that the seal applied to The Esplanade in 2006 has been removed, Lou says the new gravel roads produce more dust than ever before.

"Residents will have to endure more mud and dust than prior to the dust suppressant seal.'

He dismisses claims from the shire that use of the "shire blend" is not driven by cost considerations.

"The shire blend is about five per

In response to the question, Shire 2005 and 2007 and were "designed cent cheaper than class two and easier and cheaper to maintain.

> "If cost was not a consideration. why on earth would anyone use this material knowing it has more detrimental effects to people's health and wellbeing?"

> Lou said the new surface on The Esplanade has reduced pedestrian and bicycle traffic to a trickle, with walkers forced to wear boots to navigate the sludge on the road.

He has raised all his concerns in a detailed letter to every councillor.

The council has also come under fire for failing to put consistent signage in place since the dust suppressant seal was removed.

Three new signs saying "Speed Means Dust" have been installed.

"Not only are the three new dust signs inadequate, but there is not one new speed sign in the 1.5 km of rehabilitated works," Lou explained.

Council has said the new signage is

intended to slow vehicles down, and their effectiveness will be monitored.

Lou accused the council of failing to understand "the dynamics of unsealed roads" and ignoring the feedback from residents about the dust issues.

'Council's response shows a lack of empathy to the community's insufferable conditions," he said.

He's called on the council to overlay the rehabilitated road with a layer of class two crushed rock.

He also wants extra signs installed along The Esplanade, including 20km/h signs like the ones currently installed at the northern end of Batman Avenue.

Community consultation for a Special Charge Scheme to upgrade the roads in Surf Beach and Sunderland Bay is due to start later this year.

Residents along The Esplanade previously asked if its dust suppressant could be maintained until the Special Charge Scheme process was completed.

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

New vaccine appointments available

The state government is calling on all eligible Victorians to hadn't done so yet. book in for their vaccine.

Across the state, thousands of appointments for the CO-VID-19 Pfizer and AstraZeneca vaccines are available over the coming month, with further appointments set aside for priority health care workers and aged care and disability workers yet to be vaccinated.

The government said almost 60,000 Pfizer appointments and thousands for AstraZenca were now open.

Bass Coast Health (BCH) encouraged any locals eligible to receive their vaccination to book into the community clinic at the Wonthaggi Town Hall, noting there were people in the area eligible

While the centre does accept walk-ins for AstraZeneca shots and is currently not operating at capacity, people are encouraged to book in, to help BCH allocate the appropriate number of staff.

Anyone without a booking is advised to come during the middle of the day, with the busiest periods in the mornings, before 11am and after 3pm.

Bass Coast Health CEO Jan Child said BCH's vaccine roll out is reliant on receiving adequate supply.

"Our community should be aware that supply may change depending on where vaccines are diverted according to areas where Covid is posing the greatest risk at the time.

Ms Child also called on members of the public to be patient and kind and respect staff at the vaccination clinic, who are simply following the

"Our Vaccination team is here to implement the rules of the day. We are also required to ensure members of the public are safe and we are required therefore to comply with QR code scanning and screening requirements to minimise the Covid risk to our staff and the general public," she said.

"I am saddened by some members of the public who are clearly frustrated and take it out on our staff. We can assure you that we are working to get as many people vaccinated as possible.

"We are all committed to

providing a great service for available for first dose apour health service and compointments now, because the munity and we ask that you be patient and kind as we manage the changing landscape."

Supply, demand and effectiveness

The state government has stressed that both COVID-19 Pfizer and AstraZeneca vaccines are safe and effective.

A recent analysis shows that none of the locally acquired COVID-19 cases hospitalised during the July outbreak were fully vaccinated, which further highlights the importance of getting a vaccine as soon as you're eligible.

To help address vaccine hesitancy, the Department of Health will also publish graphs and tables every week online showing age and gender of vaccine recipients at Victoria's vaccination centres, as well as the type of vaccine administered.

The 60,000 new Pfizer appointments were added to the system following Victoria's decision to revise the recommended Pfizer second dose interval to six weeks.

This has freed up supply

pointments now, because the demand for subsequent second dose appointments can be met with September's projected increase in supply.

In a statement Gippsland Region Public Health Unit said the decision to extend the period between Pfizer doses would "help give more Gippslanders some level of protection against the virus, allowing more people to receive their first doses in the coming weeks.'

It said the change is consistent with Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) guidelines.

There is no change for people who already had their second Pfizer dose booked and they should attend their appointment as planned.

There is no change to the interval for the AstraZeneca

Victorians currently eligible for the vaccine under the Commonwealth's COVID-19 vaccination program include everyone aged 40 and over, and large numbers of people under 40 such as health care workers

derlying medical conditions.

The government announced last week that 18-39-year-olds will be able to receive an AstraZeneca vaccination, with informed consent, at state-run vaccinations centres, including Wonthaggi.

Gippsland Region Public Health Unit said bookings could be made for anyone aged 18-39 years, to receive the AstraZeneca vaccine.

The GRPHU also advised young people between 12-15 years who are at a higher risk of severe illness if they contracted Covid, are eligible to receive the Pfizer vaccine, with parent consent.

This includes children with specific medical conditions such as asthma, diabetes, obesity, cardiac and circulatory congenital anomalies, epilepsy and those who are immuno-compromised.

Sports and recreation clubs forced to cancel or postpone events due to the current lockdown will be able to apply for cash grants to defray costs.

The government has extended the application deadline for the Sporting Club Grants Program to August 27.
