Phillip Island's climate change impacts have accelerated

ENVIRONMENT

Climate change is set to have "considerable impacts" on Phillip Island's environment in the next 30 years, and the impacts have already accelerated in the past five years, according to Phillip Island Nature Parks (PINP).

PINP last week released its three-decade strategic plan, which is open for community feedback until August 19, with

The strategy details six priorities for the next decade, including in the context of challenges such as climate change.

"Storm surges are already accelerating cliff, beach and foreshore erosion, while rising sea levels may be encroaching lower-lying areas of the island," the strategy states.

"On land, climate change is already increasing the frequency and intensity of fires, droughts, extreme temperatures and rainfall.

"Scientific modelling indicates that over the next 30 years, some of the island's freshwater ecosystems are likely to become saline or dry out, (and) mangroves are likely to retreat or disappear."

It said increasing ocean temperatures are disrupting the marine food system, while new marine species could displace existing marine species, "as they battle for food and suitable water temperatures".

"Climate change is forecast to have considerable impacts on the marine and terrestrial environments of Phillip Island over the next 30 years, and the impacts are accelerating since we first described our conservation vision five years ago," says Nature Parks.

PINP CEO Catherine Basterfield told the Advertiser the strategy addressed both the impacts of - and adaptation to - climate change.

"We have already identified Cape Woolamai and Churchill Island as key places needing further climate adaption planning, and we are monitoring places like Observation Point for change as we undertake restoration works," she said.

Ms Basterfield explained

some bird species might migrate to Phillip Island from warmer climates and some species currently on Phillip Island "may no longer be comfortable as the environment changes".

"Over the next decade we will identify which species we can support to stay here by adapting their environments and which species we may need to help transition here.

"We already have plans that support hooded plovers, fairy terns, Eastern barred bandicoots and Australian fur seals."

Threatened species

The strategy focuses on opportunities, with "businesses and communities alike increasingly focused on reducing their impacts on nature", with "nature first" and "tourism for good" giving back to the island.

The strategy states the Koala Conservation Centre, which is

part of Victoria's koala management plan, will continue to rehabilitate injured wildlife before release in the wild and will continue to help with captive breeding of threatened species.

The strategy states there will be "bigger and better natural including revegetating 35ha of Nature Parks land and minimising "extinction risk" of species, while the impact of overabundant wildlife - such as Cape Barren geese, wallabies and possums – will further be reduced.

It says in the next three decades Phillip Island's recognition as a "world class wildlife destination" will be "enhanced", with tourism driving "profit with purpose" and Nature Parks continuing to direct revenue into conservation.

Nature Parks will work with Woolamai Beach Surf Life Saving Club to manage beach access and plan for the future.

The strategy includes aspects

covered in the proposed Summerland Masterplan (which currently has consultation underway), including the future of the Nobbies centre.

While the plan says PINP will be carbon neutral by 2030, it does not tackle emissions from visitor cars to its attractions.

Ms Basterfield said emissions from the fuels, electricity and waste used by the organisation were offset, in addition to large scale revegetation works each


"We believe that our tourism experiences can create the awe and wonder required to educate and inspire a diverse range of people," the strategy says.

Ms Basterfield said the plan identified the top outcomes to achieve over the next decade and was "not intended to clarify each of the activities that will take place to achieve each outcome".



Vehicles stolen

Local police said a car stolen from Rose Avenue in Cowes early on Sunday August 3, was recovered within hours. Police said the offenders broke into the house after cutting through window fly wire and took the car keys.

Shortly after, police on patrol saw the stolen car, along with a second vehicle (stolen that night from Newhaven), travelling in convoy through Cowes and to Smiths Beach.

The car stolen from Rose Avenue was abandoned, with all three offenders then travelling in the second car through to Kilcunda, where it was also dumped. The trio then stole another vehicle and have not yet been apprehended. Bass Coast CIU is investigating the incidents.

Excavator stolen

the same time. Investigations to date indicate the machinery was removed from the island and possibly taken to a location in Melbourne's northern suburbs. Investigations are continuing.

E-Scooters and e-bikes

As Victoria Police launches a campaign targeting e-scooters and e-bike riders in the CBD, Cowes police have reminded residents to abide by the rules for escooters and e-bikes. The local station confirmed its e-scooter liaison officer has charged several people for e-bike re-



It has rained, but we still need a lot more

Local water storages have finally been boosted after a year of dry conditions, thanks to an uptick in rainfall.

But it's not all good news, with much more rain needed to fill Candowie Reservoir, including on the back of increased water consumption.

According to Westernport Water, the last significant increase to Candowie Reservoir was on July 15, 2024, when the storage increased by 134ML from 2676ML to 2810ML.

However, last week a Westernport Water spokesperson confirmed as at the end of July, the reservoir was 45 per cent full, an increase of two per cent, with "inflows now being received" after previous rainfall was soaked up by parched soil.

"With the rainfall we've had, it's hard to believe that we're well behind the average for this time of year," the spokesperson said, with Candowie at the same time last year about 68 per cent.

From January to the end of July 2025, the region has recorded 338.5mm of rainfall, 36 per cent below the five-year average of 530mm for this period.

Water consumption the same seven-month period reached 1592 million litres (ML), a 12 per cent increase compared to the five-year average of 1423 ML.

"The combination of reduced rainfall and increased demand highlights how important it is that we all be water-wise and follow the Permanent Water Saving Rules. Every action adds up," they said.

They said Westernport Water was constantly monitoring water resources and "planning for the future".

"This includes full consideration of water restrictions as outlined in our Urban Water Strategy should they be required.'



From January to the end of July 2025, the region's recorded rainfall was 36 per cent below the five-year average for this period. Water consumption over the same seven-month period was up 12 per cent compared to the five-year average.

Candowie had been totalling about 43 per cent for several months, or 1918ML, after tapping into Melbourne's water supply.

In May Westernport Water had taken 45 per cent of overall demand from Melbourne since July 2024, or 1011ML.

According to Westernport Water policy, if Candowie drops to 2150ML then stage one water restrictions would be considered.

A decrease to 1650ML could see stage two restrictions.

As reported, autumn was the driest recorded on Phillip Island, on the back of a dry year, with some local farmers describing it as the driest weather conditions in a century and many having to truck in hay, costing tens of thousands of dollars.

The Rhyll weather station showed total rainfall for June was 64mm, which is about the average (66mm).

July saw 85mm, which is well above average (68mm).

Other parts of Victoria have also been battling dry conditions, with stage two water restrictions in force in Daylesford and Hepburn region since July 1, while water restrictions in Apollo Bay were lifted from August 1, thanks to winter rain.

Water savings

Currently permanent water savings rules apply to all households. These include:

- A residential or commercial garden or lawn can be watered with a handheld hose at any time, or by means of a watering system between the hours of 6pm and 10am on any day.
- Water cannot be used to clean hard surfaces (including driveways, paths, concrete, tiles. timber decking) except where cleaning is required as a result of a hazard or accident, or in the course of construction/ renovation.
- A handheld hose must be fitted with a trigger nozzle and be leak free. It can be used to wash your car and water your gardens and lawns at any time.

Government tips in for Isle of Wight workers accommodation

MAJOR PROJECTS

The new Isle of Wight development in Cowes is one of 23 projects that received funding from the latest round of the State Government's Regional Worker Accommodation Fund.

As part of the Isle of Wight project developed by Moda, the government said there will be accommodation for over 100 workers, across the "healthcare, food and beverage, retail and tourism industries".

The government said the grant amount the project received is "commercial in confidence" at this stage.

The original plans for the hotel included a separate three storey tourist/worker hostel (14.5 metres) with: 49 one-bedroom units; a manager's apartment and a rooftop basketball and tennis court.

It is unclear how much of the proposed accommodation would be reserved for workers from outside the Isle of Wight project, however Member for Bass Jordan Crugnale confirmed the accommodation would be available to other local employers.

She said the investment in worker accommodation was welcome.

"I am pleased it will include a mix of offerings at the Isle of Wight - including dormitorystyle and single bed options. The mix of room types and number of beds is being developed to match the worker profile ranging from backpackers on working holidays to highly qualified

"The Isle of Wight worker accommodation will be available to other employers in the region; the grant application received strong letters of support from Bass Coast Health, Nature Parks and Phillip Island Hot Springs amongst others.

"These employers currently rely on the use of family homes for share accommodation for their workers. Formal, fit for purpose worker accommodation at the Isle of Wight will return these homes to families in the community and address housing supply in the region.

"It's exciting to think about the many young people that will

be living and working in central Cowes, which will increase activation, and be a boon for the towns economy, nightlife and community," Ms Crugnale continued.

"This is the sort of co-investment that underscores and maximises the community benefit derived from past and future investment in, for example, Berninneit, the Community Hospital, Nature Parks, Streetscape Masterplan – the list goes on.

Ms Crugnale thanked Bass Coast Shire Council and Destination Phillip Island for "backing the program and this project, and their support letters also".

Background

The \$85 million Isle of Wight plans include a seven-storey mixed use hotel with a maximum height of 27.58 metres (excluding lift overrun) to the north with: 163 hotel rooms; four food and beverage premises (pub, bistro, hotel dining, signature restaurant); three retail spaces (including a yoga studio, gym, and wellness centre); two function rooms; outdoor pool terrace with a bar; outdoor beer garden on the corner of Bass Avenue and The Esplanade.

The original plans also included a separate three storey tourist/worker hostel (14.5 metres) with: 49 one-bedroom units; a managers apartment; rooftop basketball and tennis court; retail premises on the north-eastern corner with a 259sqm retail space along the northern frontage.

by Bass Coast Shire councillors in September 2023, but local objectors took the case to VCAT.

In March 2024 the State Planning Minister used new powers to make an amendment to the Bass Coast Shire planning scheme to green light the development, in the face of delays it was experiencing at VCAT.

A VCAT ruling in April 2024 also gave the project the green light. In its ruling, VCAT stated the workers accommodation must be for the exclusive use of workers employed in Bass Coast and must not be separately leased or sold or otherwise occupied.

Cowes CYC proposes tourism development

After 70 years accommodating thousands of children, the CYC in Cowes is to get a makeover.

A planning permit, currently out for public comment, is proposing demolition of the existing "old and out of date" poolside group accommodation building and construction of a new two -storey building at CYC The Island, 41-53 Church Street.

There will also be meeting room and modified toilet block, with the proposal an amendment to an existing permit.

The current poolside building has 32 beds and eight rooms, with the whole facility accommodating 203 beds.

The new building will have 36 beds in 12 rooms, each with bathrooms, with covered decks, which will take the total beds to 207, with a height of 7.83 metres.

According to the permit, the proposed building footprint will be similar to the current building "so minimal site disturbance will occur and no landscaped areas will be affected", while the driveway and 29 existing carparks will be unchanged.

Two new car parks are proposed at the front where two unstable" trees will be removed.

The site is 20,423sqm, zoned general residential, with the building footprint to be 4250sqm or about 21 per cent of the land.

"The proposed development has no effect, in terms of additional noise impacts, due to the new buildings having the same use as existing and being located in same area," the permit states.

"The proposal will have a negligible visual impact upon the wider landscape as it has a large setback from Church Street."

It states the proposal will not increase traffic or carparking as "only four additional beds are proposed and the majority of the groups come via bus", and there is "more than adequate parking

The proposal provides new up to date facilities for CYC The Island creating a better experience for occupants who come to stay and will provide a positive outcome for future tourism."

Federal Minister raises stakes on Western Port

Western Port's proposed wind turbine hub will now undergo a comprehensive environmental assessment after the Federal Environment Minister declared it a "controlled ac-

Minister Murray Watt made the declaration of the Victorian Renewable Energy Terminal (VRET) at the start of August, indicating nationally significant impacts are considered likely.

The declaration will see matters of national environmental significance assessed under a bilateral agreement with Victoria, to be incorporated into the Victorian Environmental Effects Statement (EES) process that is already underway.

The Port of Hastings (PoH) is seeking approvals on behalf of the State Government for a revised VRET, after the former Federal Environment Minister Tanva Plibersek

last year knocked back the original plan because of national environmental concerns.

PoH responded to the Minister's decision saying their "next focus is continuing with our ongoing impact assessments, and developing and refining our project design".

"We are on track to deliver, with construction expected to begin in 2027, subject to the necessary approvals," a statement by PoH said.

"The preliminary impact assessments submitted as part of the EPBC Act referral found potential impacts from the project would be small, localised and temporary, with nothing indicating the impacts would be unacceptable."

If approved, dredging in the bay will take place for about five months 24/7 with dredged material taken to a land reclamation site, with potential for further dredging for the berth pocket and quay wall.

There would be an ex-

tra 130 ships per year, with VRET construction starting in 2027, operational by the end of the decade, with a 50-year design life and unlikely to be decommissioned.

Conservationists

Leading conservationists welcomed the Minister's decision.

Victorian The

tional Parks Association (VNPA) and the Western Port Biosphere said while the newly reduced scope of dredging and wetland loss was an "improvement on the rejected 2023 plan, questions remain why an internationally recognised wetland was the right location for the terminal".

"We are still yet to be presented with convincing rationale for why this terminal must be built in the heart of a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve and Ramsar-listed wetland," said VNPA marine campaigner Shannon Hurley.

We want certainty the project can be done in a way that doesn't cause unacceptable harm to the Western Port wetlands, and we aren't confident that's been achieved yet."

VNPA, community tourism busigroups, nesses, and local councils called for a more strategic and science-based approach to managing Western Port's future from the State Government.

"The impacts of this project are likely to extend well beyond its immediate footprint. Marine life and water don't recognise boundaries – they move throughout the bay, and so do the consequences," Ms Hurley said.

"When you consider these impacts alongside declining water quality and pressures from other industries, the cumulative effect could be devastating for the health of the bay.'

She called for a plan to properly manage the bay.

As reported, the Phillip Island Conservation Society said the environmental impact of the proposed VRET on Western Port has been "downplayed", and is likely to result in "unacceptable" loss of globally significant habitat.

In 2022, the Federal Government declared an offshore wind zone in Gippsland of about 15,000sq km in Commonwealth waters.

The Victorian Government has a target of 9-gigawatts of renewable offshore wind by 2040.

Grants Program, the Victorian Emergency Services Equipment Program, local member Jordan Crugnale MP and Phillip Island Nature Parks.

Phillip Island Nature Parks will then begin separate upgrade work on the accessibility ramp (from November 2025) and stair and landing (from May 2026).



Health worker housing underway

Bass Coast Health (BCH) and Member for Bass Jordan Crugnale celebrated the start of construction of much needed worker accommodation in Wonthaggi last week.

The new two-storey accommodation at Wonthaggi Hospital will consist of 20 self-contained rooms for healthcare professionals, including doctors, nurses, medical specialists and allied healthcare staff.

The construction is being funded by the State Government's Regional Worker Accommodation Fund, with Minister for Regional Development Jaclyn Symes saying the support

would ensure regional areas have the skilled workers they need.

Local MP Jordan Crugnale welcomed the construction, which she said would be good for workers, patients and Wonthaggi.

"Making sure health workers have a place to stay near the hospital just makes sense," Ms Crugnale said.

BCH's interim CEO Professor Simone Alexander agreed.

"This project will benefit the community by helping Bass Coast Health to attract the healthcare workers who provide a wide range of specialist medical services locally, enabling our community to have greater access to quality care closer to their homes.

"We are so fortunate this project will benefit from the Regional Worker Accommodation Fund, which has helped make this facility a reality.'

The new facility will also include communal and outdoor living areas and will be built on hospital grounds, next to Kirrak House residential aged care facility, providing staff with easier access to the workplace and reducing travel time for key workers.

The project is the first health worker initiative to be approved through the Government's Development Facilitation Program and the government said it "will play a critical role supporting Bass Coast Health attract and retain more skilled healthcare workers".

Bass Coast Health provides a range of hospital community-based care services across multiple sites, including Wonthaggi Hospital, the Phillip Island Community Hospital at Cowes, and also at San Remo.

Our Airbnb listings among the nation's highest

TOURISM

Bass Coast has one of the highest proportions of Airbnb listings compared to the rest of Australia, with new research finding we rank third.

A report released last week, "Short term rentals in Australia's coastal regions: Recent impacts and policy responses" by the University of Sydney commissioned by the Australian Coastal Councils Association - analysed the letting market in popular coastal communities.

It found in Bass Coast 7.8 per cent of all homes were listed on the Airbnb platform in December 2024, with "listings distributed across the shire but particularly concentrated in Phillip Island".

There were 2252 listings recorded here in December 2024, with whole houses 2164 (96 per cent) and private rooms at 87 listings (four per cent).

The highest proportion was in the Byron shire, where 17.7 per cent of all homes were listed on Airbnb, based on InsideAirbnb data.

This was followed by Busselton, south of Perth at 8.8 per cent.

There were more than 174,000 Airbnb listings across Australia in December 2024 - nearly 1.6 percent of Australia's total housing stock.

Eleven local government areas around Australia nominated to be included as case studies in the research included the Mornington Peninsula, Sunshine Coast, and Byron.

The report found the average density of listings on the Airbnb platform across the 11 areas was 5.2 percent.

The report highlights concerns about competition between short- and long-term rental accommodation and housing affordability.


In Bass Coast and Kiama, the ratio of shortterm accommodation to long term rental properties was around 20-30 times the rest of Australia, the report states.

Byron reported the highest median rents, insubstantially creasing from \$595 to \$795 per week, while Bass Coast increased from \$325 to \$450.

The research found growth in tourism demand coincided with strong population growth.

Bass Coast recorded the highest population growth (4.9 per cent) between 2016 and 2021, whereas the Sunshine Coast recorded a growth rate of 3.3 per cent.

"In part the almost doubling of population growth in locations such as Eurobodalla, the Bass Coast, and Byron, likely

reflects the impacts of the COVID-19 period, which saw workers relocate to regional areas," it states.

In addition, the report states the lack of permanent rental housing has put pressure on employers seeking to attract and retain staff, across tourism and other industries.

The report concludes communities impacted by both population growth and residential tourism demand "will need to prioritise expanding new and affordable housing supply".

"It is important to ensure new supply is not wholly absorbed by the short-term rental sector," it states.

"This can be achieved by considering demand for second homes in planning for future residential development, and/or by restricting short term rental activity."

The report recommends state governments strengthen support for sharing data on listings and bookings so councils can better track compliance and assess housing impacts, as well as limiting the number of nights properties can be rented short-term.

Tourism

According to the report, short term rental properties dominate visitor accommodation in Bass Coast.

It states short-term rental platforms have changed tourism visitation here, with a trend to shorter visitor stays, from five to seven days to one to three nights.

The same report released in 2018 stated traditional tourism providers in Bass Coast raised concerns about "the difficulty of competing against platform enabled holiday

home operators"

Those providers said short-term rental accommodation was "able to bypass standard planning regulations and charges applying to motels, resorts and caravan parks".

The new report found traditional hotel/motel accommodation in Bass Coast demonstrated significant growth post-Covid, more than doubling its formal accommodation for overnight stays from 217,000 nights in 2020-2021 to 453,000 nights in 2022-2023.

The 2018 report highlighted local resident concerns about the impacts of holiday homes, noise, parking and bin collection.

"In some areas of Philip Island, there is concern about enclaves of holiday homes, where local residents feel surrounded by tourists," it said.

As reported in March, a Bass Coast Shire councillor mooted that local laws should be strengthened to protect residents against antisocial short stay rental accommodation visitors.

Residents also shared their experiences, with one saying security and noise issues were not "fair on permanent residents" and another saying "drunken adults and kids were running riot unsupervised".

Gambling losses from the five poker machine venues across the shire continues to grow, with \$20.75 million lost in the 2024/25 financial year. Over the past 10 years, losses have grown by \$4.48 million.

Shire-wide gaming machine losses over \$20 million

GAMBLING

Bass Coast's gambling figures for 2024/25 reveal over \$1.5 million is lost every month at poker machine venues across the shire.

Overall expenditure (losses) for the year through the poker machines came to \$20,750,308.

This is only a slight increase of \$128,475 from the previous year, compared to the \$876,096 jump between 2022/23 and 2023/24.

However the 10-year trend shows a steady rise (aside from Covid years), with yearly losses growing by \$4.48 million since 2015/16.

The latest data compiled by the Victorian Gambling and Casino Control Commission shows in Bass Coast in the past 12 months the highest monthly losses were in January 2025 (\$1.95 million), followed by November 2024 (\$1.85 million).

There are currently 210 poker machines across five venues in the Shire, with Phillip Island RSL recording the highest expenditure at \$7.7 million. It also recorded the highest loss per machine of \$133,044.

Gambling harm

In September, the State Government will begin a trial of mandatory account-based play across 43 venues, to try and prevent gambling harm.


Minister for Casino, Gaming and Liquor Regulation Enver Erdogan said Victoria was leading • Introducing a new code of the way with its major gambling reforms.

"This trial is an important first step – helping people take control of their gambling and make better choices."

People gambling at these venues will need to use a YourPlay card to play electronic gaming machines and set loss limits. Cards can be obtained on-thespot in venues.

Mr Erdogan said mandatory account-based play will offer people more control over their gambling habits and can provide them with greater insight into how much they spend gambling.

The trial builds on the government's existing gambling reforms, including:

- Mandatory closure periods from 4am to 10am for gaming areas in all Victorian hotels and clubs
- Slowing spin rates of new gaming machines
- Limiting EFTPOS cash withdrawals to \$500 per card in 24
- Capping the number of gaming machines in the state at the current level until 2042
- Prohibiting the advertising or operation of cheque cashing services in or around gaming venues
- conduct to strengthen the obligations of venue operators to better respond to suspected problem gambling.

Last year, the State Government also announced a review into the community benefit scheme, which provides significant tax cuts to clubs with gaming machines, providing they invest 8.33 per cent of gaming revenue back into the community.

Gambling opponents say the scheme can't repair the "social and economic harm" of gambling, describing it as "simply a public relations opportunity for venues" and a way to buy "social

In March, the Federal Government announced it will axe

research and development tax incentives for gambling companies.

Harm minimisation research for poker machines will still be eligible for tax support.

According to research by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare, Australians lose more per capita to gambling than any country in the world: \$25 billion a year.

Poker machines are a major source of gambling revenue, with most states allowing the machines in venues outside of dedicated gaming venues like casinos. Only WA has laws confining poker machines to casinos, and it has the lowest per capita gambling losses in the country.

A report by NSW GambleAware stated 73.3 per cent of people seeking help for problem gambling in 2020/21 identified poker machines as their primary form of gambling. Less than one per cent listed lotteries, race betting was 13.1 per cent and sports betting 7.9 per cent.

French Island barge open for tender

French Island's barge operator is confident of renewing their licence to run the business, saying the vessel is a "lifeline" for residents.

Parks Victoria is currently calling for Expressions of Interest to operate the barge, open until August 29.

"Parks Victoria is seeking a high-quality barge operator with the vision and the capacity to continue the delivery of a year-round barge transport service at French Island," the EoI states

Barge manager Brad Thomas said residents had been concerned by the tender process, but reassured them the government was required by law to run an EoI.

"Locals are unaware of why it's come up for tender and concerned about what's going on, or whether we've put it up. It's not us it's just the government process," Brad said.

He said while would-be operators had been "sniffing out" the business, he was confident the current operators would renew their licence.

"I'm not concerned at all. t's something we have to get through," Brad said, adding he understood the tender was for the same operation and not for

"I welcome anyone to take it up for a week. They quickly realise it's logistically hard, running seven days a week at the island's command.

"It throws everything at us the island. We're very island oriented. It takes a long time to get to know logistics and how to run it.

"Bring it on, we'll step into the ring."

As reported last year, the barge is owned by Terry Easy, with Brad managing it for Terry since 2018, alongside four staff and a team of contractors from welders to engineers.

The barge runs 24/7 yearround, crossing from Corinella to French Island, with a daily average of 12 return trips.

It has a maximum carrying capacity of 22 tonnes, holds 12 passengers, two cars, or one large truck, and transports all cargo for residents including building materials, stock feed, produce for the store, fuel, mail, "everything for locals to exist".

"We're also open 24/7 to emergency services," Brad said.

"The skill is also navigation of the bay. It's sheltered water but it's tidal, it races 2-4 knots which makes it tricky. We have a draft of 0.9 metres, and the deepest area is 17 metres but the average is 5-8 metres."

Terry has for the most part, lived his life on French Island - his family settled there 130 years

He bought the barge operation from his family, which was one of five families who had run the vessel for three decades.

The five families came together because they were all farmers who wanted to get cattle and sheep off and on the and so they bought the barge when a buyer couldn't be found, running it for the next 30 years," Terry said.

"Some mornings the fog is so thick you can't see the end of the vessel."

He regularly sees dolphins and occasionally whales - "never one, always three"

"And I see most sunrises and sunsets."

A petition to support the renewal of the licence for the barge has been launched, describing it as a "crucial service that ties French Island to the rest of Victoria". Visit change. org and search for French Island barge.

Ambulance response times improve in Bass Coast

HEALTH

Bass Coast has recorded its best quarter performance for 2024/25, according to the latest data released by Ambulance Victoria.

The data shows 59.5 per cent of Code 1 calls in the shire were responded to in under 15 minutes. The average response time was 16.58 minutes.

This compares to 57.8 per cent in the first quarter of 2024/25, 53.9 per cent in the second and 54.6 per cent in the third.

Results are well ahead of neighbouring South Gippsland, which registered 46.2 per cent of Code 1 calls responded to in under 15 minutes and an average time of 19:13.

Code 2 response times in Bass Coast had also improved. The last quarter was the best for the year, with the average down to 43:53 compared to 44:31 the previous quarter and 46:15 in quarter 2.

The improvement coincides with a state-wide rise, with Ambulance Victoria saying paramedics are responding 10 seconds faster to Code 1 calls.

AV Acting Executive Director Regional Operations Michael Georgiou said demand for "lights and sirens" ambulances fell by 3.5 per cent between April and June, compared with the same time last year, coinciding with an AV community information campaign to save paramedics for emergencies.

"April to June last year was AV's busiest three months on record – with 102,419 Code 1 emergencies," Mr Georgiou said

"Across the same period this year, we've responded to 98,874 Code 1 cases.

"I thank our highly skilled paramedics and first respond-

ers who do a remarkable job providing best care to their communities, each and every day.

"We're grateful to Victorians who are choosing to use alternative care for non-urgent issues – it means ambulances are available faster for emergencies. That community effort is helping us save lives."

Mr Georgiou said there'd been a 10 second improvement in the average Code 1 response time, with the percentage of cases responded to within 15 minutes up by 1.1 per cent.

Gippsland

In the Gippsland Region crews responded to 6056 Code 1 cases between April and June 2025, down from 6132 last year, but up from 6039 three months ago.

Compared with the same time last year, performance improved in 53 Local Government Areas (LGAs). The biggest improvement in the Gippsland Region was the major population centre of Bairnsdale.

AV is urging people not to be complacent, with demand for emergency ambulances climbing again as winter illnesses spread through the community. "We've already seen a 3.7 per cent jump in Code 1 demand since the first three months of 2025," Gippsland Regional Director Ross Salathiel said.

"Winter is always our busiest time. Our paramedics are focused on reaching the sickest patients first – but every day, more than 500 calls to Triple Zero (000) don't need an emergency ambulance.

"There are many options people can access when they need timely medical care and health advice but don't need an emergency ambulance, including the Victorian Virtual Emergency Department and Urgent Care Clinics.

"Between April and June alone, our expert Secondary Triage team redirected 46,015 non-urgent cases away from an emergency response."

Ambulance Victoria said it is working closely with hospitals, emergency services and government partners to keep ambulances on the road and patients moving through the system.

Community gathered for Gaza

Almost 50 people gathered at the Cowes Jetty on Saturday, calling for an immediate ceasefire and the full distribution of humanitarian aid in Gaza.

The gathering was organised by the Bass Coast for Palestine group which has been holding gatherings every two weeks, alternating between Cowes and Wonthaggi.

Attendees shared their despair at the humanitarian disaster in Gaza, with many expressing their horror at the images of the starving children and describing the situation as genocide.

One former health worker attended the gathering after seeing the conditions of the hospitals in Gaza, saying "I can't stand back and not do anything".

Another condemned what the Israeli Prime Minister was doing in the name of the Israeli people saying it was "being inflicted on innocent people".

Organisers urged people to have respectful, considered conversations with people about the issue, and to contact local and federal members, as well as Prime Minister Albanese and Foreign Minster Wong to express their concerns.

A spokesperson for the group said "the situation in Gaza is not complicated, it is simply a genocide, and it needs to stop".

"Our group exists to support the freedom of all people from the river to the sea, and to support each other in resistance and advocacy. Particularly, we want to see the Australian Government to immediately sanction Israel and implement a two-way arms embargo. Anyone is welcome to come to our gatherings to share, or to listen, or to connect and show solidarity with Palestine."

The next gathering is in Wonthaggi on August 23, followed by Cowes on September 6.

Across the world, leaders have said there is already mass famine in the area, and over the weekend, Australia joined Germany, Italy, NZ and the UK condemning plans by Israel's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu for further military action to control Gaza City.

On Monday, Prime Minister Anthony Albanese said Australia would recognise the state of Palestine at the 80th session of the United Nations General Assembly in September.

The UN's top human rights official said the Israeli Government must not pursue a complete military takeover of the Gaza Strip.

The United Nations have described the situation in Gaza as "beyond catastrophic", while the World Health Organisation said health professionals have been barred from entering Gaza

On Sunday August 3, volunteers tackled a couple of projects in the Scenic Estate Conservation Reserve.

The primary focus was eradicating gorse. Greg Johnson, President of the Phillip Island Conservation Society said it was the perfect time of year for the job when the gorse's golden flowers are easy to spot.

"But it is important to remove and bag the flower/ seed heads before cutting the plant back at or below ground level to reduce the risk of spread," he noted.

The team of eight volunteers worked diligently to remove 20-30 gorse bushes of various sizes, from small clumpy heavily grazed bushes to a nearly two-metre-tall bush - all in flower.

"When we first started working in the reserve, gorse was widespread and it's amazing to see how much of a difference has been made over years of regular working

bees," Greg said.


The volunteers also spread mulch around a site where FOSER planted various local indigenous trees and grasses in early July, to help protect and nourish the growing plants.





and community pride.


"This is about more than just building a playground," said Rotarian John Tennant.

Traffic Signals Installation

New traffic signals will be installed at the Dandy Premix Quarries intersection to reduce truck traffic through Grantville and improve safety for pedestrians and motorists using the Bass Highway.

Works commenced July 2025, approx. 4-month duration Lane closures, reduced speed limits, contra-flow traffic Deep Creek St and Bass Hwy Service Rd access impacted Two bus stops temporarily relocated

COMMENCEMENT AND DURATION OF ROADWORKS

Stage 1 Roadworks confined to the existing quarry intersection commenced early July 2025.

Stage 2 Roadworks on the Bass Highway Northbound carriageway are scheduled to commence on 14 August and are expected to be completed by 19 September 2025.

The **Stage 2 Roadworks** require temporary closure of the Bass Highway Northbound carriageway and the introduction of contra-flow traffic to the Southbound carriageway.

The left lane of the Southbound carriageway will continue to be used for southbound traffic and the second lane for northbound traffic after diversion across the highway median to share the Southbound carriageway. During **Stage 2 Roadworks**, each of the two lanes of the Southbound carriageway will have traffic moving in the opposite direction.

During **Stage 2 Roadworks** there will be reduced speed limits through the Bass Highway construction zone with modified traffic layouts and traffic controls in place to assist motorists.

ROADWORK TIMES AND TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT

Stage 2 Roadworks will generally be undertaken Monday to Saturday (6 days/week) between 7.00am and 7.00pm. Some short-term roadworks may be carried out overnight.

Traffic controls including Variable Message Signs (VMSs), Safety Barriers, Portable Traffic Lights, Traffic Controllers and Truck Mounted Attenuators (TMAs) will be in operation.

ACCESS ARRANGEMENTS

Deep Creek Street and the Bass Highway Service Road traffic will be temporarily impacted during Stage 2 roadworks.

Deep Creek Street: temporary use of Bonney Road for Bass Highway access and egress, including for Smith Street, Broome Court, Stewart Street, Malcolm Drive and Panoramic Drive traffic.

Bass Highway Service Road (northbound, western side of Bass Highway): temporary northbound egress to Bass Highway under traffic controller supervision. This will also impact on traffic from Blackwood Drive, Swan Street, Vision Lane and Lang Street using the



BUS STOP - NORTHBOUND

The Bass HWY northbound bus stop located in the Stage 2 Roadworks construction zone will be temporarily relocated further north (approx. 120m) with signage, waiting area provision and pedestrian protection provided.

PROJECT OUTCOMES

Installation of the Traffic Signals will enable trucks to turn right, northbound onto Bass Highway, resulting in a major reduction in quarry trucks through Grantville. The Traffic Signals will also improve Bus Stop pedestrian safety and assist safer Deep Creek Street traffic flows onto Bass Highway.





Bass Coast marks World **Drowning Prevention Day**

BEACH SAFETY

Drowning claims more than 300,000 lives globally each year, including hundreds here in Australia. It remains one of the leading causes of death among children and young people - yet drowning is preventable.

Recognising the urgent need for action, the United Nations declared World Drowning Prevention Day each year

This year's local recognition of event, held on July 28 in Officer, brought together over 58 organisations from government agencies and aquatic centres to volunteer groups and multicultural community representatives.

The day included speeches, panel discussions and a presentation on the grassroots Safely Engaging with Water program, which has already taught hundreds of people vital swimming skills.

In the past year alone, 226 people have completed the program, many of whom had never been in a pool before.


Harpreet Singh Kandra, a program leader, said the initiative is growing quickly, with more people completing the program and encouraging friends and family to sign up. While the program currently operates in Cardinia, Manningham, Casey, and Dandenong council areas, there is strong interest from other councils to expand this lifesaving initiative.

A spokesperson for Bass Coast Shire Council said the issue was one that hit close to home for the shire.

"During the 2023-24 summer, six lives were tragically lost to drowning in Bass Čoast, including four members of one family.

"While our beaches are among Victoria's most beautiful, they are also some of the most dangerous, with hidden risks that even experienced swimmers can underestimate.

"We were proud to attend the recent presentation at SGND as one of the coun-



Framework

Earlier this year, Bass Coast Shire Council partnered with Mornington Peninsula Shire Council, City of Casey, City of Greater Dandenong, Cardinia Shire Council, Life Saving Victoria and Belgravia Leisure to launch the Bass Coast Mornington Peninsula Cross Council Water Safety Frame-

"This collaborative initiative focuses on education, clear and inclusive safety messaging, and outreach to multicultural communities - all aimed at ensuring more people can enjoy our beaches and return home safely," the council spokesperson said.

"Beach safety is already front-of-mind for residents, thanks to extensive summer campaigns using roadside signs, flyers, and targeted social media.

"By combining these ef-

Safely Engaging with Water and in-language campaigns, more people visiting Bass Coast from inland areas will have the skills and confidence to stay safe. As we head into warmer months, these lessons could mean the difference between a safe day at the beach and a tragedy."

Improved signage

Following the Forrest Caves drownings in January 2024 - the largest single drowning incident in the state in decades - the local community called for better signage at local beaches.

In findings handed down late last year, Coroner Sarah Gebert identified a particular risk of coastline drownings for those from multicultural communities and CALD (culturally and linguistically diverse) backgrounds.

New signage has now been erected at beaches across Phillip Island, warning of the dangers of swimming at unpatrolled beaches, as part of a concerted campaign to raise awareness of beach safety.

A QR code on the signage links to the Life Saving Victoria Beachsafe App - which provides information

which beaches are patrolled in a multi-lingual format.

The campaign also saw every booked visitor with Nature Parks from November through to April receive a reminder to download the Surf Life Saving Beachsafe app.

In May this year, separate to the Water Safety framework, Phillip Island Nature Parks installed new emergency signage on every entrance to beaches on the south coast of the island.

The signs clearly state a number (PIN) to quote when calling Triple Zero (000) during an emergency, to help responders pinpoint the exact location.

Over summer Woolamai Beach Surf Life Saving Club and Life Saving Victoria patrols operate at Woolamai, Smiths Beach and the Cowes foreshore.

One of the biggest hazards on Phillip Island beaches are rips, which can be hard to spot for those unfamiliar with conditions, and can be deadly.


The broader general committee remains solid with over 15 representatives, with experienced hands backing the executive team and helping deliver media, events, programs, and community engagement throughout the year.
