State and local taxes hit ratepayers hard

RATES

Rates bills have risen for all households, and while the State Government's new emergency services tax has skyrocketed, Bass Coast Shire Council's garbage charge has had more of an impact.

Shire rates notices landed in mailboxes and emails last week, and included a "fact sheet" from the Victorian Government about their new Emergency Services Volunteers Fund (ESVF), which has seen widespread outrage from ratepayers and replaces the fire services levy charged in previous years.

The ESVF has been added on

top of rates bill, which have risen by the state's mandated cap of three per cent, in addition to a garbage charge increase of 7.4 per cent (a rise of \$42 to \$617), making a total council increase of 4.9 per cent.

But a straw poll of rate increases for homes across Phillip Island has found far-ranging disparity.

A small two-bedroom unit in suburban Cowes bore the brunt of price increases, reporting an ESVF of \$222 or 11 per cent of their rates, compared to the 2024 fire services levy of \$175 (nine per cent), and the 2023 levy of \$175 (eight per cent).

(\$618) for this year equates to 30 per cent of the bill, while the unit's Capital Improved Value was steady for the past two years, but was reduced from the CIV high of 2023.

In contrast, a foreshore fronting house will this year pay an ESVF of \$464 or eight per cent of the rates bill, a rise on 2024 when it was \$297; while the garbage charge (\$741 for a larger red bin) is equal to 13 per cent of the bill.

A house in Sunset Strip also will pay a high price with a \$252 representing 10 per cent, and the garbage charge equal to 26 per cent.

A Cape Woolamai home was The unit's garbage charge also at the higher end with the

2025 ESVF \$265 (10 per cent) an increase on the 2024 fire services levy (when it was \$201); and the garbage charge equal to 23 per cent of the rates.

The rough average ESVF for a Cowes home appeared to be about nine per cent and for the garbage charge about 20 per cent, with several reporting the ESVF was about \$100 higher than the fire services levy.



Who polluted and what is the pollution running into the bay?

A water outlet on Lovers Walk in Cowes - which runs into Western Port was twice turned a shade of milk white last week, with the EPA now investigating.

Last Monday and Thursday the outflow at the base of Erehwon Point was white, with EPA officers

both times investigating and calling for anyone with information to contact the EPA (1300 372 842).

"EPA officers inspected the area and referred the matter to council for further action," said an EPA spokesperson.

"However, if anyone has information that could assist, they can contact EPA or council directly."

Attempted burglary

On August 12, a man attempted to enter a house in Settlement Road in Cowes, which is currently under construction. Police say the man was caught on CCTV in the rear vard and the owners alerted the police, who attended the scene. Although police confirmed no entry to the premises was made, investigations are continuing to identify the male captured on CCTV.

Settlement Road accident

On Tuesday August 12 at 6.15pm a black Mazda and a silver sedan collided near the intersection of Settlement Road and Thompson Avenue in Cowes. Police said the Mazda driver failed to give way at the roundabout, "causing a T-bone collision with the silver sedan".

Due to damage sustained by the silver sedan, the front passenger in this vehicle required extraction from the vehicle by the SES, and was conveyed to hospital with non-life-threatening injuries," Acting Senior Sergeant Adrian Condron said. The driver and other passenger were not injured.

Both vehicles were towed from the scene with police saying it appears the collision was due to driver error - failing to give way which may result in a Penalty Infringement Notice.

Burnt Toast break in

The Bass Coast Crime Investigation Unit is investigating a break in at Cape Woolamai café Burnt Toast at 3.20am on August 15. Police say the offender broke in through a rear window, and is described as Caucasian, approximately 40-50 years old. He stole cash before leaving the premises. An image of the offender is available on the Eyewatch Bass Coast Facebook page and CCTV footage has also been passed onto the police. Investigations are continuing to identify the suspect. Punchbowl collision

On Saturday August 16 there was a three-car collision near Punchbowl Road, at 1.05pm. Police said a Holden Hatch travelling along the Phillip Island Road collided with the rear of a Toyota sedan that was indicating to turn right into Punchbowl Road, pushing it into the oncoming traffic. The car was hit head on by a Mazda ute, then spun around and stopped in the westbound lane, blocking Phillip Island Road.

Police said the Toyota sustained serious damage and the 23-year-old male driver and 22-year-old female front passenger, both from Melbourne, sustained severe injuries and were taken to hospital for treatment. A 23-year-old male from Wonthaggi, driving the Holden, sustained minor injuries as a result of the collision. All three cars had to be towed from the scene.

As a result of the accident, traffic on Phillip Island Road was closed in both directions for approximately two hours. San Remo Police have received dashcam footage of the collision and are continuing investigations into the collision.

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
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Local fire brigade are real life savers

Phillip Island Fire Brigade is part of a new program - the Fire Medical Response (FMR) - a joint initiative between the CFA and Ambulance Victoria.

This means that select medical Triple Zero (000) calls will see the local CFA brigade and Ambulance Victoria dispatched simultaneously to cardiac arrests from August 21.

The Phillip Island Brigade is the 26th brigade to "go live" with the new life-saving program, that aims to ensure treatment arrives within 10 minutes for anyone suffering a cardiac arrest.

Phillip Island Fire Brigade Captain Lino Drazzi said the new program means, from this week, if you call Triple Zero for a cardiac arrest, a fire engine or an ambulance may be the first responders on the scene.

Lino said 23 volunteers from the brigade had signed up for the training, and the decision to join the program was an easy one to make, given the benefits it will provide the local community.

"When someone in our community experiences a cardiac arrest, every second counts," he said.

"By joining this program, we're able to provide vital care in those first critical moments. Our members live and work in the community – we're close by and ready to respond.

"We're proud to step up and support our community in this new way. The Phillip Island Fire

Brigade has 23 FMR trained members ready to respond," said Lino.

He explained the program meant that "community members who call for an ambulance may receive both a fire truck and an ambulance. There is no specific order in which the services arrive to the incident".

Phillip Island Fire Brigade has been training with Ambulance Victoria for months, in preparation for the program which will complement the Ambulance Victoria service in the

Statewide

The new FMR program is being rolled out with 50 brigades across the state, and a similar program is already operating in Melbourne.

CFA Deputy Chief Officer Garry Cook said the program was a natural fit for CFA because of the 52,000 volunteers across the state.

"CFA has more than 1100 volunteer fire stations with more than 52,000 members," Garry

"This puts CFA in a unique position to complement the Ambulance Victoria response in 50 locations across Victoria to help deliver early intervention to cardiac arrests.'

Ambulance Victoria Executive Director of Regional Operations, Danielle North, said Victoria's cardiac survival rates are one of the best in the world, thanks to high rates of early intervention.

'The Fire Medical Response program will improve survival rates for people in rural and regional Victoria," Danielle said.

Quick intervention with CPR and a defibrillator has the greatest impact on improving a patient's chances of surviving a cardiac arrest."

Lino said the results from the regional brigades that have already gone live have been good, with Wonthaggi in operation since earlier this month.

To be included in the trial, CFA and AV looked at the demand in an area, the location of stations and the number of active members the brigade had.

"Phillip Island ticked all the boxes," Lino said.

The 10-minute response range from the station includes the bulk of Cowes and sections of Rhyll and Smiths Beach.

The Block sale ditched, to now be given away – again

The Block property has been pulled off the market, with the billionaire owner Adrian Portelli now planning to once again give away each of the five properties through his online lottery.

Two months ago, as reported, Portelli announced the sale of 113-119 Justice Road, Cowes, on his Instagram page, with the property not listed by any real estate agents, but for sale as a whole through Expressions of Interest.

"For Sale. EOI. The Phillip Island Block Resort. Selling complex complete. Everything included. Will not sell houses separately," Mr Portelli posted in June.

That sale came after Portelli last November forked out \$15.3 million to buy the entire property from the 2024 season of the Channel 9 reality TV show.

All five houses were then listed on Portelli's LMCT+ website, in a giveaway offering the whole five homes or \$8 million in cash, with the winner – a 34-year-old Ballarat healthcare worker - opting to take the cash.

Portelli then retained the resort, saying he would keep the property for himself and hold events there.

The only sign of life at the property since then was in January when the businessman helped unload three McLarens and three Lamborghinis off the back of a truck, telling passersby the cars were there to help celebrate his son's first birthday party.

Now Portelli is returning to the LMCT+ website to giveaway each property, announcing on his personal Instagram last Thursday that five people will each win a Block house through yet another

sweepstake.

"I was going to go and sell those Block houses – as you know, I put them up for sale," he said in an Instagram video.

"I had a few offers and other people trying to get finance. I can't be bothered with that s**t ... so, I said, 'you know what, I am just going to give it away'.

"I have five houses I need to get rid of. Anyone who grabs a package here, we are going to randomly select five winners, so you have five chances of winning a fully-furnished, debt-free house in Phillip Island, right next to the racetrack, in Victoria.

"And you get all the amenities that come with it. You share all the amenities with all the houses - tennis court, cinema, swimming pools. The absolute works ... good luck."

Hype

The winning property - renovated by sisters Maddy and Charlotte - was bought for \$3.5 million, while Courtney and Grant's home sold for \$3.3 million; Kris-

tian and Mimi \$2.93 million; Ricky and Haydn \$2.7 million; and Kylie and Brad \$2.6 million.

In June, Portelli told realestate. com.au he would not run another giveaway because it was too costly. "I've purchased (the homes)

twice now," he told the website. "I think everyone forgets that e resort is one half of the cost.


"It's really difficult to try to chase the money back for it.' Mr Portelli also said he would not take part in another Block

Local agents said the price Mr Portelli paid for the Block was "probably supported by the hype

and publicity". "But it's hard to find any comparative sales to support that price in the current market. It would be hard to try and get to those numbers," one agent said.

"We wish him all the best and for the sake of the Phillip Island market let's hope he gets the price.

"The publicity The Block gave the island was very good. We all enjoyed the experience."

The Block is back on Phillip Island. But not like it was in 2024, with Scott,

Shelley and the Justice Road gang.

Instead, former Blockhead Ricky ("from the Block") Recard has bought a house at Surf Beach with his Phillip Island partner, makeup artist Erin Thompson.

The couple – together with Ricky's Block best mate Haydn – will renovate the house for a new web series to be called Container Builds.

Ricky told the Advertiser he bought the house about six weeks ago and will settle in September, when they will start work and filming straight away.

Container Builds will feature Block "favourite" building businesses, from James Hardie to Beaumont Tiles, and focus on tiny homes, shipping containers and environmentally-friendly construction.

"It's not a big secret but we have to get our ducks in a row, including planning," Ricky said, agreeing the internet series was "The Block for the web".

"Ideally we start renovating and filming in October, but depending on factors it may get pushed out.

"We're working with a lot of brands who are keen to make it happen, around sustainable and eco building, with a few more details to come."

Ricky said he will continue to work in his ProRec Plumbing business Monday to Thursday, with Friday to Sunday on Phillip Island renovating and filming.

Erin currently lives at Sunset Strip and will be working on the web series, he said, explaining the two have an Instagram page, Ricky and the Makeup Artist, where they revealed the Surf Beach purchase.

"She'll have a starring role. Erin is an fishing too."

all-round cracker. She'll be doing styling and design, and a lot of the renovation, behind the scenes. She's not afraid to get her hands dirty.

"I've finally found my match in life. She does as much as me.

"She gets her best ideas at night so at 3am she'll message ideas and I'll tell her she's nuts and to go back to sleep."

Ricky said he and Erin would not be having a church service but had committed to the relationship and were planning an exchange of rings and a "big party".

"At some stage it would be nice to settle down on the island.

"One of the first things I heard on the island last year was that residents are lucky to find a tradie if the fishing or surf is on. I thought even then, that's a place I'd like to live in.

"I'm a keen fisho and I'm excited for Erin to teach me how to surf. She loves fishing too."

Haydn

Ricky said Haydn will be filming the first season of Container Builds at Surf Beach, with the second season to be Haydn's future home, most likely in central Victoria, where he plans to buy a vacant block on which to build a four-bedroom container home.

This is not their first foray into web series. After The Block auction, the dynamic duo – who call themselves "The Funovators" – launched a web series of the same name, which showcased a renovation of Ricky's Melbourne home.

The show is now in post-production and will be online in coming months, with updates on the Ricky and Haydn Instagram page.

"But our passion is sustainability so that's why we're doing the second web series."

Ricky said he was still riding the wave of post-Block fame, although the invi-

tations to parties had slowed since the initial adulation, especially since the new series of The Block in Daylesford had gone to air.

Ricky said fellow 2024 Blockheads Kylie and Brad attended his birthday in June, but he had not been in contact with other contestants.

He explained he and Haydn had dabbled in selling their own fluoro clothing line, including hats, t-shirts and even sunglasses.

"I like wearing colour, but it takes a lot of time and commitment to make fashion work and it's not my real passion."

Ricky and Haydn's house from The Block sold for \$2.7 million, which saw a \$750,000 profit (\$375,000 each) for the best mates.

Their House 3 property, known as the "Fun Factory," was purchased by billionaire Adrian Portelli, who bought all five houses on the show (see separate story).

\$9.5m for sports reserve, \$114m for college overhaul

Bass Coast Shire Council's long-awaited draft 10-year financial plan will be debated by councillors at this week's council meeting (Wednesday August 20).

The draft includes \$9.9 million for the Phillip Island recreation reserve, \$950,000 for dog parks and the biggest project – the Wonthaggi College site redevelopment – has been earmarked for \$114.6 million.

If approved, it will go out for con-

sultation until September 9, to be then adopted in October.

The council meeting has a bumper agenda, with the draft Domestic Animal Management Plan also to be debated, alongside the awarding of the tender for the Cowes streetscape master plan.

Shake off the winter blues and take the plunge with the 2025 Polar Bear Swim on Monday September 1, 5.15pm at the Cowes Foreshore.

The Polar Bear Swim has been running since 2008 and the fun community swim is open to anyone willing to brave the icy waters.

There is no formal registration and no age restrictions. However, there are three firm rules in place for the fun event: No wetsuits, no nudity and you must put your head under the water.

"There's no pressure to actually swim anywhere or anything," said the organisers.

In the past few years, a smaller group of Polar Bears leap off the San Remo Pier at the same as Cowes takes to the water.

The original Polar Bear Swim consisted of just four people. while in 2023, when the swim coincided with the weekend, there were almost 100 people taking part.

Based on weather records, September 1 is usually overcast and rainy, and last year the Polar Bears braved wild winds and cold temperatures.

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State and local taxes hit ratepayers hard

ESVF

As reported, councillors in June joined with a growing number of other councils across Victoria calling on the State Government to ditch the unpopular ESVF, which will raise hundreds of thousands of dollars for the cash strapped government.

Council officers reported the levy collections on Bass Coast ratepayers will increase from \$10 million to \$16 million annually, which represents a 53 per cent increase, or \$5.52 million. The increases include:

- Residential ratepayers: from 8.7c to 17.3c per \$1000 of Capital Improved Value (CIV);
- Commercial ratepayers: from 66.4c to 133c per \$1000 CIV;
- Industrial ratepayers: from 81.1c to 133c per \$1000 CIV.
- Farmers will pay the fixed charge plus 71.8 cents for every \$1000 of their property's CIV. They currently pay 28.7

From July 1, 2026, a new property classification will be introduced for residential principal places of residence (PPR), and non-PPR residential properties will be charged the nonresidential fixed rate.

Properties not classified as PPR will be charged a higher, non-residential fixed rate (expected to be \$276).

The levy broadens the scope of funding beyond the CFA and the Fire Rescue Victoria to include the SES, Triple Zero Victoria, Emergency Management Victoria, Forest Fire Management Victoria and the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action.

Opposition

San Remo's Nathan Murphy - who is a committee member of the community alliance Not In Our Name fighting the tax - last week wrote to the coun-

cil criticising the government's "fact sheet" attached to rates, saying it "amounts to nothing more than propaganda".

"I welcome the fact that Council has come out opposing this new tax, however the attached propaganda from the State Government is contrary to Bass Coast Shire position," Nathan said.

Not In Our Name coordinated a conference last month, where mayors and councillors created a working group to campaign against the ESVF.

The Nationals' Melina Bath said the ESVF was "designed to prop up Labor's financial mismanagement and ballooning state debt"

She said this year's exemption for farmers was "a disingenuous publicity stunt as it only applies to their principal place of residence - not the entire farm".

"The tax will drive up food and fibre production costs and flow through to supermarket shelves in the form of higher prices."

Ms Bath criticised the State Government for using local councils as tax collectors, with no transparency on how the revenue would be distributed.

"The tax does nothing to fund frontline emergency services or volunteers - most of it is being redirected to fund core government departments that should be covered by existing taxes."

The Nationals have committed to scrapping the ESVF

Council Watch last week said the ESVF was "taxing Victorians out of their livelihoods and beyond their means", and speculated the government was planning to scrap rate capping, with a petition to ensure rate caps stay.

Objectors fight proposed wellness retreat

A proposal for a wellness retreat in Ventnor has received more than 110 objections with residents arguing if it is approved, they would be concerned for their personal safety.

The owner of 109 Lyall Street in Ventnor has applied for a planning permit for a holistic health and wellness retreat in a low-density residential zone.

the proposal, 4000sqm property would have no building works, but the use of the dwelling would see accommodation for a maximum of five clients and up to two visiting medical and holistic practitioners.

Clients would attend "low intensity", "appointment-only" retreats for one week to one month with "integrated, evidence-based services focused on whole-person health".

The proposed model draws inspiration from leading therapeutic frameworks, such as The Banyans Wellness Centre, and aims to provide personalised, multi-disciplinary care to individuals seeking support in managing mental health, emotional wellbeing, and lifestyle-related conditions," the permit states.

The Banvans Wellness Centre website describes itself as offering "discreet and luxury rehab" in Queensland.

The planning permit says the wellness retreat will include psychology and therapeutic counselling sessions, yoga, meditation and mindfulness practice, nutritional and lifestyle education.

"Stays will be guided by a tailored program developed in consultation with allied health professionals, designed to support early intervention, stress recovery, and general wellbeing," the permit

It states "ample" parking will be available on the property, with minimal traffic generation.

The retreat will be operated by qualified professionals and will maintain a quiet, respectful interface with the surrounding community," the owner says in the permit. "The site will have a general manager that will coordinate the sessions and organisation of the

"The proposed use of the site as a holistic health and wellness retreat represents a modest, respectful and low-impact reactivation of an existing residential property."

Objections

However, residents have urged Bass Coast Shire councillors to reject the proposal, with 111 objections lodged by the end of last

One submitter said the planning permit was "misleading in the extreme".

"Nowhere does it say that clients will be treated for drug rehabilitation and dependency despite the fact this is one treatment Banyans health care do," the objector said.

"Clearly this is an inappropriate site for such activities being a residential area next to homes with young children."

A continuing theme in objections is concern for personal safety and safety of children and families.

"I will be living in fear knowing there are drug addicted people in our area especially near my children that have young friends in Lyall Street," wrote one submitter. "Clinical areas like this should

remain in the town centre alongside other clinical areas not in residential areas."

Others agreed, citing proximity to the pony club and reserve.

"Please, please stop this from happening and keep our island safe by keeping the clinics in Cowes next to all the other medical centres and services. I won't be able to live peacefully in Ventnor as I will be constantly concerned about home invasions or theft of property due to this clinic arriving in our precious little community."

Many supported the concept of mental health care, but said it was incompatible with a residential

"This proposal represents a significant shift in the use of the property, from a private residence to a commercial operation, and would disrupt the peaceful character of the neighbourhood."

Overdose report shows 10-year high

A report from the Coroners Court of Victoria released last week showed the state's fatal overdoses were at a 10 year high.

However the report also noted the increase in overdose deaths was related to the growth in the Victorian population.

Despite our growing population, Bass Coast's numbers dropped from six to three, back to its lowest level since 2015 (excluding Covid in 2021, where no deaths were recorded).

Of the Gippsland local government areas, Bass Coast was in the bottom three, alongside South Gippsland (which has only recorded one death per year for the past five years) and Baw Baw.

Latrobe's figures more than doubled, rising from eight in 2023 to 18 last year, the highest level in the past 10 years.

Of our neighbouring councils, Cardinia reported six overdoses and Casey 16.

Comparable areas like Surf Coast recorded much lower levels, with no overdoses in three of the 10 years, including 2024, while the highest figure was four

The local government area with the highest number of fatal overdoses was Melbourne (42), followed by Greater Geelong (35), Yarra (27), Greater Dandenong (26), Hume (22) and Port Phillip (22).

Report

According to the report men were more likely than women to overdose. In 2024 68.2 per cent of fatal overdoses were men, compared to 31.8 per cent women.

Just over a quarter of Victorian overdose deaths each year occurred in regional Victoria, with very little variation in this proportion over the 10-year period except for 2021, when the proportion dropped to 20 per cent of all overdose deaths.

On average three-quarters of Victorian overdose deaths each year involved multiple contributing drugs, which the coroner said "underscores the importance of

Gippsland overdose levels remain relatively stable, except for Latrobe which saw a jump from eight to 18 in the last 12 months. Bass Coast dropped from six to three.

highlighting drug combinations when delivering harm reduction education and other overdose prevention initiatives".

A significant finding in the 2024 data was the continuing rise of illegal drug involvement in Victorian overdose deaths.

The report stated ten years ago, illegal drugs contributed to just under half of Victorian overdose deaths. By contrast, in 2024 illegal drugs contributed to 65.6 per cent of Victorian overdose deaths, up from 58.9 per in 2023 and 54.9 per cent in 2022.

Several illegal drugs, notably heroin, methamphetamine, MDMA, cocaine and GHB, reached a 10-year high in the number of overdose deaths to which they contributed.

Meanwhile, the proportion of Victorian overdose deaths involving pharmaceutical drugs continued to gradually decline, accounting for 69.3 per cent of overdose deaths in 2024, down from 78 per cent in 2015. The proportion of overdose deaths involving alcohol was reasonably consistent with previous years, at 24.1 per cent in 2024.

The report stated most Victorian overdose deaths across the decade were accidental or unintentional (74.5 per cent) rather than suicides (19.3 per cent) or deaths where the deceased's intent could not be determined (6.2 per cent).

However, the report noted some important variations in deceased intent were observed. "For example, among males only 13 per cent of overdose deaths were suicides, whereas among females the proportion was 31.4 per cent."

In Victoria, all deaths from suspected non-natural causes, including suspected overdoses, are required to be reported to the Coroners Court of Victoria.

Suspected overdoses are recorded by the Court in the Victorian Overdose Deaths Register (VODR), which is the data source for this report.

Bass Coast Health joins patient support program

Earlier this month, the State Government announced one of five new Patient Support Units (PSUs) in Victoria would be established at Bass Coast

The announcement came as part of a report on surgery delivery in the state, which the government described as "the most planned surgeries on record".

It said the PSUs helped patients "navigate the surgery process by coordinating care, exploring alternative treatment pathways, and keeping patients informed throughout their journey".

Dr Renee Kelsall, Acting

Interim CEO at Bass Coast Health (BCH) said patients across Bass Coast and South Gippsland would benefit from this new program.

"Bass Coast Health is now part of the Patient Support Unit program that helps patients get better care before and after surgery," BCH Act-ing Interim CEO Dr Renee Kelsall said.

'For patients, being part of the Patient Support Unit program means they can recover faster and leave hospital sooner after surgery.

"For those having joint surgery, we'll make sure their health is in the best shape possible before the operation. This is because our team, in-

cluding physiotherapists, dietitians and other health professionals, will work together to support patients before sur-

gery," Dr Kelsall said.
"This can help avoid delays in having the surgery and reduce the time a patient spends in hospital after the surgery.

"We're also making sure patients on waiting lists get the care they need sooner, whether that's surgery or other treatment options that don't involve surgery.'

Surgeries are currently performed in theatres at Wonthaggi Hospital, with day surgeries expected to begin at the Phillip Island Community Hospital early next year.

Eastern barred bandicoots' 10-year milestone

Phillip Island Nature Parks is celebrating the 10-year success of the Eastern barred bandicoots' translocation to Churchill Island - a move that literally brought the species back from the brink of extinction.

The Eastern barred bandicoot was first introduced to Churchill Island in 2015. Prior to that, the species had been largely wiped out on the mainland – only surviving within three reserves in Victoria surrounded by predator-barrier fences.

Senior Scientist with the Nature Parks, Duncan Sutherland, said there are now around 150 bandicoots on Churchill Island and many more spread across Phillip Island.

"Eastern barred bandicoots have now been on Churchill Island for a decade, which enabled their release to Phillip Island eight years ago, and since then we have seen them breed and grow in numbers, expanding into areas across most of Phillip Island," Dr Sutherland

"Each year they've travelled further afield on Phillip Island and in recent months we have had more sightings in populated areas, which is reassuring for our conservation efforts. For the first time, an Eastern barred bandicoot was recently seen in the Red Rocks area in dune vegetation and on the outskirts of

"We are delighted to see the bandicoots bounce back in recent years and it is a tremendous outcome for a species that

in the wild But we cannot be complacent. Feral and domestic cats still pose a significant risk for these bandicoots through predation and by spreading the disease toxoplasmosis."

Disease

The milestone comes as new research by the Nature Parks and the University of Melbourne reveals just how deadly toxoplasmosis is to the bandicoots.

Toxoplasmosis is a disease caused by a parasite, which is only spread through the environment by domestic and feral cats. Now that Eastern barred bandicoots have been found to be highly susceptible to toxoplasmosis it is apparent that

> The research article, which has been published in the Journal of Wildlife Diseases, assessed the impact of the disease in endangered Eastern barred bandicoots on Phillip and French islands. It found most, if not all, die within two to three weeks of infection, giving conservationists the first real insight into the magnitude of its impact on bandicoot populations.

> But despite the impacts of toxoplasmosis, bandicoots were continuing to expand, reflecting the species' high reproductive potential and the benefits of ongoing efforts to reduce the num-

bandicoots to island safe havens without foxes, like Churchill, French and Phillip islands, has effectively given them a lifeline," Dr Sutherland said.

Bass MP Jordan Crugnale added: "We're celebrating 10 years since Eastern barred bandicoots made Churchill Island their home - a big win for one of Victoria's inspiring wildlife comeback stories."

As the Eastern barred bandicoots spread into residential areas, including Ventnor to Newhaven and from Smiths Beach to Rhyll, Dr Sutherland said the community played an important role in reporting sightings on the bandicoot portal and help-

dens where the nocturna marsupials can sleep safely during the day.

Responsible pet ownership and keeping cats contained 24/7 was also crucial, he said.

The successful translocations of the Eastern barred bandicoot to Churchill and Phillip islands has been a collaboration between the Nature Parks, Odonata Foundation, Zoos Victoria, the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action, Parks Victoria, The University of Melbourne, National Trust of Australia and Conservation Volunteers Australia.



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

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

In reply to Gregory Jarasch's letter (Advertiser, July 9, 2025) "Where's our history". Phillip Island and surrounding areas have an amazing history and yes Gregory, we don't present it very well.

Ťhe Parish Hall in Thompson Avenue has a large mural on the Coles store side which tells the story briefly of Georgiana McHaffie and the role in the beginnings of St Philip's Anglican Church, which is next door to the Parish Hall. St Philip's opened on January 30, 1870, now the oldest building on the island.

Mrs McHaffie is probably one of our most extraordinary pioneers. See her story and diary entries in "Phillip Island in Picture and Story". Georgiana's diaries are the most valuable look at early island history that we have. The McHaffie family were lessees of Phillip Island from 1984 to 1868.

The Parish Hall mural also covers pictorially the chicory industry, the Grand Prix, Churchill Island and the penguins and mutton bird attractions, to mention

The Phillip Island Historical Society Museum in Berninneit is open daily. Although allotted a small

area, it is still an interesting look at our history.

The Historical Society newsletter always has outstanding stories of our history. The present one being the history of Warley Hospital and of the island's extraordinary benefactor WE Thompson, after which our main street is named. See the storyboard at the sea end of the avenue.

The references "Phillip Island in Picture and Story by Joshua Gliddon is available at the library and so is "Once upon an Island: the early days of Phillip Island". The latter which is available at the Advertiser office in Chapel Street, has a photo of Gregory Peck, Ava Gardiner, Tony Perkins and Stanley Kramer during the making of "On the Beach" in 1959. At the end of a shoot party at the Isle of Wight Hotel Ava Gardiner asked Fred Astaire to tap dance on the tables. The like of which we shall never see again.

Running Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights in Cowes, the winter shelter offers much more than just a bed. Guests receive:

- A friendly pick-up from Cowes Transit
- A hot, home-cooked evening meal
- A safe place to sleep
- Access to showers and laundry facilities
- A light breakfast before heading off in the morning.

An initiative of the Inter Church Council Phillip Island, the winter shelter is run entirely by local volunteers – people from across the community who have stepped forward, trained up and are ready to offer a listening ear, a warm meal and a wel-

"We know that building trust takes time," said Wendy Elson, Project Coordi-

"We're here when people are ready. We're not just providing beds - we're offering consistency, safety and human con-

While it's been a gentle start - with just a few bookings and some cancellations the team sees that as a positive. It's given time to train volunteers, test systems and get things running smoothly.

"We expected a gentle start, as guests need time to build the confidence to give it a go. We also know that some people experiencing homelessness prefer to hear about others' experiences before deciding to stay at shelters," explains Wendy.

"The past few weeks have been a great opportunity to fine-tune everything and make sure we're really ready for the weeks ahead and we are. "The winter shelter is now fully

equipped and ready, with new facilities like a portable shower up and running." Anyone wanting to stay at the winter shelter must first complete a simple assessment with The Salvation Army Homeless-

ness Services – Gippsland. To make an appointment, call 03 5667 5220, 9am to 4pm Monday to Friday, and ask to be assessed for the Bass Coast Winter Shelter.

Support

Community support has been fundamental to the establishment of the winter shelter.

'We've been blown away by the support received from the community. Locals have really stepped up - volunteering, donating and spreading the word," Wendy said.

"It's been nothing short of amazing. The winter shelter would be impossible without this support."

The Inter Church Council of Phillip Island has also been guided by Stable One, a Victorian charity that helps communities set up winter shelters.

Stable One's support and experience have been instrumental in getting the Bass Coast Winter Shelter off the ground.

While the winter shelter team encourages public awareness, community members are asked to not directly approach individuals experiencing homelessness or pressure them to call.

The team asks locals to simply help spread the word that the Bass Coast Winter Shelter is open and ready to support.
