# Inaugural speech delivered

### **POLITICS**

Mary Aldred, the newly elected member for Monash delivered her maiden speech to Parliament last Wednesday, after being formally sworn in on July 22.

Speaking to the Advertiser the next day, Ms Aldred said it was a "great honour" to share her own story, what motivated her to run for office and to speak about the Monash electorate.

During her speech (see separate story), she acknowledged her late father Ken, a former MP, the influence of her mother Margie and the support of her family, describing them as "my everything".

She also acknowledged the

decades long contribution of former member Russell Broadbent, and paid tribute to the electorate's namesake Sir John Monash.

Describing her electorate, she said: "People in Monash give back, put in and help out. They look you in the face when you walk down the street, whether you're a friend or a stranger. We don't ask for special treatment – just a fair go, reward for effort and a better tomorrow for the next generation."

"I am proud to come from a region that grows, makes and manufactures things. Victoria succeeds when our region thrives," Ms Aldred said.

She also listed the challenges

facing the electorate, including coastal inundation on Phillip Island and at Inverloch, saying a national framework was needed "to address coastal inundation across Australia".


Infrastructure was also on the agenda, saying "In regions like mine, roads and infrastructure still lag generations behind," and reiterated her support for small and family businesses. "Australian small-business people have never worked longer days for less reward or faced more risk and red tape."

Ms Aldred quickly followed up her maiden speech the next day with her first question for the Prime Minister, on energy and the ongoing impact of cost of living, an issue she said was continually raised with her.

She was on her feet again the next day, on Thursday delivering her first 90-second statement, on "the importance of banking in regional communities", due to her concern over the continued reduction in "bricks and mortar banking" in the area, in particular the recent decision



### Ventnor accident

On Monday July 28 around 4pm, a car hit a pole travelling along Back Beach Road, near the Penguin Parade.

The driver sustained non-lifethreatening injuries and was taken to hospital for observation.

The collision is being investigated by Senior Constable Williams from the Bass Coast Highway Patrol, and at this stage it is unclear what caused the collision.

Due to the damage to the pole, electricity to the surrounding area was cut for several hours as crews worked to repair the pole. AusNet said they received a call from emergency services just after 4pm and a crew was dispatched immediately. At 4.51pm the power was switched off to repair the fault, which affected 4100 customers. The majority of customers had power restored within five minutes, however 27 customers were without power until 5.18pm, while an additional 59 customers didn't have power restored until just before 11.30pm.

### Road incident

On Tuesday July 29, at approximately 4.12pm, a woman in her 40s with a young female passenger were driving along the Phillip Island Road towards San Remo. Just near the entrance to the Hot Springs, the woman's car (a white Rav4) was hit from behind by a vehicle described as an older model blue/grey hatchback.

Police said the unknown offending vehicle turned onto Churchill Road before conducting a U-turn and turning right onto Phillip Island Road heading back towards Cowes, driving erratically.

Police are appealing for any witnesses and or vehicle dash cam footage that may assist with their enquiries. Members of the public can contact Senior Constable Watson at San Remo Police on 03 5678 5500.

### Vehicle impounded

On the weekend at Cape Woolamai, police stopped a 45-year-old male from Ventnor who was driving without a licence. His vehicle was promptly impounded for 30 days (at a cost of \$1375).

### Vehicles stolen

A blue Mazda 6 wagon was stolen from School Avenue in Newhaven on the weekend, around 2am on Sunday morning. The Bass Coast Criminal Investigation Unit are investigating the matter. Anyone with CCTV footage or information should contact local police.

This was one of several vehicle thefts from the island over the weekend, with reports that other vehicles have since been recovered, including one dumped at Kilcunda.



### Hub poses "unacceptable" risk to bay: PICS

### WIND TURBINE HUB

The environmental impact of the proposed wind turbine hub on Western Port has been "downplayed", and is likely to result in "unacceptable" loss of globally significant habitat, according to the Phillip Island Conservation Society (PICS).

The PICS submission to the Commonwealth Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation (EPBC) referral states while "a swift transition to renewable energy" was urgent and important, it must be done with careful planning to avoid unacceptable environmental impacts.

The Port of Hastings (PoH) is seeking approvals on behalf of the State Government for a revised Victorian Renewable Energy Terminal (VRET) project.

If approved, dredging in the bay will take place for about five months 24/7 with dredged material taken to a land reclamation site, with potential for further dredging for the berth pocket and quay wall.

There would be an extra 130 ships per year, with VRET construction starting in 2027, operational by the end of the decade, with a 50-year design life and unlikely to be decommissioned.

The PICS submission states the revised VRET fails to properly assess many cumulative, longterm environmental impacts, leaving "significant uncertainties"

"The VRET's extensive reclamation, dredging, artificial hardening of the coastline, and indefinite operational life will have unacceptable, permanent and irreversible effects on the Western Port Ramsar wetland ecological character."

It explains while PoH states 0.03 per cent of the bay's globally-significant habitat would be lost, this "downplays the absolute scale of loss of areas of Ramsar wetland, and this loss remains unacceptable".

"PICS is concerned the Ramsar habitat to be lost is of significant quality."

If approved, the VRET would see destruction or permanent modification of more than 45ha of Ramsar wetland, 12ha of mudflat, about 10ha of seagrass, also potentially reducing seagrass productivity for up to 2km north and 2km south of the



If the VRET is approved, dredging of Western Port will take place in the purple area, 24/7 for five months. "This area, already highly disturbed, is resilient and can recover from managed disturbances," according to the Port of Hastings. Western Port is one of only five UNESCO Biosphere Reserves in Australia and a designated a Ramsar wetland.

dredging area.

PICS is "deeply concerned about the impact of increased vessel traffic, which is not quantified", including increased erosion and impact on ecosystem health.

"PICS questions how PoH can state it is 'confident' the ecological character of the Western Port Ramsar wetland can be maintained."

Commonwealth guidelines state a development will have a significant impact if it destroys or substantially modifies a wetland, and so the VRET "puts the integrity of Australia's Ramsar protections to the test".

The submission states the Victorian Government has failed to provide analysis on other potential sites that "may avoid or further minimise environmental harm"

### **Dredging**

The Preserve Western Port Action Group (PWPAG)'s submission states they are opposed to the proposed VRET in "an Australian and internationally recognised Ramsar wetland".

"This fact alone should be sufficient to prevent the VRET being located at the PoH," the submission states. PWPAG state dredging posed an "unacceptable" risk to the bay's fragile environment, with sediment decreasing seagrass productivity.

"Major dredging occurred around the Port of Hastings in 1971. The impacts were visible in Western Port for decades and conditions have only recently returned to pre-1971 dredging conditions.

# After 38 years caring for the community, Linda is clocking off

Newhaven's Linda Goltz has retired from full time work at Bass Coast Health (BCH), after 38 years with the organisation and its predecessors.

In that time, she's helped bring babies into the world, cared for the elderly and been there for the community in emergencies.

Most recently, Linda served as Nurse Unit Manager of the Urgent Care Centre at Cowes, enjoying the last few weeks in the new centre within the Phillip Island Community Hospital.

"It's been a long 38 years but it's gone so fast. Nursing has kept me stimulated and I've always kept learning," she said. "I've admired the growth

"I've admired the growth and development of BCH, and the services we're offering from Cowes are just brilliant for the community."

Before Linda joined Wonthaggi and District Hospital – as the organisation was then known – 38 years ago, she had trained at Royal Melbourne Hospital, worked in maternity at the former Queen Victoria Hospital in the Melbourne CBD and also in maternity at Monash Hospital at Clayton.

Her first role at Wonthaggi was as a midwife but in a reflection of staff in country hospitals being required to be multiskilled, she also worked in the surgical ward.

After finishing post-graduate studies in family and community nursing, Linda undertook outreach work with the maternal and child health team and became team leader, which also entailed overseeing the drug and alcohol service. Linda combined that role with working as a midwife and a health service coordinator, the latter a role

she worked in on and off for 15 years.

Working in the Emergency Department inspired Linda to complete a Master's degree in Advanced Nursing Practice in Emergency, before her career took another trajectory: transforming Armitage House from an aged care facility to a rehabilitation unit.

Her next few years were spent as nurse unit manager of the maternity, and maternal and child health teams.

In 2019, Linda helped to open the 24/7 Minor Injury and Illness Clinic at the Phillip Island Health Hub at Cowes while the Urgent Care Centre was built.

After a stint managing the Emergency Department at Wonthaggi for eight months during the Covid pandemic, Linda returned to Cowes as nurse unit manager of the urgent care centre – a role she held until her retirement.

Her passion for learning and study throughout her career inspired her to offer this tip to young healthcare workers.

"Knowledge makes you versatile. You have to keep educating yourself and keep contemporary because it's changing all the time.

"Working in a rural health service, if you have the energy and the capacity to keep educating yourself, it gives you choices."

Patients can still expect to see Linda in scrubs at the Urgent Care Centre as she will help out from time to time, while she pursues her interest in textiles spinning and weaving.

The Phillip Island community will continue to be in skilled hands when they come to the Urgent Care Centre, with Fiona Mills taking over the role of Nurse Unit Manager.

## Hub impacts will be small, localised: Port

### WIND TURBINE HUB

Significant impacts on endangered migratory species are not expected as a result of the proposed wind turbine hub in Western Port, according to specialists employed by the Port of Hastings.

An online forum – part of a series run by the Port of Hastings (PoH) – last month focused on environmental studies and was told underwater noise from construction had the potential to adversely impact fish species and marine mammals but mitigation measures "are expected to prevent significant impacts".

Studies on fish in the bay found plumes can impact fish gills and their ability to capture food, with sediment a stressor for fish larvae.

The PoH is seeking approvals on behalf of the State Government for a revised Victorian Renewable Energy Terminal

(VRET) project.

If approved, dredging in the bay will take place for about five months 24/7 with dredged material taken to a land reclamation site, with potential for further dredging.

There would be an extra 130 ships per year, with VRET construction starting in 2027, operational by the end of the decade, with a 50-year design life and unlikely to be decommissioned.

Marine scientist Peter Crockett said they had undertaken preliminary assessments with more work to be done "to understand potential impacts", including from dredge induced sediment plumes impact on seagrasses.

Early findings indicated there would be no direct loss of saltmarsh, but localised loss of mudflats and seagrasses as a result of reclamation, about 0.03 per cent of the total Ramsar-listed area.

"Nevertheless that is a signifi-

cant impact the project needs to consider," he said.

Mr Crockett said plumes would affect water quality but it was "expected to return to background levels up to a month after dredging ends".

Preliminary impact assessments on waterbirds found disturbance and loss of habitat from dredging and reclamation was "unlikely to have a significant direct effect", with impacts localised and minor and broader impacts "unlikely".

pacts "unlikely".

VRET project manager Peter
Watt told the meeting dredging
operations "absolutely will have
an impact".

"This project is not zero impact. However preliminary impact assessments are showing those impacts are small and localised and won't have an unacceptable impact on the ecological character of the Ramsar wetland." he said.

# Ventnor neighbour loses VCAT objection

An objector has lost a VCAT case opposing the development of accommodation on a Ventnor clifftop, an area now considered of state significance.

In the case Hazelden v Bass Coast SC, the Hazelden family took neighbours from Five Acres accommodation on McHaffies Lane Ventnor to VCAT.

The two-hectare property, zoned farming, currently includes two buildings described as dwellings and three described as cabins, with a separate permit for a shed to be used as a function centre.

Last year Bass Coast Shire Council planners approved an amendment to a 2018 permit allowing Five Acres to develop an additional cabin.

The Hazeldens, who live about 240 metres from the group accommodation, opposed the amendment, arguing the additional cabin will exacerbate issues including overdevelopment of the land for non-farming purposes, traffic, light and smoke pollution, noise and visual impact.

However senior VCAT member Alison Glynn approved the permit, with slight amendments, saying one additional cabin between existing cabins was "acceptable".

"The existing use of the land as a twohectare site for agricultural purposes is already limited by its size and the existing approved group accommodation use," Ms Glynn said.

"In context of the distance between the proposed new cabin and the (Hazelden's) dwelling ... I am satisfied any additional noise, light glare or smoke from its fireplace would be small and within context of a rural environment where some noise, artificial light and smoke is to be expected.

"Additional traffic will be sporadic ... I find the proposed location of the additional cabin is acceptable."

Ms Glynn said all of Bass Coast Shire was a declared distinctive area and land-scape (DAL), meaning the landscape and environment "are important to the people of Victoria and require an enhanced level of protection and management".

Furthermore, 46 McHaffies Lane has further protection, classified as "Phillip Island Western and Southern Coast", although she added the DAL was yet to be gazetted by the Victorian Government or adopted into the Bass Coast Shire planning scheme.

She concluded the cabins were "discrete" from the public view.

"I am therefore satisfied the additional cabin does not offend the objective to 'protect and enhance' the declared area's significant landscapes."

Ms Glynn acknowledged there was a lack of clarity in the 2018 permit on the exact use of buildings, but this was beyond the scope of this VCAT case.

## Community passion for Summerland future on display

### CONSULTATION

Community members have shared their longterm vision for the future of the Summerland Peninsula at two consultation sessions held by the Phillip Island Nature

The sessions attracted a good turnout, with issues examined including how to balance the commercial aspects of tourism with the natural environment, revegetation, walking tracks, how to best manage traffic in the area and the future of the Nobbies building.

Residents also said there was not enough information for visitors explaining the history and significance of the site, calling for more signage and better use of technology, including the use of QR Codes and apps.

At the session on July 29 at the Penguin Parade, one attendee told the Advertiser there was almost universal agreement that the current Nobbies building was not suitable for the location.

Alternative suggestions for the area included cameras in penguin burrows, a camera at the blowhole and designated walking tracks and boardwalks, like those in Mt Kosciusz-

ko National Park.

Jarvis Weston, the Nature Park's General Manager for Infrastructure and Planning, said he was pleased with the turnout to both forums, and with the comprehensive ideas and suggestions made.

We have had a fantastic turn out with a range of views, thoughts and ideas expressed," he said.

A further drop-in session is scheduled for this weekend, Saturday, August 9 from 12.30pm to 2.30pm at the Penguin Parade Visitor Centre.

"After this point all information received will be synthesised and we will begin the design development process. We will test some of the design principles before developing the draft master plan for comment and feedback."

The draft master plan for the Summerland Peninsula is due to completed by October.

## Another council meeting, another road scheme

Another small-scale special charge scheme has been approved for Sunderland Bay.

Bass Coast councillors at the July meeting approved a road scheme for The Esplanade between Sunderland Bay Road and Zephyr Court.

The scheme was requested by landowners in a petition to the March 2024 council meeting, with the total estimated cost of the scheme \$1.8 million.

The maximum total amount that can be charged to all landowners is \$499,128, with the estimated cost per landowner to be between \$11,938 and \$28,897.

In May councillors voted to progress a road and drainage upgrade project along The Esplanade between Sunderland Bay Road and Batman Street, Surf Beach.

At the July meeting, there were again more questions by residents on the continued roll out of small-scale schemes.

Louise Lyell commented figures used in calculations were "all totally at the discretion of the relevant council with no specific details other than a formula given in the Act".

Who is the independent governing body that oversees that criteria and calculations used are correct?" Louise asked.

Council CEO Greg Box responded there was no requirement for an independent body to oversee the way council apportioned costs.

'Council has cost apportionment and associated documents legally reviewed to ensure the wording and calculations are consistent, fair and reasonable and ultimately defendable if challenged," Mr Box said.

Louise also asked

about the \$1.2 million council contribution to a special scheme for 17 houses. "Considering that council finances are under strain, is this allocation of funds considered money wisely spent for the greater community?" she said.

Mr Box replied the investment was consistent with the council's Urban Road and Drainage Improvement Policy and the current Long Term Financial Plan.

"Consideration given not only to the property landowners' frontage, but also to the community benefit provided by the infrastructure," Mr Box said.

"Where the community benefit is high, Council will provide a higher funding contribution to the project."

General Manager for Infrastructure and Planning at the Nature Parks, Jarvis Weston said it was a fantastic turn out with over 80 people attending the consultation sessions and expressing a range of views,

thoughts, and ideas. "It is so valuable to

hear from locals and communities to ensure we find the right balance between ecotourism and protecting the significant environmental and cultural values of the Summerland Peninsula.

'The shared respect and responsibility for the conservation values of the peninsula was evident throughout the consultation process."

Following requests from the community for a weekend session, the Nature Parks has announced an additional drop-in session for Saturday August 9 from 12.30pm to 2.30pm at the Penguin Parade Visitor Centre Education Space.

There is also an online survey available to complete by Friday August 15, when this round of consultation will close.

The Nature Parks will then collate information received and begin the design development process, testing principles with key stakeholders, before a draft master plan is developed and released for community feedback later this year.



## Shore Break: breaking mental health barriers

Chris Pitman's riveting solo play "Shore Break" held the audience spellbound at Berninneit last Wednesday evening.

The play was introduced by Cr Tim O'Brien, who spoke of his career specialising in workplace mental health.

Cr O'Brien said unfortunately Australia "was blighted" by depression and suicide, ranking in the top 10 globally, and that the number of lives lost each year to suicide was twice the road toll.

He also said rates of depression and suicide increased the further you moved from

"Perhaps we need to re-examine the notion that bush people are great at looking out for each other. Use tonight as the opportunity to open up the discussion," he urged. "Mental ill health can touch any of us."

Running for 75 minutes, Chris' powerful performance tackled questions of connection, masculinity, mental health ... and love of the ocean.

The monologue is delivered by an older surfer, in a tent by the ocean, on the edge of a desert. It covers growing up with an alcoholic and distant father, and a mother who made jokes to help skate across the difficulties of life, from his first trip to the beach, his instant love of the ocean, learning to hold his breath, friends made and love lost. Over the performance, it is gradually revealed what led him to this place.

At times brutal and confronting, it was also tender and hilarious, with many in the audience chuckling along with Chris' descriptions of high school teacher Budgie in too tight pants, or a mother wracked with emphysema ... who was "kicking the bucket" just a little further down the road.

### **Panel**

The performance was followed by a panel featuring Chris alongside surfer Ross Clarke-Jones and Beyond Blue Ambassa-

dor Paul Milne, who talked openly about how men deal with their emotions, and mental health challenges, which can leave you disconnected from your own life, much like the protagonist in Shore Break.

Chris said seeing men camping out on rugged coastlines, searching for surf made him want to tell their story. "They seemed like forgotten people." He was surprised how much the story resonated with others.

Surfer Ross Clarke-Jones shared his own journey and challenges after an injury during a reality TV show in 2019 left him unable to surf. "It destroyed my identity. If I can't surf, I can't do anything.'

Moving to the island that year, he then confronted Covid lockdowns and described himself as "crying on the floor". "What am I going to do? I had no trade, or profession.

He credits his wife with helping him turn things around - when she bought him a dog, George. Then he described working alongside local tradies who were renovating his house, which saw a whole new world open up.

He now works with his friend Stu at Vortex Bathrooms and said the structure of work, learning new skills and that sense of achievement, has transformed his life.

"He has taught me everything. I have got a full life ... an even better life.

Chris described surfing as the "ultimate mediation ... you spend a lot of time sitting and waiting", and the ocean "is so much bigger than us", while Ross regaled the audience with a story of a wipe out that tore off his boardshorts, leaving him nude in the surf surrounded by cameras and drones.

Between the laughs and the insights, the three men emphasised the importance of talking, and dispelling the stigma around mental health, with Ross saying it was "long overdue", and conversations needed to happen "more often, out in the open with honesty and compassion."

"There's no point waiting for the 'what

ifs'," said Paul.
"Encourage people to talk. Speak up. Don't be afraid to ask, are you okay."

After the panel, the audience were invited to enjoy pizza in the great hall at Berninneit, and talk with Chris, Ross and Paul, and each other.

The local focus on mental health continues, with a sports trivia quiz and mental health awareness night on August 16, presented by the Phillip Island Health Hub Auxiliary at the clubrooms of the Phillip Island Football Netball Club.

## Christmas in July" at PICAl

There was a little extra warmth at the Phillip Island Community and Adult Learning Centre (PICAL) this winter, thanks to the generosity of local families and the big-hearted students at Newhaven College.

More than 100 gift packs have been donated by the school's year five and six students, each filled with small, thoughtful items - everything from toiletries to treats. Each pack also includes a handwritten message from the student or family who made it, offering encouragement, kindness or just a cheerful note to brighten someone's day.

It was all part of a Social and Emotional (SEL) Program at the school, around empathy, kindness and community. And now, these beautifully made packs are finding their way to others in the community through PICAL.

"This is what PICAL is all

about," said David Rooks, Centre Manager.

## Aged Care reform delayed; seniors still waiting for real support

The Federal Government's new Aged Care Act will now come into effect on November 1, four months later than originally planned.

And that is creating more pain for locals trying to secure home care packages.

Earlier this year, local residents shared their stories of battling "the most confusing system you could possibly believe" trying to secure home care assistance.

One resident said after an almost year long assessment and waiting process, his package was withdrawn three months later, after he could not find a provider.

He contacted multiple providers, only to be told there was no care available.

In April, a spokesperson for the Department of Health and Aged Care told the Advertiser "the current home care system isn't working".

Commenting on the experience of local residents, the spokesperson said, "unfortunately probably what they've

discovered the hard way, is they've fallen down the cracks".

At the time, the residents were told the new measures by the Federal Government, due to start on July 1, would create a new, more sustainable Support at Home program.

With the timeline now pushed back, the residents remain in limbo.

### Disheartened


One resident (83) said he was disheartened by the experience of trying to negotiate the current system.

After a formal assessment, he was approved for two hours of home help each week – basic cleaning support to assist with daily living.

He was told the cost would be \$175 per week out of pocket, while the provider would receive an additional \$360 per week from the government to "manage" the package – a total of \$535 per week for two hours of cleaning.

'I could hire someone privately for a fraction of that cost," he said.

"Even the person trying to

sign me up agreed the system doesn't make sense. But that's just how it works, apparently."

The government has promoted home care packages as a key part of its strategy to help older Australians "age in place" and remain in their homes longer. However, means testing - especially for those who own property or have savings - continues to limit access or drive-up costs, even for modest support.

"I've worked hard all my life, saved, paid taxes, raised a family, and contributed to my community," the man said.

"And now I'm told that's the reason I have to pay more for a bit of help at home.

The Department of Health and Aged Care says the decision to delay the start of the new Act was made in consultation with the sector and will allow more time to educate clients, support staff, and ensure providers are ready.

It said the Act is designed to centre aged care around the rights of older people, improve access to information, simplify care assessments, and bring greater transparency to service costs.

It also promises to make service agreements, care plans, and pricing easier to understand - a welcome change for many older people who say the current system is confusing and overly bureaucratic.

While aged care providers have welcomed the additional time to prepare, the lived experience of many older Australians paints a more urgent

"The help exists in theory," the local man said.

by Bendigo Bank to close its Korumburra branch. "I don't want to see more reductions in Monash."

With the latest sitting round over, Ms Aldred headed home, due to return to Canberra in late August.

Back in Monash, she intends to continue holding "mobile offices" across the electorate, saying the initiative had been very popular with constituents.

"It's really important to continue these. Not everyone can leave where they live to come to me to discuss issues; I want to go to them."

Also on her agenda is civics in schools, and after meeting with the Speaker of the House of Representatives, she's returning to Monash with a replica mace and kits to distribute to students.

"I'm keen to visit schools and discuss the parliamentary system, and why it's important to take an interest. Hopefully that might even inspire some of them to serve their community."

She intends to continue meeting with local community and sporting groups, and reiterated her support for the Phillip Island Recre-

ation Reserve.

"I met with Catherine King, the Infrastructure Minister, to discuss the issues important to Monash, and I will follow that up with a letter," she said.

"I will keep pushing the Recreation Reserve as hard as I possibly can."

### **Parliament**

After a busy first session, Ms Aldred said she had enjoyed her time in the parliament, commenting on the "overwhelmingly generous response" to her first speech, from people on both sides of parliament.

"I was raised in a family

that believed what you put out is what you get back, and that means being respectful and courteous to colleagues on all sides of the house,"

she said.

"Sometimes differences of opinion are good and important. There should be a contest of ideas, which results in a better outcome, but it should be respectful debate."

In her own words, she hasn't wasted any time getting started, already appointed to several committees, including the Communications, Sport and Arts Committee and the Audit and Public Accounts Committee.

"There will be a lot of work in a very constructive, collegiate manner. I am motivated every morning I'm here. It is such a privilege and a thrill."

The new Monash MP was one of just a handful of newly elected Liberal members, with the Opposition holding just 43 seats in the new parliament.

Despite relentless media coverage of the discord between the National and Liberal parties, especially over NetZero, Ms Aldred said she's focused on what she wants to achieve for Monash.

"In the Liberal Party we are able to voice our opinion on behalf of our community, without fear of expulsion, unlike the Labor Party," she said.

"It allows for robust debate and contested ideas.

"I'm here to do a job, and I'm taking my time to prepare my thoughts on energy - which is a complex policy - on sustainability and Net Zero

"I will listen to the views of the local community and prepare my thoughts in an evidence-based, thorough manner that best represents the people of Monash."

# Aldred speech highlights

The new member for Monash, Mary Aldred delivered her inaugural speech to parliament last Tuesday, July 29.

Key features of the speech include:
• Acknowledgement of her late father Ken, a former MP, who made his first speech in parliament 50 years ago, and the influence of her mother Margie. "While people are sometimes quick to associate my interest in politics with following in my dad's footsteps, they forget to acknowledge my mum's influence, too."

 Acknowledgement of former MP Russell Broadbent, his decades of service and their long association.

• A description of the Monash electorate and its people ... Gippslanders, farmers, veterans, tradies and teachers. "I am proud to come from a region that grows, makes and manufactures things. Victoria succeeds when our region thrives." She also acknowledged the advice and friendship of Aunty Cheryl Drayton, a Gunaikurnai elder from Drouin.

A tribute to Sir John Monash, saying
 Australia owed him a debt of gratitude,
 including for his work with the State
 Electricity Commission in the Latrobe
 Valley. She said the latent antisemitism of
 his time could not dim his achievements,
 but it was "tragically ironic" that now
 Melbourne and Victoria were "in the grips
 of the oldest hatred time", reiterating her
 support for the Jewish community.

 A list of thank you's to the key people who supported her campaign locally, as well as support from fellow politicians including Wayne Farnham (Victorian Senator), her "patron senator Jane Hume", the Hon Judith Troeth, and new leader Sussan Ley. She especially thanked her mother and siblings and extended family.

 Outlining the key priorities for Monash: A new West Gippsland Hospital; addressing coastal inundation, particularly at Inverloch and Phillip Island; improved infrastructure and roads; support for veterans; increased assistance for small business; supporting farmers and timber towns.

• Her desire to work collaboratively with all her colleagues on both sides of the parliament. "... My parents instilled in me a clear understanding that political opponents are not enemies, that while we have different, sometimes markedly opposite views on policy, we all love Australia, and that there are good people on both sides." She also expressed concern that "as a country we are losing the ability to respectfully disagree with one another on big national issues".

 An outline of her experience before entering politics: roles on community boards (for hospitals and aged care, Lifeline, tertiary education and sporting organisations); Founding CEO of Committee for Gippsland; a career in technology and cyber security.

Describing the Liberal Party as "a large family – loud, boisterous with bold arguments and real contests that those outside the family may not always understand but they're always for each other when it counts".

• Outlining her core beliefs as "a Liberal whose instincts will always stretch to the empowerment of the individual", protecting rights of religion, the right "to love the person you choose", curbing government overreach, and leading on the economy "with a focus on growth and productivity." She also stated she believed the country was "losing its way" and that there needs to be "some tough national conversations".

Ms Aldred concluded her speech with a promise to the people of Monash.

"I recognise that each day I spend in this place is a day closer to when I will leave. I plan to make each day count by advancing the cause for which I am here, a passionate belief in the purpose and potential of the people of Monash. To my electorate, I asked for your trust and confidence. You have given me the opportunity of a lifetime. I will work my heart out for you."

## Rescue tower repair underway

### INFRASTRUCTURE

This week, work has begun to repair the Smiths Beach Rescue Base, managed by the Woolamai Beach Surf Life Saving Club (WBSLSC).

The project includes repairing the corroded steel on the rescue base structure.

Club President, Jason Close said during the work, the stair and landing adjacent to the tower will be closed

However the timber accessibility ramp will remain open, aside from a one-to-three-day closure in mid-August.

"Access to Smith's Beach will remain open at all times via the western access stairs," Jason said.

"Contractors will do their best to minimise inconvenience to beachgoers during the works."

He said the club was very grateful for the support of members of the local community, the Smiths Beach-combers Association, Phillip Island and San Remo Rotary, the Victorian State Government's Tiny Towns Grants Program, the Victorian Emergency Services Equipment Program, local member Jordan Crugnale MP and Phillip Island Nature Parks.

The State Government contributed \$133,960 (through two separate grants), with Rotary donating \$20,000.

"We are looking forward

"We are looking forward to the rescue base being ready for the summer life saving season and also to the improvements to the landing, staircase and ramp progressing," Jason said.

The project is due to be completed by mid-September.



combers Association, Phillip Island and San Remo Rotary, be available for the upcoming summer season.

Work begins this week on repairs to the Smiths Beach Rescue Base, ensuring the vital life saving facility will be available for the upcoming summer season.

Phillip Island Nature Parks will then begin separate upgrade work on the accessibility ramp (late 2025) and stair and landing (2026).

This work is funded by a State Government grant of \$90,000

### Repairs

Over the past 18 months, WB-SLSC sought funding to ensure the safety of the rescue base structure, which was built only seven years ago.

The club said the metal staircase at the base, which provided lifesavers and lifeguards with fast and direct access to the beach, had become increasingly corroded. In March 2024, it an-

In March 2024, it announced that unless money could be found for repairs, the staircase would have to close, followed by the tower in coming seasons.

It raised around \$25,000 towards the repairs with the remainder of the money coming from government grants and donations from community groups.

The tower is a vital part of the WBSLSC summer patrols, with over 11,000 people visiting Smiths Beach during patrol hours each summer.

In recent years, the club

has recorded thousands of preventative actions – proactive steps taken to avoid rescues, including directing swimmers back between the flags.

The base is also equipped with a solar panel and battery, part-funded by Westernport Water, which ensure radios – crucial for communication and co-ordination of rescues and beach safety – can be charged.

The base includes a first aid room and a fresh water tap, both essential assets for lifesavers and lifeguards when treating members of the public.

Eighteen Newhaven College Year 10 students embarked on the Borneo World Challenge program, assisting local environmental groups, while enriching their own cultural experience.

### Students volunteer in Borneo

### **EDUCATION**

Over the school holidays, an intrepid group of 18 Year 10 Newhaven College students volunteered their time by engaging in conservation work in the Kinabatangan River area of Borneo.

The group was accompanied by teachers Fiona Smart and David Prideaux. The College part-nered with World Challenge, an organisation that provides experiences for participants while making a positive impact in international communities. World Challenge trips are student led, where student teams are put in charge of the budget, decide where to eat, organise daily activities, run daily meetings and make sure everyone is safe and accounted for.

The trip began with the first five days in Kota Kinabalu, where the students became familiar with the city and its landmarks, went stand-up paddleboarding, and spent a day snorkelling, experiencing coral reefs, sea turtles, and even saw a shark.

The project work was to help the local area of the Kinabatangan River to plant grasses and trees and clean up the river. The students worked extremely hard in the heat and humidity to make a real difference.

### Age Pension

### Getting it and Keeping

or many Australians heading into retirement, the Age Pension plays an important role in helping cover day-to-day living costs. But working out whether you're eligible - and how much you'll get - can be confusing.

Here's a simple overview of how the Age Pension works and what to keep in mind if you're planning to apply or already receiving it.

### How eligibility works

There are three basic requirements to qualify for the Age Pension:

- 1. You must be over a certain age. As of July 2025, the Age Pension age is
- 2. You must be an Australian resident, usually for at least 10 years.
- 3. You must meet income and asset test rules, which look at what you earn and what you own.

The income test includes things like superannuation income, part-time work, or investment returns. The asset test looks at property (not including your home), investment assets, savings. vehicles, and other belongings of value.

Both tests have limits. If you're under those limits, you may receive a full **pension**. If you're above, you might still qualify for a part pension.

### Current Age Pension Rates and Thresholds (as of July 2025)

- Maximum fortnightly pension\* \$1,149.00 (\$29,874 per year) - Single \$1,732.20 (\$45,037 per year) - Couple
- Full pension asset test (homeowner) Less than \$321,500 - Single Less than \$481,500 - Couple
- Part pension asset cut-off (homeowner) Up to \$704,500 - Single
- Up to \$1,059,000 Couple Full pension income test Less than \$5,668 per year - Single

Less than \$9,880 per year - Couple

Part pension income cut-off Up to \$65,416 per year - Single Up to \$99,954 per year - Couple

\*Includes supplements. Note these thresholds change slightly each year, so it's worth checking the latest figures online or with Services Australia.

### Don't qualify? You may still get help

If you're over Age Pension age but don't qualify due to your income or assets, you might be eligible for the Commonwealth Seniors Health Card.

This card gives access to cheaper prescription medicines and may offer savings on medical services, electricity, gas, and rates — depending on where you

### Keeping the Age Pension

Once you're on the pension, it's not set-and-forget. You'll need to keep Centrelink updated if your financial situation changes — for example, if you start a part-time job, receive an inheritance, or sell an asset.

Regular updates ensure you're getting the right amount. If not, you might be overpaid — and required to pay it back

### Make it easier with online tools

There are free calculators and estimators available on the Services Australia website to help you work out what you're entitled to. If you'd rather speak to someone, the Financial Information **Service** is a free government service that can help explain your options.

### The bottom line

The Age Pension provides a base level of income to help older Australians live with dignity in retirement. Knowing how it works - and keeping on top of any changes - helps you stay in control of your finances and avoid unnecessary stress.

Even if you don't qualify now, your situation might change - so it's always worth checking again down the track

### **Traffic Signals Installation**

New traffic signals will be installed at the Dandy Premix Quarries intersection to reduce truck traffic through Grantville and improve safety for pedestrians and motorists using the Bass Highway.

Works commenced July 2025, approx. 4-month duration Lane closures, reduced speed limits, contra-flow traffic Deep Creek St and Bass Hwy Service Rd access impacted Two bus stops temporarily relocated

### COMMENCEMENT AND DURATION OF ROADWORKS

**Stage 1 Roadworks** confined to the existing quarry intersection commenced early July 2025.

**Stage 2 Roadworks** on the Bass Highway Northbound carriageway are scheduled to commence on 14 August and are expected to be completed by 19 September 2025.

The **Stage 2 Roadworks** require temporary closure of the Bass Highway Northbound carriageway and the introduction of contra-flow traffic to the Southbound carriageway.

The left lane of the Southbound carriageway will continue to be used for southbound traffic and the second lane for northbound traffic after diversion across the highway median to share the Southbound carriageway. During **Stage 2 Roadworks**, each of the two lanes of the Southbound carriageway will have traffic moving in the opposite direction.

During **Stage 2 Roadworks** there will be reduced speed limits through the Bass Highway construction zone with modified traffic layouts and traffic controls in place to assist motorists.

## ROADWORK TIMES AND TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT

Stage 2 Roadworks will generally be undertaken Monday to Saturday (6 days/week) between 7.00am and 7.00pm. Some short-term roadworks may be carried out overnight.

Traffic controls including Variable Message Signs (VMSs), Safety Barriers, Portable Traffic Lights, Traffic Controllers and Truck Mounted Attenuators (TMAs) will be in operation.



Deep Creek Street and the Bass Highway Service Road traffic will be temporarily impacted during Stage 2 roadworks.

**Deep Creek Street:** temporary use of Bonney Road for Bass Highway access and egress, including for Smith Street, Broome Court, Stewart Street, Malcolm Drive and Panoramic Drive traffic.

Bass Highway Service Road (northbound, western side of Bass Highway): temporary northbound egress to Bass Highway under traffic controller supervision. This will also impact on traffic from Blackwood Drive, Swan Street, Vision Lane and Lang Street using the



### **BUS STOP - NORTHBOUND**

The Bass HWY northbound bus stop located in the Stage 2 Roadworks construction zone will be temporarily relocated further north (approx. 120m) with signage, waiting area provision and pedestrian protection provided.

### **PROJECT OUTCOMES**

Installation of the Traffic Signals will enable trucks to turn right, northbound onto Bass Highway, resulting in a major reduction in quarry trucks through Grantville. The Traffic Signals will also improve Bus Stop pedestrian safety and assist safer Deep Creek Street traffic flows onto Bass Highway.







"It used to be you could sit there and tattoo, and make a pretty good living," he said.

"Now people have moved into other art fields. Not necessarily just to supplement their incomes, but to keep their momentum, and become better, rounded artists.

"I know personally, I began painting and that's become a really significant part of my life."

Being able to focus on art outside of his tattoo studio represents a new kind of freedom.

"Tattooing is more like applied art. You are working to someone

"When you paint, you don't have to worry about any of that. With art, painting, photography, you are just doing your own thing.'


He's hoping the local creative community will support the new exhibition, as they did with "Body Parts".



### Shameful conduct

At the July 16 BCSC meeting ratepayers submitted five separate questions explicitly requesting information about how BCSC's proposed governance changes to public question time (PQT) were of benefit to ratepayers and non-discriminatory. Ratepayers specifically asked council to outline the reasons and rationale behind this policy change, how the policy was not discriminatory, and how the changes would affect ratepayers. None of these matters were factually addressed in CEO Box's response, which didn't match the questions asked. Instead, his "answer" talked only about how ratepayers had been given one month to respond and that

all responses would be con-

sidered. His answer was sim-

ply filibuster which avoided

meaningful scrutiny, whilst

not technically contravening

the required procedures. Spe-

cific questions were asked,

and a single inadequate and

irrelevant answer was given.

This is a practice all levels

of government have become

highly skilled in, and this kind

of obfuscation appears to have become an increasingly standard operating procedure for BCSC in recent times.

In fact, for the last four or five years it has become obvious that some elements of BCSC have had an ongoing issue with the mere existence of PQT. In July 2022, former Crs Rooks and Laing, launched a failed motion to remove PQT from monthly council meetings entirely, alleging it to be "the most inefficient way to put questions to council." Then, in May 2023, former Mayor Cr Michael Whelan said council would no longer be answering questions about the Sunderland Bay-Surf Beach Special Charge Scheme, and subsequently refused to answer around 120 questions. This ran counter to BCSC's own rules of governance.

What is behind this continued attempt by BCSC to diminish PQT? Could it be that being expected to answer important and confronting questions is uncomfortable? Or perhaps matters are raised which council would prefer remain somewhat obscured?

How long should ratepay-

ers tolerate this? We deserve better. Shameful conduct for a body constantly claiming honesty, openness and clarity in its dealings with its ratepayers.

Apart from the destruction of the environment caused by the massive footprint imposed by these structures, once built, all of a sudden the local shops, boutiques, cafes and restaurants have a reason for raising their prices exponentially to cater to the uber-rich at the expense of the locals. In fact, the knock-on effect for the locals to be able to afford to live in Byron Bay, is now the very reason why the locals have had to move somewhere else.

I spoke to many of the ex-locals who used to live in Byron Bay, pushed out of the area to outlying regions which are more affordable. Having visited Byron Bay on several occasions, I noticed a huge change in the atmosphere which included the underlying anger and disappointment in having been forced out. The attempt to lure wealthier prospects to Philip Island would be at the expense of the locals and our way of life here. That's not something to look forward to.

# Bass Strait gas plan open for feedback

### **ENVIRONMENT**

Community consultation is currently underway on environmental impacts from an existing Bass Strait gas field, which includes Phillip Island's

Beach Energy is undertaking a five-year review of the Bass Gas Offshore Operations Environment Plan for ongoing production operations for the Yolla gas field in Bass Strait.

Commercial production of gas from the Yolla field started in 2006 and could extend to 2030, or finish

The gas field is serviced by the Yolla Platform, and a 147 km subsea pipeline that transports the gas and liquids under the surf zone, beach and coastal dunes near Kilcunda to the Lang Lang Gas Plant, where natural gas is processed before being distributed to the domestic east coast

The platform is connected to the Lang Lang Gas Plant via a satellite link, controlled remotely onshore direct or indirect environmental impact.

The pipeline and gas plant are not included in this environment plan.

However, according to Beach Energy, the planning area (see the yellow section in the map) is the broadest extent of the "environment that may be affected" (EMBA), subject to final approvals. In other words where operational activities could have a direct or indirect environmen-

Beach Energy states risks from operational activities includes water discharges and loss of containment of hydrocarbons or chemicals, but this was managed through equipment design, and maintenance programs.

There are no activities in marine parks, but the Yallock-Bulluk Marine National Park and Powlett River Mouth, are within the EMBA, and

Species that fall within the planning area include southern right and humpback whales, particularly during the winter months, dolphin and shark species, seals, migratory sea birds, little penguins, and shearwaters, with commercial shark fisheries and other fish species also potentially impacted.




The result? Maxen Mills soared once again, claiming second overall in the KOB Series,
