"Farcical" DAL delayed yet again

The final DAL will have a major impact across Phillip Island, with developers hoping to get the green light for vast new housing developments at Cape Woolamai's airport land, Newhaven West, Smiths Beach, Ventnor and San Remo.

PLANNING

The State Government has again - for the fourth time - extended the deadline for finalising the long-anticipated Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) project.

One local described the constant delays as "farcical", with Bass Coast first declared a DAL in 2019, aiming to lock in town boundaries, and tighten planning controls to protect significant landscapes.

The DAL's final hurdle, the Statement of Planning Policy (SPP) was expected last year but was extended to October this year.

But last week Member for Bass Jordan Crugnale MP confirmed the draft SPP had again been given an extension, despite in October saving details would be finalised by November, when a priority for government and it was to be endorsed by public entities such as Bass Coast Shire, with the final public SPP

expected by April 2025.

"I am once again extremely disappointed we will not be able to finalise the DAL documentation to seek both endorsement from the responsible public authorities and inform communities about the final boundaries, as was stated to happen by the end of November," Ms Crugnale said last week.

"I know the community want certainty and this update does not provide that right now.

'I am assured work is progressing and am in constant communication with the Minister for Planning's office and as soon as I am able to share an additional update I will.'

Ms Crugnale said she shared people's "frustration" and was not able to give any further time-

line "at this stage". can assure everyone this is the work will be done," she had said previously.

safeguard environmental, landscape and cultural values and encourage good neighbourhood design, while not putting communities in areas of environment risk."

She said the SPP would provide a blueprint for the liveability of the Bass Coast for the next 50 vears and ensure housing growth and infrastructure investment occurred in the right locations.

As reported, in August Planning Minister Sonya Kilkenny refused to speculate on specifics of the DAL's final release when asked by the Advertiser.

"I don't have a timeline. It's a priority. It will happen," Ms Kilkenny said, putting an end to rumours the whole project had been shelved.

As to why there had been such a significant delay, the Minister said it was a "complex matter".

and tightening planning controls to protect significant landscapes, with six areas declared state or regionally significant including the coast and hinterland between Cape Woolamai and Ventnor, as well as the Rhyll Inlet, and areas north of Cowes-Rhyll Road to Newhaven.

During the public consulta-tion in 2022, 747 written public submissions were received and the former Minister for Planning referred the draft SPP and all written submissions to a standing advisory committee for independent advice.

In May last year the independent planning panel hearings for the DAL closed, after listening to more than 70 parties and 30 witnesses over two months.

In February councillors voted on a submission, supplied by the Department of Planning, which provides new landscape details suggesting Ventnor and San Remo in particular could be expanded.

Under the new details, San Remo looks set to almost double in size, with the town boundary extended through to Punchbowl Road.

And Ventnor west may become another controversial battleground, with the government potentially recommending expansion for housing, Remo and Bass Coast before a move not supported by the community or council.



Block buyer in hot water

REAL ESTATE

The billionaire property investor who bought all five Cowes houses auctioned in the reality TV show The Block has been charged with running an unlawful lottery.

Well-known figure on The Block, Adrian Portelli forked out more than \$15 million on November 9 to secure the entire property, with all five houses then listed on his LMCT+ website.

The website is currently selling tickets in a giveaway for the public to have a chance to win the entire resort or choose \$8m in prize money, with entries to the giveaway closing December 26.

However last week it was reported Mr Portelli will face a South Australian court after being charged with running an unlawful lottery.

LMCT+ is described as a "shopping tool and rewards club", offering shopping discounts for a monthly fee, with members allegedly granted entry into monthly draws where cash and prizes can be won.

According to ABC news, Mr Portelli and his company, Xclusive Tech Pty Ltd, face 19 charges of person conducting/assist in the conduct of an unlawful lottery.

The charges range in date from January 2023 to May this year, with Xclusive Tech charged over several lotteries that offered properties from The Block as a major prize.

Island beaches considered for Top 10 list

Australia's Beach Ambassador made a surprise visit to Phillip Island this week as part of his nationwide search of 12,000 beaches to determine the Top 10 for 2025.

Coastal veteran Brad Farmer AM, who has been writing about beaches for 40 years says, "Phillip Island is an ideal destination for inbound international tourist post-Covid'

During his visit, Brad inspected a shortlist of beaches on Phillip Island including Cowes, Smiths, Red Rocks and Kitty Miller Bay.

The Top 10 beaches list, a study Brad undertakes each year for Tourism Australia, showcases the best beach destinations and celebrates the diversity of Australian beaches.

Last year, Squeaky Beach at Wilsons Prom was crowned the number one beach in Australia.


During his visit, Brad caught up with local surfers and former members of the Phillip Island National Surfing Reserve committee, Graeme Burgan and Phil Wright, to discuss local issues.

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Rhyll jetty will undergo major makeover

Rhyll jetty will undergo a multi-million-dollar upgrade, including a new pontoon and a wider landing zone for cruise ship passengers, with plans released by Parks Victoria last week

The yet-to-be-funded redesign comes after a year of technical investigations and community consultation.

News of the proposed upgrade, however, was met with protests by some residents, who asked why the Rhyll jetty was prioritised above the closed Newhaven jetty.

Parks Victoria said the upgrade was needed because the jetty is approaching the end of its life and needed to support a "range of water-based tourism and recreational activities", including tour operators and short-term berthing for cruise ship tenders and recreational vessels.

"It plays a significant role in supporting wildlife cruises, cruise ship ten-ders, recreational boating and fishing as well as promenading for the local community," Parks Victoria states.

"The number of passengers arriving at Rhyll has significant economic benefits, enhances its sta-

tus as a desirable tourist be a significant factor in destination, and provides for the Rhyll Community Association who welcome visitors and promote tourism at Rhyll.'

The authority also said the jetty needed to be designed for "local wave climate and climate change impacts such as sea level rise".

The final Rhyll Local Area Port Plan does not propose any dredging, with the proposed jetty on the same footprint as the existing jetty.

The plan provides berthing and pedestrian access across the full tidal range and includes:

- A widened landing zone, which will reduce congestion and allow for crowd dispersal
- Improved safety and accessibility with solar lighting, a new disability compliant gangway, and handrails on both sides
- · A jetty head with a symmetrical pontoon design, using the existing pontoon and a new pontoon to the east
- The berths created by the new pontoon will be shared between tourism operators and recreational users

"Although the wave and tidal climate at Rhyll is not severe, determining the appropriate wave loading will

the detailed design phase," the plan states.

The upgrade will depend on securing funding, planning and necessary approvals, and further consultation with stakeholders.

Consultation

A jetty was constructed at the site in 1877 and has been replaced several times, with the current structure built in the 1980s.

Parks Victoria said the heritage character would be maintained, with construction materials decided through detailed design.

"As a jetty within a small fishing village founded in the 19th century, the preferred design solution will reflect this existing character," the authority said.

Community consultation on the draft plan ran in July and August on Engage Victoria, which was viewed 650 times, with 29 submissions received.

Results showed 64 per cent of participants supported the design, with the most important feature nominated as "maintaining the character of the jetty".

The second highestranked response was pro-viding a "safe and wellmaintained facility", and the third highest-ranked

"access for all tide berthing".

The most common activity nominated was boating followed by exercising or sightseeing.

More than half of participants (64 per cent) were male, the majority (96 per cent) were aged 35 years, and most participants (68

per cent) were residents of Phillip Island, with 25 per cent visitors.

The jetty plan follows the \$4.5 million upgrade of the Rhyll ramp for boaties in 2022 by the shire, which manages the foreshore, ramp and parking.

Earlier this year the final Phillip Island and San Remo Destination Management Plan Towards 2033 was released, flagging the Cowes jetty for a priority upgrade, especially for cruise ship tenders; in addition to an upgrade for the Rhyll port infrastructure as an "economically viable cruise shipping destination plan".

Toilets to reopen for Christmas

INFRASTRUCTURE

Bass Coast Shire Council has confirmed the public toilets on the Cowes foreshore will be reopened to the public by December 20. In October, council stated it expected the work on the toilet block to be completed by the first week of December.

The toilets have been closed since late September, with contractors undertaking waterproofing and repairs.

The project included grinding and filling the slab, installing a waterproof membrane and paving tiles, internal painting and reinstating handrails.

Council was harshly criticised by local businesses and community members for the timing of the closure, which included the busy MotoGP weekend, and the original timeline which stated the toilets would be closed until January.

That was then amended to late December, with council saying it would reopen before Christmas, and defending the timing of the project.

"The scheduling of this project was deliberate to both allow the works to be completed during the best weather while balancing community need for the toilet to be open during the peak summer season (late December 2024 to January 2025)," a council spokesperson said in October.

'The slab needs to be as dry as possible to perform these works. Temperature and predicted rainfall had to be taken into account and therefore this work could not be completed during winter months due to frequent rainfall and the resulting damp conditions.

"These works are to prevent the unplanned closure of the toilets after rain that has occurred frequently over recent years."

This week, a council spokesperson said the toilets will be open by December 20.

"Ideally the top section will be finished as well; there is a small chance there might still be some items that will require the temporary fencing to stay up," they said.

"We are really hopeful this won't be the case but for public safety, we will need to be conservative.

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Ninety-six per cent chance of drowning: report

LIFESAVING

The 2023/24 annual drowning report released by Life Saving Victoria (LSV) last Wednesday said there is a 96 per cent likelihood of one or more drowning fatalities in Bass Coast Shire this summer.

The fatal drowning summary, which ranks Bass Coast second highest, is based on incidents since 2014/15 within Victorian LGAs where more than five incidents have occurred.

Last summer, six people drowned across Bass Coast – which is designated as a "local government area blackspot". The Mornington Peninsula, which saw eight drownings over the 2023/24 season, was the only LGA in Victoria with more drownings than Bass Coast.

Of the six drownings across Bass Coast last summer, five were on Phillip Island, including four people who died at Forrest Caves in what was the worst incidence of mass drowning in the state in nearly two decades.

Speaking at a media conference at the LSV headquarters in Port Melbourne last Wednesday, Dr Hannah Calverley said 54 people had lost their lives in Victorian waterways last year.

"These are real tragic reminders that water safety should be at the forefront of everybody's minds, particularly as we head into the warmer weather," said the LSV Manager of Research and Evaluation.

"Each of these numbers represents a real issue. Real people, real communities, and real families that are affected by drowning. And first and fore-

most, we need to express our sincere condolences to those affected."

Multicultural drowning record

The report reveals a substantial increase in both the number of young and multicultural Victorians drowning in the state.

Fatal drownings among culturally and linguistically diverse (CALD) people was the highest on record in the last year ending July 1, with 21 people losing their lives. Jagjeet Singh Anaand, Suhani Anaand, Kirti Bedi and Reema Sondi, the four people who died at Forrest Caves in January, were among the tragic losses behind that statistic.

Dr Calverley said last year was the "worst summer on record" for drowning in Victoria with many lives lost in coastal settings.

"Tragically, many were swimming outside of the patrolled areas or outside of patrol times." There were also ten fatal drownings of people aged 15-24 last year, which is double the ten-year average.

"Many of these incidents involved these young people simply going and trying to have fun with their friends in coastal settings during the summertime, and perhaps unintentionally taking risks," Dr Calverley said.

The CEO of LSV said "our community collectively shudders at this sharp increase in drowning deaths, particularly among teenagers and young adults. We need a communitywide effort to reach out to our young people and halt this disturbing trend.

"We must support our multicultural communities by breaking down language and cultural barriers, building water safety abilities and fostering role models so all Victorians can enjoy the water safely."

Local action

The drownings at Forrest Caves last year saw renewed calls from the local community for improved signage at local beaches, with new, upgraded signs installed at beaches controlled by Phillip Island Nature Parks in the lead up to summer.

According to a spokesperson from the Nature Parks, the new beach entry signs incorporate "all the changes recommended" in the 2019 Blackspot Coastal Risk Assessment Report.

In the lead up to summer, the Nature Parks and Bass Coast Shire Council began a public awareness campaign for beach safety.

Every booked visitor with Nature Parks through to April 2025 will receive a reminder to download the Surf Life Saving Beachsafe app – which provides tailored information on both patrolled and unpatrolled beaches.

Nature Parks have also launched a new safety website page. Under the "beach safety" tab on the webpage, Nature Parks direct visitors to download the Beachsafe app and provide several generic safety messages. A list of beaches where "swimming is not advised" is also provided.

Latrobe Valley or Melbourne for medical services?

HEALTH

Phillip Island residents have been urged to lobby the Victorian Health Minister to fight an imminent health services merger that could see locals sent east to the Latrobe Valley for medical visits, rather than to Melbourne.

The Phillip Island Medical and Health Action Group (PIM-HAG) last week made the "call to action", after concerns Minister Mary-Anne Thomas was set to decide on the merger before Christmas.

Under a review of health services in Victoria conducted this year, Bass Coast Health (BCH) is recommended to join the Gippsland local health network, headd out of the Latroba Valley



based out of the Latrobe Valley.

PIMHAG spokesperson Linda Marston said former BCH CEO Jan Child had strongly advocated to instead be part of Bayside, which includes Alfred Health, Kooweerup Regional Health Service, and Peninsula Health.

Linda said with Ms Child departing the role in October, "we have lost a very strong advocate", adding BCH board and management supported Ms Child's position.

She said 99 per cent of locals needing health services currently travelled north along the Bass Highway, and not east across Gippsland.

"The vast majority of resi-

dents from the island and San Remo have relatives and friends in the Melbourne suburbs and on the Peninsula, so they have family support and accommodation if needed. They do not have them in Traralgon," Linda said in a letter to Minister Thomas last week.

"Phillip Island has three million visitors a year, the majority from Melbourne, who may receive treatment from BCH but then head home for further care if required.

"There is also no public transport that people can take from the island to attend appointments without an overnight stay."

The letter stated if health services moved to Traralgon, it would "not result in the community using them" and would "not result in efficiencies". Linda told the Advertiser residents should consider whether they wanted specialists from the Latrobe Valley or The Alfred visiting the new community hospital, to be opened in 2025.

Linda said State MP for Bass Jordan Crugnale supported PIMHAG's position and the Victorian Government "should remember this is a marginal seat".

"If the Minister's decision upsets enough people there will be political ramifications.

"We want the government to support us and do the right thing by us."

Most dangerous island beaches: Colonnades

Last summer, six people tragically lost their lives at beaches across the Bass Coast, as drowning figures across the country continue to rise.

This summer, the Advertiser's summer safety series highlights some of the island's most dangerous beaches for visitors and anyone not familiar with local conditions.

This week, we speak to locals and emergency services about the Colonnades at Cape Woolamai.

On Christmas Eve 2018, a mother watched on from the shore as her husband and 20-year-old son were swept away by a rip at the Colonnades. Tragically, after being retrieved from the water, both father and son were declared dead at the scene.

The Colonnades is an unpatrolled stretch of beach, to the west of the Woolamai surf beach. The area is renowned for its dangerous rips. It is rated as "highly hazardous" by the BeachSafe app, which describes it as "an exposed high energy beach used by surfers and fishers, but unsuitable for safe bathing".

One senior lifesaver who responded to the 2018 rescue, who requested not to be named, was cooking a Christmas Eve dinner for their family when the call came through about an incident at the Colonnades.

The senior lifesaver, who retrieved one of the bodies from the water, said around 10 volunteer members, some under the age of eighteen, arrived to respond to the emergency. By the time the senior lifesaver arrived on the scene, one body had been retrieved from the water while a co-ordination of rescue services searched for the second.

"I can't remember who spotted him, but someone saw his body in the rip. So in the end I went in on the board, and there were some members of the public on the rocks because it was just mega low-tide by then," the senior lifesaver said.

"And we grabbed him and got him out, but he was dead by the time we got him."

Response capabilities

As Woolamai Beach Surf Life Saving Club (WBSLSC) President Jason Close explained, if a member of the public needs to call for help from lifesavers, they must dial 000. It is then a case of saying where the incident is taking place and describing the emergency, the Club President said. If lifesaving assistance is required, Life Saving Victoria (LSV) communications will then contact the club's emergency response contacts, and those in the area will respond. The Club President said whilst emergency procedures exist for volunteers to respond to incidents which are after hours or at unpatrolled beaches, there are a number of reasons why these emergencies

are much more difficult to respond to. The time it takes to call for help, the time for the volunteer lifesavers to retrieve and set up rescue equipment, and then the time to travel to the rescue location are all factors which mean when help arrives, it may already be too late.

"For these reasons, the safest option is only to swim at a patrolled beach, between the flags, between patrol hours," Jason said.

"This way lifesavers are there on the beach with their rescue equipment, can see you and can respond immediately if you get into trouble."

The senior lifesaver who retrieved one body during the 2018 Christmas Eve Colonnades rescue, said that particular incident "did get under my skin a bit".

"I think the Christmas Eve (incident), it's a time when you're reflecting on family and that other families don't get to go home," the senior lifesaver said.

"I remember feeling afterwards – whenever I've been to a drowning – I then get pretty protective the next day and week.

"When you see people swimming outside the flags you get quite an emotional response, wishing that they had better instructions or were making better decisions for themselves."

Lingering community impact

Local surfing legend Glyndyn Ringrose lives on the doorstep of the Colonnades, and said the Christmas Eve rescue and other very close calls at the beach still weigh heavily on the minds of the community.

"Yeah, I'm always looking, always watching people, and I think that goes for most people who are surfers, and a lot of surfers go down here," Glyndyn said. "There's a lot of guys who would run out and save someone at the drop of a hat if they had to – if they saw them in trouble."

Of the Christmas Eve rescue, Glyndyn said "I wish I was there. If only there was somebody, a local who knew what was going on around, (the victims) probably wouldn't have been in the water. They would have been fine."

Recently in an interview with the Advertiser, the CEO of Life Saving Victoria lauded the efforts of local surfers and community members who perform unsung rescues and take proactive preventative measures such as advising people not to swim or surf at a particular beach. Glyndyn said he has performed several rescues where the victims didn't even realise how much trouble they were in.

"As soon as your feet leave the ground, you've got no real reference point of where you are except if you're using visual reference points.

"When you're looking at a mass of water, it feels like you're not really moving. But when you look visually back at the land, you can see how fast you're being swept out."

Woolamai Beach Club President Jason Close said Phillip Island has so many beautiful surf beaches, but unfortunately the conditions and the remoteness of many of them makes swimming dangerous.

"It makes so much sense to swim at a patrolled beach, and no sense not to."

Gambling – is there a local benefit?

GAMBLING

As gambling losses in Bass Coast Shire continues to rise, figures from the last financial year show the poker machines at Phillip Island RSL generated the highest revenue in the shire.

The venue not only reported the highest player losses – \$7.5 million – but also had the highest revenue per machine of any of the five gaming venues in Bass Coast.

However the President of the Phillip Island RSL (PIRSL), Peter Paul, cited ways in which the not-for-profit organisation gives back to the community.

Mr Paul said overall the pokies were "absolutely" a net-benefit to the community.

"The revenue generated through our gaming machines plays a crucial role in enabling us to support both our veterans and the wider community," the Phillip Island RSL President said, adding the venue complied with all legislation.

Of the \$7.5 million lost by players at the RSL gaming machines, Mr Paul said after government taxation the annual income generated by the venue from pokies was just over \$4 million (\$4,030,687).

Of this amount, Mr Paul said 71.5 per cent was returned to the community.

"These funds enable us to provide significant welfare support, particularly through our veteran assistance programs, which lie at the heart of our mission."

By law, each year all venues with poker machines must lodge an audited "community benefit statement" with the Victorian Gambling and Casino Control Commission (see separate story).

A community benefit statement allows clubs to claim benefits under several differ-

ent categories (Class A, B and C), and verifies whether the community benefit provided by the club is equal to at least 8.33 per cent of its net gaming machine revenue.

Mr Paul confirmed that the RSL's latest community benefit statement included charitable donations and assistance to well over twenty local groups, clubs, schools and societies ranging from \$500 to over \$20,000.

"We are proud to have sponsored local community groups with over \$80,000 in 2023/24 and contributed three dialysis chairs to the new Community Hospital to enhance local healthcare infrastructure," Mr Paul said.

"Our welfare initiatives also include maintaining a fleet of vehicles, costing over \$120,000 annually, to transport veterans to essential medical appointments both locally and in Melbourne."

Other community benefit claims by the RSL include over \$130,000 in meal subsidies and complimentary memberships for Veterans over 80 years of age.

In total, just under \$500,000 (\$494,498)

was claimed by the RSL in the Class A "direct community benefits" category in the last financial year.

In the Class B category ("indirect community benefits") the RSL claimed over \$1.3 million in staff wages, nearly \$70,000 in advertising costs, over \$35,000 in cleaning expenses, and \$8000 on an ice-cream machine. A number of other operational costs were also claimed such as gas, electricity and superannuation.

All the items claimed are legal under the current Community Benefit Scheme.



What is the Community Benefit Scheme?

GAMBLING

By law, each year all venues with poker machines must lodge an audited "community benefit statement" with the Victorian Gambling and Casino Control Commission.

The Community Benefit Scheme, provides significant tax cuts to clubs with gaming machines, providing they reinvest 8.33 per cent of gaming revenue back into the community.

The scheme is split into two main class

A gambling expert at Monash University, Charles Livingstone, recently assessed statements from 35 Victorian clubs and found only 1.2 per cent – or \$2.5 million – of all expenditure claimed "was actually attributable to genuine charitable and philanthropic purposes".

"A somewhat more substantial sum of \$39 million – or 74.6 per cent of claimed benefits – went to the running costs of the clubs and their facilities," Livingstone said.

clubs and their facilities," Livingstone said. He said clubs "ramped up their claims in order to demonstrate how much they contribute to good works".

Gambling under review

GAMBLING

Local Member for Bass, Jordan Crugnale has responded to concerns about the increasing losses from poker machines across the shire.

Data released recently by the Victorian Gambling and Casino Control Commission (VGCCC) reveal gambling losses across the shire's five gaming venues rose to over \$20 million in the last financial year.

Ms Crugnale said the amount of money lost in the shire was "beyond staggering".

"Whilst it is a legitimate form of gambling, there is so much harm and this has consequences not just for the person gambling but everyone around them.

"People become more socially isolated, their mental health and wellbeing slides, they might be going without meals, not able to provide for their kids, pay bills and so forth."

Ms Crugnale said the State Government had introduced new gambling reforms this year.

In September it mandated closure of gaming areas in pubs and clubs between the hours of 4am and 10am

Member for Bass Jordan Crugnale said the government would be reviewing the Community Benefit Scheme for venues with poker machines, saying some of the community benefit claims were questionable.

chines and for their loved ones but we always need to do more," she said.

The scheme is split into two main classes: A and B. Class A refers to "direct community benefits", and venue operators are able to claim 100 per cent of these items.

Class B claims are categorised as "indirect community benefits' and can include staff wages and venue operational expenses.

The scheme has come under increased scrutiny across the state in recent weeks, particularly for claims made in the Class B category.

Gambling opponents say the scheme can't repair the "social and economic harm" of gambling, describing it as "simply a public relations opportunity for venues" and a way to buy "social licence".

The state's gaming minister Melissa Horne has acknowledged concerns about "misuse" of the scheme and triggered a review into the process. As the club with the highest gambling income in the shire, Phillip Island RSL claimed over \$1.4 million in the contentious Class B category last financial year. A prominent San Remo small business

owner said this week he strongly supported the review.

He said it was unfair poker machine venues could access tax benefits on restaurant business expenses such as staff wages; to the disadvantage of competitors in the hospitality industry who could not. "We're sweating it out, while they're

raking it in."

He said other restaurants, concerned about the rising cost of food and ingredients, and staff wages, were not bolstered by gambling revenue. In November a new bill was passed which the government said was designed to "reduce gambling harm".

Measures include reducing the spin rate of poker machines, reducing the amount of money that can be loaded into a machine at one time from \$1000 to \$100, and mandatory pre-commitment limits.

She said the introduction of carded play will allow patrons to set limits on the amount they are willing to lose, and ensure money being put through the machines is tracked, to stop money laundering through gaming venues.

Community benefit?

Ms Crugnale addressed concerns about the claims made by venues through the Community Benefit Scheme.

"Our reforms provide important protections for people using gaming ma"The Community Benefits Statement is an important mechanism to guarantee clubs are actually investing back into the communities they're hosted by, to ensure more people can benefit from the revenue they bring in.

"Following concerns raised around the misuse of Community Benefits Statements, we are undertaking a review and will publicly consult on how to improve the system.

"It needs improving, it needs an overhaul," Ms Crugnale continued.

"Pokie venues and their operators need to do better, and personally I would love to see them gone altogether.

"I commend clubs and establishments that phase them out and turn towards a family friendly enterprise – we have seen this with pubs, even footy clubs too."

Nature Parks unofficially celebrates full recovery

TOURISM

Visitors to Phillip Island Nature Parks have returned to pre-Covid levels, with more than a million tourists in the past year, while a profit was recorded for the first time in recent years.

PINP's 2023-24 annual report unofficially marks the end of a long post-pandemic recovery, with an 18 per cent increase on visitors compared to 2022-23, international visitors "far exceeding expectations" and visitation returning to levels consistent with 2018-19.

And for the first year since 2020, Nature Parks didn't receive any operational funding from the State Government, which was required in the wake of Covid.

The Penguin Parade consistently sold out over summer and Easter, setting a record with nearly three weeks of sell-out nights between December and January, and 20 nights in February.

Nature Parks achieved a net profit of \$2.3 million, up from the \$1.9 million loss of the previous year, with a 35 per cent increase in total commercial revenue.

The closure of the Antarctic Journey in January at the Nobbies Centre had an estimated financial impact of \$300,000, however the launch of Ben & Jerry's ice creamery in November contributed to revenue growth.

Following several years of redundancies during the pandemic, Nature Parks in the past year had 210 employees, compared to 260 in 2017 and 170 in 2021-22.

The top five markets for the year were China, Singapore, United States, Hong Kong and United Kingdom, with arrivals from New Zealand, South Korea and India exceeding January 2019 levels.

Holiday travel surpassed "visiting friends and relatives" as

the primary purpose for short-term arrivals.

The annual report shows travel and entertainment costs rose to \$168,000 from \$116,000 the year before, which follows the re-emergence of the international tourism market, and "valuable sources of revenue" from key events.

Penguins

The world's largest colony of little penguins is now estimated at 37,000 at Summerland, despite facing setbacks in the breeding season that saw an "unprecedented surge" in ocean temperature and a strong El Niño event, causing food shortages and elevated chick mortality.

A nightly average of 1379 little penguins crossed the beach at the Penguin Parade in 2023-24, which was about six per cent lower than the previous year. Penguins travelled further than in previous years, with one recorded passing by Wilsons Promontory, "the longest trip we've recorded to date during a breeding season".

PINP researchers analysed 11 breeding seasons of little penguins, with results showing reduced human activity during COVID-19 restrictions had minimal impact on the population, but increased marine traffic negatively impacted foraging efficiency.

The report also highlights new research that shows the little penguin population faces the threat of 80 potential hazards (see separate story).

Wildlife

According to the annual report, the wildlife rehabilitation

team responded to 1196 calls for wildlife rescues and advice, cared for 70 little penguins and rescued and cared for 547 other native wildlife from 82 species.

There were nine trips to Seal Rocks resulting in 37 entangled seals spotted, with 13 captured and released from the entangling material.

The top three entanglement materials were recreational fishing line, line and hook and white garden mesh around their necks.

Since the "bins on boats" project, the annual average number of trawl net entanglements at Seal Rocks has reduced from 7.3 (1997-2018) to 2.2 (2019-2024). There were 42 drone surveys over Seal Rocks using thermal sensors to track entangled seals, and currently a PhD study is examining the

long-term effects of entanglement in marine debris on seals.

The report shows there are 16 koalas at the Koala Conservation Reserve, including three joeys, with critical care for two koalas from Healesville Sanctuary.

PINP's endangered species work has seen the numbers of Eastern barred bandicoots spread across the island, with the population now in the thousands.

In 2023-24, two feral cats were removed during nighttime surveys on Summerland Peninsula, 30 cameras were installed with AI technology to send live alerts when feral cats were at Observation Point, while feral cat detection dogs helped remove 10 feral cats from around Phillip Island.

PINP's sailing drone completed its first season, clocking up 3000km in 35 trips, collecting 1.5 TB of data on the food supply of little penguins, which will now be analysed by experts from France, Sweden and Monaco.

Nature Parks received \$8 million from the State Government to repair assets at the Penguin Parade, and the Nobbies and PINP invested \$4.6 million into conservation and research.

There were 255 volunteers who contributed 10,700 hours of volunteer work, and a further 14 local businesses joined the 'Dark Sky so Shearwaters Fly' campaign to help ensure a safe start to the migration of the short-tailed shearwaters.

Nature Parks has a fleet of 36 cars, with fuel use increasing by about five per cent in the past year, with greenhouse gas emissions from transport increasing by more than five per cent, with the organisation planning to move to electric vehicles.

Little penguins face big risks

Phillip Island's little penguin population faces the threat of 80 potential hazards, according to a Melbourne University study.

The Disease Risk Assessment for Little Penguins study, highlighted in the 2023-24 Phillip Island Nature Parks annual report (see separate story), identified 80 hazards of concern, both infectious and non-infectious.

The study ranked each hazard in importance, with five high risk hazards, including avian influenza, oiling, predation from marine and terrestrial predators and bushfire.

There were 21 medium risk

Phillip Island Nature Parks has been flagged to extend its penguin expertise to Melbourne's penguin colony.

In an interview on ABC radio last week, a spokesperson for Earthcare St Kilda - the not-for-profit group which has managed the St Kilda colony - told listeners the State Government was endorsing PINP to take over management. The Earthcare spokesperson said they were in negotiations with PINP "when they were putting together their proposal" and PINP were "very non-committal" about Earthcare volunteers' role in the future management of the St Kilda colony. A colony of about 1400 little penguins live at the breakwater at St Kilda Pier, which has been undergoing a \$53 million renovation, including tiered seating, timber decking, and a penguin viewing area.

PINP CEO Catherine Basterfield last week said they were working with Parks Victoria "to establish a vision for the new penguin viewing area".


"As a world-leading penguin ecotourism and conservation provider, Phillip Island Nature Parks worked closely with Parks Victoria to provide expert advice on penguin welfare and improved viewing experiences throughout the construction of St Kilda Pier," Ms Basterfield said. "Should the Victorian Government formally appoint Nature Parks, we would welcome the opportunity to manage the penguin viewing experience and will continue to support the invaluable efforts of volunteers in protection of the pier's precious little penguin colony. The Victorian Government last week confirmed there will be no fee to see the penguins.

hazards including pollutants and contaminants, such as "forever chemicals" PFAS, as well as environmental stressors such as climate change and habitat loss, heat stress, and tourism.

Oil, wildfire, and predation were the most significant noninfectious hazards identified, for which PINP already has contingency plans.

There were six moderatehigh risk human health hazards, including Ross River virus, and avian chlamydia.

The report was written by vet scientists and recommends disease risk management such as biosecurity practices, veterinary examination, and "active man-

agement for identified hazards with a focus on HPAI (avian influenza) as the most time sensitive hazard".

The report stated penguin numbers at Phillip Island had varied substantially in the past century, from about 200,000 adults in 1917, to 12,000 in the 1970s when the annual mortality rate was 14 per cent, with an average life expectancy of 6.5

azards years.

Since then, little penguin numbers have recovered significantly (population is currently estimated at 37,000), and wild little penguins as old as 25 have been observed at Summerland.

While several Victorian populations are currently thriving, other populations are decreasing including Gabo and Middle Islands.

Neighbourhood Battery locations announced

ENERGY

Renewable energy specialist Mondo has confirmed seven locations to install neighbourhood batteries on Phillip Island.

It said the neighbourhoodscale batteries' locations were chosen in consultation with the community and will provide additional energy storage capacity for locally generated solar power.

The batteries will be installed at:

- Battery 1: Berninneit, 91-97 Thompson Ave, Cowes
- Battery 2: Kembla Pasadena, 1 Kembla Rd, Cowes
- Battery 3: Seagrass Everton, Opposite 11 Seagrass Ave, Cowes
- Battery 4: Goodwood Elvington, Opposite 75 Goodwood Drive, Cowes
- Battery 5: Recreation Reserve, Cnr Hallway Dr and Hoad St, Wimbledon Heights
- Battery 6: Bass Čoast Shire Council Depot, 105 Settlement Rd, Cowes
- Battery 7: Katherine Circuit, 50 Katherine Circuit

Mondo said the sites were predominantly selected based on areas of the island that have an existing high uptake of rooftop solar, "or where there was a possibility of increased energy network activity because of electrification".

As part of the community consultation, Mondo spokesperson said the company door knocked all surrounding neighbours twice and left letters if they weren't in attendance.

"We also held two public meet-

ings with another next public meeting to take place in the next six weeks," they said.

The spokesperson said a number of criteria were used to select the locations for the batteries, including siting them in areas where space wasn't a concern – for example in reserves and public spaces – and maintaining a good distance from homes.

Areas with a strong uptake of rooftop solar are ideal for batteries, Mondo stated, and based on these two factors, most of the batteries are located in housing estates "where population density is a little higher than the rest of the island".

Important role

Victorian Energy Minister Lily D'Ambrosio visited Phillip Island in March 2024 to announce \$2.1 million in State Government funding to install these batteries through the 100 Neighbourhood Batteries Program.

Five of the seven batteries will each store 205 kWh of electricity, which is the amount of energy used by 11 houses for 24 hours. Two of these batteries will each have a storage capacity of 410 kWh to accommodate larger transformers and a high density of solar installations.

Mondo General Manager, Dhammika Adihetty said neighbourhood-scale batteries will play an important role as we shift more renewable energy into the electricity grid.

"Typically, these batteries will charge during the day when the renewable energy from solar

panels is plentiful, and often the market price for electricity is low. This stored power is then released back to the grid when demand for power is at its highest, often in the early evening," said Mr Adihetty.

The project has been a collaboration between Mondo, Bass Coast Shire Council, Totally Renewable Phillip Island and the Victorian State Government.

Mondo said Phillip Island had been an integral part of its community energy focus over the past six years, stating that since 2021 it has invested more than \$10 million to install and energise a 5MW/10MWh distribution battery on Phillip Island.

"Mondo is looking forward to continuing to support the Phillip Island community achieve their renewable energy goals," said Mr Adihetty.

When the funding was announced, then Mayor Clare Le Serve alluding to "islanding" the battery at Berninneit, to provide an alternative power source during outages.

In April, Bass Coast Shire Council confirmed it was looking at options for providing a continuous electricity supply to Berninneit during power outages.

This would involve additional

costs, not covered by the original funding.

Mondo said it was currently working with the council to determine if batteries installed at significant Council buildings could provide back-up power during an outage.

There was \$600,000 included in the current budget for climate change action plan projects, including for standalone solar and battery systems at community facilities.

The neighbourhood batteries will be installed from February and fully operational by August 2025.

Western Port claims another billion-dollar scalp?

Plans to build the world's largest hydrogen demonstration project, in Western Port, look set for collapse.

Starting in March 2021, the Hydrogen Energy Supply Chain Pilot Project (HESC) was to turn Latrobe Valley brown coal into hydrogen, with the cooled volatile gas piped more than 150km to the Port of Hastings and shipped on the specially-built Suiso Frontier to Japan by Kawasaki Heavy Industries.

HESC was supported by a \$2.35 billion investment from the Japanese government and \$50 million in start-up investment from the Victorian government in 2018.

However last week Japanese news outlet Nikkei reported Kawasaki Heavy Industries had withdrawn from the trial, because it had become "difficult to

procure hydrogen in Australia within the deadline".

"With the completion of the demonstration test by fiscal year 2030, as originally scheduled, be-

ing an absolute requirement for ensuring competitiveness, the company has changed hydrogen procurement to domestic," Nikkei reported.

The Phillip Island Conservation Society (PICS) said the hydrogen project was "greenwashing": a "climate destructive carbon intensive industry" that would use "unproven and highrisk carbon capture and storage under Bass Strait".

Victorian Greens leader Ellen Sandell said it was time for the project to be scrapped, saying the "disastrous coal project has never stacked up environmentally or economically".

In 2021 the State Government rejected a planned AGL gas plant, and in 2017 successive State Gov-

ernment plans to expand the Port of Hastings were refused.

The Federal Government in January refused a State Government plan to build a wind turbine hub in the bay, as it would pose an "unacceptable" and "irreversible" risk to the bay, a plan which the State Government is now reviving.

PICAL fundraising "urgent"

PICAL faces an "urgent" need for support, with the committee of management releasing a statement last week calling for funding to keep "doors open and services running".

Following the recent funding crises, the Phillip Island Community and Learning Centre has a target to raise \$80,000 in the next eight months.

To kick off the campaign, Phillip Island Rotary Club's Cowes op shop gave all sales made on Saturday to PICAL, in addition to a sausage sizzle, music and a collection box for any donations, raising \$3476.

The committee of management - in a statement released on the weekend - said without external support, there was "a real risk of not being able to meet the community's needs".

"As demand rises, the organisation is struggling to keep up and urgently requires additional resources to continue its vital work," the statement reads.

'The need for action is urgent. "Social media has been buzzing with people expressing their determination to "save PICAL".

"While this support is encouraging, it is now time for those words to be turned into action. If people are truly committed to helping, we are calling on businesses, affluent individuals, and community leaders to dig deep and contribute financially to ensure PICAL can continue its services this holiday season."

In the last two years the neighbourhood house has: distributed 9000 food hampers, cooked 11,000 meals, and helped 7000 food pantry users "who

aren't certain where their next meal will come from, sadly half of these people are children".

PICAL has also helped 350 people in dire situations experiencing homelessness, fleeing family violence or other personal trauma and helped more than 120 people to find employment.

Crisis

As reported, the crisis began a month ago when PICAL declared impending insolvency, unable to meet debts incurred from an "administrative inaccuracy", underpaying wages to employees for more than a decade, "based on information at the time".

After initially being thrown a lifeline by Neighbourhood Houses Gippsland and Bass Coast Shire, to continue services if PICAL was forced to wind up. the crisis then concluded when PICAL announced they were

able to meet their debts.

Now, following a "revised understanding" from legal and financial advice, PICAL has reassured staff wage payments are now fully compliant, while all past staff impacted from the previous liability will be paid by July 2025.

Committee of management president Graeme Turner said more fundraisers would be held in 2025, while donations can also be made at any time through the PICAL website.

The website donation page details how the organisation is "under significant strain".

"We are asking for your support, this will enable us to continue helping more than 60 people that visit PICAL every weekday and to keep delivering our support services.'





NAPLAN results released nationwide

EDUCATION

NAPLAN (National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy) results have been released across Australia, with local schools pleased with their results.

The results saw district schools fare generally well against nationwide averages, with a number of improvements seen across several different areas.

This year NAPLAN moved online for the first time and was modified to an 'adaptive test' model. The adaptive test means if a student continues to get questions right, the questions become harder, or if the student gets questions wrong, the test becomes easier.

Emma Harris, assistant college principal at Bass Coast College (BCC), said adaptive testing allowed students more opportunity to demonstrate what they know

"The data gained is far more accurate than in previous NAPLAN assessments and gives teachers a clearer understanding of specific areas of strength and areas for students to develop.³

Ms Harris said BCC performed well in Year 9 reading, spelling and numeracy subjects. The Year 7 cohort also made improvements on last year in writing, spelling, grammar and numeracy.

Over the last two years BCC has designed and implemented a new learning model and strengthened teacher capacity in high impact teaching strategies and data literacy," the BCC assistant principal said. Year 7 students at Newhaven College were 'above' or 'well above' the national average in reading, writing, grammar and numeracy.

Newhaven College Director of Learning Karen Milkins-Hendry said 21 Newhaven College Year 9 students received NAPLAN certificates of achievement in reading and/or numeracy.

She said a new model of learning based on the science of reading had been integrated into the junior school.

"The adaptive nature of NAPLAN testing supports our move to adaptive-PAT testing as well, which targets where a student's next learning step is with greater accuracy," Mrs Milkins-Hendry said.

One of many measures

Rod McKenzie, principal of Cowes Primary School, said his school uses "a range of data to understand how students are achieving against the curriculum, and then teach to their point of need."

Mr McKenzie said in writing results at Cowes Primary, 85 per cent of students placed in either the exceeding or strong level between 2023 and 2024. The CPS Year 5 cohort were also above or well above the national average for reading and grammar. Mr McKenzie cited new initiatives in literacy as having a positive influence on the school's data.

Catherine Blackford, principal of Our Lady Star of the Sea, said writing had been a priority for the school this year. "However, we have a variety of assessments that we use to measure the development of each student," Ms Blackford said.

Year 3 San Remo Primary students performed above or well above the national average in writing, grammar and numeracy. Improvements were also made in Year 5 in writing and spelling.

"We continue to provide a strong phonic approach to reading and continue to provide a strong mathematics curriculum," San Remo Primary School Principal Karen Bowmaker said.

Year 3 students at Newhaven Primary School were above or well above the national average in reading, writing, spelling, and numeracy.

Federal election: what matters to you?

Phillip Island lawyer and Monash federal election candidate Deb Leonard held a meet-and-greet in Cowes on Monday.

Deb, who is running her second campaign for Monash, met local residents at Island Wholefoods to discuss key issues in the election. She said from door knocks and meet-and-greets hot topics were a community pool, cost-of-living and climate change.

"Instead of subsidising fossil fuels, we should instead support solar power and batteries on houses, rentals, business and school, which would bring down power prices across the board, as well as emissions," Deb said.

"There are a range of solutions to cost of living, such as cracking down on the supermarket duopoly, stemming their anticompetitive practices."

In August, Voices for Monash (V4M) announced Deb as their candidate after she picked up 10.98 per cent of the vote at the last federal election.

Deb said independent candidates were able to attract "far more government funding", citing the success of independent Helen Haines securing "tens of millions of dollars in federal funding for roads and pothole fixes in her electorate".

Deb said top of her priority list would be a Phillip Island pool, better roads and improved mental health services.

'I know how important an aquatic cen-

tre is to our community and will advocate for funding to get it built.

"Resident feedback will directly influence my policies," she added, encouraging locals to fill out a survey on her website to highlight key issues. With a date yet to be confirmed for the upcoming election, Deb said it could be as early as March 2025, or be held in May.

Bass Coast Health (BCH) has established an outstanding, inclusive environment for community input and culture, an achievement many other health services would envy. Over the past eight years, a strong foundation of mutual respect and trust has been carefully built through open and honest communication.

Is the BCH Board fully aware of the significant impact of the departure of Jan Child as CEO?

One wonders why two Board members have resigned in recent times.

While the appointment of Simonne Alexander as interim CEO is welcomed given her experience at the Alfred Hospital and the partnership developed with this metropolitan facility in recent years, the community must be reassured that her focus will remain firmly on local service delivery.

It is crucial that she remains accessible to address local needs, to engage with the community, and to provide unwavering support to the dedicated staff managing the daily operations of Bass Coast Health.

Our previous CEO set a remarkably high standard of availability, transparency and commitment, often exceeding the demands of a full-time position. Her departure has left many community members concerned about the continuity of leadership and the potential loss of momentum in service delivery and community engagement.

You could drive across Melbourne without paying a toll. Rail travel was cheap in government owned and operated the trains. My grandparents and parents lived in Housing Commission houses.

There was no cost-of-living crisis, no housing crisis because both state and Commonwealth governments kept prices down simply by being part of the market and ensured supply of housing by building and managing what was required.

I attended University at no cost and had no student debt. Unlike today.

Then privatisation and user pays were introduced by state and Commonwealth governments. Government owned banks were sold. Medibank Private was sold. GIO was sold. Commonwealth Employment Service was replaced with a privatised Job Network which was more expensive and less successful.

The corporations celebrated and their prices rose. This of course also fuelled the exorbitant CEO and executive renumeration packages, a reduction in service and closure of branches as businesses embarked on a culture of profit maximisation

Power stations were sold. Even the power transmission lines were sold. Leading to power prices rising every year. Under the Liberal Government major ports were either sold or leased out, raising the cost of both imports and exports.

It is no wonder that there is a cost-ofliving crisis. Both Labor and Liberal/Na-



Club gets ready for a big season

At the recent AGM, Chris Ross returned as President of the Phillip Island Football Netball Club (PIFNC) in what is shaping up to be a big year.

Last year, the club brought home the flag for the U18s, with both the U16s and Seniors making it through to the Grand Final.

The Seniors have made five Grand Final appearance between 2017 and 2024, including premiership wins in 2017 and 2018, and are hoping to consolidate their position as league leaders in the 2025 season.

Head coach Cam Pedersen has returned, with the club announcing the senior coaching team, as well as Reserves, Under 18s and Under 16s last month.

Once again, the club faces a disrupted pre-season, unable to train on the Cowes oval, as the turf is currently being replaced.

However the club says immediate action is needed because of the island's population explosion, especially given they are once again unable to access the one only oval at the Cowes Rec Reserve this summer.

With well over 1000 PIFNC members and around 700 players across football and netball, the club is bursting at the seams, and cannot all be accommodated at the current ground.

Being unable to access the oval for pre-season training for another year, means once again pre-season football training will be held at Newhaven College.

had asked the club to hold all junior games and training at the Newhaven College grounds during the 2025 season.

To do that would require "a huge effort" by club volunteers said Chris, and would also have a detrimental impact on the club's ability to raise vital funds through its canteen, as well on the social cohesion which is created through access post matches to social room facilities.

"Even if we can get access to the school canteen space, our already hard working volunteers would have to bring stuff over from the footy club every Sunday morning, then pack it all up and take it back that night."

"The canteen brings in a massive amount of revenue, so it would be a really significant hit to the club's budget if we lose one day of canteen revenue," Chris said.

"We have a big range of sponsorship opportunities and various packages and are keen to talk to anyone who is interested," Chris said.

He also urged people to support the 2025 Cowes Classic on February 8.

"This is a great fundraiser for the club. And if there's anyone out there who would like to vol"After being around the club this year, Hollie is stepping up into the coaching role and will be a massive asset to all grades," PIFNC said in a statement on its Facebook page.

"She has plenty of experience and accolades under her belt, so we look forward to her bringing her wealth of knowledge to the 2025 season."
