Owners of the carnival land in Cowes have closed their doors for the last time, saying they remain angry at the property's compulsory acquisition and were yet to find a new home.

Owner Brian Watkins said settlement on the 16ha site, on the corner of Phillip Island Road and Ventnor Road, was due last week but Bass Coast Shire had notified the family of a last-minute delay until March.

He would not disclose the sale price, but said it was "almost the amount we were asking".

Mr Watkins said he had asked to retain a few acres in the southern corner but the shire had rejected the request.

The Watkins were planning to retire on the land and council had several years ago approved a building permit for their home and soon after notified them of plans to compulsorily acquire the land.

A shire spokeswoman last week said the compulsory acquisition had not been finalised.

"We are working through the process but cannot provide an estimated time for completion," she said.

The carnival site was originally

Eight years ago the shire identified the land as a location for a sports hub, aiming to turn the clock back to pre-1994.

The shire that same year bought back 16ha of the original parcel of land from the Watkins, calling it the Hilton Chadwick Reserve - which lies immediately to the west of the carnival site - for future use and development as part of a sporting precinct.

In 2018 the shire initiated a formal process, through Planning Scheme Amendment C153, to compulsorily acquire the remaining 16ha of the original carnival land, explaining that by combining the Hilton Chadwick Reserve with the neighbouring carnival site, the consolidated 32ha would allow for more sports facilities.

Ross River virus tally swells

The Ross River virus tally continues to increase, with a Cape Woolamai arborist the latest positive case.

Trevor Moulynox last week received a positive result after his wife Jess saw the Advertiser articles and Facebook posts detailing the mozzie-borne virus outbreak.

Bass Coast Shire and Bass Coast Health were both unaware of the outbreak until contacted by the Advertiser.

"It happened to Trevor exactly how your article reported it,' Jess said.

'He was sitting out on the deck before Christmas and then got swollen feet and ankles. He thought he should get liver and kidney tests, but then asked for a Ross River test, although the doctor did say his symptoms suggested it could be that.

"I think the word should get out that if anyone experiences any symptoms, get them checked, because sometimes the doctor won't check if you don't cole." don't ask.'

The mother-of-two said since her 37-year-old husband was tested at the Wonthaggi Medical Group a fortnight ago he had been on anti-inflammatories which, according to the doctor, can limit cartilage degeneration from the virus.

"It's the only thing making him function. He still has a lot of joint pain and when he gets out of the car he groans like an old man.

"He's normally active, likes jogging and playing with the kids, riding the bikes, but he's

"This is something that lasts forever, like the herpes virus. The symptoms can go away but reoccur through your life so it's not something you want to get. With Covid around, you don't want your body compromised."





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Disputed Surf Beach turbine underway

Surf Beach residents' bid to stop the erection of a residential wind turbine looks to have failed, with construction of the controversial structure beginning this week.

Late last year, the Advertiser spoke to the owner of the turbine Rob McKittrick who planned to erect the turbine, which measures 10.5 metres, under the height requirement triggering a planning permit.

"I have done everything council has asked me to do and more," Mr McKittrick said.

"I don't tell neighbours what they can and can't do on their property. "People feel how they feel regard-

less of what I say or do.' Surf Beach residents said the pieces

of the turbine have now been put together, but it has not been erected yet. Despite the residents' calls to Bass Coast Shire Council to stop the turbine going ahead, Council said it had no power to stop the construction.

A Council Q&A sheet distributed last year states planners have exhausted all avenues of action to stop the turbine's erection.

"Council has no power available to it to address the proposed issues associated with the installation of the structure," the Q&A sheet states.

"The only authority that can intervene to support and address the community's concerns is the State Government through an amendment to the Victorian Planning Provisions.

"To date, the State Government has declined to amend the Planning Provisions which would provide the mechanism for Council to manage the approval and enforcement process."

McKittrick had provided details to the shire on the dimensions, designs, specifications and tolerances of the wind turbine, which was being independently reviewed and assessed.

"This documentation (whilst commercial in confidence) has been provided by the landowner in good faith," the Q&A states.

Residents had called for the shire to use enforcement to stop the turbine's erection.

"In the event the proposed turbine is constructed and is found to breach any stipulations - height, noise, commercial in nature, used for advertising purpose - Council will pursue any and all enforcement options available to ensure any breach is fully rectified.

"At this stage without any construction having taken place, there is not a situation that warrants the enactment of emergency action."

Calls to block the construction of the turbine were supported by Birdlife Australia, who raised concerns about the nearby Shearwater colony in a letter to the council.

"This proposed wind turbine will have extremely detrimental consequences to the colony, both as adult birds return each night to feed their chicks and especially as the naïve fledging chicks practice flying and leave the colony," Dr Lees from Bird-life Australia said.

"Although we appreciate the property owner is making an effort to transfer to green energy, in such close proximity to a seabird colony, in this case the construction of a wind turbine, is inappropriate and we oppose its construction and operation.

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January real estate boom unprecedented



Local real estate agents say property sales on Phillip Island and San Remo over January have been at "unprecedented" levels.

Phillip Island has been a hotspot for real estate in Victoria over January.

Since Melbourne emerged from COVID-19 lockdown, people have been snapping up the opportunity to buy real estate outside of metropolitan Melbourne.

And sales are continuing to rise, even heading out of tourist season.

Michael McLeod from First National Real Estate in Cowes, speaking last week, said sales have been exceptionally strong throughout January.

"It is unprecedented, and sales are just continuing to rise," he commented.

Some properties have been snapped up on the day they have been listed; with others in days of going on the market.

With steep competition, people can expect to pay more for their slice of coastal real estate.

^AHowever, Michael said Phillip Island is still offering relatively cheap coastal real estate, compared to some other areas across the state.

He said more people are looking for a place where they can live and work from home, but still easily commute to Melbourne when needed. "Phillip Island and San Remo are the perfect positions for those buyers."

Michael said that people wanting a lifestyle change and first home buyers were largely represented in the buyer's market, but all sectors are "flying" at the moment.

"With the incentives offered by government, first home buyer sales are rising," Michael said. "Demand is currently outstripping supply which is causing even more competition in the marketplace."

Greg Price, from Alex Scott Real Estate agreed, saying the demand for property locally has never been higher.


"It is the busiest January I have seen in my whole career," he said.

Greg has noticed a strong trend with the amount of people buying a house to live in, rather than as an investment property.

"Due to the increased demand, there is more than one potential buyer for every property. This is causing houses to sell faster than they ever have," he commented.

"There is competition across all areas of the market which we don't usually see."

Incorrect sign is causing confusion

The new V/Line sign in Newhaven is causing great confusion for bus travellers unfamiliar with the local area.

The westbound sign that is placed almost directly across from the eastbound Forrest Avenue bus stop is signed "To Melbourne" when in fact west bound buses are on the way to Cowes.

The stop also has a timetable displayed for buses that are in fact travelling in the opposite direction.

The need for a bus stop in that location has been questioned as it is just 100-metres closer to the bridge than the already well-established stop near the Rip Curl Surf Shop.

The issue has been reported to the Department of Transport, and Bass Coast Councillor Bruce Kent has wasted no time in trying to rectify the issue.

After being contacted by the Advertiser last week, Sara Rhodes-Ward, Director Gippsland Region – Department of Transport, has advised that the sign had been wrongly installed, and the error would

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Cowes neglected over Christmas Seeing the light for wildlife

A Cowes trader has accused Bass Coast Shire Council of neglecting the main streets of the town during the busy Christmas holiday period.

The veteran trader of 20 years claims neither Thompson Avenue or The Esplanade were cleaned by the shire street sweeper between Christmas and New Year.

"Previously there was a street sweeper seven days a week in January," he said.

"Bass Coast Shire Council has a theory that the shire finishes at San Remo. It forgets about us over here."

A Council spokesperson admitted the Cowes street sweeper had to undergo repairs over Christmas, "which meant some cleans during this period were unable to go ahead", but said between Christmas and the Australia Day weekend, the main streets were cleaned 12 times.

"We generally aim to sweep the Cowes CBD two to three times per week and more when regularly required," the spokesperson said.

There is a small sweeper based full time in Cowes, which is scheduled to clean the footpaths and roadways of the CBD several times a week.

A larger sweeper looks after residential areas on a weekly basis.

Cowes misses out?

According to the trader, as well as the lack of street sweeping between Christmas and New Year, the centre of Cowes went 12 days in the latter part of January without being cleaned.

Council did not directly address the claim, but said the area is generally swept "two to three times per week"

The trader also queried why council staff weren't cleaning toilets on weekends and why the Heritage Centre toilets were now locked.

"No, they remain open on weekends. The toilets are locked at dusk and reopened at dawn," the spokesperson said

A Cowes trader has accused Council of neglecting the main streets

during the holiday period, however Council said the Cowes CBD was generally swept two to three times a week, with team members also conducting litter pick ups and other cleaning duties.

members worked seven days a week cleaning public amenities from October 1 to April 1 each year, "with double cleans taking place on high use facilities such as Smiths Beach and Thompson Avenue".

"In periods of high demand, such as during an event, we engage a local contractor to maintain our amenities. which includes two hourly cleans.

'This year, we also had team members working on weekends from December 26 through until the end of January conducting litter picks, BBQ cleaning and cleansing works across all townships and high use areas," the spokesperson said.

"A roster of six team members per

The council confirmed that team day was used with early morning starts of 6am, servicing San Remo, Newhaven, Vista Place Shops, Cottesloe Beach, Cape Woolamai Beach, Rhyll, Red Rocks and Ventnor, Smiths Beach, YCW beach and Cowes CBD and The Esplanade."

Addressing complaints about the time it took to clear a tree branch which fell near the Cowes Post Office on January 28, the spokesperson said no request was received to remove it.

"Our arboriculture team and local contractors were hit with a high workload across 28 and 29 January, after the strong winds that occurred on 27 January. We received 46 tree requests from the storm event.'

It was good news for wildlife when "shearwater-friendly" lights were installed at the Cape Woolamai and Back Beach Road roundabouts by Regional Roads Victoria last year. But what exactly is wildlife-

friendly lighting? With the annual Short-tailed Shearwater exodus set to begin in

mid-April, Nature Parks research scientist Andre Chiaradia has clarified, after a request from the Phillip Island Conservation Society.

"All artificial lights will cause some harm to nocturnal animals. Some types of lights are more damaging than others," Andre told PICS.

So, there is no friendly lights for wildlife but wildlife-sensitive lights." Andre said PINP had conducted

experiments with lights and their effect on shearwaters and penguins, then given the best light options available on the market to RRV.

He said Phillip Island was used as a case study in the recently published National Light Pollution Guidelines for Seabirds, Seaturtles and Shorebirds.

More than one million Shorttailed Shearwaters call Phillip Island home, and from mid-April to early May, the newest additions to

the colony are at risk of being injured or killed on the island's roads when they attempt to fly for the first time and start their 16,000km journey back to Alaska.

RRV limits speed limits and turns off street lighting including on the Phillip Island bridge, so the chicks do not fly towards the light and end up on the main road.

Heroes don't drop their masks

The growing number of face masks dropped around streets and even in nature reserves - has been highlighted by the Phillip Island Conservation Society.

A post on PICS' Facebook page suggested possible reasons that masks ended up as litter included inadvertently falling out of pockets, no bin close by, and "no connection to place or nature so don't care"

"Yes, it's hard to fathom and really not excusable," the post reads.

"They will no doubt form a large part in PICS rubbish clean up working bees in 2021.'

Jude's wild about native food

When Rhyll's Jude Mayall attended the launch of the Farmer's Daughter restaurant in Melbourne, she got a pleasant surprise.

"They have a cocktail named after me, called Jude's Punch," said Jude, who owns the Wild Food Farm (previously the Rhyll Trout Farm).

"It has aromatics from one of my spice teas in it, including native pepper and wattle seed, which makes it a beautiful soft pink colour.

"It was a great surprise; I've never had anything named after me.'

Aside from the punch, Jude's native botanicals are being used in a range of cocktails and a signature beer at the restaurant, which opened last month in Melbourne to champion Gippsland growers and produce (see separate article).

The restaurant initiative is a positive for Jude who has had a tough year, opening Wild Food Farm on the Rhyll-Newhaven Road in February last year just before Covid hit.

"In 2020 I opened three times and closed twice. It was a rocky time to open," she says. With decades as a chef and in the na-

tive food industry, Jude however is deter-mined to focus on long-term success. Bush food

Jude grew up on a citrus farm on the Murray and completed a diploma in confectionary in Germany, before an apprenticeship with an Australian sweets manufacturer.

It was a 10-year stint working for an Aboriginal art gallery that focused her interest in food gathering and harvesting and in 2005 she started Outback Chef.

The company, which she continues to run, has dozens of products, sold to wholesalers and restaurants, including dried botanicals such as lemon myrtle and native peppers, as well as value-add products such as teas and mixed curry spices.

It was through Outback Chef that Jude became friendly with Paul Mannix, the founder of the Rhyll Trout Farm, who had also grown out about 50 different bush food species.

Under new management, the farm is used in teas and syrups, while Davidclosed about four years ago and was bought by Jude at the end of 2019.

"Rhyll is a beautiful place and this is a beautiful property, but I don't know anything about fish.

"I wanted to expand my product line and not just operate out of a warehouse so $% \left({{{\mathbf{x}}_{i}}} \right)$ I jumped in the deep end and bought it."

Future plans

Jude says the 10-acre property – open to the public since lockdown restrictions lifted last year - continues to run the café, with seating in the adjoining rainforest area.

She has mapped the property's bush food, currently focused on maintaining those plants before adding more. The plants – and her Outback Chef

products - are used throughout the café menu, overseen by chef Joel Howard. Lilly pilly, for instance, has "complex

flavours" similar to a mix of cinnamon, clove and ginger, and is used in vinegars and syrups on cakes and pancakes. Lemon myrtle's pungent citrus flavour

son's plum - not grown on the property is a favourite in the café's jam, served with cream on scones.

Jude oversees a team of about eight staff who – even during lockdown – have been wearing "multiple hats", working on the property and in the café.

The long-term plan is to target more bush food education, including to the likes of William Angliss Institute and the Cordon Bleu school.

"My own philosophy is that native food is the defining image of Australian cuisine

"We are a multicultural nation, whether it's Asian or Middle Eastern, but native food chefs are doing a great job of putting these ingredients in those dishes to make them our own."

Jude says she loves living in Rhyll, enjoying evening walks with her dog on the farm, listening to the birds and frogs.

"And the Rhyll-billy locals are a friendly group too," she says, adding she's named a beef burger in honour of them.

Phillip Island koalas' future bleak

Phillip Island Nature Parks has dismissed calls to include koalas in its proposed threatened species plan, despite the much-loved marsupial under serious threat in the wild.

There are less than 20 koalas believed to live in the wild on Phillip Island, with another koala count planned for this year (2021).

Nature Parks has a centre dedicated to conserving the species at Five Ways, which has a declining populated currently totalling 21 koalas.

Nature Parks is currently focused on the creation of an "Island Ark" through its Threatened Species Plan: the reintroduction of endangered animals and plants, including the southern bettong, growling grass frog and long-nosed potoroo.

As part of the plan, about 70 eastern barred bandicoots were released onto the Summerland Peninsula in 2017, while PINP's current draft Wildlife Plan suggests introducing predator quolls and owls.

Despite this, PINP CEO Catherine Basterfield has ruled out stepping up efforts to increase wild or captive koala numbers, saying they were an introduced species to Phillip Island.

"Koala numbers on Phillip Island are dwindling through a combination of disease, habitat loss and urbanisation," Ms Basterfield said.

There are very limited opportunities for koalas to be released on Phillip Island as we do not have the range of tree species to support a viable population, and we also have a diseased (chlamydia positive) wild population that would compromise koalas being relocated.

"This is why the Nature Parks has not identified koalas in the Threatened Species Plan as an appropriate species to re-establish in the wild on Phillip Island."

Ms Basterfield said koalas in Australia broadly speaking were under threat "however Victorian koala populations are not threatened with extinction".

"There was damage from recent bushfires in Victoria but there is no evidence that the Victorian populations are under threat," she said, adding Nature Parks nursed 14 bushfire affected koalas.

However, Phillip Island's peak koala conservation group Friends of the Koalas (FoK) disputed this, arguing Victorian koalas were under threat and Nature Parks was in a position to help the species.

"I totally agree that koalas should

"Apart from a few isolated and genetically compromised populations, numbers of healthy koalas in Victoria are probably much lower than thought and they probably are threatened.

That is why I believe the PINP could do more for the koala as it has the capacity to do so and the koala

Thousands of koalas were killed in the bushfires and much habitat was lost. There is growing concern about their future with some populations facing extinction.'

Ms Hunt said the Koala Conservation Centre was created "for the very purpose of preserving the koala".

"In the early years it did conduct research and education and had a successful breeding program but this is not occurring much at the moment. "While it might not be possible to

re-establish a large population on

the island. PINP needs to do some thing about the koala numbers at the Koala centre as their breeding rate is very low and many koalas there are old.

"The centre could support a better breeding program for the future of the koala statewide, as well as undertaking research and education. It was after all established to conserve the species."

Ms Hunt acknowledged there were limited opportunities to release koalas on Phillip Island, but said areas such as Oswin Roberts Reserve and Ventnor Reserve could support more numbers.

The land was set aside specifically for koalas and we do have a range of tree species to support them. We have certainly planted lots. "Yes they have chlamydia but so

do other koala populations.

She said PINP could possibly breed the threatened Strzelecki koala whose numbers are now believed to be below 1500 - and release them into available habitat in Gippsland.

French Island koalas come from a small genetic base and were becoming inbred, "which isn't good for the future of the species".

"That is why the preservation of the Strzelecki koala is so important genetically for the future of koalas," Ms Hunt said.

She added PINP dropped the word Conservation from the Koala Conservation Centre's title last year and renamed it Koala Reserve.

"We strongly protested and the board then agreed to call it Koala Conservation Reserve.

Rate of extinction

Since Phillip Island was declared fox-free in August 2017, the focus has shifted to threatened species.

Beyond the Horizon: A 30-year Conservation Plan, which was released by PINP in 2018, suggests the island should become a haven for endangered and threatened Victorian species.

"Australia is experiencing the highest rate of species extinctions of any landmass ... This provides a significant opportunity for Phillip Island to play a key role in preserving the biodiversity of Victoria," the plan states

The last island-wide koala count was in November 2016, when less than 20 koalas in the wild were counted.

A planned count in 2020 has been rescheduled to 2021, due to Covid.



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

Light at the end of the tunnel



Local photographer Andrew Harrison is finally enjoying a new normal, while waiting for the wedding market to bounce back after it was decimated last year by the Covid pandemic.

It was tough initially for Andrew Harrison on the phone for no pay. from Passion8 Photography when the Covid pandemic struck back in March last year.

He had 60 wedding cancellations.

While most couples rebooked for dates later in the year, the second wave of Covid and the accompanying restrictions, soon put paid to that. Weddings were rebooked yet again with An-

drew for February and March. But with interstate border closures announced in November, and overseas flights

cancelled, postponements this time were extended to late 2021 and even 2022, Andrew said. "My full-time job over all of this time was

talking with the couples involved, giving them advice, and trying to find other dates and fit in with them.

"Some have had to change the dates they have selected three times so far," he said.

Andrew had a few weddings that did go ahead in December.

"A few couples just wanted to get married and changed down to a small wedding of 15.

just three went ahead. It's been the same for February.'

He has a Covid-safe plan, and makes sure he wears a mask, sanitises and abides by regulations. But the constant changes were difficult, he said.

"The rules changed every week. "One week, you were doing a wedding where

masks had to be worn. The next week they were off again.

Some of his clients were quite upset about this. Andrew said 2020 had been a stressful time for everyone, and he had spent most of his time

He said he has retained deposits and changed dates for his clients, and no extra charges are involved.

"It's not their fault that this has happened. You do not want to add to their stress at this time," he commented.

Andrew has been a photographer for 21 years, with half of his work carried out on Phillip Island and across South Gippsland, and the other half taking him into Melbourne, the Yarra Valley and Mornington Peninsular.

And weddings are his specialty.

However, his versatility behind the camera has seen him doing more of his commercial and business photography, since Covid struck.

He loves taking photos underwater and surf photography, and selling some online.

"People started buying them, which is helpful. I intend to keep on doing this."

In fact, Andrew says, he rather likes the new normal.

"I am not relying on weddings now and am "In January I had 12 that had rebooked, but doing something different. It's a bit of a mix and I am enjoying it.

But he's optimistic that the wedding market will bounce back in the not-too-distant future.

"I am finding a bit more confidence with the wedding market. A lot of bookings are beginning to come through, especially for 2022.

"I can see light at the end of the tunnel. I have about 50 to 60 bookings going forward, starting from September.

"And people are still booking short term.

"People still want to celebrate. We just have to do it in a different way."

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Teland Wedding 200 Brighter future ahead after horror 2020

The impact of Coronavirus on the wedding industry when it hit back in March, was sudden and severe.

Health and safety restrictions, issued regularly and with little warning, left couples who had planned their big day months and years in advance, facing devastating cancellations.

Weddings were postponed, and rescheduled, only for hopes to be again dashed, as the rules kept changing.

Phillip Island marriage celebrant Lisa-Anne Prendergast was well placed to observe the turmoil as it unfolded, starting back in March.

'I had 20 instant postponements. "It was terrible for the couples. And

for all of their wedding suppliers, it was an extremely stressful time. Their business disappeared overnight. Venues, florists, caterers, event hire, photographers, hair and makeup artists, musicians - everyone was terribly affected."

Trying to understand the rules, which were constantly changing, was the first major challenge, Lisa-Anne said.

"It was hard to get consistent, concise and common-sense rulings.

'The rules were being interpreted differently, by different providers.

"As a celebrant, I went by the book. I had to delve into each wedding to find out what could go ahead.

"At one point you could have 15 wedding guests at home, but if you booked into a restaurant you could have upwards of 30 or more. So some couples married at home, and went on to a restaurant later with family and friends.

"It was confusing.

limit of just five people was allowed. That meant just two witnesses, and a celebrant, could be present."

Under Covid rules, the bridal couple were permitted to take their masks off only for the ceremony, professional photos, and while eating and drinking. While guests would sit through the ceremony masked up.

"It was hard as a celebrant to con-"The hardest time of all was when a duct the ceremony, ensuring every-

one can hear and understand while speaking through a mask," she commented

"At one point, with Melbourne in full lockdown, even with just five present, a wedding could not proceed in regional Victoria, if one of the partners lived in the metropolitan area.

"A lot of couples postponed. But then they faced a huge task trying to rebook the same suppliers for next time.'

and while some could open, others could not.

It was particularly difficult financially for larger venues who had organised staff and ordered food and supplies in for a wedding, only to find the rules changed at the eleventh hour without warning.

Lisa-Anne knows of some couples who were forced to chop and change their date four times.

Others opted to get married quietly, putting celebrations on ice until the pandemic is over.

Still others gave up entirely.

"From March through to December, just five of my original bookings went ahead," she said.

Innovative ideas emerge

Come mid-year, industry members locally were looking at Covid-Safe al ternatives to present to couples.

Lisa-Anne launched the Phillip Island Registry Office in July, which now offers registry style weddings on the island.

By law couples must give one month's advance notice of their intent to marry, sign the papers on the due date, and walk out after a short legally worded ceremony with a marriage certificate.

The option has been taken up already by a number of couples, with future celebrations left for more settled times.

Lisa-Anne, along with Abbie Patton of The Shearing Shed, and Kristie Cameron of Over the Top events, have combined their talents as members of the Island Wedding Collective.

In response to Covid, they've pulled

The weddings are small, in line with regulations, and the bride and groom don't have to worry about a thing.

The ladies of the Collective went that extra mile recently for a couple whose wedding plans were in jeopardy due to the Melbourne lockdown.

The couple could not come to Phillip Island to hold the wedding they had planned here, so the girls jumped in their vans and took the wedding lock, stock and barrel over to them at a winery in Baxter.

"Melbourne and the Mornington Peninsula could not come into regional Victoria, but for the purpose of work, with a permit, we could go to them.

"I was so honoured to be able to continue marrying couples throughout the year, with another eight weddings," Lisa-Anne said.

A brighter future ahead

With 2020 behind it, Lisa-Anne says the industry is starting to breathe. Couples have locked in their dates

for this year with others rebooking next year and into 2023.

"It is looking much brighter. We all have to keep going and stay abreast in this changing environment.

We are adapting to the new rules. And we see a brighter 2021 and 2022 ahead.'





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

Remembering our Nashos

Australia's national servicemen, affectionately known as Nashos, played a unique and invaluable role in serving our country and each year on February 14 we honour them on National Servicemen's Dav.

Throughout history, Australia has had four periods of compulsory national service, most recently between 1951-1959 and 1964-1972, with more than 280,000 national servicemen serving since the Second World War.

Under the National Service Act 1951, all men turning 18 on or after November 1,1950 were required to undertake 176 days standard recruit training in the Navy, Army or Air Force, followed by five years in their respective Reserves.

Intake was cut back in 1957 and a birthday ballot was introduced to decide who would be selected.

National service was re-introduced in 1964 as concerns grew about the security of Australia due to conflicts in nearby regions and more than 60,000 'Nashos' would serve between then and 1972.

Men who turned 20 years of age were required to register and were chosen for service through a birthday ballot held twice a year. Of those called to serve, more than 15,000 served in the Vietnam War, where some 200 lost their lives and more than 1.200 were wounded.

Two national servicemen also died while serving in Borneo in 1966.

As a nation we should always remember the service and sacrifice of our Nashos. The Australian War Memorial will honour our Nashos through the Last Post Ceremony at the Australian War Memorial on February 14 with a representative from the National Servicemen's Association of Australia laying a wreath.

I encourage all those in the community to learn more about the National Service Scheme of 1964 by visiting the Department of Veterans' Affairs Anzac Portal anzacportal.dva.gov.au.



The post-competition presentation celebrated the efforts of anglers, volunteers and members who continue to support the angling club with the Covid-Safe measures in place.


The trying conditions favoured the keen, particularly in the Squidgie Mixed Bag competition, for budding anglers aged nine and under.


