A close call at Kilcunda

RESCUE

Following the fatal drowning of four people at Forrest Caves last month, three people were pulled from the surf at Kilcunda on Sunday afternoon (February 4).

Ambulance Victoria confirmed a teenage girl and a primary school aged girl were taken to Wonthaggi Hospital in a stable condition for further assessment.

It's believed local surfers helped get the three from the water. Police, lifesavers and para-

medics were in attendance, with SES members from the San Remo unit called to help transport one of the people from the beach. A spokesperson for Life Saving Victoria said they were "alerted at approximately 12.20pm of three people in diffisistance once on the beach," the spokesperson said.

The incident was a stark reminder of the dangers of swimming at unpatrolled locations.

LSV said there have been 32 fatal drownings from July 1, 2023 to February 4, 2024.

The rescue is the second serious incident at this location in the past month.

A man drowned at Kilcunda

Warnings

Speaking at a press conference after the Forrest Caves drown-ings, the General Manager of Life Saving Victoria (LSV), Liam Krige, urged people to take care in the water, and swim at patrolled locations.

"As we know, any drowning death is preventable, and we want to try and avoid these drownings

"I can confirm that lifesavers did not assist in the rescue at Kilcunda, but they provided as-


Beach on Friday, January 12, after being swept out to sea in the vicinity of the Bourne Creek Trestle Bridge around 8.30pm.

"The bull bar rammed the south-east







Drama on the high seas

The Australian Maritime Safety sent an emergency vessel to the rescue of an LPG tanker, The Bougainville, which found itself in distress a few kilometres off Seal Rocks on Friday.

The tanker, registered in Panama and carrying LPG, was marooned on the water when its propeller sheared off completely out at sea.

The crippled vessel was safely towed into Flinders on Sunday after a rescue mission was mounted, but will be towed to a safer anchorage off Cowes on Wednesday this week, if conditions permit.

The vessel, bult in 2014 and apparently very well maintained, was headed for Westernport, carrying a full load of LPG, when the propeller was lost.

The tug The Albatross, was called in to assist from Geelong.

A spokesperson for the Australian Maritime Safety Authority (AMSA) speaking on Monday, confirmed the tanker had lost a propeller.

"On February 2, the Panamanianflagged liquid petroleum gas tanker Bougainville experienced loss of propulsion during pre-arrival main engine testing," the spokesperson said.

"It was later revealed to have lost its

propeller. The vessel was holding anchor near Phillip Island, Bass Strait until emergency towage vessels could arrive on the scene.

"The Bougainville was towed to Flinders anchorage where it is expected to remain until conditions are suitable to bring it into the more sheltered Cowes anchorage.

"The vessel is likely to remain at Cowes anchorage until arrangements can be made to tow it to a suitable repair facility," the spokesperson said.

"Dive inspections have revealed the main propeller shaft has sheared off completely. This will require withdrawal of the propeller shaft at a repair facility capable of undertaking this type of work."

The AMSA said it is satisfied the crew are safe and the vessel does not currently pose a threat to the marine environment.

"AMSA will continue to work with the master of the vessel and its operator to resolve the situation."

A local boat operator said it would be a massive operation to get a propeller back on the ship, and most likely would need to be done in a dry dock.

Ship propellers can weigh anything up to a tonne, depending on the size of the ship.

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10-month Phillip Island bridge works explained

Trucks used for construction are most likely to be impacted by the Phillip Island bridge's upcoming maintenance works, with those carting groceries, petrol and for Grand Prix circuit events unaffected.

Westernport Water is undertaking critical maintenance work on the main water and sewerage pipelines connected to the underside of the bridge from February 26 to November 2024.

To minimise impacts to traffic and the community, suspended scaffolding will be attached under the bridge so workers can access the pipes.

"Both lanes of the bridge will remain open and unaffected," a Westernport Water spokesperson said.

"With safety our key priority, the vehicle mass limit on the bridge will be temporarily reduced to 42.5 tonne to protect the structural integrity of the bridge while we carry out this critical maintenance work."

The limit had locals guessing what trucks would be impacted, with the spokesperson responding that "some trucks commonly used in the construction sector, particularly large truck and dog trailer combinations. "Trucks that are used to

"Trucks that are used to supply groceries, household goods, milk, petrol, and major events at the Phillip Island Gand Prix Circuit are not likely to be affected by the reduced mass limit," they said.

"These trucks typically operate within the allowable weight limit."

Department of Transport and Planning Gippsland director Beth Liley said heavy vehicle mass limits for the duration of the works would ensure safety for workers and road users.

"The National Heavy Vehicle Regulator is responsible for enforcing mass limits and will monitor compliance," Ms Liley said.

"Heavy vehicle operators are advised to refer to the "Heavy Vehicle Map Networks in Victoria" for planned and unplanned disruptions to the road network."

Bridge strength?

Some residents on social media questioned the reliability and strength of the bridge, asking how the pipelines could interfere with the structural integrity and weight limit.

"The vehicle mass limit on the bridge will be temporarily reduced to 42.5 tonne to offset the weight of the suspended scaffold," the Westernport Water spokesperson said.

"This decision has been made by the Department of Transport and Planning (the asset owners of the bridge) to manage the structural integrity of the bridge.

"The pipelines themselves do not interfere with the structural integrity of the bridge."

Many asked why the project would take 10 months.

"The duration reflects the significant scope of the work and the highrisk factors that need to be managed to ensure a safe workplace," they said.

"One of the pipelines will have its outer surface refurbished and wrapped and across all three pipelines there are nearly 400 connecting brackets to be replaced or renewed in tight areas with limited space. "Scaffolding will be erected on three bridge spans at a time and relocated as the work moves across the bridge."

Suspended scaffolding is attached to the underside of the bridge, without the need for road closures and it is not impacted by wind speed.

Foreshore

While the San Remo Channel Challenge will not be significantly impacted from the bridge works, other areas will.

The Westernport Water spokesperson said equipment, site offices and materials in a compound will be kept to a minimum.

"Work will start on the San Remo side of the bridge and therefore the compound will be at the San Remo Foreshore from about mid-February to August.

"The footprint of the compound will be reduced on weekends, public holidays and during major events to allow for greater access to the San Remo foreshore area.

"Pedestrian access will always remain open, as will the access tracks under the bridge."

They said in about August 2024, the compound would be relocated to the Newhaven foreshore until the end of the project around November.

Elderly pensioners take legal action against developer

An elderly pensioner couple say they have experienced "stress, anxiety and expense" after buying into a "lifestyle house and land" package on Thompson Avenue, Cowes, unaware it would be a caravan park.

And, the Phillip Island couple say, since buying in 2021 they have been forced to rent, late in 2023 learning the developer has only just applied for a planning permit.

The developer has responded, however, saying they had not changed the offering to customers (see separate story).

Norm Adams and Leonie Brennan sold their Ventnor house to pay \$247,800 to Holiday Lifestyle Cowes for a 99-year lease on a site at 137-143 Thompson Avenue in November 2021.

The couple signed a contract to pay \$312,800 to KTS Build-

ing and Construction for a twostorey cabin, with an initial payment of \$15,000 for the laying of the foundation in 2022. A further payment of \$51,000 was made to Holiday Lifestyle tradesmen, which they say was meant to secure their home to lock up stage by April last year. "We expected construction

"We expected construction would proceed in a timely manner and committed ourselves to the expense of rented accommodation until completion of our unit," Leonie said.

"Only recently did we learn the developer had not submitted documents for their planning permit to council until June 2023, which was extended to November when it was released publicly."

Furthermore, adding to their "frustration and disappointment", they also recently learned that rather than a "lifestyle village" a significant area of the site will be devoted to caravan and tent campers.

"We feel this is an activity inappropriate in a "lifestyle village". The site plan we were provided prior to the purchase of our lease site shows the whole site surveyed for lease lots with no indication of caravan or camping sites or facilities for campers," Leonie said.

"They never gave us any indication about a caravan park. We feel very naïve and angry. It's not what we signed up for."

The couple, who have lived on Phillip Island for 23 years, showed the Advertiser their contract with Holiday Lifestyle and KTS Building, which both make no reference to caravan or camping sites.

Leonie said they had phoned and emailed Holiday Lifestyle Cowes, with the manager now not responding to their questions. The couple have now hired

a lawyer in an attempt to void their Holiday Lifestyle contract.

Construction

Leonie said they had been told their home would be ready three times – April last year, then Christmas and now April this year.

So far only the steel foundation, with concrete stumps for their home had been laid and Leonie said it appeared only six cabins had been constructed on a total of 49 sites.

"As yet, there is little evidence of any building activity on our unit," she said adding the building was permanent and not moveable.

"Alarm bells started going off in April last year because we had paid to get it to lock up and suddenly all worked stopped and we found out late last year they didn't have the proper permits, which is when I met our lawyer to discuss the issue." She added they have nowhere to live.

"We sold our house, then rented and had to move from that rental after a year, and so moved to Frankston.

"The house we're in has sold and so we have to move out by February 9 and have been trying to find any rental on Phillip Island, all while we're paying for all our furniture to be in storage."

Leonie said it had been a "disastrous chapter" in their lives due to "disappointment, expense of rental accommodation and legal fees in an attempt to recover our money and cancel our contracts".

"It is very disappointing the developer does not realise the stress, anxiety and expense that has been caused to an elderly couple and refund all moneys so that we can move on with the rest of our lives.

"It's mind blowing."

Developer responds to customer concerns

The developer of the Thompson Avenue "lifestyle" project has defended the development, saying they had not changed the offering to customers and the planning permit would soon be complete.

And, the developer said, the original independent builder had quit the project, yet to return customer money.

Holiday Lifestyle's spokesperson Lauren Clarke told the Advertiser in 2021 they purchased 137-143 Thompson Avenue, the former Islander Caravan Park, which had existed on the land for more than 50 years.

Ms Clarke said Holiday Lifestyle had "architecturally designed and engineered unregistered moveable dwellings with six individual floor plans".

"These are a much better

"Our plans for the caravan park have been advertised regularly and remain the same. Offering onsite management and the opportunity for holiday, overnight, short or long-term accommodation."

Ms Clarke said concerned buyers Norm Adams and Leonie Brennan (see separate story) – given they have a registered leasehold to the site – "can sell it at any time".

"We are happy to assist with this if they do not want to wait for the planning process to finalise."

She said the couple had been aware they were exempt from land tax "because it's a caravan park".

Planning

Ms Clarke said cabins or unregistered moveable dwellings in a caravan park were permissible, "and usually only require an installation notice". According to the Residential Tenancies Act Residential Tenancies Regulations 2020 "if planning consent is required a council has powers ... to prevent works which do not have a relevant planning permit". She said in April 2023 Bass Coast Shire informed Holiday Lifestyle consent was required, and a planning permit application was submitted in June 2023 (with final lodgement including further details in November). "Last year after we commenced construction of the unregistered moveable dwellings council approached us and advised we would need to submit the different

floor plans, landscape plans etc as a planning application.

"We were advised no work can continue until we have successfully completed this process.

"We confirm all items requested have been submitted and the

process is nearing completion." Ms Clarke said she under-

stood Norm and Leonie were frustrated.

"I feel the same way."

Builder

Ms Clarke said the original independent builder had quit the project, yet to return customer money.

She said Norm and Leonie had paid an initial deposit of five per cent to the builder – and their footings and subfloor were installed – when Holiday Lifestyle learned they were required to apply for a planning permit.

Caravan park development: how it happened

As reported in the Advertiser last month, Holiday Lifestyle is seeking a \$2 million construction at 137-143 Thompson Avenue, the former Islander Caravan Park, according to a planning permit currently out for public comment.

The proposed works include: an amended site layout to reduce the total number of tent/caravan/cabin sites from 100 to 49 sites; installation of six cabins (two x two storey and four single storey) with a maximum height of 7.1 metres; installation of a deck, access ramp and stairs with the existing amenities block.

permit 1 ne seeking permission for building and works associated with a caravan and camping park and removal of vegetation, stating the site has existing use rights because of its use as a camping and caravan park for many decades. The site will continue to be used for this purpose, rebranded as Holiday Lifestyle Cowes," the permit explains. Aside from the cabins, the balance of the lots will be used for a combination of caravan and tent usage "depending on changing customer demand", with the park marketed to overnight tourists, short term stays, and coach groups.

So far the permit has received 10 objections. For the past two years residents and surrounding businesses have highlighted concerns, ranging from illegal tree removal to questions about the planning rules of the buildings,

Promotion

Holiday Lifestyle in 2021 bought the former Islander caravan park, which is in addition to their other properties at Wyndam Cove, Portland and St Leonards. In 2022 the developers were promoting "house and land packages from \$530,000 in the heart of Cowes", with no mention of caravan or tent

product than the typically massproduced cabins of the past," she said.

Ms Clarke said Holiday Lifestyle had leased sites with proposed cabins to be used as either holiday accommodation, an investment, to be rented through the park office on a longer-term basis "to enjoy the benefits of on-site caretakers looking after the property".

"Holiday Lifestyle have not changed our offering at all. We continue to offer long term registered leases over the sites together with an unregistered moveable dwelling on some.

"We have not switched anything. quently requested the return of Norm and Leonie's five per cent deposit from KTS Building and Construction.

"We have assured the couple that Holiday Lifestyle will not request the five per cent be paid again and will complete their home for the agreed price with the builder, less the five per cent. "Building will resume as soon as we get the planning permit."

Ms Clarke confirmed the cabins were moveable within 24 hours, which is required for a caravan park, and also confirmed they had reached resolution with neighbours regarding previous concerns about the shared boundary alignment.

"The homes have been carefully designed with functional floor plans for comfort and space and there is a choice of dual occupancy duplex dwellings," the advertisement said, adding "investors are offered a guaranteed six per cent net return for up to 10 years".

"Owner occupiers, whether retirees or downsizers, can alter plans to suit their lifestyle and have the benefit of no stamp duty or land tax.

"Holiday homeowners can simply relax and receive an income when not occupying if you choose."

Our best trees to be protected

A long-awaited significant tree register will soon be made public, with an online map to monitor and protect Phillip Island's most precious vegetation.

After first being mooted in 2019 by community groups, and becoming a local law in 2022, Bass Coast Shire will launch the online tree register in coming months, which will include a detailed street inventory of trees on council-owned land, which so far includes 44 in 22 species, of which 24 are on Phillip Island and San Remo.

Significant trees on Phillip Island include a manna gum at 8 Dunsmore Road, Cowes, a Norfolk Island pine on Grossard Point Road, Ventnor and a Bunya Bunja pine at Woolamai House Estate, Cape Woolamai.

While an urban forest officer has been employed to develop assessment guidelines and oversee the register of trees on public land, private landowners will this year be asked to nominate trees on their own property worthy of inclusion.

Any tree on the register will be protected under local laws, with anyone lopping a significant tree liable for fines, and anyone wanting to lop one required to apply for a permit. Residents and community groups say significant tree registers can give extra protection when battling a major development.

For example, Newhaven residents cited their avenue of golden

cypress as a reason two projects should not proceed: Regional Roads Victoria's mooted upgrade of the Phillip Island Road at Newhaven to four lanes; and the shire's now-failed proposal to create a regional skate park at Grayden's Reserve.

Protection

Acting shire CEO Jodi Kennedy said a significant tree was one that was rare, old, had an outstanding size, heritage connections, planted by someone famous, or was a stand of trees.

"Once the map is released private landholders can nominate their own trees. Not every tree will be significant, but they can contact council to find out," Ms Kennedy said.

She explained a significant tree was given the same protections as a tree in a vegetation protection overlay (VPO), which protects the majority of private trees, with Phillip Island covered by many VPOS, whereas San Remo is not covered by a VPO.

The new local law also included protections for trees with a girth of 155cm or wider.

"Anyone who wants to prune, chop or lop a tree in a VPO or a tree that is on the register, or is a protected tree, will need to apply for a permit," she said, adding that utilities such as Westernport Water or Regional Roads Victoria have exemptions.

"It's not perfect, but the register puts in an extra layer of protection. We take this seriously and so we do our best with the

tools afforded to us."

Ms Kennedy said to avoid confusion, landholders should call council to check if a tree is protected.

"A 10-minute phone call is all it will take to check the requirements. If it doesn't relate to the tree register it's worth checking the VPO.

"This is about responding to community pride in trees on public and private property. We all benefit from vegetation."

Impetus

The idea for a significant tree register came after years of concern by ratepayers about constant tree felling, especially following the creation of the 10/30 rule for bushfire protection. More recently there was criticism more than 3300 trees and plants were removed to make way for the Lifestyle village between Settlement Road and Church Street.

Locals were also critical of the loss of mature gums on a new subdivision on the old market site at Settlement Road, as well as the former Islander Caravan Park.

In response, the Bass Coast Branch of the National Trust and the Phillip Island Conservation Society (PICS) in 2019 proposed the island's first significant tree register.

However, in the wake of Covid the proposed register stalled and the shire took up the register, passing a new local law in July 2022, which came into effect on January 1 last year.

Former PICS president Jeff Nottle welcomed the significant tree protections in the local laws.

"We are aware of the community angst around the demolition of some trees and we know the community wants to protect them," Mr Nottle said.

Urban forest

Council has a renewed push to increase and protect tree coverage, last year also approving a new urban forest strategy, which found towns are increasingly losing trees because of poor development, despite 91 per cent of survey respondents wanting more trees.

The strategy has a target of 40 per cent canopy in urban towns by 2040, with Cowes currently at about 30 per cent, with about 10,000 street trees and potential for 2000 more.

San Remo has few public trees, with just 445, and potential to plant more than 1000.

The strategy states no neighbourhood should fall below 25 per cent canopy coverage, with the shire now committing to plant 1500 trees annually, an increase of 1200 trees compared to the current program.

According to the strategy our existing urban forest is "under increasing pressure on multiple fronts", from dieback, poor quality development, infrastructure conflicts and climate change.

The shire manages 24 per cent of urban land in Bass Coast, with 76 per cent privately owned.

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Upgrade to **Cowes-Rhyll Trail**

INFRASTRUCTURE

A 700m stretch of the popular trail between Cowes and Rhyll will be upgraded to a shared use path for pedestrians and bicycles, as work continues to establish an important connection between the two townships.

Coast Shire Bass contractors Council started work last week to upgrade the current gravel path and replace some sections with concrete

Phillip Island Nature Parks construction staff will also soon start works to widen boardwalk sections and replace decking with non-slip material.

The works will be conducted in stages from late January to May, with a section of the trail between Conservation Hill car park and the Cowes-Rhyll Road crossing closed for the first two weeks of February. Phillip Island Nature

Parks General Manager Infrastructure and Planning, Jarvis Weston, said a section of trail would be closed while the works were completed.

"We have scheduled

the work to coincide with meeting planned for late the off-peak season to minimise any impact to trail users," Jarvis said.

"However, it is necessary to close a section of the trail while the works are undertaken.

"The trail may be intermittently opened while the work is undertaken so we encourage locals and visitors to modify their routes to avoid disruption, to observe the signs and respect cordoned areas to ensure safe trail use."

Linda Marston from Island Voice welcomed the upgrade, but voiced concerns.

"While I'm happy to hear it's being made safer, the emphasis should be on it being a shared pathway, not just a bike track for speeding cyclists.

"The needs of other users - children, pedestrians, those on mobility scooters - needs to be considered."

Linda said the more controversial section of the Rhyll path, through the Rhyll town, was still under discussion between Rhyll residents and the shire, with a

February to iron out issues.

"There are some markings on the ground for the proposed pathway and it's not what we thought had been agreed upon.

"It's in a different area than what we had anticipated," she said.

"So we still have concerns and we will see what comes out of the meeting later this month."

Bass Coast Mayor Clare Le Serve said the latest round of works would allow users safer and better access to the trail, and would complement the \$326,000 upgrade of the Cowes-Rhyll Road pathway funded by the council in 2020.

"These works will offer greater access for trail users to enjoy the trail and spectacular views of the coastline and Phillip Island.'

The Victorian Government has supported the project with \$416,000 for the upgrades through Regional Development Victoria.

A close call at Kilcunda

On Monday, he reiterated the warning.

"We are extremely concerned about the number of drownings we are seeing across the Victorian coastline and in inland waterways," he said.

"To date this summer, we have seen 22 drownings. That is far too many. Many of those are preventable and avoidable. This weekend alone we have seen significant incidents.

"People are attending unpatrolled locations in the first instance and aren't getting advice from lifesavers that are on the beaches. They are perhaps not aware of their own abilities when they are heading into those dangerous conditions.

"Rescue is the last resort. People can do a lot more by heeding the safety advice before they even get to that situation."

Unheeded

It appears the warnings continue to go unheeded and local surfers have raised concerns about the lack of awareness from beach goers.

Surfer Bernie Huigsloot said he guided two beginner surfers out of a rip near Surfies Point on Sunday (see separate story), while another told the Advertiser that on Saturday, a group of young children were being swept under in the strong rip at the small bay beside Surfies Point.

"The parents were up the beach approximately 80 metres away and ran down fully clothed," they said.



It appears the warnings continue to
go unheeded and local surfers haveFollowing a fatal drowning at this location, and of four people at Forrest Caves last month,
three people were pulled from the surf at Kilcunda on Sunday afternoon (February 4).

"One parent managed to swim out in bathers and get them to the rocks. A young girl's head was going under.

"They were a group that included local mums with their kids aged around eight to 10.

"I couldn't believe they didn't read the rip, knowing they are regular beach goers.

"I witnessed it from the top of cliff while my son surfed. "I ran down the stairs to assist but luckily they didn't need it.

"My friends and I have saved many swimmers this summer, even if just from warnings before they reach the water, and some in the surf already in trouble," they said.

"More needs to be done at a government, immigration and school level.

"Our locals and emergency service have seen too many such incidents."

There's a sense of déjà vu amongst the island community and local surfers as calls continue for improved beach safety signage.

Back in 2019, after two men drowned on Christmas Eve at the Colonnades in Cape Woolamai, suggested improvements included car parks locked to the public and black flags hoisted on days of dangerous swell, improved signage, as well as shock TAC-style advertisements depicting the dangers of surf.

In 2019, a 45-year-old father and his 20-year-old son from Cranbourne East were standing in the water at the unpatrolled Colonnades beach, when they were knocked down and dragged out by a big wave.

At the time, the Advertiser reported the event left lifesavers at Woolamai Beach Surf Lifesaving Club (WBSLSC) traumatised, with 20 members responding to the incident on the day, and the club confirming many had sought counselling.

The circumstances are tragically similar to the most recent deaths at Forrest Caves, where the four people were reportedly wading in the water before being swept out. After the 2019 drownings, surfer Tony Ringrose suggested that hardto-miss warning signs – similar to those found on Hawaii's North Shore - be erected. "Cape Woolamai rips makes Bondi Rescue look weak and boring. It's one of the most rip-effected beaches in our state and great for surfing, but not swimming," Tony said. "Signs needs to be put up on beaches not patrolled by surf lifesavers, such as Forrest Caves." Representatives from WBSLSC and the local police agreed social media could be better used to warn visitors of the dangers at local beaches.

The 2018 Coastal Risk Assessment

This week, LSV confirmed that between July 1 2023 and February 4 2024 there had already been 32 fatal drownings and 22 since the start of December.

Graham Jolly, former treasurer of the now disbanded Bass Coast Ratepayers and Residents Association has been calling for the public release of the blackspot report for years.

He says the local community must have a say about the report, and authorities should listen to the public's ideas on safety improvements, especially from the surfing community.

He suggests a citizen led approach to the report's recommendation that the beach signage be regularly monitored and maintained.

"It would be good if the community as a whole were asked to go to each beach entry and the last point before putting a foot on the sand, and photograph all beach safety signage," Graham said.

He also criticised the Beachsafe app, saying it needed to be revised "especially in other languages".

Calls from the community for improved beach safety signage continue in the wake of the four drownings at Forrest Caves last month.

As reported in last week's Advertiser, the long-awaited signage upgrades, recommended in a 2018 Blackspot Risk Assessment Report, are yet to appear

According to Phillip Island Nature Parks, the updated signage of its beaches is due to be rolled out in the coming months.

Bass Coast Shire Council is yet to confirm what has been organised for shire managed beaches.

Local surfer Bernie Huigsloot believes current beach signage on the island is inadequate.

"We need much larger signs at every access point to the surf side of the island," he said.

"People need to be educated at point of entry with big signs you have to walk around or duck under ... and in animated form for the non-English speaking tourists."

Like most island surfers, Bernie has witnessed many rescues and has himself helped people who have got into trouble at local beaches.

Last weekend he guided two beginner surfers out of a rip near Surfies Point.

dent was unfolding. "I was at the Colonnades,

and there were four boys, all schoolies age, swimming in front of the steps. "These users all in third

"They were all in thigh deep water before being swept out by a wave and in over their heads.

"The surf was big and unruly; no surfers were in the water. It was sunny, a long weekend and no lifesavers on patrol.

"I waited on the shoreline until they all made it to safety. It was a close call, all were exhausted. They had no idea of the danger."

A comprehensive education campaign about the dangers of water safety is needed, he said.

He recalls a day at Smiths Beach, where a strong rip developed. and he pulled between eight and 10 people out of the water, even though he had tried to warn people not to enter the water.

"In a rip, people panic and swim towards the calm water, which is the rip.

"They see these big waves and that looks like danger, but that's what will get them back to shore."

He has called on the council to fix the signage at the local beaches.

"Forget about what looks good, or harms tourism.

"The signs need to be big and grab people's attention. And they need to stand on their own. Don't attach a dog sign to it," he said. He said signage like the "King Waves Kill" signs on the WA coast at Carnavon deliver a strong message and have become quasi-attractions in their own right and Instagram famous. He also thinks a system of warnings on days of dangerous swell should be developed for all the ocean beaches. "It might be beneficial for the shire to go to some of those beaches (that are not patrolled) and put signs out on the day, that say 'beach closed for swimming', or 'dangerous day'," he suggested.

for Bass Coast – the Blackspot project, assessed 48 beaches across the shire.

The report said although Bass Coast was the fourth largest local government area in terms of the length of coastline, it is "the second highest of 23 LGAs in terms of fatal drowning events".

Between July 1, 2000 and June 30, 2016 there were 29 coastline deaths the report stated.

Bass Coast also represented 15 per cent of all rescues in the state from eight lifesaving patrol seasons between 2007-2015.

The report bluntly stated the drowning risk within Bass Coast was 37 per cent higher than state-wide figures.

He believes a warning sign is needed at the caves, as well as at the beach entries to Forrest Caves.

Last week Phillip Island Nature Parks said new signage would be rolled out in the coming months, following the coastal risk assessment.

Bass Coast Shire Council did not respond to a request to confirm if new signage had been organised for the beaches it manages, or a timeline for rollout.

The report recommended a shirewide approach to beach safety signage. ence and were paddling against the rip going backwards. I had to show them paddling across it to get out and finally making it back to shore."





History of the Challenge

When the Woolamai Beach Surf Life Saving Club ran the first Channel Challenge in 1986 there were only 57 competitors who were willing to brave that first crossing from the mainland to Newhaven and then back over the bridge to the San Remo Hotel.

This weekend, competitors line up for the 38th event, with over 600 people expected to take part.

The inspiration for the challenge came from the late Lyall Williams from the San Remo Hotel as a way to raise funds for the surf club. The response from the local community was amazing.

Service organisations, council and members of the community all pitched in to help and are still doing it.

The original winner of the male section was the late Michael Gordon (former editor and leading political commentator at The Age) while the original female winner. Katie Peart. was a Woolamai lifesaver who became a journalist with the Herald-Sun.

and has grown into a contest that on three occasions has featured more than six hundred competitors and over five thousand spectators lining the jetty, the bridge and the foreshore.

Over the years we have seen many elite Triathletes, AFL footballers, Olympic and Commonwealth Games competitors, politicians and of course a bevy of local identities enjoy their day at San Remo.

In 2010, the Channel Challenge celebrated its 25th anniversary, with over 600 competitors.

Both of the 1986 winners were at the event, while two locals, Brian Dallinger and Geoff Daff completed a clean sweep of all 25 events and along with Michael Gordon and Katie Peart, were presented with commemorative medallions.

Sadly, Michael Gordon, always a strong supporter of local biathlon events, died of a heart attack while competing in the Cowes Classic in 2018.

been some serious athletes win the Channel Challenge and the honour roll includes several multiple winners - marathon swimmer Jon Van Wisse, plus leading Grand Prix triathletes Tim Bentley, Bryce Quirk, Robert Harris and most recently Marcel Walkington.

In 2006 several overseas competitors here for the Commonwealth Games entered the Challenge and that year New Zealander Kris Gemmel prevailed over a very hot field while the female division was won by Scottish triathlete Kerry Lang.

However there is no doubt the Queen of the Channel Challenge is Penny Reid (nee O'Connell) who won the female section of the race fourteen times. Penny has also won the Lorne and Portsea ocean swims and has represented Australia at the international level.

In 2019, for the first time in its history the event was cancelled due to weather conditions and was rescheduled for March.

tracted 453 competitors, including 62 people who were part of the 31 relay teams who completed the race

In 2021 the event was cancelled due to Covid.

Everyone was excited for the race return in 2022, and the 36th Channel Challenge ran on February 19, 2022. The conditions were perfect with approximately 500 competitors and 34 teams in the relay category.

The event was won by Australian triathlete Callum McClusky, who finished in 11 minutes and four seconds, only 14 seconds outside Bryce Quirk's record.

Callum beat another leading triathlete with Olympic aspirations, 18-year-old Tristan Price, by 42 seconds.

Just behind them was Emma Jeffcoat, who had represented Australia in the Triathlon event at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

Callum and Emma were part of a team of

elite Australian Triathletes who came to San Remo for the event.

The first junior male across the finish line was Ryan McKenzie with a smart time of 13.55.

Ryan is the grandson of an original WBSLSC member, Ron Stephens, who was helping out in the race centre.

Drama

In 2023 the event took a dramatic turn when the race, originally scheduled for February 4 was cancelled the night before, due to a forecast for high winds and dangerous water conditions.

Initially organisers decided to reschedule the event for the end of the year - on the first Saturday in December, as there were no suitable dates and tides available for the remainder of the summer.

However after meeting with the committee and discussing with competitors, the overwhelming majority were in favour of rescheduling the event for March 11.

Although it was the first day of the long weekend and not ideal, the rescheduled event was described as "no frills" with no market or tug-of-war taking place.

It ran without a hitch, on a sunny autumn day with a light breeze.

There was a record number of entries - 640 - but not that many took to the water. Some of the original competitors were not able to make the new date, but donated their entry fee to the WBSLSC.

Top ranking competitors Callum McClusky and Emma Jeffcoat were the fastest male and female competitors across the water and both went on to win their respective divisions and repeat their victories of the previous year.

Justin Tilley, a local O/40 competitor was the fourth fastest competitor overall while a local youngster, Callum McLeod, also beat home all visiting and local competitors in the Junior Male category.

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

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

A gripping historical thriller

MOVIE

The Phillip Island Movie Club (PIMC) presents "Caravaggio's Shadow" on Wednesday, February 14 at Berninneit, commencing at 7pm.

The 2022 Italian film is directed by Michele Placedo who also stars as Cardinal del Monte.

Caravaggio was a 16th Century painter and regarded as one of the most prominent Italian artists of his generation with his realistic depiction of the human form.

His work was a huge influence on Baroque painting. Caravaggio used prostitutes, beggars and thieves as his models, transforming prostitutes into the Virgin Mary and thieves into saints on his canvas and this earned him the ire of the Catholic Church.

Caravaggio (played here by Riccardo Scamarcio) had earlier been involved in a street brawl with Tomassoni, the gang-

ster son of a wealthy family. Caravaggio was forced to flee Rome after Tomassoni died. He gained temporary sanctuary in Naples, while he hoped for a Papal Pardon.

However, Pope Paul V decided to investigate the painter and the rumours concerning his debauched lifestyle to see if he was deserving of such treatment. He sent a papal inquisitor (Louis Garrel), known simply as Ombra (the shadow) to question some of his patrons and those who knew him best. This included the Marquessa Colonna (Isabelle Huppert) who had first offered him shelter when he fled to Naples and patron and art collector the Cardinal del Monte (Michele Placedo).

Caravaggio died under mysterious circumstances in Tuscany in 1610, but this film offers up a plausible solution to that.

Placedo has wanted to make this film for 50 years and uses a non-linear nar-

rative structure that jumps back and forth in time to reveal his story and this may be difficult for those who do not know Caravaggio's work. It is a complex time in the history of the church and the film explores this making for a gripping historical thriller.

The PIMC will provide a drink and popcorn prior to the film, starting at 6.15pm

Ronnie celebrates his family's prominent past

FAMILY HISTORY

Sometimes seen sporting a colourful bowtie in Bass Coast Shire council meetings, Ronnie Bauer arguably has something of a theatrical flair.

But it was only on a recent trip to Germany – which he describes as "10 days that shook my world" – that Ronnie came to understand how deep his theatrical roots run.

The trip revealed just why his grandfather's work has been celebrated in film, and sung by the renowned Three Tenors and at the soccer World Cup when Germany hosted in 2006.

"I knew some of my family's history but not to the extent that I discovered on this trip," Ronnie says, comparing the trip to an episode of the SBS genealogy series "Who Do You Think You Are".

Ronnie says even as a boy he knew his family's history was unusual.

His grandfather Ludwig Herzer was a librettist in Germany, writing text for operas.

Ludwig's most famous piece was Yours is My Heart's Delight from The Land of Smiles, sung at the World Cup, which also featured in the 2000 war film U-571 and has been performed by the Three Tenors, while Ludwig worked with renowned composers Franz Lehar and Joseph Beer.

"In Australia few people know his songs, but in western Europe and especially in the Germanspeaking world he and his work are well known," Ronnie says.

"I have the piano that belonged to my grandparents, bought out from Austria after the war, on which Ludwig composed operettas and it's thanks to that piano that nearly everything I own can be traced back, because of royalties."

War

Ronnie says while Ludwig died just before the outbreak of World War II, his wife (and Ronnie's grandmother) Ella was trapped in Austria, a highly dangerous place at the time for a Jew.

"She was kept safe because her friend (Sophie, the wife of Franz Lehar) was having an affair with the brother of Hermann Goring (the powerful Nazi leader)."

Ronnie's mother Henny was 21 when the war started, at the time working as a producer/director in Vienna, and she fled to Switzer-

land for safety.

Henny then travelled to Shanghai, where she worked as a nurse in a refugee hospital for 11 years.

"In Shanghai my mother met my father Peter Bauer – who was also from Vienna – and in 1949 they came to Australia, where dad worked as an architect.

"My mother was even part of Steven Spielberg's Shoa Foundation project, recorded to capture stories from survivors of the Holocaust."

Discovery

Ronnie's mother passed away in 2004 and it was while he was sorting through her belongings he discovered manuscripts and memorabilia dating back to his grandfather's pre-war compositions.

"It was in German and I couldn't read it, so pointless hanging on to it. I sent six big boxes to the Franz Lehar museum in Austria."

Those big boxes opened doors that have only now come to fruition.

Through that contact, a book on the life of Ludwig Herzer was recently published, with a performance of one of his operettas having a premier in Germany in mid-December, which Ronnie travelled to attend.

"It was a big deal in Germany. I was interviewed by the media and it won a prestigious operatic prize."

Ronnie then travelled to Vienna where another performance of his grandfather's plays was being held. It was through contacts he

met then that a whole new world opened up.

"I was invited to visit a theatre museum and I walked in and

a life-size cutout of my mother greeted me. I was in total shock and very emotional.

"Imagine walking into a museum and your mother greets you after 20 years.

"It turns out mum was the first female to graduate from a major theatre school in Vienna as a producer and director and she is now revered as the pioneer of Austrian theatre like Amelia Earhart in aviation.

"She never spoke about it so I didn't realise how highly she was regarded.

"But the story gets better."

New relatives

Ronnie says he had always believed he was the only child of an only child (his mother), of an only child (his grandfather).


But on his December trip to Germany, he discovered Ludwig had a sister who was a piano child prodigy and married a man esteemed in theatre.

"I found out I had all these relations I'd never heard of but then I discovered my great uncle died in a concentration camp and my great auntie fled to America where she died without having children.

"The whole trip felt surreal because of all the unexpected twists that popped up."

Ronnie says he'll hopefully return to Austria for the reopening of the refurbished Lehar museum that celebrates his family's musical legacy.

"Nothing would make me prouder than to have one of Ludwig's operettas performed at Berninneit one day."

Previously he was priest at the Holy Monastery of Panagia Kamariani in Red Hill, but was last year "let go" by the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of Australia (GOAA) for a series of controversial opinions.

He is best known for the traditional Blessing of the Waters ceremony in Rye each year, which sees thousands of local Greeks turn up to show their support.
