Lull in cruise ships visiting Phillip Island

TOURISM

The number of cruise ships visiting Phillip Island drops to just three in 2025/26 but will increase to seven the following year, a cruise ship industry forum was told last week.

Representatives of Australia's major cruise operators spoke last Monday at the Penguin Parade's visitor centre, with the forum told there was a current lull in the industry, after a peak in 2023/24.

The forum heard anticipated visits by cruise ships to the island in the next year are: December 23 Noordam; January 1, 2026 Seven Seas Explorer; and April 4, 2026, Carnival Adventure.

Destination Phillip Island's Kim Storey told attendees given the cruise season ran from October to April, the current "quiet time" should be used to "refresh the offering" of Phillip Island's attractions for cruise ship itineraries.

"We will think about what we can do over the coming months and years because your programs are years out," she said.

"We are keen to work with you to improve itineraries.

"We want to expand the number of offerings and customise to demographics and ship passengers' profiles. We have a range of boutique experiences that could create some very attractive shore excursions.

"We will be working with industry and the shore excursion companies to explore the various opportunities."

The forum did not hear about the Victorian government's decision to raise Melbourne port fees by 15 per cent in 2023, the equivalent of about \$4 per passenger, which industry insiders say has had a flow-on impact to the sector.

Kim told the Advertiser the fee was having "somewhat" of an impact on the number of cruise ships visiting, in addition to global issues, such as the Middle East crisis.

Lull Matthew McKeown from Carnival told the forum Princess Shore Excursions showed Phillip Island had the highest passenger rating satisfaction score for Australia and New Zealand.

Visit Victoria's Chris White said there was a "dip this year" after a previous "big season", while the State Government was currently creating the Victorian Cruise Strategy to boost the sector. Australian Cruise Association CEO Jill Abel told the forum in 23/24, 151 cruise ships visited Victoria, the second lowest only to South Australia's 88. The highest was Queensland at 464.

Jill said globally there was confidence in the industry, with 77 new ships on order to be built by 2035, each costing about \$1 billion.

"Globally the sector is forecasting there will be 42 million passengers to cruise in 2026, with cruisers average age 46," Jill said

The average passenger spend per day was \$455, with global trends for food and agritourism products and shore excursions for multi-generational groups.

In March this year, P&O Cruises Australia ceased operations and folded into Carnival Cruise Lines.

"We have a big task in Australia to make sure growth can happen and that requires infrastructure investment," she said, adding the industry was conscious of their environmental footprint.

As reported last year, Rhyll jetty will undergo a multi-million-dollar upgrade – which is yet to be funded – including a new pontoon and a wider landing zone for cruise ship passengers.

In recent years Phillip Island residents have raised concerns about the environmental impact of cruise ships in Western Port, which is Ramsar listed.

Western Port Biosphere Foundation CEO Mel Barker told the Advertiser given the international significance of Western Port – recognised through both its Ramsar status and UNESCO Biosphere Reserve designation – there was "a need for a very high standard of processes and controls to minimise the risk to the marine environment".

Risks can include things like introduction of marine pests or an oil spill, Mel said.

Development crane to farewell Cowes

MAJOR PROJECTS

The developers of a \$40 million apartment complex – whose crane has dominated the Cowes' skyline for several years – say the development is slated for completion in late 2025.

S&D Property's residential project "Atrium on Phillip Island", at 46-48 Chapel Street, received council approval in 2016, after the developers bought two blocks of residential land in 2015.

S&D Property co-founder Steve Boutros said once finished there will be 46 predominantly three-bedroom apartments and a handful of multi-level fourbedroom penthouses with gardens.

Designed by Petridis Architects, and constructed by Loumain, each apartment features open plan living and dining, and various balcony and courtyard arrangements, with an atrium in the centre of the building.

Of the 46 units, 15 have been sold, with the intention to sell about five more and hold the balance as short-term accommodation. The ground floor has been designed to be retrofitted into a cafe, restaurant, or retail space.

Other developers have told the Advertiser increasing construction costs and reduced property prices on Phillip Island have tightened the development industry.

Steve said their development had been backed by Jadig Finance "when others

didn't" finance them.

"We were able to break ground in 2023 after streamlining the town planning process, achieving the funding requirement, and securing finance just a year prior in 2022." he said.

Jadig Finance managing director Adam Gringlas said they provided development finance for the project and would continue to support S&D Property with a residual stock loan on the balance of retained stock once Atrium finished this year.

The partnership between S&D Property and Jadig Finance signals a broader shift in development behaviour in Victoria as developers look to non-bank and private lenders to secure development finance for their higher risk appetite," said Adam.

When approved in 2016, the five-storey apartment building was given a permit for 44 dwellings, a café and basement carpark. The permit stated the café would be at street level and seat 40 patrons.

The permit allowed for 61 car spaces, including four for building and café staff and 57 for residents.

Café and apartment visitors would park on the street, with the permit seeking a reduction in patron parking requirements.

"Based on our experience with similar developments across Victoria and understanding Cowes and associated strategies and policies, it is submitted that this car parking arrangement is appropriate," stated the permit at the time.

San Remo food relief continues to grow

Nearly four months after opening its doors, San Remo's grassroots emergency food relief initiative is quietly making a big difference - offering not just groceries, but dignity and a sense of belonging to those in need.

Wednesday Every morning, between 10am and 1.30pm, the back room of St Augustine's Anglican Church Op Shop on Marine Parade hums with activity.

Locals who arrive are greeted with a smile, and guided to shelves stocked with basics: pasta, cereal, long-life milk, toiletries, snacks, pet food, and, more recently, fresh bread, thanks to the generosity of Beachside Bakery.

The initiative is run by San Remo residents Samiro Douglas and Jane Ross, who are both deeply committed to supporting the community.

"This is guilt-free food," says Jane.

"There are no criteria, and the only questions we ask are how many people are in the household and if there are children. That helps us guide people to the items they might need.

We supply bags, but if people bring their own, that's helpful," she adds.

While San Remo Food Relief operates independently and is not part of PICAL (Phillip Island Community and Learning Centre), the two groups have a strong working relationship. Through this partnership, San Remo Food Relief is able to purchase groceries at minimal cost via Foodbank, which ensures the service can continue to offer affordable, essential

The wait is over – it's time to lodge

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) is advising it is time to lodge, as most taxpayers with simple affairs will now have their information pre-filled into their accounts.

Assistant Commissioner Rob Thomson said that the ATO had completed pre-fill of over 91 million pieces of information available for individual tax returns from employers, banks, government agencies and private health insurers.

"You've been patiently waiting, but now you're good to go. Whether you lodge using a registered tax agent or lodge yourself through myTax, pre-fill information will now be available," Mr Thomson said.

Taxpayers should check the pre-filled data to ensure accuracy, add anything that may be missing and then include any deductions they are entitled to claim.

"Don't forget that you need to include all sources of income in your tax return. This includes side-hustles, linked income from providing ride sourcing services or selling services via an app.

"Remember, the ATO has 40 industry and occupation specific guides to assist you in what you can claim and what records are required to prove it," Mr Thomson said.

To help keep your personal information safe and protected,

the ATO's app now has powerful new safety features designed to give users real-time control over their tax affairs through alerts and instant account locking to help stop fraudsters in their tracks.

"Fraudsters are getting smarter, but so are the protective features in the app. The ATO app will send you real-time messages when changes are made to your ATO record, and you can quickly lock your account to prevent unauthorised access or fraudulent refunds.

"These features provide peace of mind knowing your account is protected and you remain in control of your tax affairs anytime, anywhere," Mr Thomson said.

The ATO app and ATO online services through myGov also allow taxpayers to see the progress of their return once they or their registered tax agent have submitted it.

"Most refunds are finalised within two weeks and this process cannot be sped up, even if you call us," Mr Thomson said.

Taxpayers have until October 31 to lodge their tax return or to get on the books of a registered tax agent, which may allow them more time to lodge.



Workers participating in the gig economy could be in for a shock tax bill this year, says Australia's largest accounting body, CPA Australia.

Income generated from sidehustles has become a major focus for the Australian Tax Office, with digital service platforms now legally required to report the income earned by their users under the Sharing Economy Reporting Regime (SERR).

CPA Australia Tax Lead Jenny Wong says anyone who has earned money through platforms such as UberEats, Airtasker, YouTube and OnlyFans and does not report and pay tax on these amounts on their tax return risks an amended return, extra tax bill and possible penalties.

"The Sharing Economy Reporting Regime is expanding this financial year, meaning the ATO will be aware of any income you have received through these types of gig economy platforms," she said.

"This brings them into line with other third parties that already provide the ATO with the data it uses to pre-fill tax returns, including banks.

"Until this year, individuals have been required to self-declare the income from their sidehustles. Now nothing will go under the radar. If you deliver food

with DoorDash, work some casual jobs through Airtasker, or make content for Patreon, You-Tube or OnlyFans, these sites are now reporting your earnings to the tax office.

These rules apply to a broad range of services, not just the most well-known. If you use a website to rent out a car parking space or your designer handbag, this income will be recorded, and you'll need to pay tax."

Ms Wong says individuals who have enjoyed a strong year of earning activity through sites such as YouTube and OnlyFans could be in for the biggest shock.

She also reminds influencers specifically of their obligations to declare any gifts and gratuities received as a form of payment.

"You must pay tax on income you earn above the tax-free threshold of \$18,200," she said.

"So, if you've had a successful year earning money through advertising revenue and streaming subscriptions, as well as through gifts and gratuities, the ATO will be expecting you to cough up. Yes, this even includes free cars, holidays, clothes and anything else you're lucky enough to receive as a form of payment.

"Depending on how much you've earned during the year, this could be a significant amount, maybe even tens of thousands of dollars."

Ms Wong says the expansion of the SERR helps resolve the ATO's challenge of dealing with the gig economy and ensuring that Australians fulfil their tax obligations. The data-matching regime started in July 2023 with platforms such as Airbnb, but has now expanded to include a much broader range of activities, like content creators.

"The current level of tax compliance from digital economy users has largely been a mystery," she said.

"Though people might not consider earnings from digital platforms as income in the same way as their regular job, it is all viewed the same way by the ATO. Chances are that many people have simply not been declaring this income at tax time. That all changes now."

CPA Australia's tips for gig economy workers:

• Declare all income: Ensure that all earnings are reported in your tax return, regardless of the amount or frequency. This includes gifts and gratuities.

• Maintain accurate records: Keep detailed records of income and expenses to support

your deduction claims.Understand your obligations: Familiarise yourself with your tax requirements, including ABN registration and GST obligations if applicable. • Seek professional advice: Consider consulting a professional tax agent to navigate your tax affairs and ensure compliance.

What expenses can gig economy workers claim?

Australians working in the gig economy may be entitled to claim some work-related expenses, but only if they are directly linked to the income they've earned, they have not been reimbursed, and they have a proof of the purchase. Examples include:

- Work from home expenses: Such as phone, internet and energy costs.
- Travel costs: The cost of travel between work locations could be deductible.
- Motor vehicle expenses: Delivery drivers could claim for fuel, repairs and other expenses, but must identify the percentage used for business purposes.
- Tools of the trade: For example, a video camera, editing software and professional lighting. This must only be for business use, not private.

Planting for National Tree Day

To coincide with National Tree Day a group of volunteers from AusNet arrive to assist with a special planting day at the Phillip Island Recreation Reserve last week.

Working alongside volunteers from the Phillip Island and Bass Coast Landcare groups, the volunteers planted indigenous seedlings at the site.

Trial sites were established in July this year by Landcare, supported by AusNet funding, trialling 10 different types of revegetation.

The aim is to study the best techniques for local indigenous plant growth, with 10 separate areas, each 10m x 15m, using various planting styles.

"It was fantastic for our volunteers to work alongside the Landcare Australia team and local community members on a project to protect and restore the local indigenous vegetation," said AusNet Communications Advisor Kathy Burgstahler.

We look forward to seeing how the project progresses over the course of the three-year trial."

Wallaby proof fencing has recently been completed, and gates installed on site to give the new seedlings the best chance of surviving.

Rabbit skirting (made out of wire) is due to be installed soon.

Landcare has received \$20,000 annual funding for the next three years from an AusNet Community Landcare Grant.

The funding is being used to kickstart revegetation works in the new Phillip Island Recreation Reserve in Cowes.

When the funding was announced last June, Chairperson of Phillip Island Landcare, Carolyn Atherton, explained the group would work to revitalise the area and enhance endangered vegetation.

"We'll be working with council to guide us in planting and where we need to revegetate," Ms Atherton said. "It's going to be a long-term investment for the community down the track when the area becomes a reserve."

Ms Atherton said they had also been experimenting with bespoke fencing methods in order to stop rabbits and wallabies from destroying plants in their infancy.

"Rabbits and wallabies put a lot of stress on any native plants that have popped up. We've been trying different things that are proving quite successful in stopping the rabbits and wallabies from destroying the seedlings before they get a chance to establish."



Cypress trees, wildlife future

At the July Bass Coast Shire Council meeting, Thompson Avenue Golden Cypress group president Pauline Taylor asked if council had a policy on the protection and management of the trees in Cowes.

Council CEO Greg Box replied the Thompson Avenue Golden Cypress were protected by a heritage overlay under the Planning Scheme and feature in the council's Significant Tree Register, while council adopted a maintenance and replacement strategy in 1999.

Sue Chadwick asked if council would consider removing the remaining golden cypress storyboard from the Thompson Avenue Esplanade and relocating it to the Berninneit site.

"The storyboard is of National Trust significance, and I believe it deserves a more suitable and respected location for public viewing," Sue said.

Mr Box responded relocation of the remaining storyboard would be considered as part of the Cowes streetscape stage one project.

Sue also asked how council could nurture wildlife and prevent roadkill.

"Fast developing tourism and island urbanisation is causing conflict as to how we

can care for our native wildlife. There must be some protection for our indigenous fauna," she said.

Mr Box said council officers had worked with Phillip Island Nature Parks and the State Government on the Phillip Island Wildlife Plan.

"Council recognises that the natural environment of Bass Coast is valued by residents and visitors alike," he said.

Bridge demolition

Councillors have voted for the Kilcunda Viaduct Bridge – on the land side of Kilcunda – to be demolished.

Officers told the July council meeting the bridge had partially collapsed and was currently fenced off because of public safety concerns and "risks of further collapse".

"Whilst many residents are urging council to preserve the bridge for local history and heritage reasons, the bridge has failed and is beyond preservation," officers said.

They said the bridge had not been maintained since the closure of the rail service in 1978.

Demolition will cost \$32,000, compared to \$27,000 for a fence to be installed around the bridge, or \$54,000 to \$65,000 for restoration.

Director of the Alliance for Journalists' Freedom – inspired by his detention.

"The Egyptians tried to take my voice away and tried to silence journalism." Speaking out, and telling his story "is a way of saying screw you" to the Egyptian government he said. "Retelling (the story) weaponises it in my favour."

Paul Bangay – Changing fashions in gardening

There were a lot of gardeners on the island keen to hear the thoughts of leading landscape designer Paul Bangay. In conversation with Story Gatherers' Sue Hines, Bangay spoke of his childhood, his parents rewilding land near Wilsons Prom back in the 60s, and where his love of gardening came from.

As well as sharing the story of how he created his own gardens, and some of his favourite gardens across the globe, he had some good tips for the backyard gardener. "A garden is not a hospital," he said about choosing plants for your garden. "Give it a year, if it doesn't work, then throw it out."

Ann Jones – What the duck?

Speaking with Phillip Island Nature Parks' Paula Wasiak,

ABC's "nature nerd" Ann Jones kept the audience entertained with her tales of the strange and wonderful behaviour of animals. Describing herself as a "professional dork", Ann admitted radio (or audio) was her favourite medium, as it gave the audience the space to imagine and insert themselves.

Her tales included gay male swans in Perth, all-female gecko populations and mating rituals of dung beetles. No one in the audience will ever look at an alpaca in the same light after Ann's description of their (very) lengthy and slightly gruesome mating habits. "Sorry to anyone who has their alpaca jumper on today," she joked. There was also a gasp from the audience when she said local wallabies eat bird carcasses.

Kon and Sia Karapanagiotidis and Jordana Silverstein – Food: much more than a meal

The role of food in maintaining culture and breaking down barriers was the theme of this session, and gave the audience plenty of food for thought. They directly addressed the situation in Gaza, where Kon said the Israeli Government "was using food as a weapon war". As the child of holocaust survivors, Jordana spoke of a "collective fight for justice", saying at the moment, "the Palestinian are the most oppressed" and are also dealing with wide-spread and institutional racism that is not being addressed. "What Israel is doing is bad for everyone," she said.

Sia spoke of her experience being a migrant in Australia and the importance of food for family and community, saying she had cooked every day for the last 55 years, because she loved it. "Always cooking is an act of love."

Kon, who founded the Asylum Seekers Resource Centre, said we must not lose our collective humanity, with the day's session focused on the "power of food and storytellers, and the way the community can fight back". "Keep your hearts open, your minds curious and always be kind," he said. "We don't need higher walls; we need longer tables."

Judy Horacek – It's easy being green

Cartoonist and illustrator Judy Horacek shared her cartoons and thoughts on "being green", including "Where is the green sheep", the book she wrote with Mem Fox, which she described as a "magnificent success". She

It was an early start for literary lovers on Sunday, with the Festival of Stories back at Berninneit at 9.30am.

The day's MC Brian Nankervis expertly kept the crowd entertained and enthused, as well as amused, getting people to link arms and sing along to get the festival started.

Gideon Haigh and Michelle Lesh with Foong Ling Kong - The price of love

It was a serious start to the day, as the two authors spoke of their memoirs; Gideon of his brother Jaz, and Michelle's work to ensure her late husband's book was published after his death.

Gideon's book was written decades after his younger brother Jasper died, at the age of 17, in a car accident in 1987. Michelle was in the early stages of grief when she edited her husband Mark Raphael Baker's memoir "A Season of Death", written af-ter his diagnosis with terminal pancreatic cancer.

Both spoke of the incalculable loss and what the writing process meant for them, coming to terms with that loss and their own grief. "Mark's voice is palpable in the book; it was a way for him to be with me after he died," said Michelle. For Gideon, who had "an aversion to self-enquiry", writing the book brought conflicting feelings, unlocked memories, and prompted conversations with

The popularity of crime novels with women was due, in part, because "we live in a society where we feel less safe than men do," said Jane, explaining it was a way to work through "the worst things that we can imagine happening to us".

Both women agreed the rise of the female detective reflects women's desire to see a woman be "the one that brings the bad guy to justice".

Peter Lalor and Gideon Haigh – From Murdoch to the new media

Bringing their free-ranging podcast Cricket et al to the stage on the media. "It broke the busi-ness model. Advertisers went, and with them, so did trust," said Peter. "Newsrooms have become ghost towns."

The pair, described by Peter's mother as "two cheeks of the same arse", said their podcast was more fun than they ever had in journalism, due in part to the relationship they've developed with their audience. Analytics, algorithms, Murdoch and Donald Trump were all discussed. And while they admitted the new media landscape has been good for them (with their 10,000+ subscribers), they don't see it as a positive. "I think we are losing something through this fracturing of the media environment," Peter said, where culture wars had "become a business model".

Alice Zaslavsky In Praise of Veg

The author, radio and TV presenter and chef, talked with Brian Nankervis, for a lively session covering her career and approach to good food and cooking. Both former teachers, Alice said her time in the classroom enabled her to "convey information in a concise, clear way". She talked about her childhood in Georgia, the love of food nurtured by her parents and grandparents, and the thrill of eating tropical fruit on their move to Australia. Paradoxically, her move from teaching started as a desire to inspire her students to join her "Food and do the course". She finished the session gifting the audience an easy mid-week recipe - a four cheese gnocchi cauliflower bake.

Beau Vernon Olympic-sized dreams

Journalist Peter Lalor talked with Phillip Island's Beau Vernon, about his life in sport - before and after his accident in 2012. They discussed the importance of the local football club, in Beau's life and in local communities more generally, with Beau saying part of his motivation to make the most of his life, was his way of thanking the people who had supported him. Alongside his football coaching victories, sits his personal sporting high point - winning bronze at the Paralympics. "It was a highlight representing my country in front of my kids," Beau said. And the closing ceremony was another; "there were 70,000 cheering for all these people who had disabilities; celebrating their strengths".

He believes he is a better man now than he was before the accident which left him paralysed from the chest down. "The hardest times are where you have the greatest growth. Everyone faces adversity. It's the way you deal with it; it's how you look at it that determines the outcomes."

The festival concluded with everyone enjoying an excellent afternoon tea thanks to the baking skills of the Phillip Island CWA Twilight Group. Story Gatherers' President Lois Gaskin said the success of this year's event guaranteed they'd

A new space – for bank and the community

The Bendigo Community Bank in San Remo officially moved into a new and more spacious building last week, marking a significant milestone for both the bank and the local community.

Former islander Sam Docherty retires from the AFL

Former Phillip Island footballer and Carlton player Sam Docherty last week announced his retirement from the game, with his team acknowledging he is "loved and respected not only by the Carlton faithful, but the entire AFL industry".

Sam played his 184th and final AFL game last Thursday night at the MCG against the Hawks but the former skipper will be acknowledged with a tribute at the club's next home game against the Gold Coast Suns on August 9.

Coincidentally his mum Annabel, who lives in Cowes, retired a week before Sam and last week said she looked forward to the next chapter in the family's life.

"I'm excited for the future and spending more time with the family," Annabel said of Sam's wife Nat, two children Ruby and Myles, as well as her son Josh, his partner Jess, who have Kai and another grandchild on the way.

In his career, Sam, who left the island at the age of 18, has suffered three ACL injuries, as well as recovering from testicular cancer in 2022, which had spread to his lymph nodes, lungs and stomach, and required 12 weeks of chemotherapy.

In 2013 Sam had just joined Carlton and was at a camp in Arizona when he received a phone call telling him his dad, Eddie – an island premiership player, a coach of multiple teams, and a Phillip Island Football Club life member – had passed away.

National media described Sam, saying his "endless kicks in the guts show us the power of overcoming adversity".

Nicholls Medallist in 2016, received All-Australian honours in 2017 before stepping up alongside mate Patrick Cripps in 2018 to take over the captaincy until 2022.

After playing every game for the Blues in 2016 and 2017, Sam was sidelined for the next two seasons after undergoing backto-back ACL reconstructions.

He returned in 2020 to play but was then diagnosed with cancer, which saw him undergo multiple surgeries and chemotherapy treatment. His teammates and countless supporters shaved their heads, raising \$219,000 for the Peter Mac Cancer Foundation, an organisation where he became an observer to the board and subsequently raised nearly \$700,000 in two years. tive which helps vulnerable children get back into the classroom through the support of therapy dogs.

His off-field work earned him the Jim Stynes Community Leadership Award in 2023.

"When I was a kid my entire family used to climb into a van and drive from Phillip Island to the MCG for Round 1 every year," Sam said last week.

"For me to get the chance to go on and play in those games, and also captain the club that I grew up supporting – I can honestly


