But it hasn't been clear sailing for local business, with many reporting big losses from the snap lockdown, plus the stress of policing the new QR check in and ID requirements as restrictions ease.

## D checks add to business Covid pa

been hit by a triple whammy, not only losing income from the latest COVID-19 lockdown, but also losses from the upcoming long weekend.

And, they say, they risk facing hostile customers to enforce the state government's mandated ID checks which ensure no Melbourne visitors to rural Victoria – or get slapped with a fine of almost \$10,000.

Last week the Phillip Island Business Network announced they would hold a subsidised Working with Aggressive and Challenging Behaviours workshop on June 23 and 24, to help businesses with irate customers.

Since the easing of restrictions in rural Victoria last Friday, Melbourne residents were not allowed to travel to the regions, including over the com-

ing Queen's Birthday long weekend. den Brink urged visitors "to please help" and comply with regulations.

"Business cannot afford the fines

on them," said Robert, adding he had been vaccinated, with the roll-out critical to get the economy back.

"The hardest part of the QR/ID system is having to deal with people not wanting to comply.

"We are at the frontline and have to bear the brunt of people's frustration and rudeness.'

He said while most customers complied, a few refused and took "their frustrations out on the staff".

"We do not accept this and ask the people to leave. We have absolutely lost business because of our "no details no service policy." It's not worth risking the safety of others and the fine not to comply.'

Robert said desni nimise food wastage with the snap lockdown announcement, they had Cheeky Goose owner Robert van nonetheless lost thousands of dollars and regional businesses should be eligible for grant money.

"We tried to cancel whatever we

Local businesses say they have of up to \$9913 that can be imposed could. But what do you do? Having to prepare the place for a shutdown, trying to find income to pay wages, calling a full book of reservations to cancel and possibly rebook is never an easy task.

"The fourth lockdown and it's a task not getting easier with practice."

San Remo Fisherman's Co-op manager Paul Mannix said while they were excited to again open their retail shop, they "immediately encountered problems and confusion" when asking for IDs and travel permits.

We have had metro residents saying they have a holiday house here and demand to dine in," Paul said.

"Regional residents were annoved we have asked them for proof of residence and then walked out. Others have claimed they have lost their permits.

"When we have refused service with no ID customers get irate."

Paul said they were forced to reassess and had to quickly adapt, closing seated service.

"Our answer for the moment is to remain closed until June 11. keep serving our customers, but for now it is takeaway only for everyone."

#### Accommodation

Kaloha caravan park owner Michael Coghlan said they were forced to cancel all bookings for the lockdown, with a total loss of about \$10,000, not including the subsequent weekend and the Queen's Birthday.

"So far bookings for guests from regional Victoria are very slow coming through. I think people are a bit hesitant to book anything due to possible lockdown extensions," Michael said.

He said staff were checking guests' address and would be asking for proof of address such as drivers' licence on arrival

"Hopefully guests will be happy to oblige with this," he added.

Larson Henderson, owner of The Island Accommodation at Newhaven, said he had been forced to cancel 95 per cent of bookings and so would

"It simply isn't viable to stay open with a small prospect of new bookings from regional residents travelling, which is basically our only source of income or potential clients, Larson said, questioning why Victoria needed four lockdowns.

He said their group bookings had a lead time of at least three weeks, so the one-week lockdown would take them up to six weeks to recover "in any meaningful way'

Larson commented that \$2500 of government support was "like a band aid" and it was disappointing regional Victoria was excluded from further funding.

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# Aquatic drop in sessions changed

Due to the latest COVID-19 restrictions, Bass Coast Shire Council has made some changes to the upcoming drop-in sessions on the Bass Coast and Phillip Island aquatic and leisure centre feasibility studies and concept plans.

The session planned for Wednesday, June 9 at the Phillip Island Leisure Centre will now be held online.

The face-to-face drop-in session at the Phillip Island Leisure Centre (10-12 Church Street) on Saturday, 12 June from 9am to 1pm will still go ahead unless further restrictions come into effect.

Bass Coast CEO, Ali Wastie said Council hoped to schedule another face-to-face date for Cowes later in the month.

'The online session was created on June 9 to allow the community to have their say during COVID-19 restrictions, as we're conscious that the community may have already set aside that time in their diaries to attend, so we still wanted to provide the opportunity on that particular day.

Council is remaining flexible and adaptable with the aquatics community consultation, and is more than happy to provide the community with different forums and more times and places to have their say," Ms Wastie said.

"We are happy to provide an extra dropin session at the Phillip Island Leisure Centre, tentatively booked for Wednesday, June 23, depending on restrictions at that time. We will inform the community of the time and date of this session once it can be confirmed.

"As I'm sure it can be appreciated, it is a difficult time to plan ahead, due to the uncertain nature of COVID-19 and the associated restrictions."

Bass Coast Shire Mayor, Cr Brett Tessari said it is important to remain flexible and adaptable through these challenging

"We want to ensure that we provide the community with the best opportunity to have their say on aquatics, as engagement with the community and stakeholders in the project is considered crucial and feedback received will be critical in shaping design and operations of both centres," Cr

And Madeline Slattery made a furry friend at the Koala Conservation Reserve before catching the famous Penguin Parade.

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
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## Smiths Beach camp delays questioned

A planned \$6 million redevelopment of the Coastal Discovery Camp at Smiths Beach has been delayed for five years because of an unnamed consumer affairs problem, according to the owner

In 2016 Bass Coast Shire issued a permit for the camp's redevelopment, which approved a two-storey, 176-bed accommodation, to replace the current 62-bed accommodation erected several decades ago.

The YMCA, which has leased the camp since 2004, was funding the development, and the then manager told the Advertiser they hoped to start building after Easter 2017, before reopening the new building in 2018.

The manager said they would continue to run camps for school children and community groups, while modernising the facility and improving the experience for guests.

However, the development has since stalled, with shire CEO Ali Wastie last week confirming a second request to extend the expiry of the planning permit was currently under consideration by the planning department, "with a decision to be determined soon".

The planning permit has previously been extended so is still valid," Ms Wastie said.

Last week Peta Gillies, executive general manager of camps at YMCA Victoria, said the Y was "fully committed" to the camp redevelopment project.

"The delay relates to a matter between Consumer Affairs Victoria and the trustee," Ms Gillies said, but not offering any further explanation.

"As soon as we have new information to share with the community we will, of course, make this our priority."

When asked about public funding for

the proposed rebuild, Ms Gillies provided no answer.

#### **Plans**

Under the 2016 planning permit, the proposed new building would measure 2886 square metres, would occupy five per cent of the 5.87ha site, with a double-storey primary accommodation building and a central function facility and sleeping wings to the east and west for 176 guests and eight staff.

The plans were designed to minimise impact on the environment and neighbouring residents, not building on the eastern boundary and not visible from Beachcomber Avenue or the YCW car

There was to be a conference facility, surf shack, a renovated staff residence, bungalow accommodation, and a multi-purpose sports pavilion with amenity block for tennis, netball, basketball, skateboarding, rock climbing and school concerts, as well as a ropes

The plan outlined two sealed carparks for 42 car spaces.

#### History

YCW is named after the Young Christian Workers movement that still owns the Phillip Island Coastal Discov-

It was the YCW Camp Committee Patriotic Fund that bought the land after World War II - founding it in about 1946 - for ex-servicemen and their families to have holidays, which is still one

of the camp's primary objectives.

The Patriotic Fund was established by Melbourne businessmen running charity events, with an annual fundraising luncheon still held each May, raising about \$7000 a year for mainte-

In the '70s YCW sold off some land, a section of foreshore, to the shire council, and another section on a headland which is now occupied by St Bede's College camp

Since 2004 the camp has been managed by the YMCA (Young Men's Christian Association), which is entirely separate from the two Phillip Island camps run by the CYC (Christian Youth Camps) at the Adventure Resort and on Church Street at The Island.

YMCA Victoria operates seven camps across Victoria, including Phil-

## **Penguin Parade Visitor** Centre wins top gong

Phillip Island's new Penguin Parade Visitor Centre has picked up another award, this time being recognised for excellence in landscape architecture.

At the 2021 Victoria Landscape Architecture Awards announced last week, Tract Consultants won the Tourism Landscape Architecture Award for their work at the Penguin Parade.

AILA recognised seven Awards of Excellence and 11 Landscape Architecture Awards across 13 categories, highlighting landscape architects that delivered above and beyond the sole purpose of the project, championing collaboration, placemaking and commitment to community.

The judges said the Penguin Parade Visitor Centre elevated the existing nature-based tourism experience to a new level

"Modernisation of the facilities goes beyond an upgrade of the building which has been informed by many years of thinking about the landscape. Policy has flowed to planning then design with the landscape architect leading this process over years of engagement with the client," the judges said.

"The building and car parks have been moved to improve visitor experiences with a clear, safe sequence of experiences. But more importantly the changes to the human experience have found a better balance with the landscape

resulting in the penguin habitat being enhanced."

The judges said the project illustrated the benefits of "considered site planning informing good design" and the end result provided environmental, cultural and economic benefits.

The new Penguin Parade Visitor Centre has refreshed an already popular destination and provides a foundation for its future success.

Phillip Island Nature Parks CEO Catherine Basterfield congratulated Tract Consultants on their award.

"We're absolutely delighted that Tract Consultants were recognised for their contribution to the successful transformation of this incredible site," she said.

"In addition to a vastly improved and more visually appealing visitor experience, their designs have allowed for the successful and almost seamless creation of habitat for up to 1400 breeding penguins in a reinvigorated and restored land-

In 2020 the new Penguin Parade Visitor Centre won two awards at the Victorian Architecture Awards, including the William Wardell Award for Public Archi-

In 2019 it took out the International Architecture Awards in the Parks and Gardens category, out of a field of 380 submissions from 41 countries

## Aged care concerns

The lack of a comprehensive vaccination program for private aged care residents and staff has meant some of the most vulnerable in the community are still not fully protected.

Previously, all the local privately run aged care facilities reported residents had been vaccinated during February.

However none of the facilities will now confirm if their residents and staff are fully vaccinated.

Neither Grossard Court or Melaleuca Aged Care responded to questions about how many of their staff or residents had been fully vaccinated.

Banfields Aged Care declined to provide any details.

"We're not currently engaging with any media at this point of time," said Olivia Romet, Marketing Manager for the Australia Aged Care Group which run Banfields.

It's believed Banfields currently employs 120 staff and has room for 90 residents.

It was recently given approval to build an additional wing, which will bring the total number of beds to 132 and create jobs for another 20 staff.

Melaleuca has 35 permanent and two respite rooms in their Residential Aged Care section, with 39 units and suites in their Independent Living

Grossard Court has 80 beds.

#### State aged care

The two state run facilities, Kirrak House in Wonthaggi and Griffiths Point Lodge in San Remo were happy to provide an update on staff and resident vaccinations.

There are currently 23 residents at Kirrak House and 28 at Griffiths

Bass Coast CEO Jan Child said all residents had had been vaccinated for COVID-19, bar two residents who had declined the vaccination.

Doctors were meeting with the two residents and their families to address their concerns.

She said a couple of staff had also not received the vaccination due to "health concerns" and would be deployed to other areas and any new residents accepted to the facilities would have to be fully vaccinated.

Ms Child said in the past week, Bass Coast Health had prioritised vaccinations for any healthcare, aged care or disability workers at the Wonthaggi Clinic.

We have offered to vaccinate the staff of any local facilities," she said. Residents of Griffiths Point Lodge

and Kirrak House were vaccinated in March this year, along with some staff members at Griffiths Point.

The vaccine was delivered by the Gippsland Region Public Health Unit, and the second dose was delivered three weeks later.

At the time, it was reported residents of Banfields, Grossard Court and Melaleuca Lodge nursing homes, which are privately operated, had been vaccinated a fortnight

#### Vaccination roll out

The Commonwealth government has come under fire for the slow pace of the roll out of vaccines to aged care residents and workers.

Last week, the Prime Minister said it was still not mandatory for aged care workers to be vaccinated and it was revealed the government still did not have exact figures on how many had received the vaccine.

However from June 15, all aged care facilities will have to report on their staff vacci-

It was also revealed last week the private companies hired by the government to roll out the vaccine in aged care facilities were only contracted to vaccinate residents, not staff.

All residents of aged care were supposed to have been vaccinated by Easter.

According to a recent report on the ABC, available data shows more than a third of Australia's nursing home residents aren't fully vaccinated.

According to the health.gov.au website, 370,595 doses of the vaccine had been administered in aged care and disability facilities as of June 3.

However only 165,723 residents had received their second does.

Health officials have confirmed less than 10 per cent of the aged care workforce had been vaccinated through the Federal government pro-

Less than two per cent of people living in disability care have been fully vaccinated.

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## Heroic rescue at Surf Beach

A Phillip Island surfer has been hailed a hero, after saving the life of former councillor Stephen Fullarton at Surf Beach last week.

Dan Seale, who is Newhaven College's property manager, was about to surf Crazy Birds break last Wednesday about 4pm when he noticed a man struggling to stay afloat in the surf.

Steve, a popular island identity and keen surfer, had suffered a stroke and was about 15 metres out in the white water.

"I was coming down the stairs and he immediately caught my attention because I could see he was struggling," said Dan, who before the incident didn't know Steve.

"He was in the water next to his stand-up paddle board with his left arm on it and I thought maybe he'd knocked his head.

"But then he kind of yelled help and I took off out there.

The 34-year-old said he swam out on his own board and reached Steve, saying his head was underwater, while his face was white and lips purple.

"I grabbed him and pinned him to his board. He was still conscious and had a bit of kick in him but it was not easy because he was clearly totally knackered. It was like his right arm was being pulled down in the water.'

Dan then kicked and paddled back to the shore, "wearing a wave" on top of them as they went.

A difficult situation became worse when Dan and Steve were pushed onto rocks, each still with their surfboard leg ropes attached.

"The surf was sucking our boards out and then pushing us against the rocks. The waves were going everywhere.

Right at that moment another surfer - Newhaven's Larson Henderson - luckily arrived and immediately helped Dan remove the leg ropes, lift Steve out of the water, away from the rocks and up the beach.

"I was so stoked because I was "At that point I thought how the hell am I going to do this, I don't kind stranger later rescued his know how I'm going to get him up and Steve's damaged surfboards.

Larson said he helped pull Steve up the beach - at high tide, with not much sand available - and while Dan looked after him, Larson called Triple 0, with many onlookers then coming to assist, including a nurse.

"I knew who it was straight away," Larson said, adding that his son had been chatting with Steve on the water moments be-

"In the water he was in a dire predicament.

"On the beach he got the colour back in his face and he was conscious and conversing, although he was in and out a little bit.'

When paramedics arrived, they helped carry Steve up the stairs in an inflatable stretcher.

Steve was taken to Wonthaggi Hospital and then airlifted to the Alfred Hospital.

Dan, who is also a musician who performs around the island, said he didn't hesitate to step in and help, dismissing the hero tag.

"No way. Honestly I was just going for a surf and he needed help. There was no time to contemplate anything," Dan said.

You could see he was in big trouble. I knew it was serious, the way he yelled for help and how his head was going under."

Larson agreed.

"We were just there to do what we could. Certainly he would have been in a bad situation if he hadn't got assistance," said Larson, who runs Phillip Island Camps accommodation in Newhaven.

"When someone needs a hand, you help them. We worked as a team.

"You don't hesitate, you go into emergency mode."

Steve's mate Greg Price - who in April saved the life of a Cowes man who had a car accident in Cowes after suffering a heart attack - said the whole community was praying for a speedy recovery for Steve.

"Steve's love for his island community is immense," Greg said.

'We are all praying for the best possible outcome for him and Kerry and his family."

Steve runs his architectural design business in Cowes and is wellknown for his work most recently as a Bass Coast Shire councillor for the Island Ward. He was also a councillor on the old Phillip Island

Steve is often seen around the island on his stand-up paddle board and has been instrumental in the creation of the island's National Surfing Reserve.

He remains in the Alfred Hospital where he is being treated, following



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## Attractions remain locked down Businesses trained to

Many Phillip Island tourist attractions remained closed, including the Penguin Parade - despite the easing of lockdown restrictions in rural Victoria.

Phillip Island Nature Parks CEO Catherine Basterfield said based on government guidelines, from June 3, their attractions would have a maximum visitor capacity of only

'So we have made the decision to keep our venues closed until at least Friday, June 11, at this stage, pending any changes in guidelines or advice," Catherine said, with PINP continuing to receive some state government financial support.

She said once they re-open, if still required to check visitor IDs, the admissions and visitor experience teams would carry out checks at entry points to each venue, "similar to last year when residents of metropolitan Melbourne were unable to travel to regional Victoria".

Catherine said Nature Parks had been part of the government's QR code system since it was first introduced last year, and "have been actively checking our visitors in at our venues since that time".

A Maze N Things owner Geoff Moed said they made the decision to also close their operation for two weeks.

Once they reopen, he said they would advise - via a sign at the front door - that Melbourne visitors were not allowed.

"But the actual policing might be a different matter as our staff are not trained or expected to enforce the law," Geoff said, adding they had already rolled out QR codes.

'The two-week shutdown is bad enough, but I am more concerned with Melbourne not being able to come for the long weekend after lockdown is lifted.

Lauren Mitchell from Phillip Island Helicopters said they too remained closed until June 11.

She said having no international

visitors broadly, but particularly in winter, had hit their business hard, with "the damage already done" even prior to this fourth lockdown.

Furthermore, the ban on Melbourne visitors for the long weekend and a two-week closure in this lockdown would hurt further.

"It is just disappointing when you think you are getting back to normal, we are hit with yet another lockdown," Lauren said.

"Any lockdown, no matter how short, has an impact on the bottom line, as we are a small business.

"The June long weekend is always a very busy one for us and the island. Add this together with the business lost on the busy Valentine's weekend and the impact of lost revenue will be significant."

#### Record breaking

Vietnam Veterans Museum manager Phil Dressing said they opened after the end of lockdown last week, but "with metropolitan restrictions, visitation is basically non-existent".

"We chose to continue paying our staff their normal wages without requiring them to take leave.'

Phil said while the museum had been "hit pretty hard with lockdown", there were positives.

"We started collecting visitor statistics in 2013. We broke the visitor record in December 2020 and again in January 2021. We didn't do as well in February but improved in March," he said.

"Then April 2021 broke all records since we started collecting data.

"We have found that visitor numbers decline not only in closing but even after reopening, visitation takes a bit of time to get back to pre-Covid numbers.'

Phil estimated the lockdown losses were about \$25,000, including the twice cancelled booking of a chorale group to perform at the museum, most recently on May 30, who now say they won't return.

He added the state government's circuit breaker business support package would assist the business, "but not by much".

"Our operational costs are not greatly diminished whether we're open or not. If we're successful receiving the package we'll still incur a net loss of around \$22,500 for the week.

"Have your staff experienced confronting challenges regarding Covid principles, capacity challenges or aggressive behaviour?" a PIBN spokes-

"We know this was a big challenge and will continue to be a big challenge especially as businesses now have to ID check and refuse service to metro."

Cheeky Goose owner Robert van den Brink said the hardest part of the QR/ID system was dealing with people not wanting to comply.

"We are at the frontline and have to bear the brunt of people's frustration and rudeness," Robert said (see separate lockdown story).

He said while most customers complied, a few refused and took "their frustrations out on the staff"

'We do not accept this and ask the people to leave. We have absolutely lost business because of our "no details no service policy." It's not worth risking the safety of others and the fine not to comply."

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# Sand Mining opponents raise petitions for Parliament

Planning panel report passed to minister on massive Grantville sand mine

The Save Western Port Woodlands group, which, following its public meeting at the Corinella Hall, now claims a membership of many hundreds of concerned residents, has raised two petitions to put before the Victorian Parliament.

"These petitions give us the opportunity to shine a light on the environmental destruction in this forest, on the dangers to the Western Port foreshore and its internationally protected Ramsar Wetlands, and on the very real risk of damage to the tourism economy of this beautiful coastal region," Save Western Port Woodlands spokesperson Tim O'Brien said.

"It is particularly important right now that the Bass Coast community and Grantville residents get involved and take action to stop the destruction of our coastal forests by sand miners.

"We have learned that the Minister Richard Wynne is to be handed this week the recommendation from The Planning Panel on the application by Dandy Premix to massively expand its mine on the edge of Grantville.

"The decision on this mine application should only have rested with the Bass Coast Council. It should never have been removed from this community.

"We have had expert analysis of the Dandy premix application to massively expand its Grantville operation, and have been advised that State Government Guidelines for ensuring the protection of sensitive natural environments against toxic pollutants may have been contravened in this application process,"

The amendment could also include relocating Rudi Coel's Shed to the reserve.

The council described the community garden as "highly valued" and Coel's Shed as "historically

significant".
Bass Coast Shire Mayor, Cr Brett Tessari said it's important the community has an opportunity to provide feedback on this proposed amendment.







announced a new COVID-19 Disaster Payment to help people affected by COVID-19 restrictions.

The new payment will help Victorian workers who are unable to earn income due to the current lockdown restrictions.

You can claim this payment using your Centrelink online account through myGov from June 8. To be eligible, you must meet all of the following conditions:

- be an Australian resident, permanent resident or eligible working visa holder
- live or work in a Commonwealth declared hotspot
- be unable to work and earn income as a result of a state lockdown
- be where the lockdown is for more than 7 days
- have liquid assets of \$10,000 or

If you don't have a myGov account or a Centrelink online account, you can set them up now

The government will pay you

The Federal government has lockdown. You'll get either:

- \$325 if you've lost less than 20 hours of work
- \$500 if you've lost 20 hours or more of work.

This payment is taxable.

You can't get the COVID-19 Disaster Payment if you're getting any of these:

• 299-325 Church Street, best known for its long brick wall boundary fence: Multilot subdivision (192 lots), removal of vegetation and cre-

• 35 Cowes-Rhyll Road: Subdivision of land into 16 lots, creation of reserves and associated works, and removal of native vegetation;

• 14-20 Redwood Drive: Subdivision of land into 12 lots.

#### DAL

The housing subdivisions come as the state government's delayed last round of consultation on the Distinctive Area and Landscapes (DAL) project, to guide future land use, is set to begin next month.

Earlier this year shire planners told the Advertiser developers who were eyeing off housing subdivisions were putting them on ice until there was greater planning certainty around town boundaries with the DAL.

This included Newhaven West, a mooted 35-hectare development that proposed 78 residential lots, as well as land between Corinella, Coronet Bay, and Cape Paterson.





The team at Ocean Reach and the Witch Doctor NEIPA Brewery hit Gold at this year's Australian International Beer Awards

The Phillip Island based brewers won two Gold, two Silver and one Bronze medal at the prestigious competition, which attracts entries from across the globe and is the largest annual beer competition in the world.

There were more than 2500 entries from over 400 breweries in 26 countries this year. Participating for the first time, owner Wayne Bismire said Ocean Reach medalled with five of the six beers they en-

Ocean Reach's Porter and IPA beers won Gold, the Pale Ale and Hazy Pineapple IPA were awarded Silver medals, won Bronze.

"Five out of six is not a bad strike rate," he said.

"The score on our IPA was 18.74 out of a possible 20, so it was at the extreme high end of the scoring.'

The beers are judged by blind tasting by a panel of ex-

Local beer lovers can eniov the award-winning beers, which are all on sale through the brewery, although they will have to wait a week or two to enjoy the Gold medal Porter.

We're currently sold out, but there is a new batch coming," promised Wayne.

It's a beer that you don't traditionally brew in big batches. It's darker and hearty and it's very popular in winter.'

Ocean Reach beers are distributed across Victoria, NSW and the ACT, with the wholesale side of the business growing exponentially through

"Probably a third of our product goes north of the border now," Wayne said.

The beer is now on sale through BWS and Dan Murphy stores and the Ocean Reach Pale Ale is on tap at the Farmers Daughters Restaurant in Melbourne, which offers a farm-to-plate experience of Gippsland produce.

## **Environmental** superhero guest speaker at World Vision lunch

An environmental superhero is the guest speaker at the Phillip Island World Vision Club fundraising winter luncheon June 20.

Tony Rinaudo is famously known for his work in helping to transform millions of hectares of dry land in many African countries.

A Natural Resources Management Specialist and agronomist who has worked for World Vision for many years, he has made a positive impact on food security, and environmental sustainability and resilience for thousands of vulnerable communities around the world.

His long list of achievements in developing and promoting agricultural-forestry-pastoral systems in degraded and barren landscapes has won him many international awards.

Tony's work began over 25 years ago, when, with the help of the local farmers in Niger, on the African continent, he began implementing a conservation farming system known as Farmer Managed Natural Regeneration (FMNR).

The approach has been so successful that it has since been applied in at least 24 other African countries.

FMNR is the management of existing tree stumps and underground roots that still grow, even in degraded and barren landscapes, through pruning, for natural regeneration.

The pioneering methods he developed grew trees from existing underground root systems, which he has described at times as under-

His technique involved pruning in a certain way and protecting the shoots, resulting in the original tree population being regenerated on what was barren land, without major financial costs.

In Niger alone, five million hectares of land with over 200 million trees were restored in this way. This also equated to 50,000 more tonnes of grain being harvested, with two and a half million people benefiting from the improved use of the land.

His methods can be easily and successfully practised by local farmers to stop and even reverse the destruction of landscapes and the livelihoods they support.

What he subsequently created was much more than an agricultural technique, but a farmer led movement, regreening land in the Sahel region of western and north-central Africa extending out from Senegal, eastward to Sudan. Transforming deserts into forests is certainly

no mean feat, and his story finally caught the attention of German author Johannes Dietrich, who has just published a book and e-book about Tony called "The Forest Maker."

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
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

The Panorama Estate, known locally as "Pakenham comes to San Remo' dominates the view for anyone driving over the bridge. For those closer, the mixture of dust, flood water and overgrown eyesore is a situation still before VCAT. Who is ultimately liable - Council or developer – is still to be decided.

I hope you get your footpaths on Panorama Road; I wouldn't plan on seeing them for a few more years. San Remo has been trying for the last 21 years to get any footpaths made or even the existing ones maintained. One day someone in Wonthaggi at Council might remember we exist. The only time they think about us is when they send out rate notices, which are about 40 per cent higher than similar value property anywhere else in Victoria.

Phillip Island and San Remo use to have a good relationship in the early days of Bass Coast Council with the previous CEO and staff but sadly it's been all downhill since he retired. Plans for roads and paths and for the expansion of San Remo were dumped in the "too hard basket", never to see the light of day again. The only thing that happened was the expansion.

Meanwhile the current CEO and staff continue to get their pay rises and complain about the way they are being treated. Any complaint by people in our area about the way we are treated is ig-

It's three years before the next council elections and things could be very different by then.

In the state election, it is likely Bass will be redistributed and Phillip Island could end up in the South Gippsland seat, which is currently held by the Nationals

The Federal seat is Monash and that is held by Russell Broadbent, from the Liberal Party.

The Liberals and Nationals have already shown they consider they could win the seats in both Federal and state elections.

#### Artwork upset

Have the Newhaven community (and Bass Coast residents) been mis-

On March 22, 2021, when Geoffrey Bartlett had been chosen as the successful artist for the Newhaven Public Art. I was sent a copy of his concept design and development for the sculpture. I am a resident who will be directly impacted by the installation. I do not overlook the area. My concerns were the location of the work in an area already crowded at peak times, potential damage to the work by cars and boat trailers and the poor maintenance of the area by the Shire. The image in the concept design is that which appeared in the press release to the Advertiser. The image is that of "Dancer 4", a work by Geoffrev Bartlett now found in a private garden in Flinders, superimposed on the site in Newhaven. I was alerted to existence of "Dancer 4" by another concerned Islander. Did the selection panel know that the proposed work already existed, that the image in the artist's proposal was not created as a unique work for Newhaven? How much research did anyone do? Why would an image of a different work be published in the press release for Newhaven's Public Art?

Under the image in the artist's Concept Design is the statement - "This montage provides an indication of the finished work 'Alpha' and the materials that will be used, and illustrates how the sculpture maintains the views to the harbour". In the Installation, materials and finishes section of the concept design, the artist describes the included image. There is no suggestion that the artwork for Newhaven will be other than that in his proposal.

Responses from the Team Leader Arts and Culture at Bass Coast Shire to my concerns have been unsatisfactory. The work for Newhaven is now to have "significant design variations that ensures that it is a unique object".

It should be noted that if approved Are these variations a result of the community reaction?

#### Council's hypocrisy never ceases to amaze!

After years of council refuting that road dust is a problem, last week it finally removed the dust suppressant seals on The Esplanade and Batman Avenue at Surf Beach after 15 years of service.

The council, to my confusion, erected a sign with "Speed Means Dust" together with a 20 km/h advisory sign at one location and another sign "Less Speed Less Dust" (but without a speed sign) at two other locations.

Confusion 1 - Has dust suddenly become a problem now that the seal has been removed?

Confusion 2 - Why different dust signs and why a speed sign only at one location?

Now that council has tacitly conceded that it has created a dust problem, will it erect more than just the one speed and dust sign at Batman Avenue which is 540m long? Will it erect 20km/h speed signs at both ends of The Esplanade which is 950m long and possibly another repeater dust and speed sign mid-way?

It would also be advisable to standardise the signage to portray a sense of professionalism and also remove the senseless slippery signs usually related to icy road conditions.

A crushed rock surface which has been compacted with a steel roller and pneumatic rollers isn't prone to have vehicles slide off it!

More appropriate signs and possible speed calming devices is the least we can expect from a council that has completely ignored hundreds of scientific papers that has irrefutably found that road dust is a serious health concern.


Island Whale Month sets out to celebrate the arrival of migrating humpbacks and visiting Southern Right whales to our local waters.

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

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## Getting vaccinated

Like the rest of Victoria, people from Phillip Island and Bass Coast have heeded the call and are booking in and lining up to be vaccinated in droves. No one wants to spend another winter like the one in 2020. More than half our team at the Advertiser have received their first vaccination, and Eleanor McKay shares her experience of joining the queue and becoming one of the more than half a million Victorians who've started their vaccination journey.

Last Wednesday (June 2) I got my first AstraZeneca vaccine shot.

The actual injection was the easiest, most painless part of the process.

While getting the shot might have been quick – I think I spent less than five minutes with the nurse - everything else required patience.

One thing I know now is booking in takes persistence. A load of it.

My first call to the 1800 hotline was May 25. I got through, but due to the high volume of calls, a recorded message offered me the option to register my phone number for a call back.

Too easy! I registered my number and waited. And waited (still waiting ...).

Over the following week, I rang a few times a day. Every time the message was the same - high demand, unable to take your call, goodbye.

I considered trying my luck with a walk in at the Wonthaggi clinic, but when I heard people were queuing for three or four hours in the cold, persevering with the hotline while sitting in the warmth of my own house seemed like a better option.

Last Tuesday, I tried 13 times across the day. No joy

On Wednesday, I got serious and rang 13 times in less than three hours.

At 9.42am I finally struck gold. Thirty minutes later, after a series of health questions, both my partner and I were booked in for a vaccination at 1pm that day.

Just after midday, we jumped in the car and headed for Wonthaggi.

When we arrived, around 12.45pm there were long queues for both those who had booked and the walk-in crowd.

Everyone was waiting patiently and politely, but the queues weren't moving quickly.

After 20 minutes, our booking times had come and gone, but we were still in a queue outside, just a few metres further along than when we arrived.

Even those who booked in were facing a wait of over an hour.

At ten past one, Mick the security guard, who had been keeping everyone informed and entertained with his jokes, announced loudly the clinic wouldn't be

accepting any more walk-ins for the day. Those walk-ins who had already been registered would be seen, and anyone else who arrived would be able to book in for an appointment for another day.

The crowd took the announcement without a murmur.

We're a patient and good-natured bunch

it seems. At 1.38pm we were still outside the town

hall doors. When Mick introduced Alice, who was

running the clinic to the waiting crowd, she (and her staff) received a well-deserved round of applause for their hard

Then things started to move.

1.52pm: inside at last! Confirmed our booking and seated in the first waiting Bookit section

2.05pm: sitting with the nurse, ready to receive our injection.

2.11pm: in the observation zone.



Finally made it to the top of the queue at the mass vaccination clinic.



Even those who booked endured a wait of almost an hour in the queue outside the town hall.

2.37pm: out the door with our follow up appointment booked for September.

All up, the process had taken just under wo hours.

The next day, with walk-ins on hold, people with bookings reported being in and out in an hour or less.

So far, neither of us have experienced any serious reaction to the vaccination.

On Wednesday night, my arm was sore, but to be fair, I'd damaged the tendons in my shoulder and my arm had been sore for weeks, so it was hard to know how much was the shot and how much was the tendons. A few Panadols and an early night seemed the best option.

Thursday, we both felt less than brilliant fuzzy headed, a slight temperature and super-tired - but with regular doses of Panadol, by the end of the day, things were looking up.

My advice? It's worth it to keep calling and book in. An online booking service is due to be launched any day and booking in does decrease the time you spend in the



The queue for walk-ins at the clinic stretched down the street.

On the day we attended, one lady in the walk-in queue said she'd been waiting over two hours ... and she still hadn't made it inside.

A friend did a walk in earlier in the week and said it took her three and a half hours to be processed.

"It's long, and \$#%@ cold," she texted me. With people finally getting through on the booking hotline, the spots in the clinic are being fully booked (unlike the first week, where some days bookings were as low as 60). Bass Coast Health put a halt to walk-ins for four days last week, as the staff simply didn't have the capacity to cope with the high volume.

Anyone who is allowed to visit regional areas (for example, to visit an intimate partner, authorised worker), must adhere to the restrictions in place in Melbourne, including wearing a mask indoors and outside and not visiting restaurants or attending public gatherings.

Police can issue on-thespot fines of up to \$1652 for adults who fail or refuse to comply with the public health directives.

Fines of up to \$20,000 for individuals are possible through the court system.

Victoria Police has confirmed it will continue to protect the health and safety of all Victorians by enforcing the directions of the Chief Health Officer (CHO).

"People can expect to see a highly-visible police presence across Victoria, with our Operational Sentinel taskforce conducting proactive spot checks in public places and businesses," a police spokesperson said.
"Victoria Police will also

be conducting mobile patrols, both in vehicles and on foot across the state. The mobile vehicle patrols will utilise Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) technology to scan car registration details and identify the residential addresses of those licence holders.
