

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






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Future looks bright for Dutchie's

With its chequered floor and red and white striped umbrellas, Dutchie's takeaway restaurant in Newhaven harks back to a bygone era.

But it looks like brighter times are ahead. Many locals and visitors have fond memories of summer holidays enjoying burgers or fish and chips from the popular shop.

The iconic takeaway restaurant sits at the gateway to Phillip Island and sold earlier this year, with the new owners taking possession last Friday.

Agent Mike Foenander from O'Brien Real Estate said due to a confidentiality agreement he could not reveal details of the sale, but said it was an exciting development for the muchloved old building.

He also quashed rumours that the site had been purchased by Domino's Pizza.

"It's definitely not a franchise."

The restaurant at 1 Forrest Avenue has been permanently closed for years and came up for sale in 2018 for the first time in fifty years.

However it wasn't until this year the store finally sold. The \$1,250,000 price tag included 664m2 land, as well as a three-bedroom resi-

"It's going to be exciting," he said. "Watch this space!"

Smiths Beach residents panel formed

A new Smiths Beach commu-nity panel will meet this Friday two years," Phil said. "The amount of cor (March 5), part of long-term planning on the future of the hamlet.

Bass Coast Shire last month asked for "a cross-section" of residents to nominate for a place on the Smiths Beach Town Plan Community Panel, with members meeting for an initial virtual workshop this week and further meetings in April.

Shire CEO Ali Wastie said more than 60 expressions of interests for the panel were received and 10 members selected representing a cross-section of people who work, visit and live in Smiths Beach.

"A draft plan will be presented to the community in the coming months for wider community engagement. Officers are hoping to finalise the town plan by mid-

year," Ms Wastie said. President of the Smiths Beach Association Phil Dressing said he was buoyed by recent progress, after lobbying for a masterplan

"We have achieved more in two months than we have in the past

"The amount of consultation the shire has undertaken this year has been a quantum leap. They've stepped it up.

Phil said his group had met almost weekly with the shire in 2021, as well as Nature Parks, Parks Victoria and Bunurong representatives.

Last year the shire released a draft basic plan, along with online Zoom meetings, a 15-minute online survey, and an interactive map, which Phil said had failed to zero in on key issues for Smiths Beach.

'We need to know whether ratepayers want gravel roads to be sealed. Do residents understand the State Government's Distinctive Areas and Landscape plan and its impact on Smiths Beach? Does the community want dogs off leash on the beach?"

User pays?

Last year the association released its own vision called "More Feet Less Footprints", which pointed to the ballooning num-

ber of visitors to Phillip Island, mary dunes"; as highlighted in the shire's own Visitor Economy Strategy.

"If there are more people coming, including to Smiths Beach, how will we manage them in terms of infrastructure and the environment?" he said.

"Tourists use resources but aren't contributing to them."

"User-pays" paid visitor parking is just one of the ideas to be flagged by the association.

Other ideas include:

- Building a Surf Lifesaving Club observation tower on the YCW beach "to spread the load of visitors across two beaches";
- Township boundaries, which are strictly defined under the State Government's Distinctive Areas and Landscape plan;
- Road improvements, including further upgrades to the existing "dangerous" intersection between Smiths Beach and Back Beach roads, as well as sealing gravel roads:
- Measures to stop coastal erosion "because currently at high tide beach users go into the pri-

• Dogs on beach and potential

- impacts with hood plover nesting
- The potential to expand a marine park off Smiths Beach; and
- · Make better use of the Mitchell Reserve, "which is currently under-utilised".

Phil said the association did not have fixed positions on these issues, but believed they were the most important to garner community feedback.

Last year's shire draft plan detailed the need for improvements in the town, explaining that "when there is an influx of visitors the infrastructure is placed under pressure".

"During peak season, car parking around the shops and beaches is a challenge and occasionally results in heavy traffic with limited road space," the draft plan stated.

It highlights that Smiths Beach is third on the shire's priority list to seal gravel roads, set to start in the next five years, funded through resident contribution through a Special Charge Scheme.

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At last, a community pool

After three decades of community campaigning, an aquatics centre is finally in sight, with consultation set to start next month.

Bass Coast Shire CEO Ali Wastie last week confirmed final settlement on the purchase of the carnival land on the intersection of Phillip Island and Ventnor roads, which will be home to the Phillip Island Aquatics and Recreation Precinct.

She said part one of stage one of the Phillip Island Aquatics and Recreation Master Plan was currently underway.

"In 2019, we appointed Otium Planning Group to develop a Feasibility and Business Study and concept plans for an aquatics centre on Phillip Island," Ms Wastie said.


"Otium in conjunction with Integral Group is currently carrying out an Environmentally Sustainable Design Options Report, including a geothermal investigation, to ensure the design of the facilities are as environmentally sustainable as possible.

"The concept plans and Feasibility and Business Study will be finalised based on this report."

Ms Wastie said that once the study and concept plans were completed, community consultation would begin in

ers is crucial and the feedback we receive will be critical in shaping the design and operations of the facility.

We are still in the early stages of this project, however the purchase of this land means we are able to progress with confidence, to provide the community with a valuable and much needed facility.

Phillip Island Aquatic Centre Fund (PIACF) secretary Peter McMahon said it was a great outcome for Phillip Island, urging the shire to "keep to their word of consulting with community groups"

"The Aquatic Centre is very much needed on Phillip Island," said Mr McMahon, who released a statement last week, which also included Island Voice.

"This project has been in train with the PIACF Inc committee for the last 20plus years, and our group

has amassed quite a considerable amount of data to build a centre.

"We - along with Island Voice - believe it would make sense to have a joint group of all interested parties to finalise this project."

Mr McMahon said a joint working party should include community groups, including sports.

"For too long these types of projects arrive for consultation with our community with very little input being considered," he said.

"Now with the latest community consultation procedures developed by Council, we will look forward to our voices being consid-

Carnival land

Ms Wastie said the 16ha carnival land was purchased through negotiation with the owners, the Watkins family, and was

"agreed to by the vendor on a voluntary basis"

Last month the Advertiser reported owner Brian Watkins said the settlement price was \$2.7 million, with \$2.2 million for the value of the land and \$500,000 for compensation.

However Mr Watkins said he remained unhappy with the compensation amount and was considering further legal action against the

The 78-year-old said he had refused to sign a confidentiality agreement, as requested by the shire, which would have stopped him revealing the price tag.

He said they had until June 6 to leave.

"I won't be leaving for months. It will take an army to get me out of here," Mr Watkins said.

AGL decision expected soon

Western Port residents are inquiry - said he was most redoubling their fight against AGL, with the Victorian Government's assessment of AGL's proposed bay gas project due in late March.

Mornington Peninsula Shire Mayor Despi O'Connor said the shire was compiling "No AGL" videos contributed by the community to "capture the passion of our collective opposition", which will be sent to State and Federal ministers.

"With the Government's decision on the project fast approaching - and no decision-making powers of our own - we're calling on the community to help us in this last critical fight to save Western Port before it's too late," Cr O'Connor said.

"We are imploring the government not to jeopardise our precious bay for the sake of more fossil fuels. We will also circulate the video online.

Smiths Beach resident and avid surfer Phil Wright – who made a presentation to the concerned about the impacts of chlorine on the bay.

AGL is proposing to build a 290 metre Floating Storage and Regasification Unit (FSRU) terminal at Crib Point, which will suck up about 470 million litres of seawater - including fish eggs and larvae - with water discharged into the bay about 7C colder and containing up to 47kg of chlorine a day.

The large volumes of continuous chlorine discharge that are proposed by AGL will have a permanent impact on Western Port, including on the Cat Bay section of the Surfing Reserve," said Phil, who took this photo of his granddaughters to highlight concerns.

The Inquiry and Advisory Committee hearing the project's Environmental Effects Statement (EES) started on October 12 and finished on December 17 and was the most complex environmental assessment carried out in Victoria.

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This plan A Rhyll boat ramp design was the successful concept, agreed to in February 2020, after Better Boating Victoria took on community feedback.

Rhyll boat ramp redesign consultation

New designs for the proposed Rhyll boat crossings directly across the trailer parkramp upgrade will be on display for community feedback tomorrow (March 4).

The modified designs build on last year's agreed Plan A, which included three lanes, an all-tide boat ramp, longer pontoons, safer pedestrian access on Beach Road, a fish cleaning table and an increase in car and trailer parking from 39 to 43 parks.

Last month Bass Coast Shire held an invitation-only meeting with anglers to show the modifications detailing plan A changes that impact the land – not marine

According to the new design, parking is reduced back to 39 with car spaces near the playground and Rhyll Angling Clubrooms lengthened to cater to trailers, requiring vehicles with trailers to reverse into the space.

The Beach Road zebra crossing has been removed and replaced with two new zebra

ing area.

As reported in last week's Advertiser the modifications were criticised by a Silverleaves resident who works in the safety industry, who said the new plans put children and pedestrians at risk.

A drop-in information session will show the new plans for the ramp upgrade from 4-5pm at the angling club shelter on Beach Road

There will be two construction windows, to minimise disruption to boating and snapper fishing season.

Stage 1 will see on site works between June and August 2021, pending approvals, focusing on the car park reconfigu-

Stage 2 will involve the marine component – jetties, pontoons and boat ramp lanes, scheduled for February/March 2022 and completed by August 2022.

Last Friday, the Depart- the area in almost 30 years. ment of Health said an increased number of cases of Ross River virus have been reported this summer.

to protect themselves from mosquito bites.

Victoria's Executive Director for Communicable Disease, Dr Bruce Bolam, said there have been 448 cases of Ross River virus across the state to February 25.

Bass Coast has recorded 26 of those cases.

The Advertiser is aware of three non-residents (two visitors and a holiday homeowner) who have also tested positive after holidaying at Phillip Island or San Remo.

Such cases would be registered at the permanent home address of the person, and not reflected in the Bass Coast numbers, as the Department of Health records cases by Local Government Area (LGA).

Figures from French Island are also not included in the Bass Coast total.

When the Advertiser broke the news of Ross River cases on Phillip Island in January, both Bass Coast Shire Council and Bass Coast Health were unaware of any confirmed local cases.

Bass Coast was also not included in the state government's health warnings on Ross River virus.

A spokesperson for the Department of Health said Bass Coast was not considered an endemic area for the virus.

Records back to 1992 re-

The previous highest number was 12, in 2008. In 2017, nine cases were recorded.

Single or less than five People are being warned cases were recorded in the other years, with no cases recorded at all in nine of the 29 years since 1992.

Case load

In a typical year, about 200 cases across Victoria are notified to the department, compared to the 448 this year.

In contrast, almost 2000 cases were notified in 2017 after widespread springtime flooding in late-2016 created massive mosquito breeding

This summer, the department said the majority of the cases have been in residents of the Surf Coast, Bellarine and East Gippsland areas.

Transmitted through mosquito bites, Ross River virus disease occurs throughout most regions of Australia, particularly around inland waterways and coastal regions. Heavy rainfall, floods, high tides and warm weather increase mosquito numbers, resulting in higher numbers of cases.

Dr Bolam said the early summer conditions, particularly in coastal areas, were conducive to mosquito breed-

The virus is passed between mosquitoes and certain animals, such as wallabies and kangaroos. Infected mosquitoes can then bite people.

Many local councils work routinely with the departveal this year is the highest ment to monitor and limit number of cases recorded in mosquito numbers. Around

12 councils currently participate in the state mosquitoborne disease program and receive funding for mosquito surveillance and vector con-

Mosquito traps are set up in the field, and the mosquitoes are sent to Melbourne for testing.

When mosquito numbers are high, and the lab detects virus in these mosquitoes, there might be an increased risk of acquiring Ross River virus in the coming days if the weather conditions are favourable," Dr Bolam said.

"Mosquitoes need stagnant water to breed, but they also prefer mild, calm, and more humid air to fly and bite.

Bass Coast Shire Council's program of monitoring or baiting mosquitos, run in the past through the Bass Coast Landcare Network, did not take place this summer.

In October last year, Council confirmed the program had not run for five years, as there had been no local mosquito-borne health issues.

However this month, a spokesperson said the mosquito monitoring program run by Bass Coast Landcare, with support from council, is now operating and is scheduled to run through until March.

"There are currently eight sites on Phillip Island that are part of this program," the spokesperson said.

Confirmed cases on Phillip Island have been recorded in Cape Woolamai, San Remo, Surf Beach, Wimbledon Heights and rural areas around Harbison Road

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Residents ramp up fight for Shetland Heights

The Safer Roads for San Remo committee continues to campaign for an urgent upgrade for Shetland Heights Road.

They say construction of the new junior secondary campus at the intersection of Shetland Heights and Potters Hill roads makes the upgrade an urgent priority.

The road has open drains, no footpaths and the section closest to the new campus is unsealed. Residents believe the increased traffic the new school will generate – both vehicle and pedestrian – is an accident waiting to happen.

The state government has agreed to seal a section of Potters Hill Road as part of the construction of the new campus, but to date, neither Bass Coast Shire Council nor the government will commit the necessary funding to upgrade Shetland Heights Road.

Last week, residents met with the member for Eastern Victoria, Edward O'Donohue to discuss their concerns.

Mr O'Donohue has previously raised the issue in Parliament, and after meeting with residents, Mr O'Donohue told the Advertiser the government "must urgently commit to delivering the extra infrastructure needed to make access to the new junior secondary school in San Remo safe for parents, students and teachers.

"This starts with addressing traffic concerns at the intersection of Potters Hill Road and Phillip Island Road and sealing and upgrading Shetland Heights Road.

"These issues should not be dumped on Council or local residents to fix, it is the responsibility of Daniel Andrews and his State Government alone to fix."

A spokesperson for the residents' group, Fritzie Barrowcliffe said Mr O'Donohue told them he would raise the issue again in Parliament.

"Ed seemed to be very committed to helping us as much as possible," she said, noting he also had a good grasp of the dangers of the intersection of Potters Hill and Phillip Island roads.

The residents have been campaigning for almost a decade to have Shetland Heights Road upgraded, repeatedly raising safety and health concerns with Bass Coast Shire Council.

In 2019, the group lobbied the council to have the project moved to the top of their road upgrade priority list.

However, if the upgrade happens under a special charge scheme, it is

likely to take another four years to complete.

The new campus is due to open at the start of January 2022.

"We believe the only way the road can be built before the school opens is if the state government contribute to it," Fritzie said.

Community support

As well as meeting with Mr O'Donohue, the group has lobbied local MP, Jordan Crugnale to support their campaign.

They say Ms Crugnale has put them in touch with the Victorian School Building Authority, but "is standing her ground". The group has also presented concerns about the potential threat of silicosis due to dust particles from the unsealed road to both state government and council.

Now, the Safer Roads group has reached out to the wider community for support.

A letter has been sent to local primary school principals in Newhaven, Cowes, San Remo, Bass Valley and Powlett River, as well as local kindergartens.

Describing the new campus as a wonderful and needed facility, the letter asks, "is it sensible to locate it at the end of a residential, dusty, dangerous dirt road with no infra-

structure allowing for safe access to it?".

The group said it needs the help of the school community to lobby the state government to have the roads upgraded.

"The State politician Jordan Crugnale says no one needs to access Shetland Heights Road to reach the school but what about Newhaven, Cape Woolamai and San Remo kids and parents who might want their kids to ride or walk and who can't wait in a queue for 20 mins in the morning on Phillip Island Road, they will use Shetland Heights Road," the letter states.

"Your kids will not be safe until the road is sealed and safe pedestrian access is provided."

The group is also putting together a petition to present to Parliament and is asking local residents and parents to add their signatures.

Traffic woes continue

As the political arguments drag on, residents of Shetland Heights and the surrounding roads continue to deal with the safety and health issues from the unsealed road.

The easing of Covid restrictions and the busy holiday season has seen a big increase in the number of vehicles using the road.

"Council has put in a traffic counter and are contracting someone to do a traffic analysis," Fritzie said.

With construction already underway on the new campus, dust from the trucks and machinery accessing the site from the unsealed section of Potters Hill Road is adding to the residents' woes.

"The builders are doing their bit and watering the road, but the dust we are ingesting during the construction process in horrendous."

Funding

Phil said he was confident construction could start later in the year despite the funding yet to be secured.

He said they were hoping the Victorian Government would provide \$10 million in the May budget, with a letter requesting funds sent to Premier Daniel Andrews last month, accompanied by letters of support.

State Government Veterans Minister Shaun Leane last month visited the museum, later commenting in Parliament he was "looking for ways that maybe we can support them further".

"They have got big aspirations to move the museum to a location across the road and I am seeing what we can do to help them fulfil that aspiration," Mr Leane said.

"It is the biggest Vietnam museum in the world - there is even not a bigger one in America surprisingly."

The museum will approach all the states and territories, as well as philanthropic organisations and individuals in a bid to raise funds.

"Our search will be global, any of the allies who were involved in the Vietnam War.

"We don't believe it's overly-ambitious to say we'll be sticking a shovel in the earth later this vear

approval. But that is predicated on funding. If we can't get support then the cost will be bigger and the timeline will be extended."

Background

Phil said the expansion was in line with the "National Vietnam Museum Masterplan 2025" adopted by the museum board in 2014, adding Phillip Island was considered "the spiritual home" for Vietnam veterans.

The decision was made to initially look for land on the island, then go within Bass Coast Shire if need be," he explained.

"There were caveats - we needed main road frontage and enough land for future expansion."

After receiving the Federal Government funding in 2019, the museum looked at more than 12 different sites in their search for a suitable location.

In the short-term, residents and visitors will not see any changes to the existing museum, however it is hoped a mural will soon be added to a shed on the new land declaring it as the new home of the National Vietnam Veterans Museum

Phil paid tribute to the tireless work and dedication of volunteers, with the museum started in the garage of veteran John and Krishna Methyen's San Remo home, trans-



After getting his 120 hours up, Hayden has finally got his licence! This special converted car has hand controls and Hayden is now planning adventures and road trips all around Victoria with family and friends.

The community has been with Hayden Marshall every step of the way on his journey to recovery. Hayden was thrilled recently to finally get his licence and shares his story with us.

suspended my license until I was fit to drive again.

When I was at the Royal Talbot Rehabilitation Centre I never thought I would be able to drive again, but thanks to the support from some incredible mentors and Beau Vernon, I soon discovered that it was possible.

They showed me how they

got into and out of their car, how they put their wheelchair in the car and what hand controls they use. Once I knew it was something I could do I set out on the journey to get my learners back and eventually obtain my full license.

First, I had to learn to transfer into and out of a car. Being a quadriplegic, I am paralysed from the chest down, so moving in this way was a huge feat. The first time this took about one hour with two people assisting. I was exhausted and wanted to give up, but the next day I tried again, and it took me 45 minutes.

By the time I left rehab I

Before my accident in 2016 I about 30 minutes. I still had had my learners permit and I a long way to go. I trained in had done around 30 hours of my gym every day and worked driving. Shortly after my acci-dent Vic Roads automatically strength within my body, I knew that this would give me the best chance of achieving my goal and regaining my independence.

About a year after getting home from rehab I had a driving assessment to see what hand controls I required and to see if I was fit to drive again.

The assessor said I was ok to drive and once I found the hand controls, it was time to get myself a car.

I spent about six months looking for the right car. It had to be a good height to transfer into and I wanted a few specific features like automatic window wipers, automatic head lights, cruise control and reversing sensors.

I finally found the perfect car, a Subaru Impreza. I was able to have many upgraded features installed on the car to make it easier for me to drive thanks to the community fundraising efforts just after my accident.

Once I had my car. I went to different shops that specialise got my transfer time down to in installing hand controls, to

talk about what would work in

I decided on ones that I can accelerate and brake with my right hand and steer with my left hand, these would cost around \$11,000.

I applied to get them funded through the NDIS and once they were approved, I could finally get my car fitted with everything I needed to drive.

It took about a month for the hand controls to be installed but when they were done, I was

ok to drive ... well sort of! I still only had my learners permit and I needed to get 120 hours before I could sit the test for my probationary license.

Over the next couple of years, I did lots of driving with Mum (Sharron), Dad (Ian) and Phillip Island local, Chris Dallinger.

Chris has been helping me with my gym training and offered to assist with my driving lessons. I would not have got my hours without him.

Ĭ kept practicing my transfers into and out of the car and I can now do it on my own in under 10 minutes. This includes getting my chair into the car, by fully disassembling it and placing it on the passenger seat.

After I achieved 120 hours of driving, I decided to have a few extra lessons with Stan Gates from Bass Coast Driving

I then had to sit another OT assessment which involved a physical check before the drive and an assessment on the road. I was lucky enough to find an OT that was also a Vic Roads registered driving assessor, so I could do both at the same time. This meant that if I passed, I could get my probationary license and be able to drive on my own.

It was a 30-minute driving assessment and at the end I found out that I passed.

I was so excited.

I also had to do the OT assessment as well, that had to be sent into the Vic Roads medical review team to be approved. This took around 30 days. When it was finally approved, I went to a Vic Roads service centre to pay for my licence.

I could finally drive on my

Now that I have my licence, I am driving myself everywhere. I am also planning to go on a lot of adventures and road trips all around Victoria with my family and friends.

A future goal is to convert a van into the ultimate wheelchair friendly camper and travel around Australia.

I hope to continue to inspire people showing them that anything is possible if you set a goal, having a great support network and a community behind you.

CovidSafe settings return

The return to CovidSafe settings means more vis itors in the home, less mask wearing and increasing the number of workers heading back to the office.

Masks will now only be required on public transport, in rideshare vehicles and taxis, in sensitive settings such as aged care facilities – and in some larger retail settings including indoor shopping centres, supermarkets, department stores, indoor markets.

However the government recommends masks still be used indoors or outdoors if social distancing can't be maintained, saying "the evidence is clear wearing a face covering makes a real difference in slowing the spread of the virus".

You can now host up to 30 people in your home per day. Outdoor gatherings in public places - the beach, the park - can increase to 100 people.

It's back to the office for workers, with 75 per cent across both public and private sectors allowed to return. For most workers, this meant returning to the office from March 1.

Density limits in pubs, restaurants and cafes will remain at one person per two square metres for both indoors and outdoors with no other cap, so long as electronic record keeping - a QR code - is

For small operations, there'll be no density limits if the patron number is under 25 and they will still be required to keep records.

For beauty services, businesses remain at one person per two square metres - if they also introduce electronic record keeping. For businesses where that's not possible, density limits of one person per four square metres will apply.

Retail businesses also remain at one person per two square metres and electronic record keeping is recommended where practical.

The government has introduced the Victorian Government Visitation API to strengthen contact tracing. From March 27, all business using electronic record keeping (such as a QR code), must have a system that integrates with the government's contact tracing system. Business have one month to connect to the API or switch to the free government QR code service.

Funerals and weddings are subject to a density limit of one person per two square metres. The same rules will apply to nightclubs and our community facilities, like libraries, RSLs, and community facilities. nity halls.

In gyms, the density limit remains one per four square metres – with exercise classes limited to 50 indoors and 100 outdoors.

The State of Emergency - which needs to be declared so the Chief Health Officer can issue directions to respond to the pandemic and keep Victorians safe – will be extended to 11:59pm, March 15.

Vaccine due locally from March 8

Vaccinations for health workers and aged care residents in state-run facilities in Bass Coast will start from March 8.

Vaccinations in private aged care facilities will be rolled out under the Commonwealth's COVID-19 vaccination program, and are expected to begin this week.

Bass Coast Health has advised it is not currently offering vaccinations for COVID-19 and said anyone wanting information on the vaccine roll out should call the Federal government's hotline on1800 020 080.

This week, the state government advised regional health hubs in Bendigo and Ballarat would start administering the vaccine, with vaccination hubs managed by Latrobe Regional Health (which includes Bass Coast Health) to begin delivering the vaccine from the week of March 8.

The first to be vaccinated will include frontline health staff and residential aged care residents and

Working on Churchill Island has allowed Chloe to pursue a dream to work with animals, and in the process challenge her own, and other's preconceptions, about what a woman can do.

The blacksmithing, sheepshearing, whip cracking, working dog-wrangling Phillip Islander has amassed a loyal Instagram following, and plenty of young fans through her daily demonstrations on Churchill Island.

Of all her roles, she said shearing provided her with her biggest challenge, and greatest rewards.

Part of the job at Churchill Island included a daily shearing demonstration, so Phil- renewed determination.

"Shearing is quite difficult to learn, it's like choreography with unwilling dance partner," Chloe said.

"If you get it wrong, you might get kicked in head."

At the school, she was one of only two girls, and at 27, the oldest of the group. The majority of her classmates were boys aged 15 to 18.

"It was one of the most difficult things I've ever done," she admitted.

"I had a lot of self-doubt. It's such a physical thing, and you get to the point where you can't feel your back. You're in agony when you're learning.

"I kept thinking, I can't do this, I'm not strong enough, but once you get through that, you come back with a

came addicted, describing it stronghold. as therapeutic.

"You start to learn what the pattern is, where your feet need to go.

Now a fully trained shearer, last year she worked in various sheds around Victoria.

"I travelled with a team and I was the only female shearer, although there were other women - wool handlers and wool classers.

"I was never treated like a girl. It was so equal, and it felt like I was with a team of big

"That was one of the nicest surprises. I expected it to be a bit sexist, with guys making inappropriate comments, but I didn't have any of that."

She said young women coming into shearing is transforming an industry

"International shearers weren't able to come to Australia due to Covid, so there's been an influx of young people into the industry, getting chances they wouldn't nor-

mally get.
"There are so many female shearers out there, all shearing 200-300 sheep in a day. They're just as good as the

For Chloe, mastering sheep shearing has had an impact well outside the shearing

"When I'm presented with a challenge now, I don't think, I can't do that. I work out how to do it.

"There's a sense of pride as I head around my duties, knowing I'm stronger than I thought I was." That new-found confidence

has helped her master other skills including black smithing, whip cracking and handling the working dogs, as part of the Churchill Island farm's daily demonstration.

With smithing, it looks quite skilful, but once you heat up the metal and you have the right tools, you can do anything with it. It's like playdough.

The reaction from children is her favourite part of the daily demonstrations.

"Kids will ask how I learned to shear a sheep, and it's inspiring when they get excited about it," said Chloe.

"They really like the whip cracking; they think it's the coolest thing. It's so loud, it does sound tough and scary.

"And a lot of parents are excited about their children seeing a girl do something

The coach of the Bass Coast Breakers football team, Bianca Hellmuth-Pask, has been involved with football for decades.

Over the years, she seen a lot of changes to women's football, both on field and off. But the path to pursuing her passion in the male dominated sport hasn't always been easy.

Her dad used to take her down to play football and "everything was fine".

"There wasn't an option, there was no women's team, so I suppose I believed it. There were physical and mental barriers back then," she said.

Her love of the game kept her involved, taking on a coaching role at Little League, but on the field, she had to swap football for softball.

It wasn't until she left school that Bianca found her way back to football, through a chance discovery.

"In my early 20s I was working for Woollies and moved to St Kilda. The woman's football team trained at the oval behind work.

The rest, as they say, is history. She joined the training sessions and a few years later started playing for the St Kilda Sharks.

Stints playing for North Heidelberg and Melbourne Uni followed.

During that time, she witnessed the Victorian Women's Football League (VWFL) blos-

"When I first started playing, there were about six teams in all of the VWFL. "By the end of my playing career, there were approximately 15 clubs, some with three

teams, and there were three divisions." She also witnessed the first women's football exhibition match (17 years ago) and many of her fellow players were instrumental in the foundation of the League.

Watching the progress of women's footy over the years, she thinks now society is ready to fully embrace a female league.

"You hear commentators talking about women's football, and for some people, it's better to support their club's women's team than the men's!

"It's all moving in the right direction."

When she moved to Phillip Island three vears ago, Bianca was initially approached to play for the Bass Coast Breakers before being offered the head coach role for the 2020

While it's still challenging for women to pursue their football dreams, Bianca thinks the road has gotten easier.

"The avenues are there now, but as girls get into their teens, I see them questioning

A woman of the world

Imagine working at a world-class attraction where everyone on the staff ... from managers to maintenance staff, cleaners and life guards is female.

It's hard to imagine such a workplace in Australia, yet that's what Peta Wittig experienced in one of her roles in the United Arab Emirates.

Ironically, in a country known for its strict segregation rules, the Yes Waterworld in Abu Dhabi provided women with unique employment opportunities.

The water park held a Ladies Night each week, open to women and children only," explained Peta.

The purpose was to provide a comfortable and safe environment for women without any men on site.

'The ladies night meant the company's recruitment prioritised women, so there were enough women to staff the park on those nights," Peta said.

"Ladies night was one of the most popular, from a visitation point of view. And the women who were hired got to work on the park's regular days as well, so it was a winwin situation.'

Peta said the chance to work in the United Arab Emirates opened unexpected doors for her career.

And being a woman was never an issue with getting a job.

But life in the Middle East wasn't without its challenges.

"There were instances where I would put my hand out to shake someone's hand – and they'd retract in horror."

Peta was in her mid-twenties when she went to Dubai in 2007, as part of the opening team for the Dubai Aquarium.

"My manager at the Melbourne Aquarium asked me if I wanted to go to Dubai, so I City, and one of five women in to me, I respect you.'

got on a plane on my own and

landed in the Middle East."

While it was a culture shock initially - "they have very strict rules, especially for the locals around co-mixing at work" - working with a familiar team helped her adjust to the social norms, long hours and demanding work

"I had a fantastic manager, who guided me and I don't think I could have gotten through that time without him.

"When you're millions of miles away from home, having someone I knew I could trust was key to me getting through it.'

The expected two-year stay turned into a decade.

"If I hadn't gone overseas for that time period, I don't know if I would have had the same opportunities in Australia.'

During her stay, Peta worked at a number of different attractions.

She moved to Al Ain, a small town on the border of the UAE and Oman, as Operations Manager at Hili Fun

"The biggest challenge was getting the respect of the team," she said.

Her staff came from all over the globe, including Egypt, Morocco, Eastern Europe and Sri Lanka.

They were used to the boss being a man. It took a bit to get their respect.

"Some of them had never had a female manager, and I was really young.

"In your twenties, you think you know everything, but it really tested me. I had no idea about managing different cultures and how different and difficult that would be."

She eventually left the UAE for a job in America, as part of the opening team on The Green Planet, an indoor rain forest in St Louis.

"The UAE lifestyle was very fast paced, with long hours. I wanted to find a better work/life balance."

But a Middle America tourism industry dominated by middle-aged men "was a challenge"

When she met her Australian partner, she made the difficult decision to leave her amazing job and return to Australia.

Following her heart led her to Phillip Island and ultimately to a job as head of Tourism Operations at Phillip Island Nature Parks.

"In Australia, tourism has a lot of women, but overseas it's totally different, even in America.

Her time in the male dominated space taught her great life lessons and Peta said she works hard to address gender bias in the workplace.

"When I left the Aquarium, one of my staff said: "I've really enjoyed working with you, you're just like a man".

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No community engagement

The annual Community Satisfaction Survey shows that Bass Coast Shire Council is not a leader in community engagement.

It is instead a follower, languishing in the mediocre middle.

And recent behaviour at council suggests that our councillors have no desire for it to become a leader.

Example 1:

Council received 38 community submissions to its new Community Engagement policy. But council passed the policy with barely a whimper.

Apart from some brief words and excuses from Crs Rooks and Kent, the other councillors sat mute without any acknowledgement to the community's input, suggestions, or recommendations. To me they resembled a group of naughty boys and girls who had been admonished by the community.

Example 2:

Some weeks ago, council posted news to its website advising that Option 2 for the Inverloch shared path extension would not be proceeding as planned.

Option 2 is the community's preferred option. This option was agreed and funded by council in 2019.

Within hours of me notifying Inverloch Community Voice of the advice, someone at council ordered that the information be pulled from its website.

Notably, the 2019 council report states ... "In light of the overwhelming community support received for Option 2, officers believe that council has a clear indication of local community opinion and an identified way forward to progress design and construction of the path."

And in his Mayors Message of February 28 last year, Cr Brett Tessari stated..."The consultation showed that there was overwhelming support for Option 2and the construction of this option will provide the best overall outcome for the community".

Several weeks ago I wrote to each councillor and the CEO requesting answers as to why the information has been removed. still await a response from them. So much for community engagement from council.

Residents and ratepayers deserve much better from a council that is handsomely funded by their hard-earned money. After all, the councillors are meant to demonstrate community leadership.

Despite their newly minted engagement policy, this new councillor group is yet to demonstrate that they are willing to try harder.

Shani commenced her journey at Phillip Island Nature Parks as an Indigenous Trainee which she describes as an "interesting career jump" as she had just been offered full time work at the ANZ bank after completing a schoolbased traineeship.

She didn't really know what the job would entail but she knew that she wanted to be working outside on Bunurong Country.

She says now she is very grateful she took the jump as she "cannot imagine not working out on Country each day".

During her role as a trainee, she became aware there was no real process for working on Country.

She knew Phillip Island (Millowl) was "such a unique cultural landscape that needed to be protected the right cultural way".

Working alongside another Bunurong Community member she developed the Nature Parks' first Cultural Heritage Portfolio.

Shani has been instrumental in implementing the cultural heritage management processes through training and ongoing works on Coun-

She describes this as her greatest cultural achievement in protecting the landscape of Phillip Island (Millowl) and Nature Parks ranger Shani Blyth, who has been nominated for a Young Achiever award, at a Board Meeting on Country 2020 Cape Woolamai with BLCAC CEO Dan Turnbull.

This had help shift the organisation's entire environmental management culture to respect and care for Coun-

Shani's integrity was critical in ensuring that the process was inclusive and respectful of the Bunurong Land Council Aboriginal Corporation and a newly signed MOU.

This space was created for and with the local Community to have a place to harvest from the bush and to create a safe meeting place.

"The local Community helped me establish this area through planting days and working together to create this space," she said.

Since joining the Nature Parks, Shani has completed a Certificate III in Conservation


educating and sharing her and Land Management, graduating in the top 20 students.

At the completion of the traineeship, Shani was promoted to a full time Environment Ranger.

She is currently working with the Bunurong Land Council Aboriginal Corporation, to develop an Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Land Agreement Management (ACHLAMA) for the Nature Parks - one of the first of its kind to be completed in Vic-

'We need to protect these sites as they tell stories and the history of how the land was, is and can be used in the future," she said.

"I have really enjoyed the practical side of cultural heritage and would like to also acknowledge the people who have offered me experience and taken me under their wing, I am forever grateful for these opportunities and hope there will be more in the future.'

The sizes were all over the place, with undersized to almost 50cm reported, but no consistency in any spot at all.

Then opposite to those reports a couple of customers that fish around Corinella told us they couldn't get away from them and got their bag without any problem.

The only real difference this week was the winds favoured those areas around Corinella whereas they seemed to be opposite to the tide down this way.

There was a couple of exceptions where customers fell on a patch, top end towards maggi shoal, and landed a good bag but certainly in the minority.

On Saturday the moon was full, weather good, winds surprisingly calm but the gummies were hard to find.

Several headed out looking for a gummy on the full moon but only a couple managed to find anything of size.

There was the usual 100s of undersized ones but the bigger ones weren't that plentiful.

With the weather offshore not playing its part during the week once it came good on the weekend those heading out

were on the tuna or kingfish hunt. We only had one gummy reported. The only other report I had was a second hand one of a couple caught off the surf at Woolamai. From the reports over the years, it's not ideal to actually fish on the night of the full moon but the four days or so either side. The days leading up weren't that good for fishing so maybe the next couple of days will produce a few. Having said all that and the historical best gummy fishing timing things on the moon, the reports over the last few months of gummies has come from that in between time

So, like all fishing don't stress too much if this is the only time to fish for something, just go when you get the chance.

A couple of reports of offshore flathead from the weekend and although the fish were mostly small the numbers were easonable enough to make the trip worth it.

There is plenty of bait offshore and a good time to get in front for next season. Mackerel, salmon and yakkas all make good snapper baits, vac pack them before putting in the freezer and by snapper time they will still be as good as the day you put them in there.

Several tuna again on the weekend and from the three main spots, Cape Patterson, Pyramid Rock and the Flinders area. Although small skirts accounted for the majority, we had reports of other lures being successful, hard bodies and bigger skirts and although it was a couple of weeks back one that was caught on a bait out for a gummy.
