Boys Home hotel plans dropped

MAJOR PROJECTS

Plans to build a 72-room hotel at Newhaven's old boys home development have been withdrawn, with the developer now reverting to a previous planning permit approved in 2010 by VCAT.

In 2023 the developer, who bought the heritage-listed property in 2021, applied for the permit to build a \$15.6 million hotel on 1.4 hectares at 54-61 Forrest Avenue,

which is zoned residential.

The permit included 13 town-houses, restaurant, gym, and function centre and sought to retain buildings including the southern dormitory and the cottage to the south, which were previously set for demolition.

However last week the developer, renowned boxing promoter Brian Amatruda, told the Advertiser following discussions with his family he had withdrawn the plans and was now seeking to amend the 2010 VCAT plans.

The 2010 permit includes: 21 lot subdivision, 10 dwellings, part demolition and alteration of an existing heritage building, including conversion of the heritage building into six residential apartments with ancillary garages, and vegetation removal.

Mr Amatruda for the past three years has spent "millions of dollars" restoring the main old boys' home building to its original 1928 art deco style and said he did not want to demolish any of the heritage buildings or remove vegetation.


As such, he would now need to return to VCAT for approval to vary the 2010 permit.

"Technically we need to go back to VCAT but it shouldn't be contentious," Mr Amatruda said. "We are now working with

Beach safety and emergency measures increased

SIGNAGE

New emergency signage has been installed at beaches on Phillip Island to help improve emergency response.

A spokesperson for Phillip Island Nature Parks said the new signs had been installed on every entrance to beaches on the south coast of the island.

The signs clearly state a number (PIN) to quote when calling Triple Zero (000) during an emergency.

"Emergency markers are designed to pinpoint your exact location during an emergency in public open spaces or hard to define places," the spokesperson ex-

"The emergency markers are in addition to standard beach entry signage and the additional hazard signage installed at high-risk beaches."

The signage is not part of the Life Saving Victoria Water Safety Framework released last year, which included a review of beach safety signage at high-risk locations. Nature Parks said the signs were part of its "general emergency management improvements to aid emergency service responders" and were not directly tied to a specific plan.

End of era with sale of Ventnor Heights Nursery


dy, locally-sourced plants left a lasting impact on the gardens and landscapes of Phillip Island and beyond.



Big bucks to repair bridge

INFRASTRUCTURE

The State Government has allocated \$50.4 million in this year's budget for maintenance work on the Phillip Island bridge.

The government said the works will extend the lifespan of the bridge, which was erected in 1969, with replacement of beams, pier legs, piles and handrails.

Local MP Jordan Crugnale said the upgrade would ensure the vital connection to the mainland could be used by residents and visitors for years to come.

"This will give locals and millions of visitors a smooth and dependable route to get to the amazing Phillip Island," Ms Crugnale said.

"Phillip Island is iconic with so much on offer – it's why we're making sure the thousands of people who come here every week can get there safely."

The government said it was working to finalise time frames for the Phillip Island bridge, and it is expected works will take around three years to deliver.

The funding for the bridge upgrade is part of the government's \$976 million Better Roads Blitz, announced this week in the lead up to the release of the 2025/26 state budget.

Concerns

In recent years, the Phillip Island bridge has been subject to consistent and progressively more thorough inspections by the Department of Transport and Planning (DTP).

In March 2021, DTP bridge inspections requiring lane closures were carried out over six days.

In 2023, the department engaged an engineering consultancy service to inspect the bridge using automated technologies including drones, AI and machine learning.

In February this year, the DTP installed sensors to monitor the bridge's structural condition and performance.

This follows on from a \$1.6 million inspection of the bridge in 2024, which included underwater divers.

That Level 3 investigation by Arcadis Australia, took over three months, during which the company "collected and analysed optical imagery, lidar, acoustic and thermal data which provided digital insights and accurate defect quantification" of the bridge.

In 2024, some residents speculated the bridge was well past its original use by date and was showing signs of deterioration.

Mike Cleeland is a lifelong island resident who was present when the bridge opened to the

public in 1969.

"While there is no substitute for a qualified engineering assessment," the former science teacher said, "when you're underneath the bridge looking up, to the untrained eye it's cause for alarm."

There were other community members who shared Mike's concerns as several cracks in each pylon are visible at low tide, and there have been reports by the community of 'spalling' – where fragments of concrete break off a larger body – of which concrete cancer is a cause.

Dr Hemanta Doloi, a professor of construction management at the University of Melbourne and an expert in rural infrastructure planning and policies, spoke to the Advertiser in 2024.

"In an ideal situation, you do not like to see any cracks," Dr Doloi said.

"Because this is a classic recipe of oxidation taking place within the concrete crack where the

steel is present inside.

"That will create concrete cancer, where the steel will bulge inside and concrete will eventually fall apart.

"If there is a crack, definitely there is a compromise."

However, the professor stopped short of saying whether the cracks would pose a threat to the integrity of the structure, noting many public assets last long beyond their original predicted lifespan.

Purple bin rollout delayed

Bass Coast Shire Council has written to the State Government raising concerns about the financial costs of moving to a purple-lidded glass bin recycling scheme.

The bin roll out was initially expected in December last year, but now has a deadline of July 2027, with about 30 Victorian councils trying to stop the mandated rollout.

The group of councils argue the \$129 million recycling scheme will force an increase in waste disposal charges to households of about \$27 per year.

The councils want to see glass included in the state's container deposit scheme, including glass wine and spirits.

About 20 councils have already rolled out the purple bins. A Bass Coast Shire Council

A Bass Coast Shire Council spokesperson confirmed they had written a formal letter to the Environment Minister and made

a submission through the state's consultation process last year.

"In both, Council raised concerns about the potential financial impact on our community," the spokesperson said.

"The State Government's decision, initially expected in December 2024, has been delayed, and we are awaiting further updates."

Queensland, NSW and South Australia have opted to expand their container deposit schemes to include glass wine and spirits bottles.

According to the draft Bass Coast Shire Council 2025/26 budget, ratepayers will be hit by a price hike of 7.4 per cent – or \$42 – to the garbage charge.

The increase will see the charge rise to \$617.

In 2018 we paid \$374 for the privilege of kerbside waste removal.

The council said the hike was necessary to comply with environmental regulations.

Sin bin: council aims to reduce landfill

Farmers, tourism businesses and builders will be encouraged to go green under a new Bass Coast Shire Council policy.

The council last week released a new report for community consultation, "A Circular Economy Framework for Bass Coast 2025-2035", to discourage materials wasted or thrown into landfill and instead encouraging re-use.

While the council is now calling for ideas and feedback, with a summit to be held on June 5 ahead of a final framework in July, the report flags potential solutions including processing and use of organic material locally, also supporting a local marketplace for salvaged construction materials.

For the tourism industry, it proposes "waste free tourism" including reducing single-use plastics, supporting nature tourism that regenerates the environment and zero waste events, and introducing energy and water-efficiency.

The report says the construction industry in Bass Coast accounts for the highest economic output at 22 per cent, and the largest count of businesses by industry with over one quarter of all businesses.

For construction, it proposes supporting recycled materials, modular construction and digital platforms for sharing waste materials, as well as establishing deconstruction guidelines for buildings.

Several countries and companies have implemented manufacturer take-back programs for waste, placing the responsibility on producers for managing their products' end-of-life, such as Patagonia through its Worn Wear program, which accepts used clothing.

Farming

For farming, the second largest

count of businesses at 13 per cent, especially beef and dairy, the report encourages composting and repurposing organic waste, alongside adopting regenerative farming, soil health practices such as nutrient cycling, bioenergy and biochar products

The council states it will encourage farm to table networks that minimise packaging waste and food miles.

However, Phillip Island's only dairy farmers Adam and Annette Eldridge say they send an average of 12 x 1.5 cubic metres of hay bale plastic waste to landfill because Bass Coast Shire Council no longer offers a recycling program.

The couple, who run more than 300 beef and dairy cows on 480 acres at Ventnor, said in spring they baled rounds of hay, each bale covered in netting and plastic, which was then taken to Grantville transfer station, paying about \$1200 for it be buried in landfill.

Adam said for many years he bagged the plastic and took it to Grantville for recycling, but in recent years this program stopped.

He admitted it was part of a bigger, national problem.

"It's a big problem but I think the shire is the one who can offer solutions," Adam said.

"If you take into account all the farmers just on Phillip Island, there's probably about 100 cubic metres of silage plastic being generated and when you think what a big farming community Bass Coast is, the quantities of waste are massive. Probably most farmers burn it, even though it's illegal to do so."

Adam said he was further frustrated that the rolls of plastic to wrap bales once came with a thick cardboard core, but manufacturers had now started using hard plastic tubes which weren't recyclable.

"We want to do the right thing, but they make it difficult."

A council spokesperson said their processor had previously been stockpiling the silage plastic, but after recycling proved ineffective the processor no longer accepted the plastic.

Adam also said they already use soil health practices on the farm and it was illegal for them to sell raw milk from the farm gate.

Phillip Island a global powerhouse on environment WILDLIFE

Phillip Island is a global leader in conservation, helping to return species from the brink of extinction, a Phillip Island Nature Parks event was told last week.

About 110 people attended the PINP event at the Phillip Island Winery to celebrate progress in reintroducing threatened species and restoring biodiversity on Phillip Island, especially the eastern barred bandicoots (EBB) and bush stone-curlews.

Nature Parks' senior scientist Dr Duncan Sutherland told the crowd Australia had "an appalling record on extinctions" but Phillip Island's foxfree status in 2017 was helping turn that around, especially for the EBB.

He said thanks to the EBB being introduced on Phillip Island in 2017, the species had gone from extinct in the wild to now endangered.

"It skipped the critically endangered stage," Dr Sutherland said.

"It's the only species in the world we know of that has gone from extinct in the wild to no longer having a captive breeding program.

"The only way to protect them is to find fox-free

eradication is a worldstand out, I don't think people realise just how important it is.

"The next island (globally to become fox-free) is a third the size of Phillip Island and doesn't have a human population on it."

However, Dr Sutherland said one of the greatest threats to the EBB on Phillip Island was cats, which are not only predators, but also carry the disease toxoplasmosis.

He said one in five bandicoots die from the disease, with roadkill another key threat.

"If an EBB catches the disease it will die within two weeks and one in five are dying this way."

Dr Sutherland said it was now important to ensure the genetic diversity of the EBB population and so bloodlines from Tasmanian EBBs were being introduced here.

The bandicoots are prolific breeders, with babies in gestation for just over 12 days, and within about four months they were able to breed, but then have a life span of about three years.

A single EBB can move about five tonnes of soil a year, acting as "ecological engineers" aerating and improving soil health.

"There's very little of the island where the EBB is not spotted now,"

he said, referring to the number of public sitings reported on the Nature Parks' EBB website.

"You can see them in almost any backyard on the island."

Dr Sutherland was asked if speed limits on Phillip Island could be reduced to protect animals, to which he agreed slower speeds "are better for wildlife" and a review of limits by the Transport Department and Bass Coast Shire Council was not yet complete.

Curlews

Nature Park's researcher Paula Wasiak gave a presentation on the release in August last year of a dozen critically-endangered bush stone-curlews into the Oswin Roberts Reserve.

She said the birds each wear little GPS backpacks so they can be tracked, which take her "two hours and 15 minutes to sew".

Ms Wasiak said the survival rate of the birds had been high, with roadkills, dogs and cats their main threats, but nevertheless on two occasions she had intervened to save two birds at risk.

"One was in Rhyll being swooped by magpies," Ms Wasiak said, adding she rescued it and re-released it to a safer area.'

The second intervention was on a main road during the Grand Prix weekend.

"It's a fine line. We don't want to intervene almost all the time. They need to learn and if we intervene they will not learn. They need to coexist with us.

"We won't know if they successfully establish on Phillip Island for a few vears

An audience member asked if the current drought was impacting the birds, to which she responded most of their water needs come from their food sources, which include invertebrates.

Summerland, Cape Woolamai, Churchill İsland and the Koala Conservation Reserve are all possible sites to house the birds in the future, Ms Wasiak added.

Farmer Anne Davie was scheduled to talk about sustainable farming, including planting over 20,000 trees on the family farm Bimbadeen, but was unable to make the event so her granddaughter Lily Christopher made the presentation.

Ticket sales from the event went to Phillip Island Landcare Group and the Penguin Foundation.



Thousands say no to fisheries cuts as decision imminent

A petition signed by more than 21,000 Victorians was tabled in State Parliament last week, demanding the State Government scrap its planned "gutting" of Fisheries.

The petition came as a review on the final decision on the future of Fisheries officers is understood to have concluded last week, ahead of potential funding cuts in the state budget yesterday (May 20, which were released after the Advertiser went to press).

Last Thursday more than 50 Fisheries officers and industry stakeholders gathered on the steps of Parliament House to protest the government's decision to slash funding and staffing.

The government plans to slash the number of fisheries officer positions in Port Phillip Bay and Western Port Bay - Victoria's busiest fishing and boating areas - from 27 down to nine, with four staff in Cowes set to lose their jobs.

Statewide, 35 roles will be cut, reducing overall staffing from 192 to 157, while all Fisheries officers will be reclassified as "engagement officers", with

a shift from enforcement to "education and engagement".

Shadow Minister for Outdoor Recreation, Sam Groth, said the petition reflected "growing anger and concern from recreational fishers, environmental advocates, and coastal communities".

"Poaching has already begun. While most people do the right thing, a small percentage who don't will wreak havoc on our fisheries," Mr Groth said.

"The dismantling of fisheries enforcement will leave our waterways vulnerable to illegal fishing, marine damage, and serious safety risks.

"With more Victorians than ever enjoying fishing and boating, now is the time to strengthen compliance - not gut it."

Meanwhile, figures released for the 2023/24 financial year show more than 70 per cent of all calls received by 13FISH related to offences in the five Fisheries stations proposed for closure.

Former Fisheries officer and Phillip Island resident Kevin Brown said in 2023/24 there were 1154 calls to 13FISH, the afterhours reporting line, for Cowes, Altona, Braeside, Mornington and Queenscliff.

Warley legacy preserved at new Community Hospital

As the construction of the highly anticipated Phillip Island Community Hospital nears completion ahead of a hoped-for opening in June, a tribute to the island's rich healthcare history is set to take pride of place in the new facility.

Among the final touches to be installed is an historic display of plaques commemorating milestones in the history of Warley Hospital — a beloved institution that served the Phillip Island community for 85 years. The plaques document the establishment of the Warley Bush Nursing Hospital in 1923, the opening of a modern new Warley facility in 1962, and the addition of the Warley Nursing Home Annexe in 1980.

For 85 years, Warley Hospital provided essential healthcare services to local residents 24/7 until forced to close its doors in 2008 due to funding shortfalls. Its loss was deeply now its legacy will live on thanks to the efforts of the Phillip Island RSL Community Men's Shed.

Peter Paul, President of Island Voice and the driving force behind the project, has commended the outstanding work carried out by the volunteer Men's Shed members.

"The PIRSL Community Men's Shed was more than enthusiastic to undertake the restoration of the four plaques, after they were finally located, depicting major milestones in the history of Warley Hospital.

"They regarded the

project as significant for the island's history and saw the plaques as a wonderful legacy to be displayed permanently in the new Community Hospi-

The Men's Shed volunteers meticulously restored the century-old plaques, mounting them on Baltic pine, donated to the Shed by a local family.

The restoration was carried out by Men's Shed felt across the island, but member and former stone mason Marcus Blake, who polished the plaques to their original condition. And the timberwork was completed by Brian Walmsley, Men's Shed coordinator, who said the project was a "labour of love"

"Many of our members have strong ties to Warley, and the restoration became something deeply personal," Brian, whose children were born at Warley, said.

"We're proud to have helped ensure Warley's legacy is honoured for generations to come.'

Kirsten Wienzerl, Ex-

ecutive Director of Primary and Clinical Services at the Health Hub — and herself born at Warley Hospital — expressed her thanks to the Men's Shed.

"This is a powerful and everlasting gift to the Phillip Island community," Kirsten said.

"The legacy of Warley will now continue to inspire and remind us all of the care and compassion that defined its service over 85 years."

The restored plaques will be permanently displayed inside the new Phillip Island Community Hospital, serving as a symbolic bridge between the island's healthcare past and its bright, modern future.

The new owners of the Westernport Hotel in San Remo, Morgan and Shiree Mountford have not only taken over the hotel, they also moved states and are about to start a family, with their first child due in July.

It might sound like a daunting load, but Morgan and Shiree are relishing the challenge and have thrown themselves headfirst into running the beloved local hotel.

Arriving a little over two months ago, the couple set up house in San Remo, and now Morgan's parents have also made the move, offering a helping hand both with the new hotel and the new baby.

"The idea was to make it a family venue, so mum and dad loved the opportunity to do that," Morgan said.

The decision to take on running the hotel came from the desire to raise their family in a regional area, rather than a small apartment in Sydney.

Morgan felt the skills he had built up running his own plumbing company would be transferrable to running a hotel.

He also said the strong feeling of community he discovered when he visited San Remo, reminded him of the community he grew up in, in NSW's Southern Highlands.

After seeing the venue advertised online, Morgan travelled to San Remo and met with former owner Nick Say. He said he was immediately struck by the friendliness of the locals, and how much the two men had in common.

"It was supposed to be a venue walk through and Nick and I ended up here for almost three hours, talking about life, pubs and the community.

Morgan discovered Nick was a similar age when he took over the hotel, and wife Mish was also pregnant with their first child.

"It really resonated with everything that I thought.

"I jumped in the car and rang Shiree and said I'm going to put a deposit down; we can make this work," he said.

Community focus

Despite the massive upheaval of an interstate move and taking on a new business, Morgan and Shiree said things have fallen into place; "it's just been effortless".

As they find their feet in the community, a list of priorities for their new venture have firmed.

First up is the bistro, which has seen a reworking of the menu.

"We have a great head chef, who has been here since last August, and I

feel like we've given him a bit more creative space," Morgan said.

'We are currently trialling new weekly specials and preparing to launch our winter menu in the coming weeks," said Shiree.

In addition to the seasonal updates, the team is working towards introducing table service to enhance the overall customer experience.

"You're coming out to a venue for hospitality – to sit, relax, and enjoy time with your friends," Morgan explained.

"We're putting a lot of effort into providing quality service and feel confident in the team's ability to make these improvements and elevate the dining experience."

Adding another level of service, the hotel has purchased a courtesy bus to help transport customers and has put a call out on social media for name suggestions.

Also on the horizon is an upgrade of the accommodation and converting one of the existing spaces into a function room.

The popular kids playroom has already had a facelift, with the addition of a big chalkboard and new toys.

Keeping the customers front of mind in all their decisions is vital, said the couple.

special thing about this place is there's a lot of different customers," Shiree said.

"Wednesday nights. which typically attract surfers and tradies, are very different from Friday nights, which draw in longtime locals who have been coming here for years."

Morgan hopes locals will embrace the changes, but also realise the hotel is still very much the place they know and love.

"I would like them to feel they're still part of it. This is where everyone comes to feel part of a community."

Shiree agrees. "It's for all ages, families, dogs, evervone"

As they settle into life in San Remo, both are enjoying meeting the locals, with Morgan in the venue every day.

"I want to be part of the community. I want to know what everyone's doing.

"My main focus is letting the locals know we're here for the long haul; we want to raise our family here."

The venue's tradition of supporting local causes is continuing, including providing vouchers for the Dalyston Youth Girls and local Biggest Morning Tea fundraisers, as well as offering display space within the venue for local artists and artisans.

"We're open to collaborations and more than happy to help out."

Morgan also hopes to continue the Westernport's reputation as a live music

"I'm working really hard at the moment, getting in touch with promoters. And also letting the locals know that music is here to stay."

He is keen to host more local musicians and promises they "will always have live music on a Sunday, no matter what".

"We want to get to a stage where everyone knows Sunday is Westernport music, and regardless of what band is on, it's going to be quality, and this is where you're going to come.

"I would love nothing more than to have an artist start here and end up coming back in a few years and selling out. Nothing would make me happier."

Research officers took advantage of calm conditions at sunrise last Friday to carry out drone photography of Silverleaves and Cowes east erosion hotspots, as part of an ongoing study.

Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) science officer Bec Stuart flew the drone over more than 2km of beach, from Erehwon Point to the end of Silverleaves' residential area, at low tide from the dunes to the water line.

The drone takes hundreds of photos, at 100 metres altitude, to measure sand move-

The drone coastal monitoring program started in 2018, and has been carried out every six to eight weeks since it commenced.

DEECA released the draft East Cowes and Silverleaves Adaptation Plan at the end of April, which is out for community comment until May

From page 1 council to keep the buildings. No developer lobbies to keep buildings so we're not asking for more, we are asking for less.

"It's very unusual to go to VCAT and ask for less demolition and more restoration of a heritage building."

He said he could have taken the hotel redevelopment to VCAT for approval, and had also sought government intervention, but ultimately decided the course of least resistance was best.

Mr Amatruda said \$500,000 State Government tourism feasibility grant they received for the hotel development was not spent.

Objectors

Mr Amatruda said "push back" from objectors to council had meant the hotel proposal had not been a "pleasant process".

"They pushed them so hard, even though we were trying to build something great," he said.

"We are all getting older, so let's make what we have beautiful and improve the (2010) permit.

He said objectors were calling for the Boys Home to be turned into a memorial, or a community or cultural centre "but they don't own it, it's privately owned".

"If they continue to push, we can demolish what was approved for demolition, which is a large part of the buildings. That is an option if we get too much push back.

"But we don't want to do that. We don't want to take down anything, we want to restore."

He said objectors should be careful what they wish for, explaining if this variation of the permit failed he would revert to the 2010 plans in their entirety.

"If they want something and they get it, they may ultimately

"I want to emphasise you can protest all you want, but something will be built there."



As allowed under the 2010 permit, the recreation hall in the top north-east corner will be demolished for townhouses.

Variation

Mr Amatruda said they were seeking variations to the 2010 permit including keeping all heritage buildings, which would mean the 21-lot subdivision would reduce to about 15.

The old residence on Boys Home Road was originally set to be demolished, but he was now seeking to keep that, which would reduce the lots on that section from four to two.

The 1970s caretaker building on Forrest Avenue would, however, be the only building to be demolished to allow for the originally-planned subdivision.

The original planning permit allowed for partial demolition of the main building, including adding parking, but Mr Amatruda said they planned no changes and there would be sufficient parking.

"We are sacrificing money and profit, that's what we're prepared to do to retain the history.

"We are not a big bad developer. When we bought the building it was months away from being burnt down. It had no doors or windows, it was a mess, vandalised by squatters.

"We want to restore the buildings to better than they were."

Over the past six months Mr Amatruda had run a twopronged parallel planning process, working on both the hotel plans and the 2010 plans, running "two on purpose"

The 2010 permit had been extended several times by various owners and when Mr Amatruda purchased the site in 2021 he extended it to October 2026.

He said they had recently successfully sought a further extension for another three years to complete.

While there were no milestones for the project, once they received the green light it would take about 18 months to complete.

Because the plans are based on the 2010 permit there is no requirement for the owner to make a publicly available estimate of the value of the development and are not required to be made public because they're based on an approved permit.

However Mr Amatruda said he had already spent considerable money, estimating about \$500,000 on the hotel plans, a further \$500,000 on the 2010 plans, and "millions" on the restoration.

He guessed once green lighted, the 2010 plans would cost about \$15 million, "which is a builder's rate", as he is the owner of Omni Property Group, which develops properties around Victoria.

history: a snapshot

MAJOR PROJECTS

Newhaven's old Boys Home was constructed by the Mission of St James and St John in 1925 to house boys aged between nine and 16.

To this day former boys tell of a dark and tragic past at the

It was sold to Knox School in the early 2000s, which applied to develop the site into housing, taking their plans to VCAT in

In 2010 concerned local residents formed the Newhaven Residents Group, objecting to the development at VCAT, with amendments made through mediation.

Under the original 2010 permit, more than 100 trees would be razed, including pines, cypress trees, several natives, garden plantings and an old orchard, with the developer required to buy offset vegetation.

The 2010 plans show all outbuildings would be demolished - which was agreed to at VCAT including the 1930s cottage facing Boys Home Road, the recreation hall, bike shed, office block, amenities and laundry block and generator/fuel store.

Where these buildings once stood would instead be a mix of vacant lots and lots with twostorey dwellings, with six units in the north-east corner on Forrest Avenue and four units facing west to Boys Home Road.

A north-east section of the main building would be demolished and another wing gutted to make way for a carpark and

There would be six units built in the main building's northern section, overlooking Forrest Avenue, with the Romanesque exterior façade - arguably the most iconic characteristic of the building - required to be maintained.

The renowned chapel - which was built in 1935 and has hosted numerous Newhaven College plays, assemblies, and even year 12 exams - would be residential

The 2010 VCAT ruling said the chapel, headmaster's residence, and two dormitory and living wings had "primary heritage significance", with the permit retaining the key buildings and removing "those of lesser or no importance".

While the development never went ahead, the permit was still valid, after passing through multiple owners in recent years.

In 2020 the property - its 14-bathroom 14-bedroom, boarding house, chapel and ancillary buildings - was sold for about \$3.5 million, and previous to that sold for \$1.65 million in 2015 to a group of 10 investors.

In 2020 the then president of the National Trust's Bass Coast branch wrote to the council calling for an urgent review to protect the boys home, which had seen years of neglect and vandalism.

The National Trust said the permit allowed for the demolition of the eastern leg of the main heritage building, as well as a conversion of the lower level of the southern residential wing to car garages.

This would be disappointing if this happened, as the shire's heritage expert stated it would be preferable to retain this area," the Trust's spokesperson said at the time.

He said demolition of the teacher's cottage on Boy's Home Road was also permitted in 2010.

Edward's plaque returns

HISTORY

A brass plaque commemorating one of the island's most famous residents, Edward the Koala, has been repaired and returned to its original site.

The sign was reinstated last month, on the site of Edward's favourite tree, in Dunsmore Road, just up from the beach.

Edward rose to national prominence after he was rescued in 1939 by Phillip Island conservationist. Florence Oswin Roberts, the proprietor of Broadwater Guest House in Cowes.

The guesthouse became famous in 1939 when Mrs Oswin Roberts turned it into a koala hospital.

In the aftermath of the bushfires that devastated parts of Phillip Island, Mrs Oswin Roberts rescued all the burned and homeless koalas she could find, set them up in hammocks in almost every room and on the verandas, and tended their wounds, hiring nurses from Melbourne to help her.

Mrs Oswin Roberts also found a helpless baby clinging to its dead mother after the bushfires.

She took the defenceless crea-

ture back to Broadwater to raise it, calling on her friend Crosbie Morrison, the famous naturalist, for advice on how best to care for the tiny orphan.

The koala was christened Edward, although it was discovered to be female after its death.

Edward thrived under Mrs Oswin Roberts' care, and despite being free to roam, showed no signs of wanting to return to the bush.

As a result, Mrs Oswin Roberts became the only person to ever legally own a koala in Victoria. She was granted permission to keep Edward by the Chief Inspector of Fisheries and Game, after a special bill was passed through the Victorian Parliament.

Such was the strength of the bond between the two, the koala rarely left her side, and became


famous making appearances with Mrs Oswin Roberts at charity functions in Melbourne for the war effort.

For seven years, Edward held court at Broadwater, receiving thousands of visitors and being regularly photographed with them.

Edward was also a great favourite with the residents of Cowes, who were well accustomed to seeing the pair around the town.

Edward's death in 1944 made headline news around Australia at the time, with bulletins across the nation mourning the death of Australia's most famous koala.

Edward's body was taken to a taxidermist and is now on display in the Phillip Island and District Historical Society Museum at Berninneit.



Today, he brings that same storytelling expertise to the Society's video content, helping to give its exhibitions a polished and professional touch.

Jason has lived on and off Phillip Island for the past 15 years. In addition to his media work, he has operated hospitality businesses, chaired community forums, and contributed to strategic tourism planning. He now channels his passion for history into preserving and promoting the island's stories – and welcomes others to join him.



Call for Bass Coast to unite for reconciliation

National Reconciliation Week is a time for everyone in Bass Coast to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, and to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

This year the theme of Bridging Now to Next, reflects the ongoing connection between past, present and future and asks us all to step forward together, to look ahead and continue the push forward as past lessons guide us.

Bass Coast Reconciliation Network (the Network) acknowledges Reconciliation National Week each year with member organisations hosting events at their workplaces for their teams with some open to all community members to attend.

National Reconciliation Week is bookended by two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey:

- The successful 1967 referendum when Australians voted to remove clauses in the Australian Constitution that discriminated against Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples
- The 1992 Mabo decision when the High Court of Australia recognised native title-the recogni-

tion that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' rights over their lands did survive British colonisation.

"We all have a role to play when it comes to reconciliation, and in playing our part we collectively build relationships and communities that value Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, histories, cultures, and futures," said co-Chair of the Network, Dr Bev Munro.

The day before National Reconciliation Week, May 26, is National Sorry Day commemorated nationally to remember and honour the Stolen Generations.

Public events happening across Bass Coast to acknowledge the week include a program of free First Nations films and Story Times at your local Myli Library, a special free screening of "Off Country" at Berninneit, Cowes and celebrating the launch of Bass Coast Health's Reconciliation Action Plan on Wednesday May 28 in Wonthaggi.

"Across Bass Coast, organisations are acknowledging National Reconciliation Week in their workplaces, schools and communities and everyone is encouraged to join in and show their support," said Dr Munro.

Come together on Sorry Day

Bass Coast Reconciliation Network invites the community to acknowledge the mistreatment of Australia's Stolen Generation and promote healing on National Sorry Day with a community gathering at Cape Paterson Surf Life Saving Club.

The community will come together in a collective show of reconciliation between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and non-Indigenous Australians on May 26 to recognise the important date of significance. National Sorry Day, also known as the National Day of Healing, is an annual commemoration that acknowledges the mistreatment of First Nations children who were forcibly removed from their families, communities and cultures.

First Nations community member and co-Chair of the Network, Dr Bev Munro said "Sorry Day provides us an opportunity to reflect on the Stolen Generations and the pain and suffering past practices have caused".

"However, we need to also reflect on our current practices as a community. The recent report 'Are you waiting for us to die?' notes that only six per cent of recommendations made to support the Stolen Generation have been implemented. These recommendations were made almost 28 years ago. How sorry are we as a country if this is our response?

Bass Coast Reconciliation Network co-Chair, Kate Lochlin, said Sorry Day was an important day for the whole community to acknowledge the pain and suffering caused by the forced removal of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children.

"The Cape Paterson gathering on National Sorry Day provides us with an opportunity to think of all the children and their families of the Stolen Generation and the heartache endured by their forced separation," Ms Lochlin said.

We encourage the community to join us in a collective commitment to healing and support for First Nations.

The Bass Coast Reconciliation Network includes membership from Bass Coast Shire Council, Bass Coast Health, Westernport Water, Phillip Island Nature Parks, Bunurong Land Council, Bass Coast South Gippsland Reconciliation Group, Myli - My Community Libraries, West Gippsland Catchment Management Authority and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community members.

The gathering will include a Welcome to Country and Smoking Ceremony by Bunurong man, Robert Ogden and a guest speaker from the local Aboriginal community, followed by a light lunch, varns and music by Fonzie (Paul) Patten. Released in 2024, the film is written and directed by an Italian actress and singer Margherita Vicario. The year is 1800 and we are at the Sant'Ignazio music institute for orphaned girls outside Venice. The conductor is to receive the newly elected Pope Pius VII, but is nervous about the concert. He has been commissioned to perform a self-composed work but struggles with writing and note block.

Although not based on a specific story, it is the story of many girls in this situation in Italy at that time. The historical context is

convent-conservatories in and around Venice, where orphaned or abandoned girls were taught to sing, sight read and play instruments by musical priests. The most famous of these was Antonio Vivaldi, music master at the Ospedale della Pietà, whose music is sparingly but effectively used in the film.

By 1800, however, the anti-clerical Napoleon controlled a huge swathe of northern and central Italy, and when he repressed the country's religious or-ders in 1807, Venice's charitable music schools closed for good. A very different scenario to that of other countries where the girls were not taught anything and only used as servants.

"Gloria!" is a tribute

that there were four such to all the talented women who composed music in previous centuries and who never received the recognition their male counterparts enjoyed

The film runs for 106 minutes and is rated R.







Destruction of bushland at Grantville

It's strange how some people can't see the wood for the trees when it comes to environmental issues. In Bass Coast Shire, a handful of noisy people shrieked about demolishing a few dying trees to allow a road widening scheme for a sand extraction site which had already been granted a permit - yet they have not raised a squeak about cutting down and setting fire to native vegetation and habitat trees in Stanley Road.
