This living cultural space will provide world-class, diverse programs enriched with local art and performance, expanding and diversifying existing community programs and services.





Key members of the local arts community joined Bass Coast Shire councillors and staff, Bunurong Land Council representatives and federal and state ministers for the official opening of Berninneit on Saturday, October 28. The building opens its doors to the public on Thursday, November 2.

The long road

The road to Berninneit is a long one, with many twists and turns.

Although the journey towards the building as it stands today only began in 2019 when Bass Coast Shire councillors voted to demolish the old cultural centre and build a new facility, the seeds for a cultural and community centre were sown decades before.

Island resident Anne Davie has been advocating and working towards a centre for the Phillip Island community since the early 1990s.

"I can't believe it's happening after all these years," Anne said.

Back in 1991 she represented the Shire of Phillip Island at a conference on creative communities.

"I presented a paper on community culture on a holiday island," she recalls.

"In 1992 I was a Phillip Island Shire councillor when I proposed a motion to build a community and arts facility.

When it passed, I called out 'hallelujah'," she recalls.

It took another 31 years before Anne's vision was finally realised.

There were multiple plans and consultations for the redesign of the centre - with six different designs proposed over the decades.

It was in May 2020 that the current building - and all its features - began to take shape.

Jackson Clements Burrows, a Melbourne architectural firm responsible for redesigning the St Kilda foreshore, and multiaward winners for their innovative public projects, won the tender to design the new building.

At the time, the architects described the lengthy consultation process already undertaken by council, and the existence of draft plans as a bonus for the team.

"We're very lucky, there's been five years of consultation and two well-developed designs, so we know where the building functionality needs to go. We understand what the building should be," they said.

were a cause for excitement, at the time describing it as an opportunity to show what Phillip Island was capable of.

And it would finally be the realisation of a long-held dream.

Back in 1992, a Phillip Island Arts and Cultural Committee was formed. The committee ran until 2018, with Anne at the helm as president the entire time.

We set about to show how important it is for people to come together and be entertained," she explained, describing the group as very diverse.

But they were united in their desire to have a building in Cowes, "to express us as a community".

"People have put in so much work. I have probably been with it the longest time, but the commitment of other groups has been outstanding.'

The previous cultural centre (demolished in 2020) was initially the shire offices, not a custombuilt facility that reflected the needs of the community.

She believes Berninneit will For Anne, the new designs strengthen community creativi-

ty, by having community groups and creative activities under the one roof.

"This is a very creative community and I think because Phillip Island was on its own as an island for so long, people learned to entertain themselves.'

And the location of the new centre is steeped in island history.

"It's a great site for the building. There's so much history ... the old Cowes primary school, the shire of Phillip Island ... and now once again people will be coming together to celebrate ourselves as a community," Anne said.

"I'm very pleased we will be celebrating our First Nations history too.

"The only disappointing part is so many who put in so much over so many years are no longer with us. But they have their legacy now."

When it came to thanking all those who tirelessly campaigned for the new building, she said there were too many to list, but they were all "passionate about arts and culture and what it does for a community".

The new building will be a great source of pride for the community Anne believes.

"It will ensure a pathway to the future, providing a place where people can participate, interact and enjoy diverse activities that are enhancing experiences.

The council of the day committed themselves and I'm very pleased with that, and their belief in it.

"You design a building and then it shapes you," Anne said.

"I think it has enormous po-

She hopes any sceptics in the community will come inside and embrace the opportunities it offers.

"This will be a great place for interaction."

As well as providing a new library, 250 seat theatre/cinema, art gallery, museum, and function spaces, the new Cultural Centre will have Passive House (PassivHaus) certification, only the second public building in Australia to achieve this.



The show is presented by local promoter Ocean Sounds, in the lead up to the popular festival on Churchill Island on January 6.


Earlier this year, supporting the release of her new single "Lion", Steph toured the UK and Europe, playing in seven different countries, including support shows with Vance Joy.



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Baluk Arts presents Millowl

Baluk Arts is delighted to present its exhibition entitled "Millowl" to launch Berninneit, the new Cowes Cultural Centre.

The exhibition, "an immersive, contemporary Aboriginal art experience exploring spirit and place", features five of the country's most talented Aboriginal artists including Bunurong artist Adam Magennis, Nyul Nyul Saltwater man Lowell Hunter (aka 'Salty One'), Boonwurrung/Barkindji artist Mitch Mahoney, Guringai Saltwater woman Charlie Woods (aka 'Charlie Needs Braces'), and local Bass Coast resident Dunghutti/Ngayawana artist Patrice Muthaymiles Mahoney AOM.

The exhibition will feature an array of art forms, including a traditionally made stringy bark canoe, contemporary paintings, a sand sculpture, projections, all accompanied by a commissioned musical score. Each piece in the exhibition carries with it a unique story, connecting the viewer with the artist, in celebration of the spirituality and history of the land, sky, waters, and animals of Millowl.

In the lead up to the exhibition, Baluk Arts ran a series of public activations including a beachside workshop by Salty One at Berrys Beach.

"For me ... the sand is ultimately my canvas ... We can learn a lot from understanding how indigenous peoples have looked after and nurtured the lands for countless generations," he said.

The lead up also included a five-day residency with Mitch Mahoney creating a traditional stringy bark canoe which will feature in the exhibition.

"For us First Nations people, art is a way of passing on knowledge. It's through the making of things, through the telling of those stories that we pass on knowledge to [the next] generation." Mitch said.

For the exhibition, local Bass Coast resident Patrice Mahoney OAM, has created a painting celebrating the wildlife on the island and her connection to it.

"I make work from my con-

nection and respect for the intersection of the landscape. One that is deeply personal, as the iwata (the echidna, my Anēwan country's totem) through to where I am, how I feel, and the always changing chapters in my life."

Adam Magennis is a Bunu-

rong artist, Indigenous activist, archaeologist and Director of Kaptify Art Consultancy. Adam's style is influenced by the works of Salvador Dali, the social sciences of archaeology and anthropology, the natural sciences and ecology and geology and the theory of cultural ecology.

For the musical score, Baluk Arts has commissioned one of the fastest up and coming Aboriginal musicians in the country, Charlie Needs Braces, to create a unique piece that speaks to the artworks in the exhibition and to the island itself.

"There are so many amazing things about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures," the musician said.

"I hope that [the work] evokes joy, happiness [and] celebrations!"

The opening ceremony will feature a Welcome to Country and smoking ceremony by the Bunurong Land Council, providing an opportunity to acknowledge the traditional owners of the land and their enduring connection to it.

Guests will have the privilege of hearing directly from the artists, gaining insights into their creative process and the stories behind their artworks. The opening will also feature a live performance by Charlie Needs Braces.

A proud Mutti Mutti man, Kutcha is our storyteller in the treasured tradition of Uncle Jack Charles and Archie Roach.


His mesmerising music creates connections across cultures, generations and spaces, while his charismatic stage presentation deepens our understanding of Australia's first people.

Bold Berninneit -"magnificent" and "remarkable"

The new cultural centre in Cowes was officially opened on Saturday, in front of a small but enthusiastic crowd, with guests describing the building as "magnificent" and "remarkable".

The official ceremony preceded the community preview evening on Wednesday, with the doors to the new facility opening to the public on Thursday this week.

At Saturday's event acting Bass Coast Shire Council CEO, James Stirton welcomed representatives from the state and federal governments, the Bunurong Land Council, councillors, staff, Russell Broadbent – member for Monash, and members of the local arts community.

Mayor, Cr Michael Whelan said opening Berninneit was a special moment for many.

"It really is an honour to officially open this remarkable building." Cr Whelan said.

"Berninneit is a testament to the power of a community coming together and celebrating our shared vision and connections.

"It will bring years of performance, visual arts, story gather-

ing and learnings to our community and beyond, entertaining and enriching generations to come."

Jillian West from Bunurong Land Council Aboriginal Corporation delivered a Welcome to Country, explaining "it's where old relationships are re-established and new relationships are formed".

Senator Jess Walsh, representing the Federal Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government, said centres like Berninneit play a vital role in communities.

MotoGP artwork swiped by fans

An artwork installation depicting local wildlife on motorcycles, displayed at the entrance to Phillip Island for the MotoGP, has been stolen.

Created by Cape Woolamai artist Zev Landes, the cute characters were a "fun way to welcome everyone to the island".

Unfortunately some fans clearly took the characters to heart ... and home, with the artwork stolen from outside the Newhaven Visitor Information Centre on the Monday after the GP.

Zev said he reported the theft to the police and posted about it on social media and said both police and the community were incredibly supportive.

Members of the community reported seeing a black van and a ute stopping and taking the artwork.

Zev, who paid for the installation from his own money, is devastated by the loss.

"I'm going to treat this disaster as a compliment and I'm flattered people wanted the art," he told the Advertiser.

"I love drawing animals and wildlife as it helps people connect to the nature around us and so I included some of our island's best known local species.

"I created and paid for the art-

work myself and had the permits to display it, with the support of the team at the visitor information centre.'

Zev said as well as creating a fun and friendly welcome, he hoped the artwork, which included penguins, koalas, wallabies and echidnas, would raise awareness about wildlife and help reduce the roadkill death toll.

He thinks excited fans probably souvenired the pieces, but the theft has left him out of pocket.

"It costs around \$700 in mate-

rials to make the display," he ex-

"I would love to be able to put them out every year, and it would be great if someone could help do it again next year."

The staff at the visitor centre said the display was popular with visitors, with a lot of people commenting on them and stopping and taking photos and selfies.

Zev said it would be good if some of the major brands involved in the MotoGP, including the Australian Grand Prix Corporation were open to supporting some "non-commercial ventures" around the event.

"Artists want to get involved. They've got the talent, skills and enthusiasm," he said.

There's so many creative voices on the island - we just need the support to bring spaces to life."

He's also hoping someone in the community knows where his artwork has ended up.

"If anyone's mate has them in their pool room, just ask them to drop them back at the information centre, or to contact me over instagram@zevlandes," Zev said.

If he creates new artwork for next year's event, he plans to make it "souvenir-proof".

"I'll make them bigger, so they can't fit in a car so easily," he said.

Sign off? Protest group's illegal display

PROTEST

A display of signs on the San Remo foreshore, peddling a Covid vaccination conspiracy, has raised some eyebrows in the community.

Jane Ross, who helps organise Anzac and Remembrance Day events in San Remo each year questioned whether the group had permission to erect the signs near the San Remo cenotaph.

"Two weeks out from Remembrance Day, I take major issue with anyone who has not donned a uniform and put their life on the line in the service of their nation, being referred to as "the fallen"," she wrote.

The display was organised by the South Gippslanders for Freedom and Inclusivity, which describes itself as a "safe space to connect and find support", and invited those who felt the Covid vaccines had impacted on their health or family connect with them. Bass Coast Shire Council said the display was not authorised and officers will remove any signs that remained on the foreshore.

While Covid lockdowns are a thing of the past, across the country small groups of protestors continue to rally against vaccinations, lockdowns and other government policies.

The self-described "sovereign citizens" believe they are not under the jurisdiction of the government and the law doesn't apply to

Back in April, a local chapter of My Place tried unsuccessfully to hold an event on Phillip Island.

My Place groups oppose Covid vaccinations and mandates and also consider themselves sovereign citizens. The groups subscribe to global conspiracies including the existence of a cabal plotting to remove ordinary citizens' freedom and describe the World Health Organisation (WHO) as a risk to national sovereignty.

They also oppose "smart cities" (using technology such as free Wi-Fi, parking sensors, recharging stations) saying it is a way to track people and establish a 20-minute travel limit without

In April, after two local venues cancelled the group's bookings, the Phillip Island My Place meeting moved to the San Remo Foreshore, with guest speakers including Café Locked Out members and Darren Bergwerf, founder of the Frankston My Place group.

In a post on the weekend, Café Lockdown warned "the government is preparing to silence your canaries.'

"And once they have snuffed out the voices of the brave, what will the future look like for your soul?" it asked.

Ten out of ten for new playground

A new playground at Rhyll, adjacent to the revamped boat ramp, opened this month. And it's been given a hearty thumbs up by the many young users who tried it out over the weekend.

The playground got off to a shaky start, as it was originally scheduled for development three years ago.

Land was provided by Bass Coast Shire Council for the playground to go ahead, after Better Boating Victoria, which took over the former children's play area for boat trailer parking, did not have the space to replace it.

"Better late than never," says Rhyll Community Association secretary Cheryl Overton, who is delighted with the new facility

"The result is splendid, and bigger and better than the playground it replaced."

Cheryl said that the community had requested council to theme the play-ground in line with Rhyll's famous wood carving statue, of a ferry captain looking out to sea.

The ferry captain is carved from the base of a magnificent and historic cypress tree on the Rhyll foreshore, after it had to be cut down.

A wood, maritime and nature theme features throughout the new play space.

Play equipment includes two upperlevel towers connected by a bridge; incorporating wooden sea pods complete with lookouts; and climbing frames and slides attached. Two musical chimes, attached to one lookout, are set off by the pull of a rope from ground level. The musical theme continues with the use of bell gongs on steel instruments, shaped as a stingray and a turtle

An old wooden boat, salvaged from the former playground, has been given a new lease of life, with disabled access; and a foghorn type arrangement allows "passengers" to speak through a pipe to a mate sitting up on the next level.

And a swing in the shape of a ship's wheel is in place.

A special entrance tunnel can be used by the kids to access the playground (alternatively just walk in) and an indigenous shelter on the foreshore boundary is a special feature waiting to be explored.

Stepping logs, and walkways to the nearby beach, are incorporated.

An attractive boundary fence, built vertically with wooden sugar poles, in keeping with the log theme, was paid for by the Rhyll Community Association with the help of Andy McFee. It is designed to keep children safely inside.

There is plenty of comfortable seating and natural shade for the older generations to use, and no-one will tire of the magnificent Swan Bay views.

According to the shire's website, the total project cost is in the order of \$300,000.

The playground was jointly funded by the Victorian Government's Growing Suburb Fund (\$235,000) and Council's adopted Capital works open space renewal program 2022/23.

Charge scheme battle continues

A new online petition is calling for Bass Coast Shire Council not to abandon the special charge scheme for Surf Beach and Sunderland Bay.

Earlier this month, the council announced on its Engage website that the contentious scheme would not go ahead, saying that feedback showed the majority of property owners in the estates opposed the scheme.

Over the years-long campaign, Say No, a group formed to oppose the scheme, had also presented four petitions with over 600 signatures from residents who did not want the scheme to proceed.

The latest petition, created by Surf Beach resident Lou Pecora, states the council can't just abandon the scheme and "force 47 per cent of the community to continue living in third world conditions".

The petition is calling on the council to amend the scheme or offer an alternative model. It claims the scheme was "outvoted by a small margin of six per cent" and that many who voted no don't live in the estates full time, or endure the "terrible wet, muddy conditions of winter, and the insufferable dusty conditions of summer".

It also criticises the format of the charge scheme process, which it claims was created for small urban communities, and was not appropriate for large coastal holiday estates.

"It was not meant for a community where perma-

nent residents are significantly outnumbered by absent property owners, who by their absence, have not experienced and cannot appreciate the difficulty of living in these conditions on a daily basis," the petition states.

Council must not be allowed to "walk away from its responsibility and obligation to provide a safe and healthy environment" the petition continues.

The petition suggests that rather than a one-size-fits-all approach, the council should allow individual streets the option to "upgrade their road to their requirements".

It has so far attracted 50 signatures – a long way from the 500+ who opposed the current council proposal – with some outlining their reasons for supporting the petition. But it appears the yes and no groups are united in their desire to see council provide a solution for the two estates.

The Say No group has previously said there were better solutions than the one being presented by the council, and invited council to meet with them.

"Come and chat with us, we are confident that there

is a way forward that could be embraced by all."

In a recent letter to the editor, another Surf Beach resident called for the roads to be fixed, saying residents had been let down by council.

"I've been informed that although the council has admitted the drainage and roads in the area are a health and safety issue, nothing will be done to fix it for at least 40 years," wrote Sam O'Loughlin.

"Surf Beach and Sunderland Bay residents are sick of this mess, please write to your councillors before the December meeting where they plan to vote down the scheme."

Signing the new petition, Ross Jamieson said streets and drainage in the area need to be improved, and if not "council must take action to manage the storm water in the street".

"The dust is not good for anyone's health nor is it good for the local flora and fauna," said Licia Prisco, a non-resident property owner who is also supporting the new petition.

"Please let's do what we can to have this proceed."

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High water pressure queried in flexi-hose flood

Nine months ago, Doug and Janet Hamilton's Smith's Beach home was flooded after a flexihose burst.

Two days after this devastating event, a similar house flood occurred nearby at Sunderland

While going through the long and arduous process of a complete rebuild of their home, the couple have discovered that there are now five, and possibly six properties in their vicinity, that have had the same thing happen in recent times.

We initially cursed the flexi hose and what we assumed was cheap manufacturing," said Ja-

"But we have now discovered that the water pressure at Smith's Beach is 1200kPa, when in fact the Australian standard for household water pressure is regulated to 500kPa."

The couple are now wondering if the high water pressure in their area is connected with their situation, and that of the other homes affected, and if so, what can be done about it.

"I had never heard of a flexihose flood before," said Janet.

"And there is no obvious connection between us and the other flooded homes. Some are old. Some are new. We now wonder if the high water pressure has something to do with what happened."

The couple's nightmare began in January this year when they left the island on a Thursday afternoon expecting to be away for about four days.

On Sunday, they got a call from a neighbour saying the windows of their house were completely steamed up, and water was running out under the doors.

The neighbour turned off the outside hot water service and the water metre, while Janet, Doug and their son rushed down to Phillip Island.

They were met with a wall of water when they opened their front door.

Every room in the house was

the night moving furniture out into the garage, but some of this, including a beautiful antique iron bed, table and chairs, coffee tables and drawers, were later found to be unsalvageable.

Dry out

Their insurance company arrived the next day and declared the house 100 per cent water saturated.

A company specialising in this type of remedial work was brought in to dry the house out, before any rebuild could begin.

It took 26 dryers, a dehumidifier and fans going flat out for seven weeks to achieve this.

Then when architraves were being removed in May it was discovered the subfloor was completely covered in mould.

This meant the entire house, flooded. They worked well into including the bathroom and kitchen, with all woods, doors and cupboards swollen, had to be gutted.

We were left with the stumps, joists and bearers," said Doug.

It is only now that new flooring and additional joists are finally going in.

A mould test will be conducted this week, before the plastering can proceed.

If all goes well with the test, plastering can begin.

"Our insurance has been great, but this has been a long and ugly process which I wouldn't wish on anyone," said Janet this week.

"We have told as many people as we can about our experience, encouraging them to replace flexi hoses regularly and to install a pressure regulator valve ... but we can only reach so many people."

Warning

Janet wants the couple's story told to warn others in the community about what happened as a preventative measure.

A builder aware of the couple's experience told them the Australian standard for household water pressure is regulated to 500kPa.

'When he had the pressure tested for us it was 1200kPa. That is a huge discrepancy. New taps are internally regulated to 500kPa. But not everyone has

"Who is responsible for control of water pressure, and to what standards," is a question she would like answered, in light of their awful experience.

"It has been a terrible nine months for us, and I want people to be aware of what can happen so preventative action can be taken.

"Particularly now that it has come to light that the same thing happened to two neighbouring homes within the last two-year period, and three others that we are aware of more recently."

Janet said she was out walking a few months ago and saw the Steam Matic team that assisted her, working at another Smiths Beach house.

"They commented to us that this was another flexi-hose job. The downstairs of that home had to be gutted too.

"While we initially blamed the hose back in January, we now believe high water pressure played a role."

Westernport Water was contacted for comment and provided a comprehensive response (see separate story) and information on the issue.



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
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
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Westernport Water responds to flooding query

Geoff Russell, Manager Communications and Engagement, Westernport Water, responded to queries raised by a Smith's Beach couple whose home was completely flooded after a flexihose burst in their kitchen.

He said Plumbing Standards state the maximum static pressure within buildings should not exceed 500kPa and it is essential for property owners to consult with a licensed plumber who is familiar with the current standards and requirements.

A licensed plumber can determine the water pressure in your specific area and provide advice to ensure compliance with the Building Act 1993 and Plumbing Standards.

Mr Russell provided the following information in response to the flooding of a number of homes in the Smith's Beach area in the past two years.

- Phillip Island customers receive drinking water from an enclosed water storage basin on top of the hill in San Remo. From there, water is gravity fed through the water supply system to customer properties. Water pressure in the region is subject to higher-than-average water pressure due to the nature of the gravity fed system.
- The pressure at any given property can vary depending on its elevation above sea level. Distance from the San Remo water storage basin will also influence water pressure, so it is important to engage a licensed plumber who can provide advice on your individual circumstances.
- Qualified, licensed plumbers are well-versed in Victoria's standards and requirements. If you're facing high water pressure issues, consider discussing the installation of a water pressure regulator for your plumbing system with your plumber.
- Westernport Water aims to provide a minimum water pressure of 300kPa to ensure a reliable and adequate supply of water to homes and businesses and is responsible up until the water meter stop tap. Internal plumbing is the responsibility of the property owner. Further detail can be found in Westernport Water's Customer Charter.
- Flexible braided hoses have a finite lifespan and require

- replacement by a licensed plumber in accordance with the product standards. (Further information provided below)
- To prevent unexpected highwater use, Westernport Water encourages people to turn off their stop tap when going away for an extended period. This can help to prevent leaks or plumbing issues from causing water damage if left unattended.

Q. What do customers need to do when water pressure is greater than 500kPa?

A. Consumers should be aware braided flexible hoses are required to be WaterMarked in accordance with AS/NZ 3499:2006 Water supply-flexible hose assemblies. This standard requires each hose to be marked indicating their suitability for different applications.

Q. Should I turn my water meter stop tap off when away from my property?

Maintaining our equilibrium

TOURISM

A new plan looking at longterm tourism in the region is out for public comment.

Destination Phillip Island (DPI) released the draft Destination Management Plan (DMP) last week.

"This document provides a long-term roadmap for tourism in the region and is designed as a framework that will evolve over time to provide strategies and measure success to guide tourism management and its impacts on our community," DPI said.
"This DMP has been in-

formed by, builds upon and supersedes the Phillip Island & San Remo Visitor Economy Strategy 2035 (VES2035), and draws on the most up-to-date collective intelligence across all key stakeholders."

This includes an online survey run in June and July, which gathered more than 280 responses.

Individuals and local community groups made submissions on DPI's "tourism snapshot" and those submissions also informed the draft plan.

"Maintaining an equilibrium for the impact of tourism is paramount, and is the single biggest priority for the destination," the report stated.

Contents

The draft plan said the community and other stakeholders had long campaigned for a "balanced, sustainable approach to tourism", and there was a strong reliance on environmental assets.

The plan's stated purpose is "Tourism for the greater good", stating support for sustainable growth, valuing quality over quantity and encouraging "slowing down".

Sustainability, climate change, digitised travel, economic uncertainty, competing markets and workforce available and skills are some of the key challenges identified in the report.

The report said figures from 2021/22 showed tourism accounted for 26.8 per cent of the gross regional product and 39.3 per cent of filled jobs.

These figures meant Phillip Island and San Remo was the most tourism-reliant area in Victoria, and the fourth most tourism reliant in the country, behind Lasseter in Central Australia, Kangaroo Island and the Tasmanian East Coast.

The report includes a current visitor profile and says finding the right balance between "sensitive and valuesaligned growth and conservation is crucial".

It also stated some community members see tourism growth as having a negative impact on the island.

It recommends working on attracting visitors who "understand and align" with local values, such as responsible travellers who want to care for the land and "give back to the community, and environment".

The report outlines a set of five guiding principles, and associated actions.

- Building a resilient tourism ecosystem
- · Caring for country and community
- Sharing our story with impact
- Enhancing visitor experi-
- Improving visitor moments

Suggested actions include a program where visitors can contribute money or time to local conservation projects; advocating for coastal, aquatic, dark sky, small group in-destination based tours (cycle, walking), and ev hire; supporting environmentally sensitive accommodation; peak season or location specific parking charges for nonresidents; on-demand transport; developing tracks and trails; and improved transport options.



"Investments in these centres are more than bricks and mortar – they are places where stories are told, culture is celebrated, and laughter is shared," Senator Walsh said.

"The spirit of this centre is captured beautifully by its name, Berninneit, a Bunurong word meaning 'gather together'."

Speaking at the launch, Member for Bass Jordan Crugnale said she had no doubt the new building would become the "cultural and social beating heart of the island, and create a beautiful sense of pride and place".

Ms Crugnale was representing Minister for the Suburbs, Sonia Kilkenny.

When the wind blew the cover off the building signage during her speech, inadvertently revealing the new name before the "official" unveiling, Ms Crugnale took it in her stride.

"It will be a bit like an Italian wedding when we just set it up again, the second one with cameras and videos," she quipped, to laughter from the crowd.

She went on to praise the new centre.

"It will provide the community with resources and facilities that will help enrich their lives and build their resilience.

"I want to applaud the local community for the collective and visioning effort over many years to bring us to today," she said.

"This truly is about community and gathering together."

Ms Crugnale said the state government was honoured to be part of "this remarkable project", which was funded by state and federal grants.

She also paid tribute to the council's "significant role, both in time and finances – an astound-

ing investment".

The new building was declared officially open when Cr Whelan, Senator Walsh and Ms Crugnale unveiled the Berninneit signage on the building's wall.

The \$31.3 million centre was funded by a \$21.4 million investment by council, and supported by state and federal government funding, including \$2.5 million from the Victorian Growing Suburbs Fund, \$800,000 from the Living Libraries Infrastructure Program, a \$10 million loan through the Community Infrastructure Loans Scheme and \$5 million in funding from the federal government's Building Better Regions Program.

Revealed

After the official ceremony concluded, guests were treated to a preview tour of the new facility, which includes a library, historical society display area, visitor information services, function spaces, grand hall, art gallery and theatre

A courtyard area, built around the mature, existing trees on the site, will provide an exceptional open space area for the public.

The building has passive house certification, one of the first public buildings in the country to achieve this.

Visitors were unanimous in their praise, describing the building as world-class and "magnificent", while others said it was "bold" and "unapologetic".

"I am just so thrilled with it," said former mayor Pam Roth-field, who was especially excited about the new Historical Society museum.

President of the Artist Society of Phillip Island, Miranda Sage said she loved the new building.

"I like the proportions, the space, the way it brings the outside in," Miranda said.

"It's inspiring."

Many praised Berninneit's environmental credentials and the connection to the island's aboriginal heritage, which was incorporated into designs throughout the centre.

The week of celebrations will continue, with Berninneit opening to the community on November 2 and the inaugural program revealed on November 1.

DAL process extension

ENVIRONMENT

The long process to declare Bass Coast a Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) continues, with the government announcing an extension to the declaration.

It said more time is needed to consider the report from the advisory committee, which was submitted to the government in June.

Last Friday, Jordan Crugnale Member for Bass announced the Bass Coast Shire area had been redeclared under Part 3AAB – Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) of the Planning and Environment Act by the Governor in Council, commencing on October 28.

"I want to assure our community that the DAL is well progressed and that it is being redeclared as the Act requires that a Statement of Planning Policy (SPP) be prepared, endorsed and approved within one year of the declaration commencing," Ms Crugnale explained.

The Bass Coast Shire area contains distinctive rural and coastal landscapes, significant biodiversity and cultural heritage values, productive agricultural land and natural resources, and was first declared under the landmark DAL legislation in 2019.

The draft Bass Coast Statement of Planning Policy (SPP) was prepared by the former Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning in collaboration with Traditional Owners – the Bunurong Land Council Aboriginal Corporation, Bass Coast Shire Council, other agencies and authorities, and with local communities.

The draft SPP recommended locking in town boundaries and tightening planning controls to protect significant landscapes, with six areas declared state or regionally significant including the coast and hinterland between Cape Woolamai and Ventnor, as well as the Rhyll Inlet, and areas north of Cowes-Rhyll Road to Newhaven.

During the public consultation in 2022, a total of 747 written public submissions were received and the former Minister for Planning referred the draft SPP and all written submissions to a standing ad-

visory committee for independent advice.

In May the independent planning panel hearings for the DAL closed, after listening to more than 70 parties and 30 witnesses over two months, as well as 750 written submissions.

Panel members carried out several days of site inspections across Phillip Island, San Remo and Bass Coast.

Redeclared

The independent committee submitted its report of findings and recommendations to the Minister for Planning on June 22.

This report is still under consideration, Ms Crugnale confirmed.

She went on to say that "given the significant number of submissions received, the important issues raised and input from local communities and stakeholders, the Bass Coast has been redeclared to allow more time for the SPP to be finalised, endorsed and approved in consideration of the Committee's report."

Ms Crugnale said several factors have delayed the program from when it was first declared back in October 2019 including the pandemic and also the volume of submissions received and the decision to refer it to the standing advisory committee.

"To do this properly and well, having the formal hearings was imperative given just how active, invested and connected our local community is to where they live."

All public submissions and the report of the standing advisory committee are under consideration, which inform the finalisation of the SPP.

"I want to thank our community and all the stakeholders for their active participation in this process," Ms Crugnale said.

"The hearings were a positive step and brought up matters of complexity that need time for the department to consider.

"It goes without saying we want to make sure this beautiful part of Victoria continues to be a great place to live, work and visit, is protected from the pressures of development and ensure we make the right decision to preserve what we value here."

Covid cases rise

Covid case numbers are again on the rise across Victoria and Bass Coast is not immune to the trend.

Bass Coast Health CEO Jan Child said more Covid cases have been presenting to the Urgent Care Centre at Cowes and Emergency Department at Wonthaggi Hospital for treatment and more BCH staff had also fallen ill with Covid than usual.

She said while many people hoped the worst of the pandemic was behind us, the virus has never left completely and the prospect of another outbreak was real.

"Despite the risk Covid poses to the health of our community, we are fortunate that we are now armed with the knowledge about public health measures we can take to protect ourselves as best as possible," she said.

"We can reduce our risk of exposure to Covid by wearing a mask in crowded spaces or avoiding them altogether.

"We can gather with family and friends outdoors instead of inside where possible and if we do gather inside, then we can open windows and doors to im-

prove ventilation and reduce the risk of exposure to Covid should anyone have it and not know.

"It's vital that we ensure our Covid vaccinations are up-todate as these vaccinations will give you the best protection against the severity of Covid. Vaccinations are available at GP clinics and pharmacies.

"We should all stay home when unwell and symptomatic, but if we do need to go out when we are symptomatic, we should wear a properly fitting mask.

"We should also cover our mouths when coughing and sneezing, dispose of tissues carefully, regularly wash and sanitise our hands, and clean surfaces that are commonly touched by people."

People with respiratory symptoms should also take a Rapid Antigen Test to detect Covid so that if eligible, they can access antiviral treatment that is effective in reducing severity of disease. Bushfires: a local perspective

The Captain of the Phillip Island brigade, Lino Drazzi answered questions and busted some myths about the fire season on the island.

We live on an island and we're surrounded by water, so bushfires aren't really an issue here.

We live on a great island which offers some great environmental features which we all love to visit and explore, from our beautiful beaches and their coastal reserves such as Cape Woolamai to walks through our bushland reserves such as Oswin Roberts. The Island also has extensive farming and grasslands and of course tree and coastal scrub lined areas of Silverleaves, Red Rocks and Ventnor to name a few places. With these beautiful environmental features, there is also a risk of bushfire.

We do not get those long running fires, such as the ones we see in East Gippsland which spread over large distances, however we are just at risk for fires starting and spreading throughout our area.

We are unique in that we have only one exit point. Generally, when the fire season is upon us, we have large numbers of visitors to the area who really are not aware of the bushfire risk. This does complicate the situation when we do have fires and those from outside the area panic as they don't think of bushfire as part of their visit to the Island.

I don't have an evacuation plan. If there's a fire, we'll just go to the beach.

We hear this one a lot! Going to the beach is a plan, but is it your best plan?

You have got to remember, bushfires occur on hot, dry and windy days and in many cases, access to the beach is through a bush lined area. You may end up stranded at the beach in extreme heat and windy conditions. There may be heavy smoke and your exit via the coastal scrub lined walking track may not be available due to fire.

There is also the issue of tides, which again can be dangerous and leave you completely isolated. You are likely to be stuck out there for hours and will need to be prepared with water, shade, masks, etc. Also escaping to the beach may be the plan for many Australia wildlife, so you may be sharing your beach with local snakes and other dangerous animals.

Are there any bushfire prone areas on Phillip Island?

Yes, there are. The Victorian Government as a recommendation of the 2009 Victorian Bushfire Commission mapped the state of Victoria in respect to bushfire risk.

Actually, quite a large area of Phillip Island is Bushfire Prone Area (as per the map - see the light brown area).

The red areas are mapped with the Wildfire Management Overlay, which means a higher risk of bushfire. More information about Bushfire Prone Areas and a Wildfire Management Overlay can be found on the Victorian Government Department of Transport and Planning website.

I live in Silverleaves. There are a lot of trees around my house. What do I need to do to prepare for fire season?

Silverleaves offers a beautiful environment in which to live and enjoy, however it must be remembered that the area is considered a high-risk area for bushfires.

Your first step in how to prepare for the fire season is to have a bushfire plan. Make sure your family knows it and sticks to it. Consider your individual circumstances and align your decision points on leaving and staying with the Australian Fire Danger Ratings.

With a Fire Danger Rating of Extreme or Catastrophic,

and protect my home. Staying and protecting your home can be your plan. Whilst CFA recommends leaving early, under the Emergency Management Act, if someone has a financial interest in the property, they can decide to stay. Anyone making this decision should be aware of the risks it involves.

- Defending your home requires at least two fit adults who are physically and mentally able to work for long periods in difficult conditions.
- If defending, CFA recommends that you have at least 10,000 litres of firefighting water, protective clothing, and appropriate firefighting hoses and pumps.
- Homes in high-risk bushfire areas are not defendable under Catastrophic conditions.
- Defending your home is very risky – you could die or be seriously injured.
- During a fire event, emergency vehicles and aircraft may not be able to attend your property.

Have there ever been any serious bushfires on Phillip Island?

Fortunately, Phillip Island has avoided any major fires over the past many years. There have been numerous smaller fires, such as the five-acre fire in Ventnor last year, but this does not mean we should sit back and relax and feel safe.

Limited fires over the last few years means increase in fuel loads, which means if we do get

fire, there is more to burn. Climate change is also an issue, with CFA continuing to research the effects of climate change on fire weather, vegetation and more, and working to find the solutions to how we fight fires in the future. Findings so far suggest:

- There has been an increase in extreme fire weather across Australia with the greatest change in the south and east.
- Fire weather in Victoria is expected to increase by a further 10-20 per cent.
- Some areas could see a tripling in the number of 'Very High' fire danger days.
- These changes in fire weather are due to an increase in temperature and reduction in
- The fire season is more regularly starting earlier. Typically starting one to three months earlier and ending two to six weeks later.

I'm making a fire evacuation kit. So far, I have a woollen blanket, a torch, some masks and a bottle of water. What else should I include?

Your plan and your personal circumstances will help decide what you need to include in your evacuation kit. That said, there is a useful CFA guide on possible items you can include.

It's rained so much recently. Everything will be too wet to burn.

The last couple of years has seen Victoria wetter due to increased rain. However, you may have noticed recently in the news, Australia has headed into a El Nino. This means reduced rainfall, warmer days and nights and consequently an increase in the fire danger for Southeast Australia.

Locally, yes there has been a lot of rain recently. However, rain followed with warmer, sunnier conditions will see more growth in our vegetation. As we head into summer, this vegetation will dry off. More growth and dry vegetation means more fuel for fire to feed off and travel through.

I live in Cowes. I don't need to do anything to prepare for the Bushfire season.

Even living in Cowes, you should look into planning for Bushfire Season. Keeping your home and garden maintained for summer is essential. An ember from a fire quite some distance away does have to potential to spark a fire at your home. During these times, CFA resources are limited as they attack the current fire and therefore response to a fire at your home during this time could be limited.

So, maintenance is key. You should also think about what you do on those days of Extreme or Catastrophic fire danger. Think about what your plans are for the day which may take you into an area of fire risk. Think about if roads are blocked or closed and therefore may limit your ability to move around or access services that you require.

Planning and preparation are vital wherever you live or holiday. With Victoria being one of the most fire risk environments on Earth, thinking about, planning, preparing and discussing your plan with your family is vital.



To help prepare for the fire season, Council's free green waste disposal period will run from November 4 until

Fee-free green waste period starts soon

Bass Coast Shire Council's annual fee-free green waste disposal period will run from Saturday, November 4 until Sunday, November 26 to encourage preparation for the fire season.

During this time, Bass Coast residents and ratepayers can dispose of green waste free of charge at Council's Waste Facilities in Grantville, Wonthaggi, Inverloch and Cowes.

Bass Coast Mayor Cr Michael Whelan said that it is important for property owners to take steps to clean up their property before the start of summer.

"We've already seen bushfires in other parts of Gippsland," Cr Whelan said, noting these were before the official fire season had even begun.

'We're encouraging all property owners to take advantage of this fee-free disposal period to ensure they're prepared before summer begins."

With the first weekend of the disposal period coinciding with the Melbourne Cup weekend, high demand can result in queues and delays, particularly on this first weekend. Disposing of your green waste in the middle of the fee-free period may help you avoid delays.

To ensure the safety of staff and community during this busy period, Cowes Recycling Bank will be limited in the loads and vehicles it can accept.

- Cowes Recycling Bank will: Only accept green waste loads up to a maximum of 2m3
- Only accept cars, utes, vans and single axle trailers. Larger vehicles (including trucks and tandem trailers) will be redirected to Grantville or Wonthaggi

Entry to the Cowes Recycling Bank will be via The Concourse end of Dunsmore Road (rather than the Settlement Road end) to assist with management of traffic.

Weed species including blackberry, English ivy, agapanthus, mirror bush and plants that cannot be mulched such as palm fronds are not accepted as green waste, however these can go in your kerbside Organics (green lid) bin at any time.

The CFA says safety during fire season is a shared responsibility, so it's vital that you understand your local risks and take actions to prepare your family and property.

Will you leave early?

An alarming number of Victorians living in high-risk bushfire areas say they would stay at their properties until they felt threatened by a bushfire, or would wait for an official warning, a CFA survey revealed.

CFA's annual Bushfire Community Survey, undertaken since 2009-10, showed 30.9 per cent would wait for emergency authorities to tell them what to do, 28.6 per cent would stay until they felt threatened and 13.8 per cent would stay and defend their

property.

has experienced Victoria many damaging fire seasons in recent memory such as the February 2009 bushfires and the 2019-20 fires, and with the prediction of a warmer spring and earlier start to this year's season, CFA is concerned that not enough people are preparing themselves for fire season and heeding CFA's advice.

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said it's concerning knowing around half of all Victorians in high-risk bushfire areas are risking their lives if a bushfire was to occur.

"Victoria has had quieter fire seasons the last few years but now is not the time for the community to become complacent," CO Heffernan said.

"And while our firefighters are always well prepared, your safety during fire season is a shared responsibility, so it's vital that you understand your local risks and take actions to prepare your family and property.

"We've seen in the recent release of the spring seasonal outlook that weather patterns are changing and we're expecting warmer and drier conditions across the state leading up to summer.

"Fires spread quickly and they threaten lives and properties. The community needs to be prepared and they need to know their triggers to act.

"Please don't rely on one source of information, utilise the multiple channels available to you. Use common sense and protect yourself and your loved ones.'

The AFAC Seasonal Bushfire Outlook for Spring released in

August, outlined that fire risk in the coming months is expected to be normal across most parts

"Now is the time to sit down with your family or household and make sure you have a bushfire survival plan. Practice this plan and be ready," CO Heffernan said.

"On hot, dry and windy days, don't drive into or through highrisk areas. Plan an alternate route or postpone your travel if possible. Continue to monitor conditions every day.'

The survey also showed 44.4 per cent believe CFA is responsible for protecting them during a bushfire, and 43.8 per cent say CFA is responsible for protecting their home.

"We simply can't get a truck to every house during a major bushfire. Fire safety is a joint effort and the community need to also take on this responsibility when living in a bushfire prone area," CO Heffernan said.

"Our promise is to continue with our mission to protect lives and property and we are lucky to have some of the best firefighters in the world to do this."

Victoria's integrated warning system includes the Vic Emergency website, app and social media channels, VicEmergency Hotline 1800 226 226, emergency broadcasters including ABC radio, Sky News TV, commercial radio and select community radio stations.

Warnings are issued when an incident is occurring, and you need to act. Make sure you understand the three levels of warnings and additional messages such as 'Evacuate Now':

- · Advice An incident is occurring or has occurred. Access information and monitor
- Warning (Watch & Act) An emergency is developing nearby. Conditions are changing and you need to act now to protect yourself and your
- Emergency Warning You are in imminent danger and need
- Evacuation An evacuation is recommended or procedures are in place to evacuate

We're asking people to take the following actions:

- Move your winter woodpile away from the house or sheds.
- Prune tree branches so they are not overhanging the roof or touching walls.
- Clear your gutters.
- Keep grass shorter than 10cm.
- Remove leaves and twigs from around your property.
- Test anything that is part of your fire plan such as sprinklers, pumps and generators.
- Check that your home and contents insurance is current and includes a level of cover in line with current building standards and regulations.

New blueprint will help Phillip Island Nature Parks manage the risk of bushfires this season. Fire can have devastating short and long-term effects on nesting species' colonies, including penguins and short-tailed shearwaters, as well as koalas who have limited ability to escape fires.

Nature Parks new plan to manage fire risks

A new blueprint will help Phillip Island Nature Parks manage the risk of bushfires this season, amid concerns that hotter, drier conditions will pose a more significant fire hazard.

The Bushfire Management Plan 2023-2028 sets out a range of fire preparedness initiatives being undertaken by Nature Parks to safeguard iconic wildlife, conservation areas and local communities on Phillip Island as we edge closer to the summer season.

Among the initiatives detailed in the new plan are the use of fire to maintain or improve biodiversity, reducing the risk of fire ignition within Nature Parks sites through education and restricted access areas, hazard management strategies, and having adequate resources to patrol for and respond to fire events promptly.

The plan builds on Nature Parks' Future Proofing Little Penguins initiative, which is helping to protect the widely loved animals by modify. ing penguin habitat to reduce flammability and land temperatures in high-risk areas, strengthening firebreaks and replacing vegetation with "penguin friendly" plants to reduce the speed and intensity of a bushfire.

As part of the strategy, Nature Parks conducts preseason inspections to check its asset protection zones and fuel management is carried out in accordance with appropriate standards, and ensures sprinkler systems at the Penguin Parade and Koala Conservation Reserve are fully functional.

Nature Parks staff also participate in property advice visits with the Country Fire Authority to support adjacent landholders with their fire preparations, and is investigating the feasibility of extending sprinkler systems around at the Penguin Parade Visitor Centre as additional emergency shelter.

Phillip Island Nature Parks Ranger-in-Charge Ben Thomas said climate change and the threat of more frequent, destructive bushfires had ensured a comprehensive fire preparedness plan for future fire seasons.

"While bushfires are relatively uncommon on Phillip Island and most fires are quickly detected, with 65 per cent contained to 1ha or less, we cannot be complacent. We must be prepared," Mr Thomas said.

"The reality is climate change is making heat stress events and bushfires worse, not only in Australia but globally.

"These fire events are bening more frequent, more intense and more dangerous - and they have the potential to decimate communities, conservation areas and vulnerable populations of the treasured wildlife we are fortunate to have on Phillip Island.

"In particular, fire can have devastating short and long-term effects on colonial nesting species, including penguins and short-tailed shearwaters, as well as koalas who have limited ability to escape fire – not to mention the knock-on effects on business continuity and the local economy."

Wonthaggi arts centre upgrades

Council approved an additional \$40,000 for improvements to the Wonthaggi Union Community Arts Centre.

The work, to be undertaken by Branch Studio Architects, is needed as the existing facilities "in part, do not comply with current Australian Building Regulations".

Work includes upgrades to the box office and kiosk, toilets, office, disability access, lighting and wayfinding.

Cr David Rooks said "unfortunate was when we have to spend more money than we intended", but praised the work of council officers around the tender process, describing it as 'good due diligence".

Statutory reports

The three reports, including information meeting of councillors, planning and building statistics for August 2023 and contracts awarded or extended under the CEO delegation were passed as a block.

There was no discussion on any of the reports from any councillor.

There was one plan-ning permit refused and 32 approved in August, including a second su-permarket in Grantville, and changes to the Woolworths car park in Cowes, which would see four less car parks, but the creation of five pick-up parking spaces created.

The report shows there were 39 new applications received in August, with 25 open building enforcement cases.

There were 52 open complaints/cases planning enforcement.

There was only one contract awarded under the CEO delegation \$338,000 for a retaining wall and enclosure at the Old Wonthaggi Railway Station.

Early Childhood leases

New leases were granted for three early childhood centres, in Wonthaggi, North Wonthaggi and Corinella.

A nine-year lease for the White Road centre was granted to the Bass Coast Children's Centre Incorporated, with rent of \$20,124 per annum, increasing annually by four per cent.

A nine-year sub lease was granted to Y Kinders for the centre at Drysdale Street Wonthaggi, with a rent of \$10,000, increasing annually by four per cent.

Uniting (Victoria and Tasmania) secured a nineyear lease for 60 Corinella Road, with rent increment increases set over the first five years (starting at \$5000), then four per cent annually after that.

All providers will be responsible for maintenance of the premises and a program of capital works.

Beau an Australian gold medallist

Phillip Island's Beau Vernon has not let the grass grow under his feet since moving to Queensland earlier this year.

Beau, a former footy great before an on field spinal injury left him a quadriplegic in 2012, and a subsequent three time senior premiership football coach on Phillip Island, notched up a huge win in Paris last month, as a member of the Australian team that won the World Wheelchair Rugby Championship.

Australia's Steelers beat Canada to bring home the international trophy.

Other countries the Steelers played to make it to the grand final were Denmark, England and

Canada. The team then had to play the semifinal against Asian champions Japan whom they hadn't beaten in past four years.

The Steelers Australian Wheelchair Rugby team is for paraplegics and quadriplegics, and is the only footy game quadriplegics can play in.

Beau was introduced to it while in rehab after his accident in 2012. He took an interest in it, but other commitments and especially football coaching on Phillip Island took over during the following years.

It was only when he moved to Queensland's Sunshine Coast in January that he made contact with the Steelers' coach and asked if he could train with

A few of the Australian team members are based in Queensland and Beau trains with them weekly in Brisbane.

He brings tactical skill and knowledge of game play with him, thanks to his coaching background.

"It was pretty cool (for me) to put on the Aussie colours and to represent our country," he said as he arrived back on the Sunshine Coast last week.

"To win a gold medal for Australia is a great experience and one that I'm very proud of.

"It's given me a lot of confidence in setting my sights on gaining selection for next year's Paralympics."

The Paralympics Games will be held in France next August.

The penultimate round saw six categories compete in the sunshine across three days, with free practice Friday taking the honours of getting the weekend underway.

The Alpinestars Superbike Championship, Michelin Supersport's, Supersport 300's, Yamaha R3's, Oceania Junior Cup and Superbike Masters all took to the tarmac and hit the gas in their respective categories.

With the season finale looming, every result and point mattered – rendering the competition fierce with tensions running high.

Alpinestars Superbike

Friday's free practice sessions saw Yamaha Racing's Cru Halliday and Mike Jones dominate the timing charts.

Jones topped the charts in Practice 1 with a time of 1:32.885.

Halliday took timing honours during both the afternoon's second and third sessions, with 1:32.801 and 1:32.651 respectively.

A love of all things equine since he was a small boy has seen 17-year-old Newhaven College student Gabe Smith crowned World Champion at the International Mounted Games (IMG) which were held at Werribee last week.

Gabe was one of a five member Under 18s team representing Australia over four days of competition, against teams from across the world.

For the first time in the history of the International Mounted Games, which have been run annually for the past 23 years, Australia was the winner, from the 15 international teams which competed here.

Gabe's team took the gold ahead of England (second place) and New Zealand (third)

This year marked the first time that the international event has been staged in Australia.

And in another huge honour for Gabe, he was voted by 13 of the 15 international coaches in Australia for the event, as "Most Outstanding Under 18 rider" throughout the four days of competition.

Gabe's horse Blu was also named by the same international coaches as runner up champion horse in the Under 18 competition, out of the 140 horses competing.

In what has certainly been a hectic few months, Gabe also won the Australian Mounted Games Association National Individual U18 Champion title for the second year running.

Then on the weekend before the World Games, he won the Under 18 National Pairs Championship in partnership with Ryan Bissick, at Ballarat.

The International Mounted Games, originally the idea of His Royal Highness, Prince Philip over three decades ago, have a massive following across Europe, for both competitors and spectators, and is fast catching on here.

The sport is an equestrian discipline in its own right, similar to dressage, showjumping and eventing. Its origins can be traced back to the military in Europe and includes games that hark back to mediaeval times.

Played in three different formats: individual, teams and pairs, it is fast paced and showy, with athletic ability, agility, pre- ing, and describes mounted cision of riding and horsemanship, all coming into play.

Riders must navigate through various obstacles, often at full speed. A special bond is needed with their pony, with competitors required to vault off and back on their mount, to pick up an obstacle, at speeds that can average 55 kmh.

Several relay-style races require riders to pick up objects from the ground (from the saddle), weave through a series of poles at high speeds, hand items off to teammates without slowing, and dunk objects into buckets. Jousting is also a discipline, and picking up rings with a sword while cantering at speed is another challenge.

Ponies are the preferred mount, as their shorter stature make several of the races easier

Blu, a ten-year-old quarter horse and Gabe have trained and competed together for the past three years.

Future

Gabe has been riding since he was seven, and rides competitively, competes in showjumpgames as loads of fun.

The "fun" belies the skills and training one needs to become a world champion, however.

Gabe says the world games last week took competition for him up to a new level.

Used to winning, he jokes he was quite taken aback when an English competitor kept up with him in a game which in Australia he usually has a clean pair of

The sport is as much for girls as boys, and younger sister Giselle Smith is this year's U15 Australian Mounted Games champion.

Both Gabe and Giselle have been coached and mentored by their mother Tash Robinson, a teacher at Cowes Primary School. Tash is a keen horsewoman

who rode trackwork at the age of 14 and loved bush racing when growing up.

Gabe wants to see Mountain Games included as an Olympic Sport and wrote to the Olympic committee last year suggesting

Although the reply was no, he has not given up on the idea yet. His immediate aim now is to

defend his world championship title at the 2024 International Mountain Games in Italy next July.

It will certainly be a busy year in 2024 for this very focused young man.

Gabe will be studying in Year 12 for his VCE, and working to achieve a score that will get him into an equine science tertiary course. He will be training for the 2024 international mounted games in July. And he holds down a part time job breaking in and training horses after school and on weekends.

As part of this job, he has just taken delivery of a six-year-old to train for champion Victorian jockey Jamie Kah, who also loves Mountain Games competition.

And if that is not enough, he is looking forward to his interstate Australian teammates converging on Phillip Island with their horses for his 18th birthday celebrations early next year.

"Who knows," says Gabe. "They are bringing their horses. We could put on quite a spectacular show for Phillip Island."

Gabe is seeking sponsorship to pursue his dream of competing next year in Italy.
