Saved! Jetty battle gets a win

COMMUNITY

A community group fighting to save the much-loved Newhaven Jetty is celebrating after the State Government announced the jetty would be restored, repaired and reopened.

Member for Bass, Jordan Crugnale this week confirmed \$5.5 million in funding through Better Boating Victoria to repair the jetty

"We know how important the jetty is to the local community and I'm thrilled to announce funding to begin the process of renewing access for boating and fishing," Ms Crugnale said.

"Reopening this facility will support local tourism, recreational fishing and boating while preserving the character of Phillip Island's iconic waterfront."

Ben Dennis, whose restaurant is located next to the jetty, is one of the locals who led the campaign to have the jetty reopened.

"We are very happy to see it moving forward," Ben said of the announcement the jetty would be repaired.

He also thanked Amanda Keilar, a passionate local fisher, for her advocacy and "amazing support".

"She's been the backbone of this whole movement and the driving force.

"We appreciate Jordan's involvement and the pressure Melina Bath (Nationals MP) put on the government.

"We look forward to being part of the (rebuilding) process and having some local input into the design."

He also thanked the local community who supported the campaign.

Amanda Keilar said she was "beyond stoked that the community gets to retain its asset and see it reopen".

"I'm grateful to the Newhaven residents for the pressure they've put on the government."

Back in September, Amanda told the Advertiser she believed the cost to fix the Newhaven Jetty would be "a lot less than the government expected", and called for the government to release the details of inspections undertaken on the jetty.

At the time, she vowed to continue "rattling the cages", saying "we're not going to just sit down and watch it fall into the ocean".

Nationals MP Melina Bath de-

scribed the government's "backflip on the permanent closure" of the jetty" as a hard-won victory, "driven by unwavering community leadership and persistent political advocacy by The Nationals".

She congratulated everyone involved in the campaign, particularly Amanda and Ben and the Newhaven residents for their "tireless campaigning".

"Newhaven Jetty should never have been closed without notice or consultation," Ms Bath said.

"Our outdoor recreation assets are vital to local communities and the visitor economy, and their maintenance must be treated as a priority, not an afterthought.

"My focus now turns to ensuring the delivery of this project is prioritised for locals. The people of Newhaven deserve a jetty that is safe, accessible and maintained for generations to come."

Impact

Back in November 2024, Ben spoke to the Advertiser of his "deep frustration" at the closure of the Newhaven Jetty and the severe impact it had on his business.

"Our venue, cherished for weddings, functions and community gatherings relies heavily on the jetty's aesthetics and accessibility as a drawcard," Ben said.

"Since the partial closure in 2018 and now its complete shut-down with locked gates barring entry, we have experienced a sharp decline in bookings, particularly for weddings where the jetty is central to the experience."

This week, he confirmed that after being closed for some maintenance, the restaurant was due to reopen next week.

Beyond the impact on his restaurant, Ben said he witnessed firsthand the disappointment of recreational fishers who arrive at the jetty on a daily basis, only to find locked gates.

Designs

Ms Crugnale said structural inspections of the T-shaped jetty have been undertaken since its closure and this will inform the drafting of the detailed designs and approvals needed before construction can take place.

She said the jetty's lower landing would be rebuilt to make

it easier to hop on or off boats, with room for three to four vessels to be tied up at a time.

There will also be new cleats and ladders on the lower landing.

The broader jetty structure

The broader jetty structure will have new solar lighting and fendering to protect boats while moored.

Assessments of the current jetty have recommended replacement of timber decking, capping and beams, remediating the tops of wooden piles and restoring full pedestrian access.

Ms Crugnale said funding for the project was part of the 2025/26 Recreational Boating Action Plan.

The design work and approvals will be managed by the



Remembrance Day Page 14-15 Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA), working with Parks Victoria and local user groups.

It's expected the design work will begin later this year or early in 2026.



Expect delays on Phillip Island Road

ROADWORKS

Transport Victoria has advised of traffic disruption during rehabilitation works on Phillip Island Road for the next month. The work, on Phillip Island Road between Bermagui Crescent in Sunset Strip and Smiths Beach Road will take place from early November to mid-December.

Crews will be working at night, between 6pm and 5am, with motorists advised to allow up to 10 minutes extra travel time, as the road will be reduced to one lane, with lane closures and reduced speed limits in place.

"Traffic management will be on site to guide traffic through the area, one direction at a time," Transport Victoria advised.

The impacted section of Phillip Island Road is north of the Back Beach Road roundabout, and passes the Adventure Resort, A Maze'N Things, Newhaven College and the Koala Conservation Centre.

A climate for change


Climate action priorities over the next four years were discussed at a community workshop held at Berninneit last week.

"Open secret" that Phillip Island may lose MotoGP

CIRCUIT

Speculation is rife that Phillip Island will lose the MotoGP, with global media suggesting there may be a "brief stay of execution" after next year's event, "before falling off the calendar".

Two London-based motorsport media outlets – The Race and MotoGP News – have written articles in the past fortnight including "Why Phillip Island's MotoGP future is in such jeopardy" and "Albert Park circuit considered as Phillip Island replacement – but deal unlikely".

The outlets have reported it was "an open secret" for "some time" the Australian Grand Prix Corporation (AGPC) and MotoGP promoter Dorna "have been looking at alternative locations" for the Australian race.

As reported in the Advertiser in September, negotiations to secure the MotoGP at Phillip Island beyond 2026 – the final year of its contract – were underway.

At the same time MotoGP great Wayne Gardner said the event at Phillip Island was dying a "slow death" and flagged the event should be moved to another state.

The Race online motorsport news said this year's MotoGP on Phillip Island at the end of October attracted fewer fans than every other race on the planet, except Qatar and Hungary.

This year's Phillip Island event "took place amid a backdrop of fresh rumours about the track's future on the calendar and doubts over whether the historic circuit will get a new contract when its current deal expires in 12 months' time".

"There's been speculation for some time about what exactly the future holds for Phillip Island given both its somewhat chronic lack of investment and a relatively isolated location that does limit the number of possible spectators," The Race reported.

It states Phillip Island was given a 10-year deal in 2016 to run the MotoGP on condition there would be significant investment in the circuit's facilities.

"But it's hard to argue that has happened," The Race journalist Simon Patterson wrote, adding it was "still very much one of the most old-fashioned tracks" with "no sign of significant changes" since 2016.

The problem was "compounded" by Phillip Island being two hours from Melbourne, with the

bridge causing "traffic chaos", as well as a lack of accommodation.

This made Phillip Island "one of the most expensive" for racegoers to attend, with many instead opting to travel to cheaper Asian MotoGP events.

"As a result, it's been something of an open secret for some time that both the AGPC and series promoter Dorna have been looking at alternative locations for the Australian GP," The Race said.

New location

Online motorsport media outlet MotoGP News also reported this year's majority takeover of MotoGP by Liberty Media – which also owns Formula 1 – had "generated widespread expectations" the sporting event will move in Formula 1's direction.

MotoGP News journalist David Comerford agrees with The Race that Albert Park – the home of Australian Formula 1 – was a possible option.

"It's believed that AGPC has spoken to Dorna about whether it would be possible to run both MotoGP and F1" on the street track, although it adds this was unlikely given the number of trees that would need to be removed."

Another more viable option was Lindsay Fox's proposed Home of Motorsport at Avalon, which the

State Government has provided funding for initial stages.

But given construction was yet to start, The Race suggests while Avalon is being built "Phillip Island receives a brief stay of execution before falling off the calendar".

"But it unfortunately does feel like only a matter of time before MotoGP no longer visits one of the sport's most iconic and beloved venues."

MotoGP News goes further, speculating the "problem here is that if Phillip Island can't negotiate a new deal and the Victoria (Avalon) track isn't ready, then the Australian GP could be absent from the calendar for a number of years".

"A short-term renewal for the current venue might therefore make the most sense given the importance of the market."

While the media outlets suggest there has been a stalemate between circuit owners the Fox family, Dorna and the State Government over the Phillip Island MotoGP contract renewal, fans speculated the Fox family's tactic has been not to invest in the island.

"(The Fox family will) get an extended race extension on the cheap (for Phillip Island), custom build their own track on their own land (at Avalon airport), and then charge airport fees for the cargo and possible passengers that will inevitably land next to the track," fan Tim wrote on The Race's chat.

Tsundoku wrote "Phillip Island is the best MotoGP track in the world".

"It would be criminal if it were to leave the calendar," he wrote.

Debate

As reported by the Advertiser, in July it was announced the USA-based Liberty Media had completed its four billion Euros (more than \$7 billion) majority stake in Dorna.

Dorna holds rights to 2060 to run MotoGP, currently in 22 races around the world, which they have done since 1991, as well as the Superbike World Championship

The current 10-year contract to run the MotoGP at Phillip Island was reached in 2016 between Dorna and the State Government and will expire after the 2026 event.

According to industry insiders who spoke to the Advertiser, contract renewals this year have been announced at or around the 2025 MotoGP at the venue, including in Germany and Barcelona, leading to speculation the event was to be confirmed around this year's October 17-19

event on Phillip Island.

But that did not eventuate and the AGPC told the Advertiser there was yet to be an update, and a Victorian Government spokesperson said conversations were commercial in confidence.

"The Australian Motorcycle Grand Prix is synonymous with Phillip Island; we are proud to back this much-loved, iconic event that showcases the best of the Bass Coast to a global audience," the spokesperson said.

Motorsport fans weighed into the debate about the future of the MotoGP at Phillip Island following comments by MotoGP great Wayne Gardner.

Some fans supported the event's move to The Bend, the Shell-V Power Motorsport Park, at Tailem Bend, South Australia, or alternatively the Sydney Motorsport Park at Eastern Creek. One fan even proposed it be moved to Circuit Italia, a new, privately funded circuit, near Raymond Terrace in NSW, designed to be an international-standard track able to host high-layed events.

However, many fans supported the event continuing at Phillip Island, but said costs were too high, the weather in October poor and track facilities "substandard".

Boardwalks reopened

The Nobbies boardwalks and car park re-opened last Thursday October 30, in time for the Melbourne Cup weekend.

"On the way to soak up the views at the spectacular Nobbies boardwalks, visitors can stop in at the Penguin Parade Visitor Centre, open from midday each day, to pick up a hot beverage and to access bathroom facilities," said a Nature Parks spokesperson.

"Public toilets are also available at the Penguin Parade car park."

The Boulevard (Southern Road), running along the South coast of the Summerland Peninsula, between the Nobbies and the Penguin Parade, re-

mains open for moving traffic (no parking).

"To ensure the site is structurally safe, further critical repair works are being undertaken on the building from October 2025 through to March 2026," advised the Nature Parks' spokesperson.

"The Nobbies Centre will remain closed while planning is underway for the updated Summerland Peninsula Master Plan.

"As part of this, we are seeking the views of our community, visitors, and key stakeholders on the future of the Nobbies site. We want to ensure any further investment in the Nobbies facility helps to achieve the community's long-term aspirations for this site."

RIP NIMBY: new laws crush objectors' rights

Sweeping new planning laws introduced by the Victorian government last week could mean neighbours will no longer be able to object to a new development in their street or over their fence

Planning observers said the government was pandering to developers and objectors were being "unfairly scapegoated", adding the new law won't solve the problem of housing affordability (see separate story).

They say given Phillip Island but not San Remo - now has town boundaries locked in under the DAL, all development will be infill and so the Bill will impact people locally.

A source told the Advertiser it was not clear the exact impact from the Bill, with details yet to be clarified.

However, the Planning Amendment (Better Decisions Made Faster) Bill 2025 is the biggest shake-up of Victoria's planning system in decades, introduced to Parliament and most likely set to be passed this year.

Planning permits for homes, duplexes, townhouses and lowrise apartments will require no notice and have no third-party appeals to VCAT.

For larger, higher density apartments, only those who are directly impacted - like neigh-

bours in the area – will get notice and be able to appeal.

Sonya Planning Minister Kilkenny said Victoria had the broadest third-party appeal rights in the country – allowing anyone to object to a planning permit even if they lived nowhere near the proposed development.

She said this had led to homes being delayed for years by people who were not directly impacted.

"Neighbours have a right to have their say about a high-density development, but new homes shouldn't be delayed by people who don't live anywhere near a proposed project. It's not common sense," Ms Kilkenny said.

Just this year, Bass Coast Shire councillors have dealt with many controversial planning permits that received numerous objections.

For example in June a plan to build three double storey dwellings, with a three-lot subdivision, at 23 Birdwood Avenue, received 20 objections and was approved by the majority of councillors but voted against by Island Ward

Planning permits

In addition, the Bill will reduce the time it takes to approve a planning permit.

Currently, a planning permit on average takes 140 days to get approved - and according to the Minister if there is an objection, it could blow out to more than 300 days.

Ms Kilkenny said under the existing Act, most projects - no matter how big or small - go through the same process, so a single home was assessed the same way as a multi-storey apartment block.

The new Bill creates three separate paths for planning approvals, with stand-alone homes and duplexes set to take 10 days, townhouses and low-rise developments to take 30 days, and larger apartment buildings to take 60 days to approve.

Ms Kilkenny introduced the bill to state parliament on October 28, updating the Planning and Environment Act 1987, saying it would slash approval times, cut red tape and update Victoria's "NIMBY" planning laws.

The Bill also allows councils and the government to update local planning rules or planning scheme amendments.

She said simple updates like fixing a zoning boundary or adjusting a local policy would now be easier, while more complex proposals - like rezoning land for a completely different use would go through a more detailed process.

Concern

Last year local planning observers were highly critical of the Planning Minister's "unprecedented" intervention to approve the Isle of Wight development amid VCAT delays - and also the Vietnam Veterans Museum, after it was rejected by VCAT.

Ms Kilkenny used her then new powers to make an amendment to the Bass Coast Shire Council planning scheme to green light the \$85 million Isle of Wight development.

The new powers, part of the government's Development Facilitation Program (DFP) to expedite faster planning approvals for larger commercial developments that have "significant economic benefits", came under fire on Phillip Island.

Local planning observers said the decision was "undemocratic" and should be "of enormous concern to everyone", saying it set a precedent to approve any major development, such as the highly unpopular Kitty Miller Bay resort, which was overturned by councillors in 2023.

Changes to planning schemes are usually lengthy processes, requiring public exhibition and a planning panel.

Don't blame objectors for housing crisis

The Victorian Government is pandering to developers and objectors are being "unfairly scapegoated" by a proposed new planning law, say local planning observers, adding it won't solve the problem of housing afford-

The government last week introduced the Planning Amendment Bill 2025, which - once passed - will see planning permits for homes, duplexes, townhouses and low-rise apartments requiring no notice, with no third-party appeals to VCAT (see separate story).

But local planning observers said the proposed legislation was troubling.

Phillip Island Conservation Society president Greg Johnson said planning objectors were being "unfairly scapegoated" by the

Greg said there had been a cri-

sis in housing supply for a decade or more "but it hasn't been caused by so-called NIMBY planning

"It's an affordability crisis caused by the tax system allowing investors to accumulate multiple houses to rent-out as landlords, funded by excessive bank lending, which fuelled the house price boom," Greg said.

"Cashed up investors can easily out-bid young people needing a home and no government has had the courage to do anything about it because of election sensitivity.

"Planning objectors are being unfairly 'scapegoated' in my

He said rather than tackle the real problem, the State Government was increasing supply by speeding up planning, "so any minor delays in the approval process is seen as a bigger problem than it really is".

"Removing objector's rights

will please the property industry but I doubt it will make houses more affordable or get more built in the short term.

"Recently the problem has been made worse by a shortage of skills and materials.'

Furthermore, Greg said, the new law was an added burden on planners.

"If objectors trying to ensure builders stick to decent neighbourhood character design rules can't do that anymore, who is going to police the system?

"The onus will be on council officers who don't have the capacity.

Victorian National Trust (Bass Coast branch) president Ross Lloyd agreed, saying he was "extremely concerned" about the new proposed legislation.

Ross said under the new Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) for Bass Coast, which became law last month, as well as the council's own neighbour



character strategy, different buildings were deemed suitable depending on where it was proposed to be built, such as "a town as opposed to a hamlet".

"I am not sure whether the new proposed legislation would respect the importance of this area's special significance, as recognised by the DAL," Ross said. "If it does not, that would be extremely unfortunate."

Newhaven boat ramp to receive facelift

After a two-year delay, final designs to upgrade the Newhaven boat ramp are set to be released next year.

The confirmation comes after the State Government last week gave a \$75,000 grant to Bass Coast Shire Council for structural repairs to the ramp, (not to be confused with the neighbouring Newhaven jetty which just received \$5.5 million to be repaired and reopened).

In 2023 the community gave feedback to a draft plan for a multi-million-dollar upgrade of the boat ramp, which currently includes a two-lane concrete ramp, jetty, fish cleaning facilities, and parking.

The draft proposed:
Construction of a third

- Construction of a third boat ramp lane and an extension to the existing ramps by nine metres to allow for easier access during low tide;
- Existing jetty to be removed and replaced with a new jetty with a lower landing and extended

with a gangway and floating pontoon, which will require an area (the size of which is currently unknown) to be dredged to allow suitable depths for vessels;

- An additional 23 car and boat trailer parking spaces, which requires the reclamation of about 1300sqm land on the west side of the existing boat ramp car park to widen the area (currently there are 48 formal and informal car-trailer parks, with the upgrade set to create a total of 56). This will require the current seawall to be rebuilt and extended.
- Two rigging bays, a
 Boating Victoria camera
 and the existing fish
 cleaning tables will be
 relocated. There will
 also be an extension to
 the path and a beach access ramp.

Boaties in 2023 said the draft needed to be significantly modified to make car parking and vessel launching safer.

It would require a range

of environmental approvals for proposed dredging and land reclamation.

In mid-2020 engineering condition inspections and structural assessments were undertaken that showed the 50-year-old structure was "nearing the end of its design life", recommending an upgrade over the next five to 10 years.

2026

A Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) spokesperson last week said they were working on detailed designs for the ramp.

"We anticipate appointing engineers in early 2026 to draw up detailed designs, with a view to having final designs complete late next year," the spokesperson said.

"We've recommenced discussions with Bass Coast Shire Council about upgrade plans for Newhaven boat ramp with a view to progressing detailed designs and next steps."


In 2023 the community

meeting was told by government representatives they had commissioned environmental assessments to inform the concept designs and "would progress the necessary approvals before any work is undertaken", adding the beach at Newhaven would be retained.

They said the size and shape of the dredged area, and frequency of dredging, would be based on "further advice from maritime engineers taking into account user needs, environmental impacts and available funding".

Problems boaties encounter with the current ramp include a lack of space and configuration of berthing and tie up points; limited car-trailer unit parking – on peak days overflow extends into surrounding roads; insufficient ramp length for launching, particularly at low tide; and the existing jetty poses access challenges.

Fullarton's GP contribution recognised

GRAND PRIX

Stephen Fullarton has received a special presentation from the Australian Grand Prix Corporation (AGPC) acknowledging his contribution to the success of the event on Phillip Island.

The award was presented on Monday morning after this year's

Stephen was involved in traffic management for the event from 1997 until 2023, as well as running the Lukey Heights and Siberia carpark for several decades.

Stephen said his carpark operation employed dozens of locals and over the years developed into a well-oiled operation, parking up to 2000 cars a day.

There are plenty of tales of battling wet weather, traffic hiccups and liaising with local police to get the vehicles swiftly off the roads and into the car park.

However his involvement with the Grand Prix goes back to the 1980s and well beyond traffic management.

When it was first announced the GP would run on Phillip Island in April 1989, there was an outcry from the local community, with many opposing the event on health and safety grounds.

Stephen was one who passionately advocated for the event and was chairman of the local GP liaison group that was formed to assess and address the impact of it on the local community.

All volunteers, they worked tirelessly to ensure the concerns expressed by opponents of the event were addressed.

In February 1989, the Advertiser reported a large number had attended a public meeting in January, making their feelings clear about the proposed event. "They did not want it in any way, shape or form", the article stated.

Convened by local Anne Davie, who opposed the GP coming to Phillip Island, the meeting was described by then shire president Cr Stan Gates as "a fiasco and the denial of the opportunity to present the facts by those in support to those who were concerned".

At the meeting, local doctor Jim Khong expressed fears about the event impacts, including road congestion, difficulties of emergency access, potential health problems associated with portable toilets and high noise levels. He was also concerned about crowd size and access to alcohol.

The Grand Prix is too big for Phillip Island and will change its character forever," he is quoted as

Phillip Island Conservation Society also raised their concerns over fires, illegal camping, and the possible destruction of local flora and fauna.

At the time, Stephen was a councillor for the Shire of Phillip

The article said that at this meeting, Cr Fullarton was "not permitted to continue after the eight minutes allocated for his speech had expired", thus depriving those present of valuable information.

A separate article outlined the details from the committee report, which was not allowed to be heard at the meeting, addressing community concerns around accommodation, car parking, catering, entertainment, services (phones, electricity, water), policing, roads and CFA presence, outlining how the island would be able to accommodate the demands of the event.

Stephen Fullarton also defended the work of the committee at a subsequent council meeting.

"A huge amount of time, and massive amount of work have gone into planning for this major event", he said, dismissing the vote of no confidence in the council that emerged from the public meeting.

The importance of the work done by the GP liaison group prior to that first event cannot be underestimated

The high level of public concern that existed prior to the inaugural GP event saw the State Government call a meeting, chaired by then Minister for Youth Sport and Recreation Neil Trezise, and attended by representatives from police and various government departments, to get an update on preparations for the Grand Prix, to address local concerns.

Embraced

Despite all the noise and fury,

once the event arrived, there was a stunning change of heart.

In its edition of April 13, 1989, the Advertiser reported: "In what could be described as an amazing turn of events, residents and local people took the bikers to their hearts ...".

Crowd behaviour was described as good. The consensus from "both the police and the community at large was that this group of visitors were far more preferable than the New Year's Eve crowd that Cowes attracts annually".

Stephen is quoted as saying he and the liaison committee were "elated" and that the event was "a success beyond our expectations and reward for those who had faith and vision in the island's ability to host a major international sporting event".

He described the local community's response as "fantastic".

Thanks to the vision and dedication of Stephen Fullarton and the other members of the Phillip Island council's GP liaison committee, the Grand Prix is now firmly embedded in island life.

In the following decades, the MotoGP has grown to be the centrepiece of events in Bass Coast and is the biggest sporting event in regional Victoria.

Each year the event injects millions of dollars into the local economy.

This year's attendance was estimated to be the biggest since Casey Stoner's last win in 2012, with the total estimated attendance at 91,245, with a race day estimated attendance of 38,645.

Following months of controversy and threats of legal action, a planning permit that sought retrospective approval for the Aussie Outdoor Emporium has been refused.

As reported last year, the owner of the landscape garden supplies business at 2124 Phillip Island Road was told by Bass Coast Shire Council in April he had 60 days to remove "all goods and materials associated with the operation of a retail premises" or else face fines or court action.

The owner had operated the business, next to the Ramada Resort, for a decade without a planning permit, but was adamant he was being unfairly treated.

A petition with 377 signatures was at the time lodged with council, stating it "beggars belief why council wants to close down the nursery Aussie Outdoor Emporium" as it had "enhanced" Cowes.

In June councillors confirmed legal action against the owner had been put on hold after he agreed to lodge a planning permit.

That retrospective permit was released at the end of last year, seeking the use and development of the land for landscape gardening supplies in a farming zone, a reduction of car parking requirements and display of business identification signage.

However, the agenda for October's council meeting states the permit had been refused.

A council spokesperson said the Emporium was defined as either retail or restricted retail, which were prohibited in the

farm zone.

"As the use is prohibited, no permit can be granted," the spokesperson said.

They said the permit was inconsistent with council planning policy, including protection of agricultural land with no agricultural benefit, and was "an out of centre development that ought to be located in a commercial or industrial area".

"The access and car parking arrangements were unsatisfactory and did not demonstrate the supply of parking was adequate or that the access to the property was safe."

Compliant?

The retrospective permit in 2024 stated the business - also home to the Phillip Island Strawberries - aligned with the farm zone requirements, and the garden supplies did not "adversely affect the

use of land or the surrounding land for agriculture".

"The current land use activities and associated building and works are considered appropriate and warrant approval," the permit stated.

The business has 13 car spaces, arguing the required 6,614sqm of land required to be set aside for car parking "would clearly be an oversupply of parking for this site and use".

The owner had responded to requests by the council to remove all non-complying signage, with the exception of one sign - Phillip Island Strawberries – to the front of the site.

In May last year the council sent a letter to the landowner stating failure to comply with planning enforcement orders "may incur the following penalties of up to \$230,772.00 and \$11,538.60 for each day offence continues".

Traffic Signals Installation

New traffic signals will be installed at the Dandy Premix Quarries intersection to reduce truck traffic through Grantville and improve safety for pedestrians and motorists using the Bass Highway.

Works commenced July 2025, approx. 4-month duration Lane closures, reduced speed limits, contra-flow traffic Deep Creek St and Bass Hwy Service Rd access impacted Bass Hwy southbound bus stop temporarily relocated



COMMENCEMENT AND DURATION OF ROADWORKS

Stage 1 Roadworks confined to the existing quarry intersection commenced early July 2025.

Stage 2 Roadworks on the Bass Highway Northbound carriageway commenced 14 August and were completed 19 September 2025.

Stage 3 Roadworks require temporary closure of the Bass Highway Southbound carriageway and the introduction of contra-flow traffic to the Northbound carriageway.

The left lane of the Northbound carriageway will continue to be used for northbound traffic and the second lane for southbound traffic after diversion across the highway median to share the Northbound carriageway. During **Stage 3 Roadworks**, each of the two lanes of the Northbound carriageway will have traffic moving in the opposite direction.

During **Stage 3 Roadworks** there will be reduced speed limits through the Bass Highway construction zone with modified traffic layouts and traffic controls in place to assist motorists.

ROADWORK TIMES AND TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT

Stage 3 Roadworks will generally be undertaken Monday to Saturday (6 days/week) between 7.00am and 7.00pm. Some short-term roadworks may be carried out overnight.

Stage 3 Southbound carriageway roadworks will be carried out in two (2) phases –

- Stage 3A being the smaller section of roadworks north of the Quarry Entrance, with
- Stage 3B being the larger section of roadworks south of the Quarry Entrance.
- Stage 1 Quarry Entrance roadworks will also be completed during Stage 3A and trucks will commence right turn Quarry departure onto the Bass Highway northbound carriageway via portable traffic lights as part of Stage 3B.

Stage 3 Traffic Controls will include Variable Message Signs (VMSs), Safety Barriers, Portable Traffic Lights, Traffic Controllers and Truck Mounted Attenuators (TMAs) in operation.

ACCESS ARRANGEMENTS

Deep Creek Street and the Bass Highway Service Road traffic will be temporarily impacted during Stage 3 roadworks.

Deep Creek Street: temporary use of Bonney Road for Bass Highway access and egress, including for Smith Street, Broome Court, Stewart Street, Malcolm Drive and Panoramic Drive traffic.

Bass Highway Service Road (southbound, eastern side of Bass Highway): temporary southbound egress to Bass Highway under traffic controller supervision. This will impact on traffic attending Grantville Cemetery, the temporary southbound Bus Stop and 1421 Bass Highway.

BUS STOP - SOUTHBOUND

The Bass HWY southbound bus stop located in the Stage 3 roadworks zone will continue to be temporarily relocated further north (approx. 220m) in the Bass Highway Service Road (southbound) with signage, waiting area provision and pedestrian protection provided.

PROJECT OUTCOMES

Installation of the Traffic Signals will enable trucks to turn right, northbound onto Bass Highway, resulting in a major reduction in quarry trucks through Grantville. The Traffic Signals will also improve Bus Stop pedestrian safety and assist safer Deep Creek Street traffic flows onto Bass Highway.







Cash flow in Retirement:

The Inflows and Outflows

Then you move from earning a regular wage to living on superannuation, investments, or the Age Pension, one of the biggest adjustments is getting used to a different rhythm of money coming in and out. Cash flow in retirement isn't just about how much you have, it's about how and when it moves.

Understanding your cash flow can also highlight where small tweaks can stretch your money further such as switching to a cheaper phone plan, reviewing insurance premiums, or adjusting how often you draw from your super. Even modest savings can add up over a

Remembrance Day in Cowes

A Proclamation about the observance of Remembrance Day was signed on October 30, 1997, some 28 years ago by Governor General Sir William Deane, on behalf of the Australian people.

That national declaration called for one minute's silence, formerly two minutes, to encourage remembrance of the sacrifice of those who died or otherwise suffered in Australia's cause in wars and conflict throughout the world.





"Maybe you have specific skills such as marketing or sales or could join one of our subcommittees and help with developing new ideas and running events during the year. All welcome."



Perseverance Primary's future uncertain

FRENCH ISLAND

French Island's only primary school has closed, with an uncertain future.

Perseverance Primary, which is nearly 130 years old, was one of Victoria's smallest schools, with a State Government exemption for the minimum number of pupils required to attend.

However, following concerns by French Island residents, a Department of Education spokesperson last week told the Advertiser Perseverance Primary currently had no enrolments.

"As a result, the school council has requested the school become non-operational," the spokesperson

"The department is examining enrolment forecasts as part of considering this request".

School councils can recommend to the department the school becomes non-operational - otherwise called de-staffed or closed - if there are low or no confirmed enrolments.

However, the non-operational process allows schools to re-open if local demand increases.

"Madness"

Second generation French Island resident Bruce Chandler, who moved there as a four-year-old in 1967, completed his pri-

mary education at Perseverance and described the closure as "madness".

"French Island needs a school. We have one,' Bruce said

He said it was the first time in the school's history it had shut full-time, shutting a few months ago.

In a recent Waterline magazine edition, Bruce wrote they poured money into the school to "bring it

up to code" yet now it remained empty.

"Surely we can do better than that.

"Is it a sign of what our community has become with padlocked gates and no trespassing signs and everybody thinking about their own little patch?

"What about the community? What about the future kids?"

Bruce said at the cente-

nary of the school - which started in 1896 – there had been 250 kids enrolled.

"When I was at Perseverance Primary School our numbers got down to under the recommended amount to keep the school open which was seven students and we brought a family in with three kids just to keep the school open," Bruce said, adding it was in the early to mid-1970s.

"We got them a house and work on French Island .. and that's how we kept the school open.

"They built houses to put families in to keep the school open in the past. The community got together to keep Perseverance open."

He said there were currently vacant houses across the island and "why don't we have a family with children in them?", adding there would be many struggling for affordable housing who would "love" to live on French Island.

In 1893 the government established six different settlements on French Island, with each of the families in these settlements given 20 hectares of land and the following year more than 50 children needed schooling.

Three schools were built and in the middle of 1896 a teacher was appointed to teach at Star of Hope and the Perseverance schools.

Perseverance was open five days a fortnight and Star of Hope six days a fortnight.

French Island is not on the grid, so each landowner has renewable power and diesel generator backup; also responsible for their own water, usually from rainwater tanks or dams, and sewage.

With no shire, residents don't pay rates, and the island is an unincorporated territory with the State Government planning minister the responsible planning authority.

There is no health clinic and so for non-urgent health issues residents travel to the mainland and in life-threatening scenarios the air ambulance is called.

Acts of gallantry

We will remember them. Four simple words. But four incredibly powerful words in the Ode of Remembrance.

It's not "we will remember them when it's convenient", which is the plan by Prime Minister Anthony Albanese.

An independent statutory agency has accused the Albanese Government of abolishing the rights of Australian Defence Force personnel and veterans when seeking to review our nation's highest awards for bravery.

The Defence Honours and Awards Appeals Tribunal has made a formal submission to a Senate inquiry regarding the government's plans to limit the time period for reviewing acts of gallantry.

The Tribunal's submission also highlighted that it would've been impossible for the Victoria Cross to be posthumously awarded to war heroes like Ordinary Seaman Teddy Sheean and Private Richard Norden under the new approach of the Albanese Government.

Under the changes rammed through the House of Representatives without proper consultation with ex-service organisations, all Labor Party MPs voted to introduce a 20-year time limit on reviewable actions.

In effect, it would mean the actions of Australian Defence Force personnel from World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War and any other conflict outside the 20-year timeframe could not be considered for review.

In its submission, the independent Tribunal strongly disagreed with Labor's approach and said:

"In the view of the Tribunal, the Bill in its present form would work to the very significant disadvantage of ADF members and veterans, their families and other supporters by abolishing existing rights of independent merits review in the Tribunal and would thereby detract from the integrity of the defence honours and awards system."

Our national heroes deserve recognition regardless of the timing of their actions.

The Coalition will continue to campaign against this illconceived Bill because we don't believe our solemn commitment of "we will remember them" should have a use-by date of 20

Loss of democracy

Councillors are required to disregard personal interests; however personal biases were apparent at the October 18 council meeting. Reports were tabled with unanimous support and self-congratulatory endless statements. Public questions, submitted in advance, were responded to, but if questions arose during the meeting, the public were shut down immediately.

The Domestic Animal Management Plan has raised concerns from some and support from others however the biased outcome is endless measures of dog/cat control including additional "dog catchers". The plan is about control, not flexibility and inclusiveness, with no consideration for human and animal wellbeing.

The collective opinion was dogs were bad which in 99 per cent of cases is not the case. Surely it is the job of council to base decisions on the evidence available, yet Councillors O'Brien and Morgan appear to believe that native wildlife, such as Hooded Plovers, are frequently murdered by dogs. If they had read the reports commissioned by Nature Parks, they would know that the majority are washed away at high tide and many are taken by birds of prey, with no evidence of dog kills.

Whilst the protection of wildlife is important has it been thought through? For example, Phillip Island is overrun with Cape Barron Geese and rabbits and the reintroduction of species such as the Bandicoot and Stone Curlew may impact on existing species.

Councillors also need to be cautious in their response to the public. For example, a planning application for a Health and Wellness retreat received 150 objections with concerns, amongst others, that the centre was for drug rehabilitation clients. Cr O'Brien's response was there were no grounds for any objections as the intent of the centre was "for people to stand around on one leg humming or standing by a pond". Whilst this was not an applicable response to the 150 that had objected it also demonstrates a lack of insight into therapeutic care.

In summary should not councils consider the evidence for their policies, the impact of biased views and take a representative stance for their whole community?

Pool safety check

As the warmer months approach, Royal Life Saving Australia is urging all backyard pool owners to check their pool fences and gates as a matter of urgency. It is vital to save lives.

Children under five are very curious, quick, and fearless. Their love of water puts them at a very serious risk of drowning. Each year in Australia, we lose on average 19 young children to drowning, with half of these tragedies occurring in backyard swimming pools. The majority are aged just one year old. The risk of drowning triples at this age when children become more mobile. We should all be deeply concerned.

For every child who dies, around eight more are hospitalised following a non-fatal drowning incident; this is over 150 children under five every year. Some of these children will experience long-term health outcomes, which can have lifelong impacts on children and their families. This is extremely alarming.

While active supervision is always the best protection, no parent or caregiver can watch a child every second of the day. A functioning, compliant pool fence and self-closing, self-latching gate provides a vital extra layer of protection - for those everyday moments when life interrupts: the phone rings, the doorbell goes, or another child needs your attention.

Pool owners should always check that wet weather hasn't loosened fence posts, gates are working and close properly, toys are packed away, and portable pools are emptied when not in use. Just as important, brushing up on CPR skills ahead of summer could well save a life.

By taking the time now to check your pool fence, gate and surrounds - making sure there are no climbable objects nearby -you could prevent a tragedy.



The Ladies Teal Day Committee has received a generous donation of a second corporate box for six people at the One Day Cricket in January, which will be raffled in December.

With only 400 tickets available at \$5 each, Committee Chair Helen Coghlan said, "We're hopeful of selling out, which would add another \$2000 to an already fantastic result."

The event began three years ago, sparked by the courage and determination of local woman Christine Hammond, who had been diagnosed with ovarian cancer.

Although Christine sadly passed away last year following a four-and-a-halfyear battle with the disease, her courage continues to in-

This year's event was

especially moving, with Christine's husband, Peter and two daughters, Michelle and Tracy, attending as special guests and sharing powerful words with those gathered.

Michelle reminded attendees that this disease often strikes silently.

"When Mum was first diagnosed, she barely had any symptoms and at first just dismissed them, as busy women so often do.

By the time it was picked up, it was too late."

She went on to explain there is currently no early detection test for ovarian cancer, a stark contrast to other cancers where screening options exist: mammograms for breast cancer, blood tests for prostate cancer, and at-home kits for bowel cancer.

"We need one for ovarian cancer. Mum wrote to many politicians pleading for more funding into research but with no success. When she died, we promised her we would never stop fighting for change. That's why we're here to-

Tracy echoed her sister's message.

"It's so lovely to see this room filled with warmth, friendship, colour and purpose. Last year, just fifteen days after Teal Day, we lost our beautiful Mum. One of her happiest moments in those final weeks was being here at this event surrounded by the incredible sense of community that this club embodies."

Ovarian cancer remains the most lethal reproductive cancer, with treatment protocols unchanged in de-

Chemotherapy remains the frontline defence, but the journey is gruelling and the cancer often returns.

The survival rate, once diagnosed, is just 49 per cent, yet with early detection, it could jump to over 90 per cent.

This day isn't just about our Mum," Michelle said.

"It's for you ladies your mums, daughters, sisters and friends. We all deserve better, and we need to keep fighting for it."

Every dollar raised on the day goes directly to research into early detection and better treatments.

The Teal Day committee, led by Helen and supported by a passionate golfing community, was deeply thanked for continuing this now-annual tradition.
