Nose dive: after more than 30 years island pool again shelved

AQUATIC CENTRE

Bass Coast Shire's mayor said it was a "tough" decision to delay a community pool for Phillip Island and she empathised with residents who had fought for one "for a long time".

As reported last week, councillors at the October meeting voted in support of the amended Bass Coast Shire Aquatic Strategy, which has Wonthaggi's pool upgrade as the priority.

The strategy – which is open for community feedback until November 6 - states planning and advocacy for Phillip Island will start following completion of the Wonthaggi redevelopment.

Successive pool committees and residents have worked to establish an aquatic centre on Phillip Island, since the first pool committee was formed in

Mayor Rochelle Halstead told the meeting and about 40 residents in the public gallery at Berninneit "I feel for Phillip Island, I really do".

"I know they have been advocating for a long time," she said. "It's a difficult situation with

funding limited at state and fed-

eral levels. We can't deliver assets without the support of government.

"We have advocated hard for a two-pool strategy and we have fallen flat.

"I congratulate councillors for making this tough decision. It hasn't been an easy decision because we know how strongly our communities feel about this.

"I hope people realise it wasn't an easy decision.

"We haven't taken Phillip Island off the future plans and if a the Wonthaggi swim complex sooner opportunity presents, we will be all over it."

Cr Ronnie Bauer said for

years he had "total commitment" to a Phillip Island pool, but he was "also a realist and pragmatic".

"In the current climate our advocacy only allows for one aquatic centre," Cr Bauer said.

The Wonthaggi pool does need some very urgent attention. Not if but when it breaks down, we have nothing comparable in the shire.


"From a population cenperspective, renovating makes sense and quite frankly is our only option.

Virtual Reality beach safety session

WORKSHOP

Monash University and Life Saving Victoria (LSV) are looking for anyone aged 18+ to help with a research project on how to design more effective coastal safety signage.

Participants will take part in a short virtual reality experience to test signage and provide feedback. There are two opportunities to be involved, on October 30. The first session is at Berninneit, from 12pm – 4pm, with another at the

Penguin Parade from 4pm – 7pm. Each virtual reality experience runs for 20-25 minutes, with participants filling out two surveys (one before and one after).

The sessions are part of a study undertaken by Monash University and LSV to try and improve beach safety signage.

Victoria has experienced record summer drowning tolls in recent years, with the Bass Coast and Mornington Peninsula identified as the highest-risk areas.

"Our project aims to refine and evaluate coastal safety signage to improve public engagement, understanding, and prompt action at these locations," said Dr Hannah Graefe, Manager - Research and Evaluation at LSV.

"The signs will complement and not replace current safety signage in these areas.

"The study is informed by community engagement, including recent focus group participation, and seeks to address the needs of diverse beach visitors, including local residents, international tourists, and families."

The signage being tested in the virtual reality sessions, were designed based on feedback from focus groups.

After feedback from the virtual reality sessions, Dr Graefe said the signs will be further re-

fined "and eventually installed at high-risk coastal locations for the summertime".

A previous consultation session on Phillip Island in September attracted less than a dozen people. After four people drowned at Forrest Caves in January 2024, there were repeated calls by locals for improved signage, more patrols and multiple suggestions, both in the newspaper and social media, for ways signage could be improved.

The virtual reality sessions on October 30 are an opportunity for locals to provide vital feedback on the best signage options to improve safety at local beaches.

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

DAL is now law

Bass Coast is legally a protected area under State Government law, after the Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) last week was approved by the Governor in Council.

After six years, lengthy planning panel, hundreds of submissions by residents and intense lobbying by developers, the DAL now ensures town boundaries across Phillip Island will not be expanded.

The exception is at Newhaven to Samuel Amess Drive, as well as San Remo's town boundary will expand to allow housing development through to Punch Bowl Road.

Planning Minister Sonya Kilkenny announced the approval by the Governor in Council, which now locks in the strongest planning protections in the state and forms part of the Victoria Planning Provisions

A Bass Coast planning scheme amendment will now embed protections, to ensure "the landscape, environment and lifestyle that define the region are preserved well into the future" the minister said.

Bass Coast joins the Bellarine Peninsula, Surf Coast and Macedon Ranges as one of four DAL areas.

"Bass Coast is one of Victoria's most iconic regions – from the Bunurong cliffs to the beaches of Phillip Island," Ms Kilkenny said.

"This is about ensuring they can be enjoyed and about protecting the landscapes, coastlines and communities that define Bass Coast, while supporting the industries and jobs that sustain it.'

Member for Bass Jordan Crugnale added Bass Coast's coastline, farmland and townships "make it a truly special place to live, work and visit - now we've locked in protections to keep it that way".

The new policy sets a 50-year vision for the region's future, locking in 24 settlement boundaries across most Bass Coast townships, with changes

to the DAL now requiring ratification by both Houses of Parliament.

Reactions

In July Bass Coast Shire councillors endorsed the DAL, describing it as the "most influential decision" they will make, while council planners said the DAL would "impact most decisions that council makes".

However, the vote in support of the DAL was not without contention, with two councillors raising concerns about the implication of the DAL on homeowners "who face the threat of retreat with no insurance cover ... and no indication from the State Government for compensation".

According to the DAL, sets should be "decommissioned or relocated" "away from areas that are or will be harmed by natural hazards".

Bass Coast Mayor Rochelle Halstead last week said protections - especially for the Western Port Woodlands - were a milestone.

"The Western Port Woodlands are one of Victoria's last remaining coastal forests and an ecological treasure," she said.

"Council is currently seeking State Government support to complete further environmental assessments that will ultimately lead to greater protection of the Woodlands. We hope the state will come to the table and assist council with this process".

She said the DAL acknowledged "what locals have always known, that Bass Coast is special".

'These long-term protections will help us preserve our environment, our townships and our way of life for generations to come."

Community groups were "disappointed" that Newhaven's town boundary would expand, but were broadly supportive of the final DAL.

Phillip Island Conservation Society (PICS) president Greg Johnson said it was a significant strategic landmark document, par-

"Permanent settlement boundaries should prevent urban sprawl into landscapes of state and regional significance, many of which PICS has cared for over the years. These landscapes include the island's farmland," Greg said.

Island Voice president Peter Paul said he was "cautiously pleased" with the DAL.

"Without the DAL there would have been continued arguments and problems. This has put a lot of that to rest and it will leave a legacy for the future," Peter said.

Nobbies precinct closed again

Phillip Island Nature Parks has advised the Nobbies precinct on the Summerland Peninsula has again been closed to visitors while further safety works are carried out, after strong winds earlier this month caused damage to the building's roof and solar panels.

Nature Parks said it made this decision to remove any risk to the public while the area is assessed and made safe.

"Unfortunately, means the car park and boardwalks will stay closed until further work can be completed by our construction contractor to reduce the risk to visitors," a spokesperson stated.

This work will involve completely removing the rooftop solar panels, se-curing roofing materials and removing any further redundance infrastructure mounted to the roof.

"We understand the timing of this closure is disappointing. While we share in the community's frustration, our priority is ensuring public safety at all times.

Following further assessments and inspections, critical repair works will commence from this week. It is hoped the carpark and boardwalk will reopen before the Melbourne Cup weekend after

works are completed and assessed.

The Boulevard (Southern Road), running along the South coast of the Summerland Peninsula, between the Nobbies and the Penguin Parade, remains open for moving traffic (no parking).

The Penguin Parade Visitor Centre is open from 12pm daily, with café and retail options and bathroom facilities available. Public toilets are also located at the Penguin Parade car park.

Repeated closure

Back in June, the Nature Parks confirmed the Nobbies Centre, carpark and boardwalks would remain closed until the end of the

At the time, Nature Parks CEO Catherine Basterfield said an engineering assessment took place, "with initial works focused on ensuring the building structure is safe to enable access to the true attraction of this site - the boardwalks, the views and the blow hole".

"Rectification works will be required on parts of the visitor centre's exterior," Ms Basterfield said.

While the centre remained closed, in early July, the Nobbies boardwalk and car park reopened in time for school holidays, until the most recent closure.

The centre has been closed since June, with engineers confirming it is not safe to re-open.

Cowes Streetscape work to recommence

INFRASTRUCTURE

The first section of the initial phase of the Cowes foreshore project was completed before the MotoGP.

With the MotoGP over, the next phase is now underway and the remaining work is expected to take until December 21 to com-

The site will then be reopened to the public, with work not recommencing

until February 2026.

Council said contractors Fulton Hogan will "re-mobilise the site" with hoarding and set up works starting this week.

This latest phase will include:

- Demolition works on the Esplanade West (same section as part 1) with changed pedestrian movements.
- Reconstruction of the road, lighting, pave-

ments and landscaping. Kerb and footpath work and stormwater drain-

age upgrades.

There will be no access for pedestrians or vehicles between Thompson Avenue and Bass Avenue during the work. An alternative pedestrian access route is via the foreshore pathway.

Wellness retreat approved, despite community opposition

Despite 150 objections opposing it, a wellness retreat in Ventnor has been given the green light by Bass Coast Shire councillors.

The permit for 109 Lyall Street, Ventnor, is for a holistic health and wellness retreat in a low-density residential zone, for which council planners recommended approval.

Under the proposal, the 4000sqm property would have no building works, but the use of the dwelling would see accommodation for a maximum of five clients and up to two visiting medical and holistic practitioners.

Clients would attend "low intensity", "appointment-only" retreats for one week to one month with "integrated, evidence-based services focused on whole-person health".

"The proposed model draws inspiration from leading therapeutic frameworks, such as The Banyans Wellness Centre, and aims to provide personalised, multi-disciplinary care to individuals seeking support in managing mental health, emotional wellbeing, and lifestyle-related conditions," the permit states.

The Banyans Wellness Centre website describes itself as offering "discreet and luxury rehab" in Brisbane.

However, objectors said the planning permit was "misleading in the extreme", with one stating while the permit did not say clients will be treated for drug rehabilitation and dependency "despite the fact this is one treatment Banyans health care do".



Council planners have reassured the community saying an approved wellness retreat in Ventnor will "not be for drug rehabilitation nor will it revolve around medication", but rather will be "a calming environment for relaxation and rejuvenation".

A continuing theme from objectors was the location was not suitable for a drug and alcohol rehab centre, with concern for personal safety and safety of children and families.

Council planners said the "extent of community response" was so large it was "relevant" under the Planning and Environment Act, indicating potential to have a "significant social effect on the community".

However, officers then clarified the key concerns and "confusion" raised by objectors with the applicant.

Officers concluded the proposal "does not seek to provide

substance abuse rehabilitation or medicinal care in its suite of services", would not follow the Banyans' model and with minimal neighbourhood impact.

"Ultimately, the proposed use of the site will not be for drug rehabilitation, nor will it revolve around medication," officers said.

"It is about holistic health practices aimed at guiding individuals through the wellbeing process.

"It is not expected that this business will result in an exposure of crime to the local area. The Wellness Retreat is to be a calming environment for relaxation and rejuvenation." Officers said the traffic from the centre was "unlikely to cause issues", with six on-site car spaces.

Humming

Councillors voted in support of the permit, with conditions, including the preparation of an operational management plan, which will manage any "potential adverse amenity".

Cr Ronnie Bauer said all three Island ward councillors supported the permit, also acknowledging objections.

"We need to vote on what is in front of us, not the conjecture and whispers that have been swirling around," Cr Bauer said. "I have visited the site. It is perfect for what this application is asking to do. It is modern, quiet, secluded and serene.

"Until we have proof to the contrary, I see no reason to refuse this application."

Cr Tim O'Brien said he lived around the corner from the proposal and had been approached by concerned residents, but agreed councillors were voting on the permit "in front of us, which is for a wellness centre".

"People standing on one leg humming is not going to greatly disturb the environment," Cr O'Brien said.

"It's for people to find themselves."

He said wellness would be a "far better use" of the home than its current use as an Airbnb.

Cr Tracey Bell said the centre would benefit the tourism economy.

Cr Jon Temby said the permit had his "full support" and he couldn't see clients "being a nuisance in any way".

He said he was reassured the use of the centre couldn't be changed without council approval and agreed Airbnbs created more problems for neighbours.

The planning permit says the wellness retreat will include psychology and therapeutic counselling sessions, yoga, meditation and mindfulness practice, nutritional and lifestyle education.

"Stays will be guided by a tailored program developed in consultation with allied health professionals, designed to support early intervention, stress recovery, and general wellbeing," the permit states.

Rhyll subdivision a step closer

Rhyll is about to get a little bit bigger. Since 2007, Rhyll residents have been fighting over-development on the former Swan Bay caravan park site, on Lock Road.

Their battle came to an end when in 2020 VCAT approved a proposal for 9-11 Lock Road for 15 townhouses and the removal of vegetation.

Around the same time, separate plans were released for 5 Lock Road: a \$2 million development for seven units, which includes one double storey and six single storey units, as well as the removal of all existing vegetation.

Now a planning permit for 3 Lock Road to build seven single

storey dwellings has moved a step closer, with the developers lodging documents with Bass Coast Shire Council to formerly subdivide the 2045sqm land to make way for construction.

The planning permit was approved in 2023, with the developers at the time arguing housing in the municipality had "become increasingly unaffordable", and the development was needed to address "greater diversity in housing types to cater to the community's needs, including housing for older people".

This leaves I Lock Road and 7 Lock Road as the only sections of the former caravan park site open for development.

In 2020, residents said if 7

Lock Road was developed at a later stage, "then cumulatively it could be a very big development".

Dating back to 2007, the old caravan park land has had various rejected proposals, opposed by the community including the group Rhyll RAID (Rhyll Residents Against Inappropriate Development).

One proposal in 2010 (the third proposal) included an 84-room residential hotel, with a restaurant, meeting room, childcare facilities, café and bar, gym and swimming pool, conference centre and 33 serviced apartments, as well as a retail component, alongside 34 dwellings to be used as serviced apartments. VCAT rejected this plan.

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Silverleaves gets its final plan to deal with erosion

An artificial "rock sill" will be built off Silverleaves' eroded foreshore, with potential for a field of new groynes in the future, according to the State Government's final erosion report.

Last week, the government released the East Cowes and Silverleaves Adaptation Plan, which provides \$1.4 million funding to Bass Coast Shire Council to implement the recommended designs and phase one of construction to protect the coastline.

The plan is the final chapter in years of anxiety for residents, with an initial report in August last year showing in two years, in a "hotspot" near Sanders Road, about 16 metres of foreshore had been lost to erosion.

This led to an angry community meeting in September 2024 when attendees asked for explanations and fast solutions to the erosion.

In April the draft East Cowes and Silverleaves Adaptation Plan was released, and a rockbag wall constructed in the hotspot zone, with the final report now out.

While light on details and broadly a replication of the April draft, page 39 of the final report details planned erosion solutions.

The plan states the first line of defence will be to "manage and renourish (bulldoze sand) in the "upstream" groyne fields in Cowes east "to restore sand to the

The 1970s existing rockwall east of Coghlan Road will be repaired.

The eastern end of this rock wall will "transition to a low crest-

ed rock sill", although no detail is provided of what a rock sill is, its design or construction material.

The plan states natural solutions will be trialled around the rockbag wall area, including continued bulldozing of sand, and revegetation behind the rock sill.

"Discrete rock fillets may be used to naturally bury the rock sill for visual integration."

Further east, the plan states there is an "option" to construct four groynes, as well as additional groynes – up to 17 towards the end of Silverleaves - "in the future to enhance dune resilience and beach amenity".

Finally, the plan states the farthest section of shoreline will be monitored and "if the erosion trigger is realised" there will be further revegetation and bulldozing of sand, alongside those additional groynes.

The only details provided on rock sills in the plan are that "modelling may be required to ensure the effectiveness of the rock sill or breakwaters design".

"These models will help assess their ability to protect the shoreline and vegetation, while also directing tidal flows to minimise erosion and ensure the long-term stability of the ecosystem.

"Low crested structure may be lower than traditional seawalls or revetments.'

The Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) will work with the council to hire a consultant to develop designs and plan for construction.

Bass Coast Mayor Rochelle Halstead welcomed the \$1.4 million funding, saying delivery of these works was now the priority.


"The plan provides a roadmap for action and has been developed with extensive community input and scientific guidance," Cr Halstead said.

"Council is now working closely with DEECA to plan and stage these works to ensure the best possible outcome."

Reaction

Resident Stephen Lapin welcomed the final plan as "a good result for Silverleaves".

"The council now has funding and can go ahead to commence engineering drawings and put

the project out to tender," Stephen

"My only concerns are: will the rock sill work, as it is experimental? And will council finish the works before the storm season and high tides in March next

Stephen said he and fellow residents met Cr O'Brien and Cr Bell on the beach last weekend and also had a "reassuring" email from Mayor Rochelle Halstead saying the council was "primed to get things going now that they have funding".

Resident Natalie Gray said she looked forward to seeing a project program and more details on the

Cowes East Foreshore Preventative Action Group (CEFPAG) chair Ken Hailey said despite the "rather worrying delay", residents were happy the plan was underway and funding was secure.

"Although the littoral reef (rock sill) is no doubt experimental, at least the latest plans recommend groynes as the next stage if the planned works do not succeed,"

He said it was imperative the works were finished before the start of next winter.

"We are confident council will make every effort to achieve this and the mayor and Island Ward councillors are all committed to make this happen.

"Credit must go to Jordan Crugnale for her work behind the scenes to make this happen."

Minister for Environment Steve Dimopoulos said the plan was created from community input, and scientific and geotechnical assessments.


He said community feedback indicated a "distinct preference" for nature-based intervention methods and "strong support" for the solutions in the plan including dune reconstruction, rock walls, and groyne fields.

Revegetation in key locations, by planting native shoreline plants suited to living in waves, would help relieve the pressure on the beaches and prevent erosion, the minister added.

Member for Bass Jordan Crugnale said the adaptation plan was a welcome step in addressing coastal erosion and management.

"I want to thank community members and local residents for being active, involved and advocates outlining what they value most about this stretch of Western Port," Ms Crugnale said.

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Spu thanks the community for support

The family of Smiths Beach former sparkie Anthony "Spu" Susic – who is confined to a wheelchair because of multiple sclerosis – has thanked the generosity of the community for a major fundraiser.

Last November, a call was put out for funding and tradie support to renovate their house to ensure Spu could use the bathroom independently.

The call not only saw more than \$19,000 raised through a GoFundMe campaign, but a host of tradies gave their time to build the new accessible bathroom.

Spu's wife Mandy said it was difficult to convey her gratitude in words.

"Oh my god, the difference it has made is huge," said Mandy, who is Spu's full-time carer.

"In the old, small bathroom manoeuvring was so hard and was getting worse. He fell dozens of times and injured himself and the only way we could get him up was with a hoist.

"Now he needs no help and can be in the bathroom independently. It's given him confidence."

Mandy said the renovation took three months and saw a former bedroom transformed into the bathroom thanks to: Christian from Lamaro Homes who oversaw the build, helped by Daniel from Plumbers Now, electrician Lars List, Reece Plumbing, Stephen Fullarton Design, Lightique, and Jo Viney who sourced disability equipment. The entire fundraiser

was organised by Peter List, who first met Spu in the late 80s through surfing on the island.

While the GoFundMe paid for fixtures, all trades gave their time free, which Mandy estimates was up to \$40,000-worth of skill

Desperate

Spu and Mandy, who have two children, Dylan, 21, and Alanah, 17, tried for seven years to receive National Disability Insurance Scheme funding to renovate their bathroom, but were knocked back on every application.

"The NDIS told us we didn't fit the criteria for funding and said we should create a schedule for who can use the bathroom," Mandy said.

"But with MS, Anthony can be in the bathroom for an hour and when he needs to go, he needs to go.

"And he had dozens of falls, was really bruised and once cut his head.

"We tried everything to make it work. We got to the situation where we tried to get a loan but because we're on pensions, they wouldn't give us one.

they wouldn't give us one.

"We didn't want to think he'd ever go into a home"

Spu, 59, ran Cape Woolamai Electrical from the early 90s to 2014, and 24 years ago was diagnosed with MS – a degenerative chronic neurological disease which affects the central nervous system. He took to a wheelchair about a decade ago, when Mandy became his full-time carer.

Obituary - Dr James Khong

Dr James Khong arrived on Phillip Island in 1978 to take over the reins from Dr Ben Weiss, the only resident doctor on the island.

As job descriptions go, this one was all-consuming – sole medical practitioner to islanders and visitors, on call 24-hours a day, seven days a week.

But James Khong – known as Jim to his many friends – was well-qualified for the position: his career included surgical registrar at Melbourne's Queen Victoria Hospital and directing emergency departments at the Preston/Northcote and Austin hospitals.

Jim, who recently passed away at the age of 84 after a short illness, was the last doctor to work alone on the island.

He delivered many babies at Cowes Warley Hospital and saw multitudes of emergencies during his 13-years on the island. Many will recall Jim's practice rooms beneath the hospital. Warley closed in 2008 and was demolished in 2020, a huge loss to the island.

In 1981 Jim was joined by another resident GP, Dr John Dixon, who established a practice in San Remo.

The knowledge that John Dixon was also an anaesthetist sent a sigh of relief across the island: these resident medics meant there was year-round access to emergency surgery at Warley Hospital for the first time. And Jim Khong was a fine surgeon.

Born to a Chinese family in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, in 1941, Jim was the sixth of nine children.

At age 12 he announced to his family that he wanted to be a doctor, and at 15 travelled to Melbourne to attend Melbourne Grammar school.

Jim studied medicine at Monash University, graduating in 1967.

While Jim's work on Phillip Island was demanding he had an infectious zest for life, enjoyed socialising, and made many lifelong friends.

They included the late artists Eric Juckert and Jason Monet – Jim remained close to Doris Monet and her four daughters – Island Surfboards cofounder Matt Ryan and his wife Jill, and other islanders too numerous to mention here.

In addition to medicine Jim was in-

volved with the film industry through his friendship with the late director Paul Cox, and he was on the board of the Australian Film Institute.

After leaving the island Jim had practices in South Melbourne and the Queen Victoria Centre, wrote a book, and continued to life to the full.

Jim retired in 2017 after 50-years in medicine. His children – Ben, Dan, Natasha and Sophia – decided to honour their father's remarkable life with party rather than a conventional funeral.

"It's more Dad's style," said Ben at The George Hotel in South Melbourne recently, which was filled with Jim's family and friends, including many from Phillip Island.

Speakers included Jim's sister, his children, granddaughter Isabella, and former island GP Dr Paul Flood.

Jim assisted at the birth of Paul and Narella Flood's daughter, Alexandra, at Warley Hospital. Today Alex Flood is a well-known opera star.

Her magnificent soprano voice soared across the venue as she sang Ave Maria to farewell Dr James Khong – a kind, generous, caring man loved and admired by so many.

Dr James Khong is survived by sons Ben and Dan, daughters Natasha and Sophia, and grandchildren Isabella, Olivia, Ollie, Orlando and Ryan.

Support for gambling harm

The Latrobe Community Health Service (LCHS) Gambler's Help team provides support for those experiencing gambling harm. As pokie losses continue to worsen across Gippsland, LCHS is hosting drop in sessions and guest speakers to highlight responsible gambling practices and available support services, as part of Gambling Awareness Week (October 27 - November 2). The 2025 campaign 'set before you bet', highlights how setting limits can reduce someone's risk of experiencing gambling harm.


"This year, we want people to remember that gambling products are designed to keep you playing.

The immersive nature of gambling can make it hard for people to keep track of how long they have been playing and how much they are spending," LCHS Gambler's Help Team Leader, Chipo Chiyangwa said.

According to data from the Victorian Gambling and Casino Control Commission (VGCCC), people in Gippsland lost \$159 million to electronic gambling machines in 2024-2025, an increase from \$154 million spent the year before.

"There are strategies people can use to stay in control, including setting a deposit limit, checking betting statements, setting reasonable time and money limits with the Your Play gaming card at venues, and taking regular breaks," Ms Chiyangwa said.

"Our events are designed to showcase these

strategies and highlight the types of supports we have available to anyone concerned with their gambling habits," she added.

The free events hosted by LCHS for Gambling Harm Awareness Week will feature information, resources, and morning tea or lunch, with events planned across Gippsland. While there are no sessions scheduled for Phillip Island, there is a special online session on October 30, from 12.30pm – 1.30pm, launching a new video "AGD & Me: Putting the G (gambling) into Alcohol or other Drugs".

Gambling harm

In Bass Coast, gambling losses in 2024/25 rose to \$20.8 million – compared to \$20.6 million in the previous year.

However the 10-year trend shows a steady rise

(aside from Covid years), with yearly losses growing by \$4.48 million since 2015/16.

The latest data compiled by the Victorian Gambling and Casino Control Commission shows in Bass Coast in the past 12 months the highest monthly losses were in January 2025 (\$1.95 million), followed by November 2024 (\$1.85 million).

There are currently 210 poker machines across five venues in the shire, with Phillip Island RSL recording the highest expenditure at \$7.7 million. It also recorded the highest loss per machine of \$133,044.

Not budging: financial plan unchanged after consultation

Residents have challenged Bass Coast Shire Council's budget priorities, calling for a redirection of funding in the final Long Term Financial Plan.

However, their calls have fallen on deaf ears, with the final plan largely unchanged compared to the draft that was released in August for community feedback.

The final plan was endorsed by councillors at the October meeting and is one of the most important council plans, detailing funding commitments for the next 10 years.

The biggest project to receive funding was \$114.6 million for the redevelopment of the former Wonthaggi Secondary College into a cultural centre.

There was also \$41 million allocated for aquatics and leisure centres, but with the focus on Wonthaggi, with no specific funding for a Cowes pool.

Phillip Island's future sporting hub will be funded \$9.9 million over the next decade, a first step to the \$120-million-plus needed to rollout all sporting projects.

Other major projects to receive funding in the LTFP over the next decade include: \$7 million for tracks and trails including \$1.4m for Rhyll stage four and five and \$2 million for a Ventnor to Cowes trail: \$1.5 million for the implementation of the mountain bike strategy and \$1.7 million for skate park upgrades from 2026 to 2031 including \$250,000 next year for Newhaven Graydens Reserve and \$1.5m for a sub-regional skate park at Wonthaggi.

Consultation

According to feedback from August and September, residents called for funding to be prioritised for a Phillip Island pool over tracks and trails.

Council officers responded tracks and trails funding of \$7 million was tied to projects currently underway or committed to by council.

Residents called for funding for redevelopment of a football

field and multi-purpose pavilion at Phillip Island Recreation Reserve, to which council officers said there was already funding of \$9.94 million for development of the Phillip Island Recreation Reserve in the plan.

Residents called for allocated funding for the mountain bike strategy to be brought forward, including a pump track at Cape Woolamai, with officers responding the plan had \$500,000 for the strategy in 2026/27, when "appropriate sites and deliverability will be determined".

There were also resident concerns about coastal erosion at Smiths Beach, and opposition to foreshore trails at Smiths

Council officers responded funding has been allocated for 2030/31 "to delay development to ensure the proposed developments align with the community's priorities".

Calls for parking to be retained in Cowes for shops and restaurants saw officers reply "council will continue to consider projects and construction impacting parking availability".

There was a call to balance revenue raising from visitors with maintaining cost of living for locals.

Officers replied council "will consider increasing existing fees or implementing new fees, where appropriate, to help offset these costs".

Aquatics

Cr Ronnie Bauer said he "fought tooth and nail to keep the Phillip Island aquatics alive albeit on life support", with a line entry in the plan for Bass Coast aquatics (plural).

To some this line entry will appear to be superfluous but to those who still live in hope for an aquatic centre at the recreation reserve, this is a crucial entry," he said.

"By being listed in the long term plan it still remains part of our advocacy. Remember, until last year the entire recreation reserve was on the 20-year list and now is the top major project for the island.

"If during a future election the opportunity presents itself, we can reprioritise not only our long-term plan but also our fouryear plan to accommodate the Phillip Island aquatic centre.

"We can say with hand on heart, it is a shovel ready proj-

Local Rotarians and lifechanging clean water program

COMMUNITY

Members of the Rotary Club of Phillip Island and San Remo have returned from a humanitarian trip to Timor-Leste, where they worked with Disaster Aid Australia and Rotary Projects Timor-Leste East to expand a life-changing clean water program.

During the visit, the volunteers helped install and audit ultrafiltration clean water systems in schools and communities and met with Timor-Leste's Minister for Education. That high-level meeting is expected to yield a joint commitment to roll out these safe water units across government schools, greatly widening the project's reach.

Over the past eight years, the Rotary-led initiative has installed 34 ultra-filtration systems across Timor-Leste, now providing access to safe drinking water for an estimated 44,000 students.

Recent audits confirmed that all units are in excellent working condition - notably, even the first system deployed in the country about eight years ago remains fully functional. This durability is a testament to the technology's robustness and the Rotary team's diligent maintenance efforts.

These ultra-filtration systems are innovative, gravity-fed water filters that use advanced membranes to remove 99.9 per cent of waterborne contaminants.

Each unit can purify up to 10,000 litres of water a day without needing electricity or chemicals, enough to meet the daily needs of a school or village. This access to clean water has sharp-

ly reduced waterborne illnesses and improved day-to-day life and school attendance for students. who can now drink safely on site rather than fetching or boiling

The shift also brings environmental benefits by curbing reliance on purchased water in disposable plastic bottles, or using wood fires to boil water, reducing both plastic pollution and deforestation.

The local Rotary contingent's meeting with the education minister is aimed at extending the clean water program into many more state-run schools, potentially benefiting thousands more children soon.

This project highlights what a small community-driven team can accomplish on the global

The Phillip Island and San Remo Rotarians - all volunteers together with many Rotary clubs around Australia, have poured time and resources into improving lives abroad, in partnership with Timorese communities.

"It's a fantastic project - simple, sustainable technology that's truly life-changing," said Rotary Phillip Island and San Remo spokesperson Duncan Hedditch.

"Once a system is installed, the local community maintains it, and it just keeps giving clean water year after year."

The club's ongoing commitment, from fundraising at home to hands-on work in the field, reflects Rotary's ethos of "Service Above Self" and the power of a local initiative making a worldwide impact.

Local Landcare groups get the grants

ENVIRONMENT

Phillip Island Landcare, Bass Coast Landcare Network and the Bass Valley Landcare are among eight groups sharing in environmental conservation grants totalling over \$145,000 in the Bass electorate.

The grants from the State Government are part of the Victorian Landcare Grants program, helping fund on-ground works, community education and engagement activities, group development, and small grants supporting administrative functions, including insurance, incorporation and operational costs.

Project grants up to \$20,000 have been awarded to Bass conservation groups for their projects including:

 Bass Coast Landcare Network (BCLN) will empower schools and the wider community to learn seed collec-

tion, propagation, and planting skills through workshops and education programs at the Bass River Garden, Arboretum, and local farms.

Bass Valley Landcare Group will work with six landholders. local schools, and volunteers to plant 6500 native plants and restore gullies and waterways, creating habitat for threatened species such as the Southern Brown Bandicoot.

• Phillip Island Landcare Group will collaborate with landholders and the Bunurong Land Council to plant 3000 indigenous plants in endangered Swamp Scrub, install wallaby-proof fencing, and host a community planning session to guide future landscape restoration.

Grants were also awarded to the Gippsland Threatened Species Action Group, South Gippsland Conservation Society as well as Anderson Inlet, Three Creeks and Devon Meadows Landcare groups.

Member for Bass Coast Jordan Crugnale said the grants recognised the work of local Landcare groups, "who are restoring habitats and waterways through revegetation, habitat creation, weed control, and fencing

"They're also engaging and educating the community, building the skills we need to strengthen both our environment and the community connections that care for it.'

David Bateman from BCLN said its supported Landcare groups received eight \$20,000 grants.

"The impact of these grants will see over 40,000 plants in the ground and 100s of volunteers engage in Landcare. A big thank you to Jordan Crugnale for her support."

PICAL's second manager brings first-rate expertise

As the new PICAL assistant centre manager, Kerryn Ladell has hit the ground running.

Working alongside manager David Rooks since June, Kerryn is now in charge of projects, programs and networking at the Phillip Island Community and Learning Centre.

In the four months since she started, Kerryn has helped transform PICAL into an energy resilient community hub in the event of power outages, where residents can recharge their mobile phones or seek shelter.

She has helped revamp the fix it café, is extending a community garden at the rear of the centre, is working with Anglicare to create a youth hub, and alongside Bass Coast Adult Learning is expanding course options.

"When you manage a neighbourhood house by yourself you don't have time beyond daily work. The day disappears," Kerryn said, adding the new role of assistant centre manager allowed for big picture thinking.

"David's vision for growth fitted in with my capabilities"

Kerryn's capabilities are perfectly suited to the role.

She has studied an advanced diploma in managing not-for-profits and for the past two decades has worked as a neighbourhood house manager at three centres on the Mornington Peninsula.

In 2019 she moved to Phillip Island, in that time working at the Corinella and District Community Centre as manager, where she helped start a Walk Against Domestic Violence in the town.

She was also centre manager at Corinella at a pivotal moment, helping install solar and batteries to make an energy resilient community hub.

"It was two months old when the power went out for three days," she recalls.

"It made a huge difference. The first day people were charging their devices, the second day they began to share stories and the third

day the whole community was using the service.

"It became about township connection."

Island life

Beyond her skill set, Kerryn said having two managers at PICAL helped in other ways, including bouncing ideas.

"It's great to share ideas with someone, we check in with each other through the week."

David works Monday to Wednesday and Kerryn works Thursday and Friday, each at the centre 9am to

Kerryn, a mum of one and grandmother of three, who is married to Andrew, says she has personally benefitted from neighbourhood house classes, having learnt to draw, a hobby she now relishes.

"I love working in community services.

"There's never a day that is exactly the same. Yesterday, for instance, I was working on cooking, then had a launch with the shire for their emergency services dashboard.

"Today I'm focused on CPR classes and other programs that connect the community.

"It's all about helping and connecting with people, making a difference at a grassroots level."

Support for SCS?

At the October BCSC meeting when moving the Links Street Special Charge Scheme (SCS), Cr. Bell stated "there were only two objections out of 12 houses" and this "reflects a general desire by the residents ... to improve safety, access and liveability in their neighbourhood".

This is an inadequate representation of the factual data council collected.

Rather than focusing on the two No votes, council should have openly outlined and clarified the factual composition of the final vote.

The Bass Coast Engage page factually shows:

1. The initial petition was signed by around 75 per cent or nine out of 12

ratepavers.

2. In the final vote resident support for the project fell by 33 per cent and only 41.5 per cent or five out of 12 ratepayers voted for the scheme.

3. Equally, 41.5 per cent of ratepayers did not vote at all.

4. Combining non-votes with No votes reveals that 58 per cent or seven out of 12 of the residents did not vote to support the scheme.

5. As it does, BCSC used non-votes as support for the declaration of a scheme which did not even achieve 50 per cent ratepayer support.

Having failed to implement the Sunderland Bay/Surf Beach SCS, BCSC made targeted changes to its URDI policy to make it easier to initiate an SCS, lowering from 70 per cent to 50 per cent, the required percentage of signatures needed to lodge a SCS petition. This made SCS schemes easier to initiate, but extremely difficult to stop

Once proposed by petition, the only way to stop a scheme is for 50 per cent plus one of affected ratepayers to vote against it.

This is demonstrated by both Links Street, and the Pioneer Bay SCS where the only votes were 27 No votes. Not a single vote was registered in favour of that scheme, yet BCSC pushed it through.

Residents need to be very careful about signing a special charge petition. You may find that doing so results in the loss of any influence or control over the future development of your street.

Editor's note: Under the rules of the special charge scheme, which are set out in legislation, for a scheme not to proceed, more than 50 per cent of property owners have to object. Therefore, a scheme does not need to achieve support of 50 per cent of property owners to proceed.

"The Wonthaggi pool will do the job for the shire until such time we are able to build the Phillip Island Aquatic Centre."

Cr Bauer also said he had "fought tooth and nail to keep the Phillip Island aquatics alive albeit on life support", with a line item in the 10-year long term financial plan for Bass Coast aquatics (plural).

He added projects could quickly be reprioritised with "one election promise".

Cr Tim O'Brien said the priority for Phillip Island was to progress the recreation reserve, on the corner of Phillip Island and Ventnor roads, specifically a "critical mass" of sporting facilities such as football ovals, after which the pool would follow.

"For Phillip Islanders who may have wanted us to press ahead with both pools, it was never going to happen," Cr O'Brien said.

"It was far too costly. This is getting things in the right order, keeping Phillip Island on the agenda."

Cr Brett Tessari said since 2016 council had advocated in Melbourne and Canberra for two pools but "it didn't work".

"We were told we were never

going to get the funding for two pools," he said.

Cr Meg Edwards said Wonthaggi was the only public pool in Bass Coast and its current disrepair meant "we are at risk of having no pool", which would be "catastrophic".

"Phillip Island's pool is not off the table," she said.

"How do you eat an elephant? Take one bite at a time."

Cr Halstead said the decision was a pragmatic response to current financial realities.

"Redevelopment will allow us to continue delivering vital aquatic and leisure services to our community, while positioning us to attract future funding for a Phillip Island facility," she said.

Strategy

The original Bass Coast Shire Aquatic Strategy was released in 2015, which supported a two-pool strategy – both Wonthaggi and Cowes – which was followed in 2021 by feasibility studies supporting two pools.

The 2025 amendment re-focuses attention, saying Wonthaggi has Bass Coast's only existing pool, which is nearing the end of its life and needs about \$10 million to keep it open.

The 2025/26 budget allocates \$500,000 to start the detailed designs of the Bass Coast Aquatic and Leisure Centre.

The strategy states there are a range of risks in continuing to pursue a two-pool strategy.

Since 2015, the Wonthaggi North East Precinct Structure Plan has been gazetted, altering the future population of Wonthaggi, with 5000 new homes or about 12,000 new residents planned.

In addition, advocacy to state and federal governments for twopools has "failed to achieve funding".

Furthermore, funding two pools would put "unsustainable" pressure on council budgets and increase "long-term debt exposure".

In 2021 a Bass Coast Shire Council study recommended Cowes have a "district level" 25m x 8 lane competition pool, combined learn-to-swim and hydrotherapy area, and 24-hour gym, at a cost of \$45.7 million.

The study also recommended a \$41 million new pool for Wonthaggi: 25m x 10 lanes, with a larger gym, new spa and sauna.

Keep the pool "fight alive"

The community group that has lobbied for decades for a Phillip Island pool said they would continue to fight for a pool.

Bass Coast Shire councillors at the October meeting voted in support of the amended Bass Coast Shire Aquatic Strategy (see separate story), which states planning and advocacy for Phillip Island will start following completion of the Wonthaggi pool's redevelopment.

Phillip Island Aquatic Centre Fund (PIACF) secretary Peter McMahon responded to the decision.

"Our committee will not sit still, we will endeavour to explore every alternative way to come up with an aquatic centre for Phillip Island, but as we age we need help," Peter said.

"This has not come as something we didn't expect, as everyone is aware for the past 30-plus years the island has had to fight Wonthaggi for anything."

He said PIACF thought the first government funding would be for the island but "again that doesn't suit the shire".

"We are told by the change to the advocacy process things will happen faster, well again we just sit and wait but keep supplying the shire with (almost half) its rate revenue."

Peter called for community members to join the group "to keep the fight alive" – with very low membership of the group in recent years – and contact him on 0418 533 256.

Reaction

On social media reactions were against council, with many calling for a reboot to Stand Alone, which was the group that led a failed move to reverse the Kennett Government's 1994 amalgamation between the Phillip Island Shire and Wonthaggi.

The group is now called Island Voice, which has also suffered low membership in recent years.

Former Stand Alone member John Matthews wrote the local government minister rejected Phillip Island separating from Bass Coast.

"The process is enormously complicated and would take an energetic community committee to drive the process," John wrote.

"The issue we have at present is the unelected bureaucrats are running the show and the elected

councillors are blindsided with internal governance guidelines.

"There should never have been a two-pool strategy. A separate strategy for Phillip Island and Wonthaggi would have had better funding opportunities."

Lois said solutions and a detailed plan of how the pool could be funded was needed.


"You could stand for council if you are so aggrieved and do a better job? I am sure if you cost it out, it is prohibitive, so check when the next council elections are and run for office."

Some comments also incorrectly stated the council had funds for the pool.

As reported earlier this year PIACF released 24 years of financial reporting following persistent community questioning on the use of donated funds.

The finances show a total income of \$302,458 since 2000, which includes \$136,000 in fundraising, \$14,000 from the buya-brick campaign and \$66,655 in donations.

Peter McMahon said because PIACF was an incorporated body, there were strict government rules for how funds could be discharged.

Phillip Island pool: a potted history

AQUATIC CENTRE

A 1994 a State Government funded feasibility study supported the establishment of a pool on Phillip Island, but the study was shelved in 1995 following amalgamation of the Bass, Phillip and Wonthaggi councils . . . by the new Bass Coast Shire Council's appointed administrators

Over the next decade, through the island community's repeated calls and fundraising, three successive pool feasibility studies were funded by the community, with help from council.

All had the same outcome: recommendations for a pool to be built on the island.

In 1999, then premier Jeff Kennet, during a visit to Phillip Island, committed his government to fund a pool on the island, on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

The Phillip Island Aquatic Centre Fund Inc (PIACF) was formally launched in 1999, with pool patron Dawn Fraser in attendance.

The group raised money to fund a community pool.

In 2013 Bass Coast Shire Council resolved to redevelop the existing Wonthaggi pool; and consider a facility for Phillip Island in another 15 to 20 years.

Following strong and sustained objections from islanders, a consultant's survey was conducted by council, which led to a further council resolution early in 2014: that two aquatic centres would be supported by council, one at Wonthaggi and one on Phillip Island.

In 2015, council ratified land behind the Cowes Cultural Centre site as the site for a new pool.

In 2017 council overturned that decision, agreeing to seek an alternative location.

In 2020, buyback of the carnival land, on the corner of Ventnor and Phillip Island roads, was completed.

This led to a masterplan for the 32-acre site in 2023, which listed an aquatic centre as a long-term future project, 20 to 25 years away.

In April 2023 a community consultation survey conducted by council resulted in 80 per cent of respondents identifying a Phillip Island pool as their priority for that site.

In January 2025, the Aquatic Centre Fund committee released 24 years of financial reporting following persistent community questioning on the use of donated funds.

Aquatic call for action

The Phillip Island Aquatic Centre Fund Inc would like to outline where it stands regarding recent amendments/ changes the Council passed at its recent meeting.

Firstly, it was never the idea to build two centres at the same time. The council chose to advocate for \$90m for both with government.

We believed the right approach was to build PI's centre first then rebuild Wonthaggi, while maintaining a fully operational centre for the shire. We do understand Wonthaggi needs to be rebuilt or grossly redeveloped.

Our group has amassed an amount of knowledge which obviously doesn't count for anything with our council. Our committee offered help to come up with alternatives, which was rejected.

We did have an excellent working group together with council, which even produced

plans for the PI Aquatic Centre to be built behind the old Cultural Centre in 2016 which council scrapped.

We will keep advocating for an Aquatic Centre on Phillip Island; however, we need your help. The money raised over the 30+ years minus operating costs is still held in a term deposit. Your bricks are still on a register with what you want written on them. Don't get disheartened.

We are holding an AGM on November 19 (via Zoom), where you can get involved. If you are interested, come and be counted in continuing our fight with council. Several ideas are being considered. We just need willing workers to come and make them happen.

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
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Newhaven College celebrates VCE Art and Design







Get bushfire ready with the free green waste disposal period

The fee-free green waste period is on again, from Saturday November 1 to Sunday November 23.

Domestic loads of green waste will be accepted free of charge at any of Bass Coast Shire Council's waste facilities to encourage preparation for the fire season.

Council's waste facilities are located in Grantville, Wonthaggi, Inverloch and Cowes.

Bass Coast Mayor, Cr Rochelle Halstead encouraged everyone to take advantage of this fee-free period to get ready for the upcoming summer.

"Now is the perfect time for everyone to clean up their property before the bushfire season," Cr Halstead said.

"Bushfire hazards include fuel like leaf litter, plants, and other debris. If left to build up, these materials can feed a fire and make it more dangerous."

With the first weekend of the disposal period coinciding with the Melbourne Cup weekend and Council's waste facilities remaining open on Melbourne Cup Day, high demand may lead to queues and delays, particularly on this first weekend.

Disposing of your green

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
