## "Devastated" landowner landed with a lemon

#### **PLANNING**

A landowner says the \$550,000 she paid for her property is money in the bin after VCAT refused her planning permit because Silverleaves Avenue – which fronts the property – failed to meet a flood safety threshold.

Architect Jude Doyle bought the property that is within the town boundary in 2020.

She then met all the planning

criteria for a proposed, modest, three-bedroom home. The building's floor level exceeding height limits by up to a metre; and there were no objectors to her permit.

But after Melbourne Water changed the flood height for Silverleaves in 2022, Jude's property became "worthless" and "sterilised", with the devastated owner now a casualty of chaotic flood planning.

Bass Coast Shire supported her application at September's VCAT hearing, with Jude now calling on VCAT to reconsider the refusal "based on the implications for both personal and broader community development".

Last week she wrote to the Victorian Planning Minister stating the decision will have significant impacts for development state-wide, and asked the minister to overturn it.

Jude said there was now a lack of clarity on minimising flood risk on Phillip Island, and has questioned why VCAT's focus is on risk elimination rather than risk mitigation.

She said there have recently been a string of inconsistent planning permits issued to nearby Silverleaves properties; with some approved and some refused under different regulations and timing. "How can my neighbours across the road at 31 Silverleaves Avenue obtain a planning permit in 2021 and I can't obtain a planning permit in 2022? Why is there no transition period for policy?"

## Police investigate house fire

#### **CRIME**

Police are investigating a fire that destroyed a Cowes house on Thursday.

The blaze took hold of the Church Street house, opposite Coles, about 3.30pm, with fire crews from Cowes and San Remo quickly dousing the flames of the asbestos building.

Cowes police Sergeant Chris Brinkman confirmed Bass Coast Crime Investigation Unit would be investigating the fire.

"The house has possibly been squatted in and we will be making inquiries with the people who have been squatting to try and determine whether it's suspicious," Sgt Brinkman said.

"CIU investigate all fires if there's a question of suspicion."

Church Street outside Coles was closed for more than an hour while crews battled the smoke and flames.

Shoppers came dangerously close to the blaze to record it for social media.

## Emergency services get funding boost

Woolamai Beach Surf Life Saving Club (WBSLSC) has received an \$83,960 grant from the State Government's Volunteer **Emergency Services Equipment** Program (VESEP) for repairs to the Smiths Beach Rescue tower.

The project will include wall panel works, inside painting, stair removal and replacement.

This year the club has been seeking \$140,000 in funding to ensure the safety of the rescue base structure, which was built only six years ago.

To date, the club has raised around \$25,000 and with the most recent grant, is well on the way to reaching its fundraising target.

The rescue base is critical for public first aid, as a training hub, surveillance and shelter, as well as storage, and since being built in 2018 harsh conditions have caused decay and rust and the base requires urgent repairs.

San Remo's CFA has also received \$100,000 for an extension to its station.

Other local services to receiving funding from the program include Cape Paterson and Inverloch SLSC, and Pound Creek, Corinella and Inverloch CFA.

Local MP Jordan Crugnale announced that locally, eight grants, with a total value of \$658,818 were awarded to CFA brigades and Life Saving Clubs across the Bass electorate.

"This is so welcomed and how wonderful that we will now see an extension at the San Remo CFA station for their growing brigade numbers, and a much-needed new light tanker for Corinella which will service the surrounding waterline townships.

"A massive congratulations to all our successful local volunteer groups and for their stellar fundraising efforts and community support which contribute enor-

mously and ensures what they need for their station, unit or club a reality," Ms Crugnale said.

"This annual program provides the vital equipment, appliances, facilities you need and deserve to care, support, service and keep us safe. Thank you for all you do in our community, at all hours in all conditions, we are beyond grateful."

VESEP is an annual grants program that provides funding to Victorian emergency services volunteer groups to purchase essential operational equipment, vehicles and appliances and undertake minor facility improvements.

## Vietnam Vets step up fundraising

The National Vietnam Veterans Museum (NVVM) board has cranked up its fundraising for their new museum, with a trip to Canberra and the USA planned.

The board has also hired a professional funding organisation to raise remaining funds, with \$16 million in state and federal government grants so far promised to the project.

Board member Phil Dressing said they had also commissioned quantity surveyor reports, due by the end of the year, which will review the initial \$50 million construction budget.

"That \$50 million looks like increasing substantially due to the increase in construction costs in recent years," Phil said.

Earlier this year the Planning Minister approved the new NVVM, which was initially approved by Bass Coast Shire councillors in 2022.

But after two objectors fought it at VCAT, the permit was refused last year.

The ministerially-approved permit green lights a new museum at 24 Churchill Road, which is similar to the original permit and has incorporated a number of tweaks that take on VCAT's concerns.

Phil said on November 5 he would be joined by board chair Kingsley Mundey and Vietnam Veterans Association of Australia (Victoria) president Bob Elworthy on a trip to Canberra to seek more than \$10 million funding.

The trio will meet with Veterans' Affairs Minister Matt Keogh, shadow minister Barnaby Joyce, as well as long-term supporter Senator Jacqui Lambie, Member for Monash Russell Broadbent and hopefully Tourism Minister Senator Don Farrell.

In August next year board representa-

tives will also attend the Vietnam Veterans of America biannual conference as guest speakers.

"We wouldn't be going if we didn't think we would also fundraise," Phil said, adding indications are that veteran philanthropy was strong in the USA.

"I'm supremely confident we will raise the required funds."

Phil added the majority of the 80 acres would be given to the community as revegetated parkland.

#### Construction

Board chair Kingsley Mundey said it would take up to three years' for the completion of stage one construction, with civil works expected within 10 months and "a sod turning in the near future".

He said fundraising had been hampered by the lack of surety for the project.

Following the minister's approval, he said after seven years of planning for a new museum "we have now reached the starting line".

"We have had a number of discussions pending the outcome of the planning process and we expect support from our allies alongside whom our troops served in Vietnam."

Kingsley recently purchased Phillip Island's helicopter business and the front 2.4 hectares of the airport land, on the corner of Veterans Drive and Phillip Island Road.

He said the museum currently used part of that land, "with the good graces of the previous owner", to park a Caribou aircraft and provide parking in front of the museum.

Once the new building is open, the current site will transition into offices, a conservation centre and storage for the Churchill Road collection.

# Boat noise impact on Nobbies' seal colony study

Loud marine watercraft noise leads to behaviour changes in nearby seals, according to a new study which has recommended improved regulations.

For the first time, a team of researchers, led by University of Sydney PhD Candidate Jessalyn Taylor, examined seasonal differences in the behavioural responses of seals near Seal Rocks.

The study found exposure to boat engine noise above 75 dB resulted in short-term behavioural disturbances amongst the seals.

It found while behavioural responses were limited to the period of noise exposure, frequent disturbances could lead to fur seals suffering more population-wide consequences.

"Human activity is changing the environment faster than many species can adapt, if they can even adapt at all, so it is vital that regulations to protect wildlife are frequently reviewed to ensure they are effective," Jessalyn said.

Seal Rocks is home to the country's largest colony of Australian fur seals, with about 20,000 seals or 25 per cent of the species' population, with surveys since 2007 showing pup numbers off the Nobbies have decreased by 30 per cent.

Seal Rocks has a small vessel exclusion zone during the pupping and breeding season when vessel traffic is at its peak: 20 metres for a permitted tour vessel, 60 metres for all other boats and 260 metres for jet skis – to the boundary of the colony.

#### Surveys

Researchers conducted surveys over four seasons between January 2022 and August 2023 using pre-recorded vessel noise from an operating outboard motor typical of vessels visiting Seal Rocks.

They assessed seal responses to low (64-70 dB), medium (71-75 dB) and high (76-80 dB) levels of the noise.

"Findings of our study shows that behavioural changes in seals exposed to loud motor vessel noise were limited to the period of noise exposure, but created increased vigilance amongst the seals and reductions in nursing and rest during those times," Jessalyn said.

"We also found that high level noise exposure was more likely to cause seals to move away from the focal area compared to low and medium level noise, likely because they didn't like it or perceived it as a threat."

She said it was important the impacts of human visitation at sensitive marine sites were well understood to ensure adequate protection of seals and effective management of the area.

"This study is one of very few to evaluate the impacts of airborne vessel noise in pinnipeds and is the first to examine seasonal differences in behavioural responses," Ms Taylor said.

"Through this study we have been able to make comparisons between colony sites and species that will hopefully lead to better protection for Australian fur seals at Seal Rocks and other marine areas with high human traffic and interaction."

The study, Behavioural response of Australian fur seals to vessel noise during peak and off-peak human visitation, is available online in the Marine Pollution Bulletin.

## Swan Lake with no swans, or birds

It may have felt cold and rainy in the past few weeks, but if Swan Lake on the Summerland Peninsula is a sign, we are experiencing below average rainfall.

The lake is usually full of water and birdlife at this time of year, but currently only features a couple of Cape Barren geese in shallow ponds.

A Phillip Island Nature Parks spokesperson said the low level was not unusual following a dry winter and birds would fly to areas with more favourable conditions and return with rainfall.



There were no swans at Swan Lake recently, with the lake's current low levels the result of below average winter rainfall.

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# San Remo SES: "everyone has something to offer"

San Remo SES Unit is looking for volunteers, both operational and non-operational, to join the service and help the community.

The San Remo Unit currently has 24 members who respond to a wide range of emergencies in the community including fallen trees, floods, landslides, beach/land rescues and searches.

San Remo SES also is an accredited road rescue unit, alongside Phillip Island and Wonthaggi SES.

There is no "typical" SES member, as San Remo Unit Controller Mandy Chancellor explained.

"If you look at the people who go to the Grand Final at the MCG, any one of them could be an SES volunteer – many probably are – and I don't think a lot of the population realise that," Mandy said, adding "everyone has something to offer".

"There might be members of the community who want to contribute but feel they aren't in a position to be operational (out in vehicles attending to requests for assistance) but there are still important roles to play in the non-operational space.

"Areas like community engagement, New Membership Officers, WHS Officers (Workplace Health & Safety), and Grant Officers are all positions where non-operational members can really use their experiences to support the unit."

Mandy, who earlier this year won the Bass Coast Shire Council's 2024 Community Leader Award for her work with the service and within the community, joined the SES in August 2019 when she "probably had eight hours" a week free.

"If you'd have said to me ten years ago that I was going to be a unit controller of an SES Unit, I would have thought: 'well yeah, no,'" Mandy said.

"But I wanted to do something which connected me to my community, and so I went through this SES door and soon it became a fantastic way of life for me.

"Like most SES units, you become family: working beside really good people and sharing amazing experiences. Many members become life long friends."

#### Recruitment

The San Remo Unit Controller explained while expanding and building the unit's capabilities, the team was "particularly keen" to hear from local members of the community who live close to the San Remo Unit (on Davis Point Road).

However, Mandy also said she was "super excited" to hear from anyone who has a few hours a week available, to talk about how they could contribute to the SES.

Mandy said she works closely with members to accommodate a range of personal circumstances, but that spare time and dedication to the community were the two main pre-requisites for volunteering at the SES.

The Unit Controller said anybody can play an important role for the service, and that it all starts with a conversation.

Members at San Remo SES are all volunteers, with many balancing various different day jobs in the community, as well as others who are studying along with retired or semiretired members.

"And let age not be a deterrent," Mandy said, noting the different ages in the San Remo Unit ranges from young adults (18 plus) and parents with young children, to retirees and mature age members of the community.

#### Dedication

One member of the San Remo SES unit, Rob Bishop, is also a dual member with Moorabbin SES Unit. Rob said as an SES volunteer "pretty much, you just want to make a real big dent in the community and help them out".

"The most important thing about this unit is that they work closely with other emergency services to provide support in various emergency situations including road crash rescue as well as the effects of storms, including flooding and building damage from storm events that sweep across our coastline and inland.

"The opportunity to learn new skills with the SES is amazing, as is using those new skills in supporting the community.

"This is actually a lifestyle and a supportive family is vital, both with the time of day we can be called out and the ongoing commitment to support the unit to be operational."

The unit was grateful to recently receive a donation from STIHL of a cordless chainsaw. The more user-friendly equipment is another way the unit works to remove barriers to people volunteering to be part of the team.

# Plants fight a gassy problem

There's usually no good news to come out of sewage.

But a "cutting edge" pilot project at Westernport Water's Pyramid Rock Road wastewater treatment plant has found floating wetlands can reduce greenhouse gas emissions and remove chemicals, a community forum heard last week.

The water authority is halfway through a two-year pilot project at the Cowes Wastewater Treatment Plant, releasing preliminary findings to about 40 community members at the forum, including farmers who can apply findings to farm dams.

The treatment plant recycles Phillip Island's sewage in a series of processes including a lagoon, before it is either released into the ocean out of a Pyramid Rock outlet or is reused as recycled water on local sports fields and farms.

The findings from CSIRO and RMIT researchers who are working on the lagoon pilot project show:

- Two of three floating plant species – common reed and jointed twig rush – successfully removed more sewage nutrients;
- The floating plants have reduced carbon dioxide by 27 per cent, nitrous oxide by 19 per cent and methane by 58 per cent; and
  There is early evidence the

remove synthetic materials from wastewater, such as PFAS "forever chemicals". Westernport Water's cli-

floating wetland is able to

Westernport Water's climate change advisor Zoe Geyer told the forum water authorities were legally required to be net zero emissions by 2035 and by July 1 they would be powered by 100 per cent renewable energy.

"We have an ambition beyond zero carbon," Zoe said, explaining they hoped the pilot project would not only reduce emissions, but sequester or store them to allow potential for carbon credits.

Zoe said there were also strict requirements in the recycled water that could be released out of the Pyramid Rock outflow.

"This is a scientific trial and so if we can reduce the nutrients that will improve what flows out to the ocean."

CSIRO researcher Dr John Awad, from South Australia, told the forum the trial showed early indications the floating plants could reduce PFAS levels by up to 60 per cent.

RMIT researcher Martino Malerba said globally waste water was responsible for up to five per cent of greenhouse gas emissions and the pilot project could be rolled out across farm dams

The pilot project will be finished in April 2025.

Jude hired a barrister, hydrologist and solicitor for the VCAT case, that cost her nearly \$100,000 including the creation of a flood risk management plan - and describes the decision as "really heavyhanded".

"It's like having \$550,000 and chucking it in the bin. There's not much I can do with the land now except build a fence and maybe a shed," said Jude, who pays vacant land tax, on top of land tax and rates.

"I'm stuck with it unless there's some kind of miracle."

#### Ruling

As previously reported last month, in Doyle v Bass Coast SC, Jude was seeking to build an elevated single level, threebedroom home on 32 Silverleaves Avenue with a Land Subject to Inundation Overlay (LSIO).

Under an LSÍO, the permit was referred to Melbourne Water who objected and Bass Coast Shire was then required to refuse the permit, which it did in July last year. However, at the VCAT hearing, Bass Coast Shire supported the application.

VCAT concluded the permit should be refused because of risks to future occupants from coastal inundation and sea level rise.

Jude said the blame for her predicament lay with Melbourne Water, which transitioned from using 2040 flooding data to 2100 flooding data in 2022.


'I have been caught out in this change. The crux of the problem is the road level – not my site – is too low to meet the Melbourne Water safety threshold.

"That threshold is a one per cent chance of a flood event in 100 years from the Rhyll Inlet, a freak tidal event, so not days of flooding, but hours.

"I designed my floor level higher, but I can't do anything about the road height."

Jude bought the land

with a view to living in Silverleaves in the future.

She volunteers with the Silverleaves Conservation Association and her partner's family has had a holiday home in the hamlet since the 1960s.

"There's no precedent for flooding in Silverleaves since that time."

#### Next steps

Jude said for future property owners in LSIO areas there needed to be better guidance to cope with planning changes.

She was scathing of Melbourne Water, saying they had "singled her out", yet had no expertise in coastal inundation or Silverleaves conditions, instead relying on flood modelling for Tooradin.

"VCAT and Melbourne Water are making decisions that are extremely conservative with no transition for people caught by the goal posts changing.

"People should not be allowed to be caught out. There's no transition, no discretion. It's not even about law, it's about the

"The planning scheme and Melbourne Water are not talking to each other.

"I understand if this applied to a greenfield site, but my land is within the town boundary.

"It's pretty sh\*t: government trying to squash one person and then go and approve a commercial development right on the Rhyll foreshore, for example, which was given a government grant to build."

Jude said she could not afford to take the VCAT decision to the Supreme Court and "rolled the dice" on even taking the permit to VCAT, now wishing she had instead simply sold the land or never bought it.

#### **Precedents**

Last year, there has been a spike in planning permit refusals in Bass Coast, with Melbourne Water having the power to veto a permit application.

The owner of 2 Settlement Road, Silverleaves, had their application for an extension of time to build a house rejected by VCAT, with Melbourne Water stating there was "a significant level of risk to life and property resulting from the predicted depth and frequency of flooding" on Settlement Road.

A million-dollar property at 13 Woodland Avenue in Silverleaves had a planning permit for a new home refused. The applicant appealed VCAT and an agreement to address flood risk was reached, which saw a planning permit approved in July.

Also last year a planning permit for 2 Bruce Road was approved. Melbourne Water did not object, despite the significant flood risk impacting the land, mainly because the proposed building was a replacement dwelling with the same number of bedrooms as the existing dwelling to be demolished.

# falls on Ventnor Road

#### **ROAD SAFETY**

Dead overhanging trees on Ventnor Road continue to be an issue of serious community concern, with another fallen branch reported on the much-used tourist and residential road.

As reported in the Advertiser earlier this month, there was an outpouring of community outrage after a large tree fell immediately in front of a sixtyseven-year-old driver at night.

Residents described driving down Ventnor Road as playing "Russian roulette" and questioned whether it would take a serious incident for the dead trees to be cleared.

Last week Jack (name changed), a Whitesands Estate resident, reported another sizeable branch which had fallen on the road.

"If somebody gets hurt, where's (the road mangers') duty of care?" Jack questioned, saying he and his wife were "apprehensive" to drive down Ventnor Road, although sometimes it is "unavoidable".

Jack said he "lost count" while numbering the dead trees along the road, but "there'd be at least ten dead ones".

A spokesperson for the Department of Transport and Planning (DTP), who manage Ventnor Road, said "our crews will be out at Ventnor Road this week to ensure the road remains safe for everyone."

"Our crews regularly inspect every kilometre of our road network, including across Phillip Island, to identify any issues or hazards and maintain the roads in safe condition."

Jack described this response as "lip service", and said he couldn't understand that if the department are inspecting the road regularly, why the trees which are now falling down on an almost weekly basis were not being removed.

'Some arborists should be able to come along, or somebody with common sense should be able to come along and go, 'yeah, that's dangerous. Let's clear it."

#### **DTP** response

Jack said after the wild September storm the road was littered with fallen trees and branches.

Jack contacted the Bass Coast Shire Council (who do not manage the road) and said in less than two weeks the fallen branches and trees were cleared.

The Whitesands Estate resident said he later realised Ventnor Road fell under the remit of the DTP, not council, but was "quite happy" with council's response.

'(Council) didn't say 'it's not my job', they didn't say that at all, they just said 'yeah,' I mean it was almost as if they accepted it was their job."

A spokesperson for the DTP said "following recent heavy winds and storms, our crews continue to clear vegetation debris as part of our broader cleanup and hazard response efforts across Phillip Island and this will continue through November.

"Over the past quarter, DTP maintenance crews have attended 95 jobs due to heavy weather.

"We encourage members of the public to notify us of any hazards on our roads by calling DTP on 13 11 70," the DTP spokesperson said.

Bass Coast winemakers were celebrated at the 2024 Westpac Gippsland Wine Show on October 17.

Silverwaters Vineyard took the gold for the Best Pinot Noir, while Purple Hen Wines picked up multiple awards, including for outstanding contribution to the local wine community.

Dirty Three Wines again picked up several awards.

In the biggest show of recent years, the Wine Show attracted 114 high-calibre entries with particular strengths in Pinot Noir and Chardonnay. There was a record haul of 53 medals, including five gold trophies, 14 gold, 15 silver and 24 bronze.

Emily and Hercules Van Der Walt of Silverwaters Vinevard were thrilled to walk away with their first trophy, Top Gold (96 points) for Best Pinot.

## A medical miracle in San Remo

#### **HEALTH**

In August, Lawton Ho and his family had taken visitors from Singapore for a day trip to San Remo.

What was meant to be an unforgettable day has been wiped from Lawton's memory, after he collapsed while enjoying a meal of fish and chips on the San Remo foreshore, suffering a cardiac arrest.

On the weekend, Lawton and his family returned to San Remo, to meet up with the first responders who helped save his life.

Despite the traumatic ordeal, Lawton says he feels incredibly lucky, and it seems the odds were certainly in his favour.

When he collapsed, friend FengYe Chan who is an ICU nurse, immediately started CPR, while daughter Saffina rang Triple Zero.

FengYe had only decided at the last minute to join the outing, invited along by Lawton's wife Jenny. Originally friends through their local church, Jenny describes FengYe as "like family now".

In another stroke of luck, local paramedics Simon McHenry and Paul De Fazio were on their

Melbourne and were just telling his anxious family outside San Remo when they received the call and were quickly on the scene.

Local police from San Remo were across the road, following up a vandalism complaint, and rushed to assist.

All in all, it was a perfect storm.

Paramedic Paul De Fazio said when they arrived, FengYe was providing "good, effective CPR", helped by two nurses who were passing by.

"Any CPR is good," said fellow paramedic Simon McHenry, "but FengYe's was amazing.

"The police were a massive help to us and were able to take over the chest compressions which freed us up to take care of everything else," Paul said.

The team were able to shock Lawton and "reset the electrical activity", with FengYe praising the pair for their professionalism on the day.

#### Memory

While the events of the day are burned into the minds of FengYe, Jenny and 14-year-old Saffina, Lawton said he has no memory of the day at all.

Rushed to hospital, he remained unconscious for way back from a job in four days, with doctors he had around a five per cent chance of waking up with his memory intact.

Once again, luck was on his side, and right at the four day deadline, when doctors would reassess the options, Lawton woke up and within a fortnight was in surgery, having arteries in his heart replaced.

He said his recovery was "extremely quick", and while he can't drive for six months, he feels he is close to being back to his normal self.

"I think I have been blessed."

Lawton and his family said they were thrilled to have the chance to meet up with the team who helped save him.

Paul De Fazio was equally happy to meet Lawton and see how well he had recovered.

"It was a very good feeling when we heard Lawton had survived, and we would like to commend FengYe for the wonderful job she did providing CPR.

'It shows that anyone in the community can make a difference and help to save someone's life, simply by knowing how to do CPR."

After spending 20 days in hospital, Lawton was discharged with no last-

## No signs of avian flu yet: PINP CEO

#### WILDLIFE

The community is being asked to remain on the lookout for signs of avian flu in birds across the island, especially in the migratory short-tailed shearwaters, or 'mutton birds'.

CEO of Phillip Island Nature Parks (PINP), Catherine Basterfield, has issued another alert to the community to stay vigilant, saying "surveillance and reporting will be key to early detection" of the flu.

While the HPAI H5N1 strain of avian flu has not yet been detected in Australia, disease screening results of up to 250 short-tailed shearwaters are currently being analysed as part of the National Avian Influenza Wild Bird Surveillance Pro-

"Phillip Island Nature Parks is continuing to monitor the shearwaters as they return to Phillip Island for their breeding season, and we are happy to report that

we have not detected any signs of sick birds," said PINP CEO Catherine Basterfield.

"As a further precautionary measure A3 signage is now in place including information about HPAI H5N1, symptoms and how to report sick or dead birds or wildlife."

We are concerned about bird flu arriving in Australia this spring

If you see dead birds in Australia:

- (1) Do not touch dead birds
- (2) Report all instances of dead birds via the Emergency animal disease watch hotline 1800 675 888
- (3) Follow guidelines provided by state and national response teams
- (4) If feasible, collect information pertaining to the number of dead wild birds, species compositions, location, date and time. Do this from a distance using binoculars and/or cameras.



While there has not yet been a detection of H5N1, a Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza, in Australia, residents are being reminded to stay on the lookout for signs, and avoid, record and report sick or dead birds by calling 1800 675 888.

Swan Lake, Observation Point and Fishers Wetland.

Stephen Brend, Scientific Officer of the Western Port Biosphere Foundation has said the potentiality of the Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza spreading through Australian bird and animal populations is "scary".

"Australia remains the only continent free from H5N1," Stephen said.

"It has devastated bird populations overseas and, as the shorebirds start to return, we are worried that the virus may travel with them."

The public is being urged to: Avoid contact with sick or dead wildlife and their environment, and to not allow pets to touch or eat sick or dead wildlife; Record what you see, the location the animal was found, and take a photo or video; and Report any unusual sickness or mass mortality events in wildlife via the Emergency Animal Disease Hotline on 1800 675 888.

#### Along with death, other signs of H5N1 are:

- Lack of coordination, tremors, swimming in circles
- Twisted neck or other unusual posture
- Inability to stand or fly
- Difficulty breathing, coughing or sneezing
- Swelling around the head,

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
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## Kids get creative to protect water

She rises above the daily challenges of family life; has a best friend with whom to share moments of levity, and dreams for her daughter Marcella to one day have a better life. Delia accepts her fate the good with the bad - until one day a mysterious letter arrives.

The film is set in the scarred remnants of Rome following the Second World War.

"There's Still Tomorrow" is a working-class drama that's equal parts funny and stone-cold serious said Movie Club secretary Margaret Byrne.

"The film looks at the life of an industrious heroine who endures a life of misogyny and domestic abuse.

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

#### Save our coastal towns

The Small Coastal Townships Alliance (SCTA), established in 2014 is community driven, comprising of 16 small coastal towns in Bass Coast and supported by the Phillip Island Conservation Society (PICS) and Bass Coast Branch of the National Trust.

SCTA has been working closely with Bass Coast Shire Council Planning Officers with a view to strengthening planning controls for small coastal towns. Inadequate planning controls are a constant threat to the coastal environment and the unique character of our small coastal towns and is also true of Bass Coast generally.

We congratulate PICS and Island Voice in speaking up against the shire's Bass Coast Unlocking Rural Tourism strategy (BURT). SCTA supports their concerns regarding overdevelopment outside of town boundaries on Phillip Island. In addition, the BURT also applies throughout the shire and is of equal concern to SCTA.

However, getting rid of BURT is one thing but new planning controls which are linked below will completely bypass Councils and communities in the decision-making process.

This is a serious threat to our state as a whole and has been going on pretty much unnoticed!

These controls make the State Government the responsible authority in the decision-making process and removes any appeal rights that objectors previously

Please note the thresholds for these major projects which are much less in regional areas.

This is a much greater threat to Phillip Island and Bass Coast than BURT!

The State Government is stealthily and steadily taking over planning from local councils and communities and it's about time this was recognised and stopped.

#### Another council bungle

I am devastated that due to a "council administrative error" I have been denied my democratic right to vote in the council elections.

The Council's Executive Manager of Governance and Finance advised me via email they had checked their records and could see confirmed submission of my enrolment request in June this year. "I've then asked the team to check the final voters roll extract sent to the VEC and we identified that you were listed as enrolled, but not listed as a voter. Unfortunately this is due to an administrative error on our behalf where one field appears to be incomplete. To compound the issue,

there is no way for Council to be aware of the error until a voter advises that they haven't received their election pack.'

I was told the VEC advised where this has occurred "you can still vote, but will need to call the VEC Public Enquiry Service on 1300 805 478 and request a replacement vote, as you should have been listed on our voters roll. I apologise for the inconvenience."

I am concerned the officer views this as only an "inconvenience" rather than stripping a constituent of their lawful democratic right.

After visiting the Electoral Office in Wonthaggi I discovered I have no recall regarding this situation and council will not be issued with a fine, notice or other infringement.

In the event I receive a notice of noncompliance that results in a fine, I am expecting Bass Coast Shire Council to pay the fine and any associated fees and have requested the CEO confirms this in writing to me.

This process was tripped up by a council officer's error in not completing a section of the online form. The question is how many other rate payers have suffered the same consequence.

This error by the officer removed my democratic right and my rates partly pay their salary. Just appalling.

Another clear example of this council's incompetence and this time at my democratic expense.



# Angling Club hosts successful competition

The Rhyll-Phillip Island Angling Club (RPIAC) held its third weekend angling competition for the 2024/2025 season on October 19-20.

This year, the competition coincided with the MotoGP, allowing anglers to maximise their experiences in both angling and motorsport.

Competitors gathered to fish in the beautiful waters surrounding Phillip Island, including Western Port Bay and Bass Strait, targeting a variety of saltwater species.

Despite starting with some rain and wind, the weather improved, offering participants a gentle breeze and sunshine to cast their lines.

Over the weekend, a total of 63 fish were weighed in, featuring an impressive array of species, including snapper, King George whiting, trevally, gummy sharks, and calamari.

With recent reports of huge Snapper entering the bay, the \$5000 incentives for angling members with extraordinary catches, during a competition weekend, remains in the bank.

The five eligible species nominated for each first-to-catch \$1000 prize, by equalling or exceeding the nominated weight, are: King George whiting (1000 grams), snapper (10kg), Gummy shark (20kg), mulloway (25kg) and kingfish (25kg).

RPIAC encourages participation in recreational angling and children, aged 16 and under, receive complimentary membership to the angling competitions to develop skills and an interest in sustainable and responsible angling.

#### Results

The competition featured several categories, with

standout performances from young anglers.

In the Squidgies Mixed Bag competition for participants aged nine and under, Harley Griffin secured second place with three fish worth 50 points, while Saige Nicolaci claimed first place with four fish worth 75 points.

four fish worth 75 points. In the Junior Weight and Junior Points competitions for anglers aged 10 to 16, Thomas Grogan excelled, weighing in a snapper at 770 grams and a King George whiting that earned 1288 points (460 grams) respectively.

In the senior divisions, Kate Jinnette triumphed in the Senior Female Points competition with a King George whiting worth 1442 points (515 grams).

Brian Bowers took home the Senior Male Points award with the biggest King George whiting of the season, worth a massive total of 2170 points (775 grams).

Tenille Preddice dominated the Senior Female Weight competition with a snapper weighing 2710 grams, while Trevor Gleeson secured the Senior Male Weight title with a remarkable 5610-gram snapper.

Adding excitement to the competition, RPIAC is also running a Heaviest Snapper contest for fishing weekends in October and November.

Currently, the leading catch is a 6200-gram snapper caught by Kevin Reid.
