

It is understood a meeting of PICAL's 300 volunteers was held on Friday morning to explain the shock news the organisation would be wound up, declaring insolvency.

# COMMUNITY

The Phillip Island Community and Learning Centre is set to be wound up after being unable to meet debts incurred from an "administrative inaccuracy", underpaying wages to employees for more than a decade.

The shock news means the doors to the 44-year-old community house will be closed, most likely along with the emergency food relief program – which

feeds about 300 people a week.


Also impacted will be the Centrelink and Services Australia agency, employment services, welfare referrals, education courses and several community groups who are hosted by PICAL, such as the community garden.

However, in a public statement issued Friday lunchtime, the PICAL board said they would aim to continue all existing services "for as long as we

are permitted", with a "focus of supporting continuity moving forward".

The statement said a special general meeting of members had been called for November 14

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

Quiet council rollback on Cowes foreshore toilets

## **INFRASTRUCTURE**

Bass Coast Shire Council has quietly updated the projected timeline for waterproofing works on the Cowes public toilet block, following widespread outrage the project would close the amenity over the island's busiest period.

On October 1, council's engage website read: "works anticipated to be completed" in January 2025.

Recently the projected completion date was amended to December 2024, with the addition: "works anticipated to be completed before Christmas".

The news that the toilet block would be closed until January attracted a slew of anger and criticism.

Residents were questioning why the works were not completed over winter, whether a portable structure would be erected in the meantime and lamenting the impact on local businesses.

Stephen Fullarton, who designed the toilet block in 1994, said he was asked by council in June to document the refurbishment works. Stephen said there was "no option but to open the

toilets for the summer period".

According to the ex-councillor, who has a copy of the schedule of works, the handover date is November 26.

"Saying until January on

their website, (council) are just quoting the worst-case scenario," Stephen said.

"But look, there are two words that never appear anywhere together in any council document: one's 'common' and the other's 'sense'."

The matriarch of Pino's Trattoria, Rosa Scarlato, slammed the council's decision.

"Well, well, congratulations

to the council for closing the toilets for repair with the Moto GP coming up, and then not even opening again during the summer season," Rosa wrote.

"Mine and other businesses have been left to take the load of people wanting to use our toilet facilities, whilst not buying our services.

"I am completely amazed they haven't been replaced by temporary portable toilets. In a town that already has insufficient facilities for the tourists, why has the council not seen fit to do this?"

Last week, two single 'festivalstyle' portaloos were put in place adjacent to the toilet block, with queues already forming during last week's warm weather.

Stephen said "hopefully the contractors will get a good run of weather and get it done" before summer.

Council did not respond to questions from the Advertiser, including: why the repairs were not completed over winter; whether temporary toilets similar to those installed at Smiths Beach last year would be implemented; and whether they considered the impact on local businesses.

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# FOI documents reveal decision to "do nothing" **NEWHAVEN JETTY**

engineering assessments which led to the indefinite closure of the Newhaven Jetty in May have been released under Freedom of Information (FOI), following a request from The National's Member for Eastern Victoria, Melina Bath.

The executive summary of the report, finalised in March and prepared by Parks Victoria for the State Government, states that the jetty is in "very poor condition" with "more than 60 per cent of the beams showing signs of heavy deterioration".

"Most of the timber decking planks, longitudinal beams and cross beams are either heavily deteriorated or failed," the report stated, "posing serious tripping hazards and reduced structural capacity below limits that could eventually lead (to) structural failure and serious injuries".

The report, which was based on a "limited visual condition (Level 2) inspection", proposed three options.

Option 1 was to "do nothing", involving full closure of the jetty to vehicles and pedestrians. Option 2a and 2b required immediate corrective maintenance to be undertaken over the course of 18 months, but would have prolonged public access to the jetty.

Option 2a proposed to maintain pedestrian access for the jetty approach and central head the runway 'stem' of the jetty's 'T' shape; while Option 2b proposed maintaining pedestrian access on the jetty approach and central head, as well as the northern arm of the jetty.

The southern arm of the jetty has been closed since 2018.

Partial pedestrian access would have been maintained to the jetty while Option 2a and 2b works were completed.

However, the report also states a proposed further Level 3 engineering inspection would have "very likely" uncovered similar or more significant defects in "all timber elements" of the jetty.

The report costed the "minimum" corrective maintenance to be "at least \$120,000", taking into consideration the Level 3 inspection would likely have found further defects.

It is unclear in the report how long Option 2a and 2b would have prolonged public access to the jetty.

After inspecting the document, Melina Bath MP said: "It is clear from the documents that maintenance would have allowed the jetty to remain open for a further 10 years before being replaced".

The report recommended "to proceed with Option 1 due to the overall very poor condition and associated ongoing major repair works required over the next five years".

According to the report, the recommendation to "do nothing" took into consideration "the current low Level of Service (LOS), availability of resources and priority of repair works at more significant piers and jetties."

Although the report cited "the current low level of service" as a reason for the jetty's indefinite closure, Amanda's petition amassed more than 2300 hardcopy signatures, and a further 1163 online signatures.

"Our community feels really abandoned and let down by the findings resulting from the FOI questions," Amanda said.

'The FOI answers also revealed that the jetty was repairable. It was deteriorating decking and cross beams (in need of repair) It wasn't the whole jetty. It's really disappointing that they just put a fence around it and that was that.

"Doing nothing is a big loss to not only the locals who use and

love it. It is a lost opportunity for regional tourism and land-based anglers who choose to come and stay and play in our area.

"It's not a big build project. It's our small, important rebuild."

Owner of Saltwater, the restaurant adjacent to the jetty, Ben Dennis, stressed how important the jetty was to his local family business.

"I personally feel the government has let us down and mislead us, with no support at all.

The Newhaven Jetty is one of the most heavily utilised assets in the region for locals and tourists."

Ms Bath also visited the Newhaven Jetty on Monday.

"Why wasn't the community consulted?" she questioned.

"I think the really sad thing is the first time the community really knew about the closure was when there was a closed indefinitely sign put on the gate.".

Jordan Crugnale MP, local member for Bass, said the jetty was closed on May 1 this year, for public safety.

"Engineering assessments revealed structural failures of the jetty meaning it is not safe to access.

'We know maritime facilities deteriorate over time, which is why staff monitor the condition of assets as part of routine patrols and arrange detailed engineering inspections when required.

The jetty will continue to be prioritised under the Sustainable Local Ports Framework for future investment."

Ms Crugnale said the government understood the important role the jetty played in the local community for recreation, including fishing and walking.

# Local council election

This week, the Advertiser received several complaints that a letter from the local branch of a state political party was advising its members on how to vote in the upcoming council election.

We received a copy of the letter and chose not to publish it for a number of

Firstly, we don't believe political parties should be involved in our council

Secondly, we felt publishing the letter amplified its message well beyond its original intended audience.

Political party membership levels are at historic lows. A letter sent to local branch members of a party represents a very small fraction of the local population.

We then received some letters to the editor which included extracts from cillors. tne originai par chose not to publish.

None of us can control what a political party says at their own branch meeting, or which candidates they discuss.

However, it is important to note that no political party has formally endorsed a candidate in the Bass Coast council election.

Are any of the current candidates paid up members of a political party? Possibly.

Do all of the candidates have political leanings or regularly vote in support of a particular party in state or federal elections? Definitely.

Over the years, councillors of very different political persuasions have managed to function together effec-

It is a reflection of the divisive nature of politics at the moment that there's an automatic assumption that people who are grass roots members of a political party are automatically not going to put their community first, or are only capable of thinking strictly along party lines.

It's an easy political tactic to focus on our differences, but the truth is, we have much more in common.

Regardless of political stripes, we believe all the current candidates care about making things better in the place where we live. It's up to each of us to decide which ones we think will do the best job. And we believe that should be dictated by their connection to community, their willingness to listen to other points of view and their ability to work constructively with their fellow coun-

This week, ballot papers from the Victorian Electoral Commission will be mailed out.

On our website (pisra.com.au) we have statements from every candidate in the Island and Western Port wards. There are also links to various groups that have surveyed candidates on special issues, and coverage from a local candidates' forum last month.

# Big win for environment, loss for sand mining

## **CONSERVATION**

In a major victory for Bass Coast Shire's only remaining forest, the State Government last week announced Grantville is no longer a priority sand mining area, effectively stopping any future quarries.

The move could pave the way for Bass Coast's first national park.

Resources Minister Lily D'Ambrosio announced Bass Coast was excluded from future sand mining under draft planning controls to secure Strategic Extractive Resource Areas (SERAs), which instead puts the focus on other areas of Victoria.

Save Western Port Woodlands (SWPW) campaigners applauded the announcement, saying the minister had "heeded the call that Bass Coast's last functional forest should not be sacrificed to supply sand for Melbourne's Big Build".

"It doesn't mean the closure of sand mines already operating in the woodlands in Bass Coast, but it will make it difficult for companies to get planning permits for new mines or extensions of existing permits," SWPW spokesperson Catherine Watson said.


"Instead sand companies will be encouraged by fast-tracked planning approvals to look towards major sand resources on cleared farmland in Cardinia (around Lang Lang) and Baw Baw (Trafalgar North).

"Special thanks to Bass MP Jordan Crugnale, who has advocated for us over the past year to achieve this. Undoing decisions that were made decades ago was never going to be an easy task."

There are currently 10 sand mines in the forest between Lang Lang and Grantville, at the rear of waterline communities, including five in nature conservation reserves.

Nine more quarries have been approved and another seven are under application.

Catherine said SWPW's aim has not been to close the current mines, but to stop new ones from opening.



In this map yellow indicates work authorities for sand mining, including 11 existing sand mines. The red indicates interest areas for future mining, which is now defunct following last week's State Government decision.

"The immediate impact is that it will make it difficult for mining companies to get work authorities and planning permits in the Western Port Woodlands.

"Our great fear had always been that the entire woodland corridor would be carted to Melbourne one B-double truckload of sand at a time."

# National park

As detailed in last year's Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL) hearings, experts gave evidence that sand mining posed the greatest threat to Bass Coast's only remaining forest and if it continued there

will be "ecological disaster", with local plant and animal extinctions.

Experts at the DAL argued instead the woodlands should be Bass Coast's first national park.

"The turning point (in their campaign) was last year's DAL panel hearing where the woodlands were recognised as being of national ecological significance, critical habitat for a range of rare and threatened plants, animals and fungi," Catherine said.

She said the "Open for Sand Business" sign that has been hanging over the Western Port Woodlands since the 1990s would now be removed. But she warned their

work was not done.

"The Adams Creek Nature Conservation Reserve at the northern end of the woodlands (outside Bass Coast) remains vulnerable.

"The future of the Holden Proving Ground is still uncertain. We are still seeking an Environmental Significance Overlay over the entire Western Port Woodlands.

"But those are battles for another day. For now, we're celebrating what we've achieved together."

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
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House permit poses "risk to safety, health and life": VCAT

# **PLANNING**

In another blow to Silverleaves, VCAT has refused a planning permit for a home in Silverleaves because of risks to future occupants from coastal inundation and sea level rise.

In Doyle v Bass Coast SC, the owner of 32 Silverleaves Avenue was seeking to build an elevated single level, three-bedroom home on a property with a Land Subject to Inundation Overlay (LSIO).

Under an LSIO, the permit was referred to Melbourne Water who objected and Bass Coast Shire Council was required to refuse the permit, in July last year.

VCAT heard while it is council policy to discourage development in Silverleaves east of Coghlan Road – and development in areas where an environmental hazard has been identified is discouraged – council planners supported the permit.

Planners argued "site by site refusals" for development was "not an approach for managing the risk of inundation" and the behaviour of flood waters from coastal inundation meant residents could evacuate early or isolate for hours, rather than days or weeks.

The owner agreed and argued the land was one of the last remaining vacant blocks to be developed and approval of this permit would not set a precedent.

The landowner said the floor level of the proposed home would be 3.47 metres, above the predicted flood level of 2.77 metres.

However, Melbourne Water maintained its opposition to

the permit arguing the permit failed to manage inundation impacts, which would result in "unacceptable risk to the safety, health and life of people".

VCAT heard Melbourne Water argued in the future sea level rise and storm events would increase and become more frequent and variable and future residents "may not have the opportunity to evacuate early and behave irrationally when faced with periods of isolation".

VCAT members Ian Potts and Geoffrey Code said the history of residential development in Silverleaves occurred mostly before authorities were aware of climate change impacts, sea level rise and the potential for coastal inundation. "So while we acknowledge the present degree of development has occurred, it has done so in the absence of knowledge about the hazards," the VCAT members concluded.

"Further, and perhaps more importantly, the objectives for planning require us to consider whether the development results in a secure, safe and pleasant living environment and balances the present and future interests of all Victorians.

"We find the overall balancing of policies favours a cautious approach and avoidance of further urban development in Silverleaves unless such risks can be demonstrably shown to be satisfactorily minimised."

VCAT acknowledged while

the "risks of flood water velocities sweeping people into deeper floodwaters" was not an issue in Silverleaves and tidal and storm levels rises were limited, there was however "time for emergencies to occur or people's anxiety to build and cause hastily ill-conceived need for egress".

Flooding would come from both Rhyll Inlet and the northern coastline.

"Even with lower tidal levels, inundation under 2100 conditions requires people to wade along inundated streets or use very short windows of opportunity to use a vehicle," VCAT members said.

"The Flood Guidelines highlight that while wading through the levels projected to occur in Silverleaves might be deemed safe, there remain a risk of injury."

## **Precedents**

As reported in the Advertiser last month, a new government report on erosion found there may be "significant loss" of private property and public assets at Silverleaves and an area of Cowes East in the next five to 10 years.

The report also found since 2022, in a "hotspot" near Sanders Road, about 16 metres of foreshore has been lost to erosion.

Last year, there has been a spike in planning permit refusals in Bass Coast, with Melbourne Water having the power to veto a permit application.

The owner of 2 Settlement Road, Silverleaves, had their application for an extension of time to build a house rejected by VCAT, with Melbourne Water stating there was "a significant level of risk to life and property resulting from the predicted depth and frequency of flooding" on Settlement Road.

A million-dollar property at 13 Woodland Avenue in Silverleaves had a planning permit for a new home refused. The applicant appealed at VCAT and an agreement to address flood risk was reached, which saw a planning permit approved in July.

Also last year a planning permit for 2 Bruce Road was approved. Melbourne Water did not object, despite the significant flood risk impacting the land, mainly because the proposed building was a replacement dwelling with the same number of bedrooms as the existing dwelling to be demolished.

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# "Lucky I wasn't killed": resident in shock after tree falls on Ventnor Road

## ROAD SAFETY

A Red Rocks resident said she "didn't have time to break or react" when a large, overhanging dead gum tree fell in front of her car while driving on Ventnor Road on Saturday September 28.

Sixty-seven-year-old (name changed for privacy) said it was "lucky (she) wasn't killed" after the approximately 50-foothigh tree fell immediately in front of her car while travelling at 55km/h at around 9pm.

According to May, it was a "windless" night, and while only sustaining minor injuries to her hand, the crash caused significant damage to her car and sent her into a state of shock for sev-

"I turned off McKenzie Road onto Ventnor Road travelling west, and I'd just gone past the fire station," May said.

"Nothing's on the road, I've got clear vision, clear night, no wind, and all of a sudden it was like a dream: there's these two big branches, thicker than your arm, heading straight towards my windscreen.

"I didn't even have time to brake or react."

May described the upper branches of the tree as a "tripod", and said luckily there was a third branch that broke the initial impact, because otherwise the two other branches would have gone "straight through the

windscreen and into (my) face".

The Red Rocks resident said she had been concerned about the number of overhanging dead trees in the area for a long time, and now feels it is simply too unsafe to drive down Ventnor Road - which is managed by the Department of Transport and Planning (DTP), not Bass Coast Shire Council.

"Somebody's going to get killed, and I'm lucky I wasn't," May said.

A spokesperson for the DTP told the Advertiser on Monday "we'll carry out roadside inspections along Ventnor Road this week to ensure the road remains safe for everyone."

# **Public outrage**

As reported last week in the Advertiser, local resident Jeff Williams said low hanging trees on Phillip Island Road are also a serious safety concern.

Jeff told the Advertiser he contacted VicRoads in August about a low hanging branch near the Koala Conservation Reserve and is frustrated nothing has been done since.

This low hanging branch originally extended right across the road and several metres of it have been broken off by some unfortunate higher vehicle," Jeff

Jeff said the response from VicRoads was "not good enough".

May also said she was now highly concerned for other drivers who use Ventnor Road daily, and said "it's just madness" the dead trees have not been

"It's people's lives. We've got an international event coming up soon, we've got people at the Penguin Parade every night and that's the road they use. And let alone all the locals," May said.

"They call gum trees 'widowmakers', because a limb can just drop off with no warning.

"When the trees have been dead for over ten years, and they're getting more and more on a lean, they just drop. It doesn't have to be a windy day or anything.

"And there's some that are really leaning on that road."

The Advertiser has asked the Department of Transport and Planning (DTP) if the trees on Ventnor Road will be cleared be-

The DTP said they encourage members of the public to notify them of any hazards on the

"Our crews regularly inspect every kilometre of our road network, including weekly inspections on Ventnor Road and Phillip Island Road, to identify any issues or hazards and maintain the roads in a safe condition" the spokesperson said.

# Jetty shed summer closure

The restaurant in the Cowes jetty shed has been closed by Bass Coast Shire Council this summer for urgent building works.

As reported in July the historic jetty shed was inspected by council officers following concerns it was falling into disrepair.

Last week The Jetty Phillip Island restaurant owner Gab Caffieri, who has operated it from November to April for the past six years, said he received an email from the council asking him to remove his equipment and explaining he couldn't open this summer.

Gab said since July range of problems, including the need to replace the restaurant's grease trap.

He said the grease trap problem had been flagged five years ago and so works could have happened sooner and not in summer.

"Planning could have been better," he said.

"The timing is not ideal. It could have been dealt with earlier."

Gab said the full range of repair works were not yet fully scoped, but would most likely include the outside rotting decking as well.

Gab also runs Kristo's Charcoal Rotisserie in Cowes and 3925 Espresso in Newhaven.

"I do lose a summer of

income from not running the cafe, but it's not my only business. This allows me to concentrate on my other businesses.'

The heritage jetty shed dates back to 1870, with the jetty managed by both Parks Victoria/the Department of Environment and the council.

Some local residents have suggested no large funding had been pumped into the jetty shed because there was still uncertainty about the future of a potential car ferry.

# Radiology transition at Bass Coast Health

## **HEALTH**

Bass Coast Health (BCH) has officially transitioned to its new radiology provider, Imaging Associates, which commenced providing imaging services at Wonthaggi Hospital on October 8. This partnership represents a significant milestone in enhancing radiology services for the Bass Coast community and aligns with BCH's strategic objectives for the region.

A key highlight of this transition is the installation of a stateof-the-art, low-dose, cardiac-capable CT scanner.

Installation of this advanced equipment is currently underway from October 8 – 18. During this 10-day period, CT services will be temporarily unavailable at Wonthaggi Hospital. Medical clinics and healthcare providers across the region have been notified in advance of this disruption, with detailed plans in place to manage patient needs and ensure minimal impact on care.

In preparation for the transition, BCH has worked closely with Ambulance Victoria to ensure paramedics are fully briefed and have the necessary clinical support.

This assists paramedics to determine the most appropriate hospital destination for patients requiring CT scans during the installation period. If necessary, patients will be redirected to other hospitals equipped with CT scanning facilities, prioritising patient outcomes and timely care throughout the transition.

# Radiology services

There is expected to be little to no disruption to other radiology services. Ultrasound, MRI, and intra-operative imaging will continue as normal, ensuring critical diagnostic services remain available to the community. X-ray services will also be maintained through the use of a mobile X-ray unit, which has been set up in the mammography room at Wonthaggi Hospital to ensure uninterrupted access to essential imaging.

To further support patient care during this period, Breast Screen Victoria's mobile screening van will be on-site at Wonthaggi Hospital from October 14 -23. This mobile unit will perform 100 breast screens during this time, covering the services typi-

cally provided in the hospital's mammography room. Women aged 40 and above can book their appointments by calling 13 20 50 or visiting breastscreen. org.au. This continuity of care ensures that vital screening services, particularly those related to early breast cancer detection, will continue without delay.

BCH CEO, Jan Child, acknowledged the short period of service disruption but welcomed the enhanced radiology service the partnership with Imaging Associates will bring.

We appreciate everyone's patience during the transition and are pleased to welcome the Imaging Associates team. These enhancements will greatly benefit the Bass Coast community," Ms Child said.



# Pyramid Rock health farm house gets VCAT green light

## **PLANNING**

VCAT has overturned Bass Coast Shire Council to approve a home on Phillip Island's "state significant" south coastline, despite concerns about its visual impact.

In the findings handed down last month in the case Pyramid Rock Pty Ltd v Bass Coast SC, VCAT said a permit for the development of a home on 18ha on Pyramid Rock Road, Ventnor, had already been approved under an old, previous permit issued in 1999.

That 1999 permit, known as "Wintersun", also approved a mixed-use development including a convalescent or health farm, golf course, and 24 dwellings on a large land parcel of a number of allotments.

This permit is due to expire at the end of this year, on December 31, 2024.

However, in this case the owner was seeking to have a plan for the home approved, which shire planners had refused to approve because it would be "detrimental to the State significant coastline".

According to the VCAT finding, the shire did not argue a home couldn't be built on the site, but instead their refusal was based on the appropriateness of the siting of the proposed home.

The shire said the siting was contrary to planning policies – including a significant land-scape overlay (SLO) – that aim to protect ridgelines and prominent coastal areas.

The SLO was introduced after the original permit was granted in 1999

The owner agreed the home would be visible from the coast but added it would be "restrained in its appearance and limited in its impact on any views".

The owner said "little weight" should be given to the State Government's declaration of Bass Coast as a Distinctive Areas and Landscapes (DAL), because it had not published its final report.

VCAT member Sarah McDonald agreed with the owner and overturned the council's refusal.

Ms McDonald said there was "no dispute" the site was in a sensitive coastal location" but added it was "not a pristine natural landscape setting", with numerous other homes located on Glamis Road and Victoria Road.

She said even though the single storey home would be large scale, it would have a flat roof form and would "not be overwhelming or dominant".

"I am satisfied the dwelling will not have an unacceptable impact on locally significant



VCAT said if the landowner wanted to progress an already approved planning permit for the health farm and home on 18ha at Pyramid Rock Road, the plans would need to be amended.

views and vistas," she said.

Ms McDonald said she also considered how the proposed home would interact with the endorsed plans for the health farm.

"If it is the intention of the landowner to act on both permissions for the health farm and the dwelling, one or other (or both) of the plans would need to be amended," she explained.

## Wintersun

A council spokesperson last week explained when the Wintersun permit expires after December 31, 2024, all the land that was once subject to the planning permit will then become subject to the requirements of the Bass Coast Planning Scheme.

"The expiry of the permit does not affect the validity of anything done under that permit before the expiry," the spokesperson said.

"The subject land is within the Farming Zone of the Bass Coast Planning Scheme and a large portion of the land is affected by the Significant Landscape Overlay."

# Caravan park

The council also lost another VCAT case in September, relating to the Anchor Belle Holiday Park in Cowes, which has been owned and operated by the Wolfenden family for decades.

In about 1970 they purchased a residential property opposite, at 20-22 Hartley Street.

In Wolfenden v Bass Coast SC, the Wolfendens claimed existing use of land at Hartley Street, which includes a dwelling and a shed, including a more recently constructed three bay garage.

The family claims part of the land had existing use rights for a store and workshop, but the council refused to grant a certificate of compliance because it did not have enough information to prove 15 years of continuous use for the two purposes claimed, with those uses prohibited under current zone controls

However VCAT member Dalia Cook set aside the council's refusal

"I do not share council's concerns that there is an absence of sufficient evidence demonstrating the continuous use of the subject land for the purpose of a shed and workshop," Ms Cook said

# **Erosion impacting Penguin Parade**

## **ENVIRONMENT**

The Penguin Parade's beach is expected to erode by about 20cm a year, forcing a change in audience seating in the future.

As reported last week, a \$5 million upgrade to the Penguin Parade gave a sneak peak of part of a new boardwalk and penguin viewing stands.

The design contract for stages three and four of the redevelopment is currently out for public tender, which includes a coastal processes study for Summerlands Beach.

That study explains ongoing coastal erosion exacerbated by climate change is why the concrete viewing platforms – originally built in the 1960s – need to be upgraded.

The study flags the eventual construction of "moveable, modular seating" once sand replacement becomes too costly or even impossible.

It states the Penguin Parade beach is expected to erode by about 20cm each year, which means the current shoreline could retreat by as much as four metres by 2040 and 10 metres by 2070

A Nature Parks spokesperson last week said coastal erosion was an issue throughout Bass Coast and many other parts of Victoria.

"Summerlands Beach is not immune," they said.

"The Nature Parks continues to manage erosion at the Penguin Parade beach through sand re-nourishment (bulldozing sand).

"This method is effective in keeping erosion at a manageable level, while still maintaining and preserving the natural environment for the penguins."

They said stage four of the redevelopment will – subject to funding – consist of the upgrade of the existing two concrete stands and the skybox, and stage three will finalise the boardwalk loop back to the Penguin Parade Visitor Centre and new amenities.

# Close eye on avian flu

## WILDLIFE

Residents have been asked to stay on the lookout for signs of H5N1, a highly pathogenic avian influenza, in the migratory short-tailed shearwaters which began returning to the island last week.

While there has been no detection of the highly infectious disease breaching Australian shores yet, in July a warning on the impact of the avian influenza was issued by the Western Port Biosphere Foundation.

Australia is the only large continental land mass currently free from the strain, which has had "catastrophic" impacts on bird colonies across the globe according to biosphere science officer Stephen Brend.

"Here in Western Port, we are worried about the migratory shorebirds as well as the number of people who keep backyard chooks," Stephen said earlier this year.

Stephen said there was little that could be done to stop H5N1's arrival – as it had already been detected in Antarctica – "but we can be prepared".

If necessary, Stephen said "chickens may have to be kept inside, people will need to be prepared to keep their dogs on a leash, at all times, least they pick up a bird carcass, as this is how foxes and cats become infected".

A spokesperson for the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEE-CA) said they are currently working closely with a number

of land managers, including Phillip Island Nature Parks and other relevant organisations to prepare for a potential HPAI H5N1 detection in Victoria.

In the US, the avian flu has led to the death of over 100 million chickens and 10,000 wild birds, as well as infecting dairy cattle, mice, cats, and 17 humans since 2022.

While it is rare for the avian flu to be communicated to humans, there has been a report in the US of hospitalisation due to the disease in a person with underlying health conditions.

## Penguins

Since June, staff at Phillip Island Nature Parks (PINP) have been preparing for an outbreak of avian flu on the island, with particular focus on protecting the little penguin population.

In a statement in June, PINP CEO Catherine Basterfield said contingency planning was underway, with rangers saying the main risk for penguins will be in spring when migratory birds return from the northern hemisphere.

Each year approximately 1.4 million short-tailed shearwaters arrive on Phillip Island, with the biggest local colonies located at Cape Woolamai, the Summerland Peninsula and along the southern coastline.

Residents are being urged to stick to tracks when walking in the dunes, to avoid disturbing the shearwater burrows.

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# PICAL insolvent, to close, future uncertain

and if members agree to the recommendation, PICAL will wind

Until that time, the Committee of Management will work with Federal, State and local government "to explore every avenue to preserve as many of PICAL's vital services as possible for our community".

The debts are believed to be in the hundreds of thousands of dollars and date back more than 10 years, but are not a result of fraud or misappropriation of money.

Instead, debts have been mounting up because of "incorrect classifications" of job roles of past and current employees - believed to number more than 20 - "which led to some individuals being paid on an incorrect pay scale", according to PICAL Committee of Management President Graeme Turner.

PICAL currently employs centre manager David Rooks also a Bass Coast Shire councillor who is re-standing in the council elections this October – for what is believed to be 30 hours per week, as well as a finance officer for one day a week, and a cleaner.

PICAL also has a Commonwealth financial relationship with Centrelink, with most of its funding from the State Government, while Bass Coast Shire Council is the landlord to PICAL's Warley Avenue headquarters.

In the public statement Mr Turner explained "estimated historic debts far exceed PICAL's financial reserves or its ability to raise the necessary funds within a reasonable timeframe, rendering PICAL technically insolvent".

"PICAL would like to emphasise it is both illegal and against the responsibilities of the Committee of Management to continue trading when we cannot meet, or demonstrate the ability to meet, our debts.

"Despite our best efforts to resolve this historic issue, we are compelled by law to make this incredibly difficult decision.

"We are fully aware of the impact this will have on PICAL's dedicated staff, clients, volunteers, and the many community members who rely on our services."

Mr Turner explained enterprise agreements PICAL entered into with staff a decade ago "were quite generic and open to interpretation, which contributed to the error that persisted undetected over the years".

"This has led to a significant debt that PICAL is unable to pay.

"It is important to note that this was an administrative inaccuracy and not the result of management, misappropriation or fraudulent behaviour by anyone involved with PICAL.

"While there are no current demands for payment, these historic debts are so significant that they far exceed PICAL's financial reserves or capacity to repay, thus making PICAL technically insolvent."

Mr Turner said "after careful consideration and comprehensive legal and financial consultations", the Committee of Management concluded the "only responsible course of action will be to make the decision to wind

The November 14 meeting will see members voting on the decision to wind up as well as "possible options and any resolutions that need to be tabled".

"While this is a challenging time for PICAL, all existing services will continue to support our community as they have done in the past for now and for as long as we are permitted, with a focus of supporting continuity moving forward," said Mr Turner.

"We will provide more information to all concerned as soon as we are able.'

Established in 1980, PICAL is a part of Gippsland's Neighbourhood Houses Victoria organisa-

The vast majority of Neighbourhood Houses are incorporated associations with a committee/board of governance, but about seven per cent are council managed and two per cent are cooperatives.

The State Government provides core funding to most Neighbourhood Houses with other income from the Federal Government, grants, and inhouse funds.

# Services will continue, for now

Urgent discussions have been held between the State Government, Bass Coast Shire and PICAL to ensure community services - including the food pantry - continue.

Meanwhile Neighbourhood Houses Gippsland, the peak regional body representing neighbourhood houses, has confirmed PICAL services "will be minimally disrupted if at all" (see separate story).

Shire CEO Greg Box last week released a statement saying they had held discussions with PICAL management and Bass MP Jordan Crugnale, who had briefed the State Government.

"Finding a solution to this issue is a priority for council to ensure vulnerable members of our community continue to be supported." Mr Box said.

We will explore all options to ensure these important and much needed services continue to be delivered.

"PICAL management has confirmed it will continue to provide services while these talks continue."

Mr Box said PICAL had notified the shire they faced "serious financial difficulties after recently discovering an historic staff underpayment issue".

"The not-for-profit organisation has been an integral part of the fabric of Bass Coast for decades and it provides essential services for many vulnerable members of our community, including emergency food relief," Mr Box said.

"Demand for their services,

largely delivered by community volunteers, has risen during the cost-of-living crisis."

Council currently provides a discounted lease arrangement to PICAL at Warley Avenue, Cowes and Blue Gum Reserve.

Council this year provided grants to fund the purchase of four accessible gardens beds to grow food to be distributed to the community, a new cash register system, training and small facility upgrades.

PICAL only moved into its new Warley Avenue premises at the start of 2023, which cost the Shire and State Government \$1.95 million to build.

The State Government contributed to the purchase of the land, which then incurred additional costs for new feasibility, town planning and building requirements.

Former PICAL board president Jeff Floyd last week released a statement agreeing the "only responsible" action was to liquidate PICAL, and now the focus should be on continuing community services.


"There are a number of ways that service continuity could be maintained. A new charity could be readily established to take on PICAL's role, or an existing charity may be interested," Mr Floyd said.

He said Bass Coast Shire's mayor and CEO had been supportive of PICAL and "I am sure that the incoming council will continue this support".

"Neighbourhood Gippsland has also been of great assistance and advice throughout PICAL's journey."

# State Government responds to insolvency

The State Government has confirmed they are working with PICAL to find solutions to the organisation's debt crisis and continue community services.

MP for Bass Jordan Crugnale told the Advertiser the government was "committed to finding a suitable solution to continue the work they do and the services they provide".

"The work they do should be supported to continue," Ms Crugnale said.

"It's so important workers are paid correctly and I'm hopeful a solution can be found.

"Over the years PICAL has provided an invaluable and life changing connection for community members needing assistance and support. It has also given so many volunteers a place to contribute."

PICAL is partly funded through the Neighbour-hood House Coordination Program, which provides \$43 million a year to about 400 neighbourhood houses across the state, including 16 Neighbourhood House Networks, with PICAL falling under the Gippsland network.

A Department of Families, Fairness and Housing spokesperson said PICAL

had advised them of financial issues affecting the organisation.

"The department is working closely with the local neighbourhood house network, Neighbourhood Houses Gippsland, to find suitable alternatives to continue neighbourhood house services in the area," the spokesperson said.

"We will endeavour to minimise service disruption to the local community through this process.

# **Neighbourhood House**

Neighbourhood Houses Gippsland (NHG) network manager Antonia Halloran-Lavelle said they had been supporting PICAL committee of management in recent weeks.

"Once the administration

error was identified the committee undertook a thorough investigation and sought and complied with independent legal advice," Ms Halloran-Lavelle explained.

"NHG are working with stakeholders and funding bodies with a focus on a continuity of essential service provision with a priority on emergency food relief and Centrelink services.

"It is hoped these services will be minimally disrupted if at all."

Neighbourhood houses are not-for-profit centres where people of all abilities, backgrounds and ages can connect, learn and contribute to their local community. They are autonomous organisations governed by community-based committees of management.

# Focus on motorcyclist safety this month

# **ROAD SAFETY**

Phillip Islander Heath Kolac is helping promote the new TAC safety campaign aimed at motorcyclists.

With the MotoGP just around the corner, the number of motorcyclists on local roads will skyrocket, so the message is particularly pertinent.

On Christmas Day in 2004, Heath was riding his motorcycle in Cowes, heading home for lunch.

"I was struck by a vehicle failing to give way," Heath explained.

"As a result of that I suffered some pretty horrific injuries; a traumatic amputation of my left leg and lost the function in my left arm.'

It took almost 12 months of rehabilitation before Heath was able to return home.

Heath's story is a reminder for all drivers about the importance of paying attention behind the wheel and looking out for vulnerable road users, like motorcyclists.

He said when he was 19, he thought "it won't happen to me".

'But then it does. It can appen. There's always a risk and motorcycles are at higher risk than other road users."

He knows from experience an accident has a massive impact and can change your life forever.

He hopes sharing his story will help bring down the toll, and raise awareness - for drivers and riders.

"I think my message would be to slow down, look out for each other,' Heath said.

"Make sure you're in the right condition to ride, but also the right condition to drive as well.

You're sharing the road and we can't become imspace. It's important that everyone does it safely together."

# **Awareness**

October is Motorcyclist Awareness Month - an annual initiative encouraging both motorists and motorcyclists to share the road.

Road safety authorities are urging Victorians to keep motorcyclist safety front of mind following an alarming increase in the number of motorcyclists killed on the state's

So far this year, 52 motorcyclists have died on Victoria's roads, close to 50 per cent higher than at the same time last year when 35 motorcyclists had died.

New statistics from the TAC show that more than half of motorcyclist deaths this year have involved another vehicle, and almost two-thirds of these deaths have happened at an intersection.

Intersections are highly complex environments where we often see drivers, riders, pedestrians and cyclists interacting to cross a road; highlighting the need for all road users to remain vigilant and obey all road rules, signals and signs to ensure our roads are safe for everyone.

TAC Head of Road Safety Samantha Cockfield said it was devastating to see significant increase in fatal motorcycle crashes and it was a stark reminder of the consequences when something goes wrong.

"Our thoughts go out to all the families and loved ones of people killed by road trauma; the ripple effects of these deaths are far reaching,

mune to the increase in lives lost on our roads," Ms Cockfield said.

'Motorcyclist Awareness Month is an opportunity for us to engage with the Victorian community and educate road users how we can all play a role in keeping each other safe; every road user should feel safe, no matter how they get around."

Ms Cockfield said every year there is a rise in the number of motorcyclists killed.

"It's partially to do with the number of motorcyclists on the road, but it does present a really good opportunity to talk to the Victorian community about being aware of motorcyclists."


# Vulnerable

"They could write a poem, or they could just get up, sit there and talk. They might write out a whole story with notes. There's not too much structure around it in that way."


Sarah said that sharing stories is something women do quite naturally, but the idea of having a dedicated space for women to tell their stories was an idea that "kept whispering" to her.





# Interest Rates in Australia Post-COVID

# - Navigating the Rising Tide

'n the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, Australia, like many nations, has Inavigated a turbulent economic landscape marked by unprecedented fiscal measures, fluctuating inflation rates, and shifting unemployment figures. The Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA) has played a pivotal role in trying to help steer the economy through these choppy waters, by manipulating interest rates in response to both local and global economic conditions.

At the onset of the pandemic in early 2020, the RBA slashed the cash rate to a historic low of 0.25% to stimulate spending and investment during a period of uncertainty. This aggressive monetary policy aimed to cushion the blow from lockdowns and economic slowdown. Homeowners were quick to benefit from these low rates, with many refinancing mortgages and enjoying cheaper repayments. Business investments, although initially stunted, also found a lifeline in this favorable borrowing environment.

However, as the economy began to rebound in late 2021 and early 2022, inflation emerged as a significant concern. The combination of supply chain disruptions, labor shortages, and increased demand for goods and services led to rising prices. By mid-2022, inflation rates in Australia had surged to levels not seen in decades, prompting the RBA to act decisively. The central bank began a series of rate hikes, culminating in a cash rate increase to 4.35% by end-2023 and has remained there since. This rapid escalation was intended to rein in inflation at the time of 7.8%, which had soared beyond the RBA's target range of 2-3%.

The rise in interest rates has had a direct impact on the Australian economy. Borrowers are now grappling with increased mortgage repayments, which has dampened consumer spending and led to a cooling of the housing market. Meanwhile, businesses are feeling the pinch of higher borrowing costs, which could lead to reduced investments and potential layoffs.

The unemployment rate, which had seen a post-pandemic low of 3.5%, now hovers around 4% as the economy adjusts to the tightening of monetary policy.

Looking ahead to the next 6 to 12 months, economists and analysts from the big four banks offer mixed forecasts. Some predict that the RBA may hold rates steady or consider slight adjustments depending on inflation trends and economic indicators. Others caution that if inflation persists above target levels, further hikes could be necessary, particularly if the global economic environment, particulary in the United States, remains volatile.

Comparatively, the U.S. Federal Reserve has also raised interest rates aggressively, with the current federal funds rate hovering around 5.00%. This tightening cycle is reflective of similar inflationary pressures faced by both nations. Although Australia's interest rates remain somewhat lower than those of the U.S., the U.S. Federal Reserve recently cut their federal funds rate by 0.50% which will potentially impact the RBA's decisions going forward.

There is a complex and intricate interplay in the relationship between interest rates, inflation, and unemployment. While higher interest rates are a tool to combat inflation, they can also stifle economic growth and lead to higher unemployment if businesses reduce hiring or lay off workers in response to increased costs. This delicate balance is one that the RBA must navigate carefully in the coming months.

In conclusion, the trajectory of interest rates in Australia since the COVID-19 pandemic has been one of rapid adjustments in response to evolving economic realities. As we move into 2025, the outlook remains uncertain, influenced by both domestic conditions and global economic trends. It is essential for policymakers to remain vigilant, monitoring inflation and employment metrics while providing a supportive environment for growth. The path ahead will require careful calibration of monetary policy to foster stability without inhibiting recovery, ensuring that Australians can weather any economic storm in the future with resilience and optimism.

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


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

# Still no Aquatic Centre

Council continues to disappoint the Phillip Island community by removing Aquatics from the Ten-Year Financial Plan, and from the Advocacy Strategy, which is how council advocates for grants from state and federal governments.

Recently the council-man-

aged Leisure Centres in the City of Yarra, commissioned a consulting group to examine the social value of operating their three aquatic and leisure centres in Fitzroy, Richmond and Collingwood.

Their modelling estimates that across the three centres, the average social value in the last financial year was \$5.07 million. Benefits examined included mental health, chronic or dementia programs and learn to

If you consider these benefits per year, multiplied over the life of the facility, it seems clear it's cheaper to build and operate these facilities, than to say "nothing to see here"

Our shire reported in last year's Annual Report it cost ratepayers \$1.845 million to operate our recreation and aquatics. They are currently tendering for a future organisation to operate them. Why can't they look at other alternatives, just like the City of Yarra?

Have you seen the Cowes Recreation Reserve ground recently? It looks like a mangy dog. If it was my dog, I'd have it put down. Council spent hundreds of thousands improving the playing surface. It came up a treat. Now, because of the success of the football/netball club in recruiting new members, the grass is worn out. Solution - develop a new oval at the land allocated – CA79. It's a no brainer.



# **FISHING**

The early spring weather in September has been horrible and the opportunity for getting out for a fish have been non-existent so to say customers are frustrated is an understatement, especially with the very small windows producing plenty of fish.

All we need now is the sunny, calm weather.

For those who don't live local it has been very frustrating because with the exception of one weekend in the last month or more, the windows for fishing have been very small.

The season so far has taken a step back 10 years, to the very good calamari fishing in August, jig colours of reds, oranges and pinks and mutton bird winds that blow for days and days in a row. September snapper fishing with very limited opportunity but very good quality table sized fish.

It's like our season is having a retro round and stepped back into the past.

Looking back through diaries when we get this type of start, we get an extended run, especially with the snapper fishing well up to Christmas with the bigger fish, then get the swap over to the smaller ones. I guess time will tell if that is the case this year.

While we have seen a few genuine 20 pounders the quality of the smaller ones has been excel-

We are getting the reports as usual for this time of the year, from the top end of the bay but plenty from further down towards Rhyll.

Observation, Silverleaves and Elizabeth Island with the corals and the mud off Coronet Bay a little quiet as yet.

A pattern that did come out of last weekend was the snapper were good in the deeper water early but once there was a lot of boat traffic the fish pushed into the shallower areas around the popular deep spots.

Baits haven't changed with squid and pilchards accounting for the majority of the reports.

The change of the low tide was slightly ahead of the high tide but not by much and I think you need to give either a go.

# Calamari

Calamari have been excellent this season, especially compared to last year where they didn't really show up at all.

The size and the numbers have been good from all types of fishing which is very handy with all the wind making boating difficult.

The bad weather has made it difficult at times with all the weed around, you just need to persevere.

It's still about 50/50 which type of jig to use, baited or artificial, but high tide is definitely better off the beaches and jetties.

Reports were scattered over the last month with the weather not allowing you to get to where you need to be or simply just not able to get to your favourite whiting

It's also snapper time and many have headed out looking for them and not bothered with the whiting.

Those who have no interest in the reds have found good quality but not big numbers. But as one customer told me, he would take ten 40 plus ones over twenty mid 30's any day.

The best area is difficult to advise, because the reports have come from so many different spots, out of the wind.

## Mental health

A little over a week ago we heard the tragic news that a young local had sadly taken his own life. Knowing him as a customer it still just doesn't seem right even saying it.

Our thoughts go out to his family and close friends. While nothing can change what has happened it's important to keep the memories and that's exactly what we will be doing, remembering a customer that was always up for a chat, polite and friendly.

It's also important to remember that you just don't know what others are going through.
