Rhyll ramp opens this week

this week – just in time for snapper season - after a seven-month, \$4.5 million redevelopment.

The finishing touches over the last week have included line marking and asphalting, with a spokeswoman for the state Fishing and Boating Minister Sonia Kilkenny - who visited the ramp last week - telling the Advertiser the ramp will "open by the latest" on Saturday (September 17) in time for school holidays.

To celebrate the opening on Saturday there will be a free fishing and boating festival along the foreshore from 10am, with live music, markets, and kids fishing clinics, with tables and a dedicated kayak/yacht/ year, with further detailed designs

The Rhyll boat ramp will re-open 10 places available in each session canoe launching area. and bookings essential.

The upgrade of the ramp started in February, and has included the replacement of the existing threelane boat ramp with new concrete panels and extension of the lanes deeper into the water - enabling alltide access.

Additional works formed stage one of construction in 2021, including the installation of new fixed and floating pontoon jetties to assist with launching and retrieval, an improved parking layout and longer car and trailer bays.

Designs for the upgrade of the Anderson boat ramp were released by Better Boating Victoria (BBV) last

Local case numbers dropping

Reported Covid case numbers have halved in the past fortnight, with local cases now un-

The warmer weather and more outdoor activity, as well as high vaccination rates are contributing to the decline in infections.

However authorities warn the pandemic is far from over.

The Department of Health continues to report Covid deaths, with over 4000 Covidrelated deaths in Victoria so far this year, and over 5000 since the pandemic began.

Everyone is urged to ensure they receive their Covid booster if eligible, continue to socially distance or to wear a mask when social distancing is not possible. Mask must still be worn on public transport.

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

Ms Wastie said businesses that would like to erect a parklet, should submit an expression of interest.

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

Mail poll fail

postie mail delivery any time soon after a postal poll failed to get a majority of households in support.

Australia Post last week

notified residents that the August poll – asking whether they wanted to switch from post boxes to mailbox deliveries via postie – only received a 32 per cent vote for change.

"This is well below the required threshold of at least 50 per cent," an Australia Post spokeswoman said.

The current arrangements will remain, and residents can continue to choose to collect their mail free of charge over the counter at the nearest post office, or have mail delivered to their PO Box.'

> "We understand that what suits a community may change over time, and Australia Post remains open to reviewing delivery arrangements in the future if the community indicates support for a change.

Australia Post did not say how many of the 324 households polled replied to the vote, with any forms not sent in counted as a vote to stay with the current system.

Phillip Island solar farm in the planning

Island will be released next month, with the potential even to crowdfund the project.

The feasibility study will analysis of solar farms ranging in size from 100-kilowatts to the largest 5-megawatts.

Sites under examination include Bass Coast Shire's Gap Road property - next to the 5MW battery currently being built by Mondo and AusNet, as well as leased farmland, a combination of residential homes and even the potential to encourage businesses in the Cowes industrial estate to erect solar panels on their rooves.

Energy Innovation Co-operative chair Neroli Raff said it was part of a larger plan to get Phillip Island to zero carbon emissions by 2030.

There are lots of rooves on Phillip Island, including in the industrial estate, but

A study looking at the potential to build a solar farm on ested in putting solar on their various sites around Phillip rooves for community benefit?" said Neroli, who met with consultants last week to finetune the draft study.

Neroli acknowledged a soexamine the cost-benefit lar farm would come with a hefty price tag, most likely funded by government grants, but even possibly crowdfunding and philanthropic investment.

"There are a lot of options and we're not yet at the point of discussing the detail.

'This study is the first step in a long journey but the study is not going to sit on a shelf and will be used to advocate for a solar farm here."

She said the study had been given \$20,000 funding from Sustainability Victoria and built on a previous 2019 study that mapped how Phillip Island would achieve zero emissions by 2030.

"In 2019 we realised that

Mini battery boost

Neroli said another project they were working on was investigating small batteries mounted on the top of power

Projects in other areas have described the batteries as a virtual power plant, helping manage electricity from rooftop solar, and periods of peak demand on the network.

Generally the pole-mounted batteries are about 30kW and provide at least two hours of storage.

'We could put them on poles in smaller communities like Rhyll, Smiths Beach or Phillip Islanders wouldn't Newhaven," Neroli said

Big battery could be powered by renewables

watt battery currently being built near Wimbledon Heights could be used to store excess, locally-produced solar power in the future.

That's according to Energy Innovation Co-operative chair Neroli Raff who last week gave a talk on land next to the battery construction, while also calling for 100 Phillip Island households to take part in a Victorian-first 12-month renewable energy

The battery will comprise of a series of units in a 38 x 34 metre fenced compound, connected to the electricity grid via underground cables, energised later this year 2022, after an initial testing period.

Mondo, who won the right to deliver the Gap Road battery for AusNet, said the battery would "help balance the fluctuating power demand on the island and support an increase in the uptake of renewable energy" for 10 to 15 vears

Neroli said one of the most common questions she was asked about the battery by the community was "why isn't it powered by renewables?".

"We are working on that," she said.

"We want to use the battery day to day to put in excess solar, so those with solar would be paid for it and could then access it at night.

"About seven to 10 per cent of power is lost between the Latrobe Valley and Phillip Island, because the energy dissipates, so we want to make with a partnering energy re-

renewable energy.

Neroli said a first step to achieve this would be the upcoming Tariff Trial.

About 100 Phillip Island households are needed to take part in a Victorian-first 12-month renewable energy trial, being run by Totally Renewable Phillip Island (TRPI).

She said owners, renters or holiday houses, as well as people with or without solar panels, could volunteer for the Tariff Trial, adding it would demonstrate how the community would benefit from the battery.

Trial participants will sign

the most of locally-produced tailer for 12-months (April 28, 2023 - April 28, 2024) to create a price structure for energy sharing between people with solar panels and those without.

"In this trial we'll be using the battery to virtually store the power and export, consume and share the excess solar energy among participants."

The battery is being built on the north-east corner of a 45-hectare site on Gap Road, purchased by Bass Coast Shire in 2019 for a new transfer station.

Solar rebate extended to new builds

announced it will expand the eligibility for the solar panel rebate to new homes under construction, enabling Victorians to save on installation costs and electricity bills from the moment they move into their newly built home.

The government said changes will save homeowners up to \$800 on installation costs by fitting panels as they wire the electricity to their new homes, as well as an average of \$1073 each year in energy costs.

So far, there have been 2724 Solar Rebates approved in Bass Coast, with 2521 solar systems installed.

Now, new homes are eligible for the rebate, and with 224 new building approvals in 2020-21, that means sever-

The state government has al hundred new local homes are now able to take advantage of the solar offer.

The government said the expansion paves the way for the increasing electrification of homes, while opening the program to tens of thousands of additional households each year – with around 40,000 new homes built in Victoria annually.

Under the changes, eligible Victorians building homes will be able to apply for a rebate of \$1400 as well as being able to access a \$1400 interest free loan to install solar panels during construction.

Since it began in 2018, the government's Solar Homes Program has helped more than 195,000 Victorian households install solar PV systems.

It said this investment has already cut Victoria's carbon emissions by 1.6 million tonnes - equivalent to the emissions produced by 500,000 cars each year while supporting 5500 clean energy jobs.

Household solar is expected to generate 12.5 per cent of Victoria's 40 per cent renewable energy target by 2025.

A wake up call on the future of our penguins

Penguins are being dunked in buckets of cold water during heatwaves to avoid another "catastrophic" death toll, a global wildlife conference on Phillip Island was told last week.

And climate change is forcing Nature Parks to come up with more ingenious solutions to protect the heat-sensitive birds from increasingly intense high temperatures, the confer-

The Island Arks Symposium VII saw more than 100 attendees gather at the Penguin Parade from islands around Australia and the world, including New Zealand and Hawaii.

The five-day conference heard talks ranging from feral cat-free French Island to Alaskan shearwater research and Lord Howe rat eradication.

Nature Parks' research officer Paula Wasiak told attendees the climate crisis needed immediate on-ground action, giving the example that in March 2019 a heatwave on Phillip Island - with 38C during the day and night time not falling below 23C – saw more than 100 penguins die from heat stress.

Paul described the event as an "oh sh*t moment" – which impacted moulting penguins – a wake-up call to avoid it happening in the future.

"That summer was 1.5-2.5C above the average," Paula said, "and on March 3 during the day moulters left their burrows because it was too warm and died on their way to the water to cool off.

"We'd never seen that before. They're nocturnal and don't go out during the day. But as soon as they stepped out of the burrow they succumbed to the heat.

"It opened our eyes to how catastrophic heat waves are to little penguins.

She said the death toll was likely much higher, given they didn't find all birds.

As a result, Nature Parks staff have since been designing a series of measures to avoid another death toll.

'We now identify days where it could happen again: consecutive hot days, moulting penguins, temperature not dropping at night.

"One of the best ways to cool down a penguin is to stick it in a bucket of water and take



Paula Wasiak told the conference more than 100 penguins died from heat stress in one day in March 2019, which was a "wake-up call" to the impacts of climate change.

Paula said all staff, even the cleaning department and ground services, had been trained to identify heat-stressed penguins, while rangers had also planted trees and vegetation around artificial boxes and burrows, which decreased temperatures by more than 8C

Nature Parks researcher Duncan Sutherland gave a talk that showed Phillip Island's penguin colony was now believed to be the largest in the world, with the once larger Gabo Island population in eastern Victoria having decreased.

Organiser Derek Ball told the audience researchers had to be honest in explaining to the public "what can and can't be saved" as a consequence of climate change, including animals, and habitable islands.

"The floods in Pakistan, the heat wave in Europe, fires in the US, there's a realisation we are in deep doo-doo," Derek said.

"We have to be up front to the Australian community."

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Push for Cape Woolamai skate park grows

The skating community's decade-long wait may soon be over with an updated skate strategy set to go before Bass Coast Shire councillors, including recommendations for a regional

Cr Rochelle Halstead last week told the Advertiser she expected to receive the strategy "shortly", ahead of community consultation.

"I would expect the strategy to be presented if not at the next meeting, then at least before Christmas," Cr Halstead said.

"As for location (of a regional park) that would be something the community should be consulted on but I would be advocating for Cape Woolamai as a central location that fits so well into the strong surfing interest that surrounds this area."

Just last week an online petition calling for a bike and skateboard pump track in Cape Woolamai closed with almost 800 signatures.

That comes as another homemade skate/bike track has been built at Cape Woolamai, with approval from the owner of the airport land, measuring about three house blocks-long. This follows an illegal foreshore track constructed on foreshore land earlier this year and then pulled down by the shire.

The DIY tracks reflect growing frustration by the skate community, which has lobbied for upgraded facilities since before 2014.

San Remo, which was stymied following community opposition and after experts assessing the site said underground infrastructure and soil conditions made it impossible to construct a skate park of that scale.

A regional park was then mooted for Newhaven's Graydens Reserve, again stymied by opposition

Newhaven, Cape Wooli

While Graydens Reserve is now set to be a local, smaller skate park, local residents say they still plan to fight any upgrades to the reserve.

Earlier this month a Newhaven Residents Association meeting voted to create a resident group to protect the park, "to become custodians to look after the green open space"

Cr Halstead - who in April voiced her frustration at the slow pace of finding a regional skate park site - said the shire's change of plans from San Remo to Newhaven and then no regional skate park had "caused a community rift at the

"Council needs to ensure absolute transparency and genuine consultation with all parties before proceeding with any further plans," she said.

'There has been some considerable concern expressed by residents around the size of any planned skate park at Graydens Reserve.

"In saying that there is also incredible support for a local skate park in the vicinity of the Cape Woolamai community."

PICAL welcomes funding boost for neighbourhood houses

from the state government that an additional \$19 million will be directed to neighbourhood houses over the next three years.

Earlier this month the government said the network of 400 neighbourhood houses across the state would receive the extra funding, on top of the annual \$6.6 million currently allocated.

PICAL Centre Manager Greg Thompson said the guarantee of funding provided a degree of certainty for the whole sector.

"Many local neighbourhood house community centres provided frontline essential services, such as emergency Food Banks, throughout the entire Covid pandemic," he said.

"The demand for this type of assistance, as well as all the other community services delivered, has continued to grow throughout 2022, as higher cost-of-living expenses are causing extreme financial pressures for many families. The announcement of the ongoing extra-hours funding will keep neighbourhood houses open.'

Member for Bass, Jordan Crugnale was thrilled to see the additional funding and said the surety it would provide would allow the neighbourhood houses to "continue their incredible work"

"We have 31 neighbourhood houses across our local government areas of Bass Coast, that enable people to achieve their potential.

"They do an incredible job at supporting and empowering our local community, their door is always open and their services exponential: food pantries, childcare, learning to drive, women's friendship cafes, getting job ready, homework clubs, classes, social group activities in health and wellbeing and of course being a safe and welcoming space for our community members in need.

'Our neighbourhood houses are there for our community members when we need them most."

Neighbourhood houses like PICAL encourage community connection and cohesion by bringing local people together to socialise in a safe, inclusive and convenient space, participate in recreational activities and deliver essential services.

The hubs provide childcare, employment, education, training and opportunities to volunteer in local communities

The hubs are also instrumental in providing accessible education to the community, ensuring people from a diverse range of backgrounds have the opportunity to study and learn new skills

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

Tourism or environment?

I wish to comment on two recent articles about the Cowes to Ventnor proposal in the shire's Tracks and Trails strat-

In the first one (August 10) a spokesperson for the Phillip Island Conservation Society [PICS] stated "the foreshore reserve provides an essential and finite corridor for wildlife to move safely along the coast as they cannot go inland ... or on the beach".

This was then contradicted by the following statement: "a track could be installed ... Anderson Road boat ramp to Justice Road with minimal disturbance".

Why would utilising this section be supported when it interrupts the wildlife corridor PICS considers necessary? As for minimal disturbance much

of it contains significant native bush which is important habitat.

In the second article (August 31) the Bikers' Users Group spokesperson states the group's main focus is safety. The roads between Cowes and Ventnor are very narrow and there are no footpaths".

However there are wide nature strips along a number of the connecting roads and selected roads would be wide enough and sufficiently quiet to be safely utilised.

Additionally, the cost of clearing the coastal reserve, installing and maintaining the path is likely to be far greater than connecting and improving already existing shared paths along the roads which would be used year-round by local residents.

Re BUGs desire to attract tourists the spokesman states: "if we attract people here cycling and to stay overnight they are spending money". Is that a proven fact or is it wishful thinking?

The article also states that there are other places which have more developed paths for people who want to ride their bikes and they have better facilities including toilets, pump stations and drinking fountains.

Surely BUG is not suggesting such facilities have a place on a vulnerable coastal strip.

It appears the lobby in favour of the proposal wishes to encourage tourism while those who oppose it consider conservation of an environmentally sensitive coastal strip and protection of existing habitat is of major importance.

In my opinion, you can't have both.

LSV and Surfing Victoria caution board riders with new season warning

and craft riders are being urged to prioritise their safety around water after new research from Life Saving Victoria (LSV) revealed these activities to be a leading cause for imperative that you do so safely, and that indrownings during September.

aquatic board riding, making up 96 per cent of all related fatal incidents since the year 2000.

LSV manager research and evaluation Dr aquatic board riders could take to keep themselves safe in spring.

"Many Victorians will be eager to take advantage of warmer weather after a cold winter, but it is important to remember your skills and fitness may have regressed since your last swim, surf or other aquatic board activ-

ity," Dr Calverley said.
"Before you go to the beach or inland waterway to surf, paddle or windsurf, be sure to check the weather, being aware that conditions can change quickly and without warning, and always head out with a friend.

"Historically, a quarter of Victorian drownings occur in spring, making it the second deadliest season after summer, so the risk is very real."

Surfing Victoria CEO Adam Robertson encouraged beginner surfers and paddleboard-

Surfers, paddlers, and other aquatic board ers to start with lessons and to know and stick to their limits.

"Surfing and stand up paddleboarding are a fantastic way to enjoy the water, but it's cludes learning from the professionals who Men are at particular risk while surfing and can pass on vital safety tips to ensure you make it home," Mr Robertson said.

"It is important that you are familiar with aquatic risks such as rips and other currents, Hannah Calverley said there were simple but as well as etiquette, while surfing or paddleimportant measures Victorian surfers and boarding. When you're ready to head out without a guide, surfing with an experienced friend is the safest transition.

"If you find yourself in trouble in the water, stay with your board as it will help to keep you afloat while you wait for help," Mr Robertson said.

Both LSV and Surfing Victoria agreed that swimming regularly throughout the year was key to maintaining aquatic skills and fitness, and could improve safety outcomes for surfers, paddlers and other aquatic board riders while recreating in the water.

Surfing Victoria also encourages both beginner and experienced surfers to get trained up in CPR and Board Rescue skills via the Surfers Rescue 24/7 Program to ensure they understand how to assist in a rescue situation.
