Expect 110,000 for next month's MotoGP: CEO

Phillip Island is well-placed to secure the next Moto Grand Prix contract beyond 2026, despite intense competition from interstate rivals, according to the Australian Grand Prix Corporation CEO.
CEO Andrew Westacott was

speaking at last week's Inspire! 2022 Tourism Conference at the Silverwater Resort in San Remo, ahead of the Grand Prix returning to Phillip Island on October 14-16,

Mr Westacott predicted one of the willingness from both parties." biggest crowds would attend in October, anticipating up to 110,000 people for the third last round in the MotoGP World Championship calendar, with about 55 per cent from interstate.

Mr Westacott was upbeat that Dorna Sports - the commercial rights holder for the MotoGP would re-sign Phillip Island beyond the 2026 event, which is the last in this 10-year contract cycle.

"Every contract's negotiations start the minute you sign the previous one. Dialogue is happening and on-going," he said.

"The two parties are willing. This is the best place for the race. I think will stay here because there

Aqualoyalty anchors off Cowes


Residents and visitors to Phillip Island last Friday morning would have spotted this large tanker anchored just off Cowes.

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Basham sentencing adjourned

The Supreme Court pre-sentence ing on with the plea today." hearing for Adrian Basham that took place on Monday has been adjourned to October 31, after he failed to follow the advice of his

In April, the jury in the Supreme Court trial found Mr Basham guilty of killing and staging the suicide of the mother of their three children, Samantha Fraser at her Cowes garage on July 23, 2018.

On Monday Justice Lesley Taylor heard victim impact statements from family and friends of Ms Fraser, in the King v Adrian James Basham plea hearing to determine the length of his jail sentence.

While Mr Basham sat motionless as one of his children and the family of his former wife told of their "unrelenting grief", the hearing was later paused while he spoke with his defence counsel Ashley Halphen, who said his client was "highly distressed".

"He is not able satisfactorily to follow the advice that he was given and we infer also he's not following the proceedings adequately," Mr Halphen said.

"I don't feel as though we enjoy his confidence, at least at the mo-

"I don't feel comfortable continu-

He said medical assistance had not been called but Mr Basham would seek help once back in cus-

Mr Halphen suggested listening to victim impact statements had 'triggered" Mr Basham's response.

Justice Taylor said the proceedings "must be heard however difficult Mr Basham finds them".

"We are here because he has been found guilty and there's a live question I must determine - that he now has no input into whatsoever. It's a question of law I will determine based on evidence of the trial and submissions both sides make," Justice Taylor said.

"It's most unfortunate we are in this position. It's evident - if not evident as a matter of logic from the victim impact statements – this event has caused enormous distress to an enormous number of people. These proceedings must come to a conclusion and the conclusion of that is when I sentence Mr Basham.

"But our system demands a person found guilty nonetheless has the right to follow the proceedings.'

The hearing was livestreamed to media and unlike the trial Mr Basham could this week be seen on the



The Supreme Court heard victim impact stories from Samantha Fraser's family and friends at the pre-sentencing hearing for Adrian Basham on Monday.

While Mr Basham only removed his mask to take sips of water while listening to victim statements, earlier in the day he became animated when Mr Halphen told the court his client had not visited Samantha Fraser on the day of her death with

"There's no dispute this is an extreme instance of family violence," Mr Halphen said, adding the murder was not premeditated, but "spontaneous"

There's no evidence Mr Basham was aware of the existence of rope until he was in the garage."

Justice Taylor asked why Mr Basham would have gone to such lengths on the morning of the murder to not use his personal mobile phone, also disguising himself and hiding in the bushes if it wasn't premeditated.

She said Mr Basham's visit to his estranged wife was not only in breach of an intervention order but also a week before they were due to go to court for a separate case involving marital rape, a matter which during the trial was part of a media suppression order.

Mr Halphen said that conduct was consistent with Mr Basham being aware he was breaching an intervention order.

Justice Taylor said evidence from the trial showed Ms Fraser's two mobile phones and handbag remained next to her driver's seat in her car and given she was "petrified" of her estranged husband "the first thing she would have done would be to pick up ones of those phones, call Triple Zero and lock the car".

Mr Basham raised his hand and attempted to speak to the court, with Justice Taylor then warning him his counsel was speaking on his behalf and "please be quiet'

Following a short break in the morning hearing, Mr Halphen told the court he needed to obtain written instructions from his client, to which Justice Taylor said "he can't be giving evidence now".

Mr Halphen said it was "more complicated".

"Mr Basham doesn't have a full appreciation of the exchange taking place."

The pre-sentence hearing is expected to take one day, followed by sentencing, which can then be followed by appeal, where both Mr Basham can appeal, as well as the Office of Public Prosecutions if they think the penalty was not enough for the crime.

The maximum possible sentence for murder is life in jail.

Family tells of impact Basham had on their lives

The eldest daughter of Samantha Fraser read an impact statement in the Supreme Court this week, at the pre-sentence hearing for Adrian Basham.

She broke down as she described being bullied by other children who taunted her with cruel comments.

"I'm not the same girl I was but I'm building my confidence back slowly and becoming the person I want to be more and more every day," she said.

She said she came to court this week for three reasons: justice for her mother, as well as her family, friends and for herself.

"I have struggled in the years since my mother was taken from us and even with support it's so unimaginably hard.

"I'm here because I'm a fighter and we will get justice for my

Crown counsel read out a victim impact statement from Ms Fraser's mother Janine, who said even writing the statement had "compounded the trauma".

ing with "the same sick feeling ... when I remember she is gone", saying she and her husband had tried 'to shield the children as much as

Janine said one child suffered trauma-related seizures, another couldn't sleep alone, while a third had repetitive nightmares.

"When they sleep I curl up in bed and howl ... the heartbreak is profound and unrelenting."

The Frasers at one point contemplated fleeing the "horror" but decided to stay on Phillip Island to give the children the only constants in their lives: school, friends. their favourite beach and memories of time spent with their mother.

"Vibrant personality"

Reading from his statement, Ms Fraser's father Trevor told the court of his family's indescribable grief and trauma and the weight of parenting his three grandchildren.

He recalled the three children - then aged nine, seven and five -

She said she wakes each morn- "forlornly" waiting at the school for their mother who "never arrived to collect them" and their "trauma, anger and grief" when they realised it was their father who "ultimately destroyed their lives".

Trevor recalled his daughter was a "vibrant personality": "humorous, intelligent, athletic and attrac-

"Even now four years after her death people tell me of the wonderful help she was to them.'

Trevor also read from his youngest granddaughter's victim impact statement, now aged nine, who "put together a few single line statements" with her counsellor.

"I feel like there's a gap missing in my heart, and a shadow over my

"My mother will always be the angel that lights up my sky."

Friends tell of impact Basham had on their lives

Fraser's spoke directly to Adrian Basham in the Supreme Court on Monday, telling him through tears he was a "monster" and she was "repulsed" he had no "remorse,

guilt, shame or feeling".

Lija Matthews – who helped establish Change for Sam, about raising awareness and prevention for ending family – gave her victim impact statement in Mr Basham's pre-sentence hearing, saying the moment she heard of Samantha's death, "I knew you killed her".

"You took her from this earth unwillingly.

"I will never forgive you for murdering Sam.

"You tried so hard to wear her down, but she put up a great fight for the sake of her children."

Lija told the court she had been swallowed by grief and trauma since the murder "and missed out on living."

She said it helped her now knowing Mr Basham had no control anymore and that she was focused on

"I can go to the beach with my friends and family.

"I'm able to help others and stop another senseless death.

"Sam would be proud of the legacv that lives on."

Lija's husband Peter also gave a statement to the court saying he was seeking medical and psychological help since Samantha's death.

"She was one of the most intelligent, witty and interesting people I have ever known. The world is a far sadder place without Sam in it."

A statement was read to the court from Samantha's friend Nadine who had lived with fear, depression, anger and guilt since her

"I can't relate to the rest of the world. I'm very emotional all the time," Nadine said.

'The trauma I feel is irreversible."

Car explodes in Cowes street

A car exploded in front of shocked drivers and witnesses in Church Street, Cowes, last Friday afternoon.

The driver had stopped to buy food from the general store and was not in the car at the time, with no onlookers injured, despite the intense flames and black smoke.

A Cowes resident was driving west on Church Street at about 1pm when he said he saw black smoke coming from the car, parked outside the Church Street general store.

"But then it exploded as I drove past. It was pretty hot," the witness said, describing the vehicle as a BMX X5

"It was fully ablaze.'

Church Street was blocked to traffic by

A CFA spokesman said three trucks with volunteer firefighter crews from Phillip Island attended the scene, along with Victoria Police and a San Remo pumper.

The fire was declared under control at The fire, attended by three CFA trucks, de-



stroyed the Cowes General Store sign.

Bonwick battles conti

Residents of Bonwick Avenue in San Remo are now fighting to have their nature strips restored, after new power poles were installed to carry high voltage power through to the new Western Port Views Estate.

Their campaign to have the installation of three-metre-high power poles along their street removed was unsuccessful, and the residents remain furious about the lack of consultation, the loss of amenity and concerned about radiation output from the new high voltage wires.

Now they say they are being treated with "disregard and contempt" and are calling for their nature strips to be restored after they were dug up to install the new poles.

One resident described the state of the nature strips as just have fallen on deaf ears.

"We have been waiting patiently for our nature strips to be reinstated, but it looks like it's not going to happen," he said.

"I know other residents have been in contact with council, the developer's project manager, the contractors ... all to no

A Bass Coast Shire Council spokesperson said some damage to grass on the nature strips has occurred.

"However it is considered that this will be rectified when the grass grows back."

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Multi-million-dollar pledge for hospital

Health Minister Mary-Anne Thomas visited Wonthaggi Hospital last week and announced if re-elected, the Labor government would fully fund the next stages of the hospital redevelopment.

The \$290 million commitment follows on from \$115 million for stage 1, which is due to open in November this year. Stage 1 includes an upgraded emergency department able to treat an additional 26,000 emergency patients every year.

The newly promised funding will cover stages 2 and 3, including two new wards, increasing patient capacity by up to 64 beds, a new labour and delivery complex and new outpatient clinic with around 25 treatment spaces. This will provide space for patients needing dialysis, chemotherapy and specialist appointments

"Population is growing on the Bass Coast - so we'll make sure the hospital grows to meet the needs of local families," the Premier said.

He said construction would be completed by 2027.

"Bass Coast Health is one of the biggest employers in the district,' Mr Andrews said. "This will not only benefit staff and patients, it will mean 750 construction jobs."

The government said this investment will complete the medical imaging unit begun in the first stage of works, refurbish allied health treatment spaces, administration buildings and training areas, and deliver extra car parking for staff, patients and visitors.

The Premier said investment in health care was a point of pride for the government. "We are doing what matters and finishing what we

He said funding for projects like Wonthaggi Hospital redevelopment was important so people could receive treatment close to home.

Bass Coast Health CEO Jan Child was ecstatic about the unexpected announcement.

"It's the best news ever," she said.

Ms Child said stages 2 and 3 were part of the hospital redevelopment masterplan, and if Labor won the election there was more work to be done to be ready to commence construction. The plan would need to be revised by BCH and Victorian Health Building Authority.

"We don't want people to have to two new 32-bed wards. One will be to expand the footprint of maternity a medical ward and the second will be a sub-acute ward."

These will be built adjacent to the new hospital building and will be a three-four storey building with an outpatient and day therapy area (including a new dialysis centre) on the bottom and first floors.

Ms Child said this was likely to be built out the front of the existing medical ward and a new carpark built at the rear of the site.

The stages will also involve a new Women's Health Centre including a new labour and delivery complex with birthing suites that will enable more complex births to be performed at the hospital. There "Stages two and three will entail are also plans underway for BCH

in the interim so that it can increase maternity service capacity in the

Member for Bass, Jordan Crugnale said she was proud to be able to deliver the first stage of the hospital redevelopment and this latest promise would ensure the local community got the healthcare it deserves.

The announcement was made onsite at stage 1 of the hospital redevelopment. The building is due to be handed over on November 6, with the new Emergency Department operating from November 28.

During his speech Mr Andrews praised the work of BCH CEO Jan scan.

redevelopment.

"To run a hospital and a building site at the same time is really, really hard. So we are very proud of the work that you've done.

He also said the Member for Bass had lobbied hard for the community.

"The Bass Coast community could not have a more effective, eloquent and determined champion than Jordan Crugnale."

Peter Paul, President of the Phillip Island Medical and Health Action Group (PIMHAG) said they welcomed the Premier's commitment.

"We would also have welcomed any statement regarding Mental Health and Aged Care development in the Bass Coast."

Mr Paul said the group was strongly focused on the Phillip Island Community Hospital, which is due to commence construction shortly, and open in the latter half of 2024.

'This has been PIMHAG's number one priority for 16 years.

"On Wednesday October 5, at 5.30pm at the Phillip Island RSL, the CEO of Bass Coast Health, Jan Child, will discuss the medical services that will be available to our community, when the hospitals are completed.

"Members of the community are most welcome to attend the talk.

If re-elected, Mr Andrews also promised \$20 million for new 25 Paramedic Practitioners, who will be able to assess, diagnose and treat patients in the field and in their homes, to ease the pressure on busy hospitals.

After the announcement by the of-the-art equipment. Premier, the Advertiser got an impromptu tour of Stage 1 of the hospital development, which is due to be operational by November 28.

Stage 1 includes an upgraded Emergency Department with the capacity to treat an additional 26,000 emergency patients every year.

The massive new ED area includes 18 cubicles, compared to six currently in operation and is ten times larger than the existing facility.

The new ED is pandemic-ready, with four of the cubicles designed so patients can be isolated and sealed off if needed.

The new building also includes a huge sterilising area and large operating theatres, fitted with state-

The first-floor ward has 16 single and eight double rooms. While it will ultimately be a surgical and paediatrics ward, initially it will accommodate all patients, while the existing ward is renovated.

Next to the ward is a light-filled patient lounge with enormous windows that overlook Wonthaggi.

Bass Coast Health CEO Jan Child said the building has been designed to incorporate natural light into patient rooms and operating theatres and an internal courtyard will be fitted out by the local Rotary group.

Stage 1 of the hospital redevelopment cost \$115 million.

Ms Child said the building was due to be handed over on November 9, with the new ED opening on November 28.

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Big leap forward in PICAL progress

lip Island Community and Learning Centre (PICAL) took a great leap forward last week, when prefabricated modules arrived at the Warley Avenue site in Cowes.

The modules arrived by truck on Monday and Tuesday last week and were then craned into

Constructed at a factory in Melbourne, the modular buildings have all the cladding, windows and doors installed, with plastering, insulation and internal painting completed.

The modules also had a mechanical and electrical fit out before being shipped.

On site, in preparation for the arrival, screw piles were installed, and service connections and plumbing works completed.

Footings for the buildings were also installed. Bass Coast Shire Council said all civil works were completed prior to the arrival of the modules and the contractor was now working on internal finishes and mechanical, electrical and plumbing fit outs.

Timeline

The new premises is expected to be ready for PICAL to move in by late November.

PICAL general manager Greg Thompson said they were working towards this date and expected to close operations for the last two weeks of November to undertake the move from Church Street.

We will continue to operate on a business-asusual basis up until the end of October," Greg said.

room hire clients we can guarantee rooms will be available up until the end of October. During November it will be on a case-by-case basis.

"In the last week of November we will move to Warley and all operations will close that week." Greg said all the buildings at the current Church Street site, bar one, are now owned by

the Victorian Health Building Authority (VHBA). He was unsure of VHBA's plans for the existing buildings but described some as "asbestos "We are telling our community groups and riddled" and likely to be demolished, while oth-

ers might be sold or put into community use.

One portable building onsite is owned by PICAL, which houses the Women Connect program and computer room.

Greg said PICAL hoped another community group or organisation might be interested in purchasing the portable and were in the process of advertising it.

"How we go moving the building we own will dictate how much room we have on site, and also if VHBA are going to move on the other portables.

Greg said PICAL was working hard to avoid disruption to two essential frontline services -Services Australia agency (for Medicare, Centrelink etc) and the food relief pantry.

We are acutely aware we want to minimise the amount of time they are not available.

There has been a huge upsurge in demand for food relief, as the cost-of-living increases.' Greg said it was "fantastic" PICAL is the of-

ficial charity partner of the upcoming MotoGP. "It will help our profile, and the profile of all community services throughout Bass Coast, but it has been a lot of work to get organised."

He said any donations to the Food Relief pantry would be gratefully accepted, as the move from Church Street meant the community garden which supplied fresh produce for the food relief pantry, had been dismantled (see separate story).

"Local supermarkets donate left over fresh produce, but as Phillip Island opens up to maior events and tourism after a two-year hiatus, there's less left to donate.

'When there's a huge influx of tourists, there's hardly any fresh produce left and it's a double whammy if we don't have our own garden.'

Greg said the food pantry can accept fresh produce donations and said they would welcome ny backyard gardeners with excess vegetables.

PICAL need produce as garden dismantled

The PICAL community garden has been dis- leaving the PICAL Food Pantry without a vital mantled, as preliminary works begin on the site of the new Phillip Island Community Hospital in Church Street.

The Community Garden is due to be relocated to Blue Gum Reserve, but the move is still being negotiated with Bass Coast Shire Council,

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The garden and Coel's Shed, which is currently on the Church Street site, have to move so the Victorian Health Building Authority (VHBA) can begin preliminary foundation work for the new hospital.

PICAL general manager Greg Thompson said getting the new garden established as soon as possible was critical.

"Part of the role of our community garden was a supply of fresh vegetables for our food pantry and our meals cooking program.' Greg said the garden had a dual purpose as a

part of the supply chain, and also an important mental health role.

"We do have a volunteer team that tends the garden and that team runs programs and conducts tutoring and guidance for anyone that wants to connect with the group from a mental health perspective.'

He said members of the team had taken home the smaller garden beds and were tending to them in their own backvards.

'When the new space opens in Blue Gum Reserve, these will all come back.

He said he hoped the council would urgently re-establish the garden at the new site, and said PICAL was also concerned about the safety of Coel's Shed.

"Coel's Shed is due to be extracted from PICAL's current backyard on Monday September 26, by the VHBA at their cost.

"It will be relocated to Blue Gum Reserve to become part of the new Community Garden. of Phillip Island (now known as ASPIR), Phil-

However this will lead to security issues if the council cannot source temporary security fencing for the Blue Gum site, within this time-

He said PICAL was concerned about the security of the shed being relocated to Blue Gum Reserve until the garden is built around it.

Boomerang worries

Boomerang Bags which currently operates out of the Church Street site is also due to move to Blue Gum Reserve, into a former CFA building that the council is transforming into an arts

Council allocated \$185,000 in the current budget to refurbish the CFA building on Settlement Road, which will also house the Artists Society

lip Island Arts and Crafts Gallery and Phillip Island Contemporary Exhibition Space.

Greg said Boomerang Bags were part of the food relief supply chain, but it wasn't clear when they would be able to move to the new premise in Settlement Road. He believes the CFA lease runs until March

2023, and it is unlikely to vacate before Christmas, which could leave Boomerang Bags without a home for several months. "If anyone has a space that might be tem-

porarily available, rent free, please contact PICAL," Greg said.

Police reassure more officers for schoolies, GP

Staff numbers at Cowes and San Remo police stations are "among the highest" on record, with extra officers expected in the next three months, particularly schoolies week, according to police command.

The response follows continued resident concern that Cowes station was frequently not staffed, while the latest annual police statistics show criminal incidents rose in Cowes over the past year to 410, an increase on the previous two years (382 in 2021, and 353 in 2020) (see separate story).

Last week island residents took to social media to voice concerns that Cowes police station was seemingly not staffed at night.

"Twice now I've reported people in my yard and when I've called it's gone through to Wonthaggi and by the time they arrive they are long gone," wrote one person on Facebook.

A respondent agreed saying they ended up calling 000, with a police car called from Wonthaggi, "but never arrived", and the trespasser was long gone.

Last year the peak group representing residents, Island Voice, called for transparency in police staffing numbers following apparent delayed response times, while a former Fisheries officer, who had worked closely with police, said the level of staff resourcing at Cowes was "far below adequate" on a normal day.

Increase

However, Bass Coast's Acting Senior Sergeant Scott Morison last week said a number of vacancies at Cowes station had recently been filled.

"Staff numbers at both Cowes and San Remo police stations are among the highest they have ever been," Acting Snr Sgt Morison

"The community can expect to see an increase in police resources during busy periods such as the Australian Motorcycle Grand Prix in October, schoolies week in November, and over the peak summer holiday period.

'Schoolies week, in particular is expected to have a larger police presence than ever before, with the number of school leavers visiting the region expected to increase now that lockdowns are a thing of the past."

Acting Snr Sgt Morison said Cowes police station counter was "sometimes temporarily

"This is because it is often more effective for police officers to be out patrolling the community, so they can be where they are needed most, rather than behind a desk at a police

"Police officers are always within close proximity to respond to incidents as they occur, with back-up support from larger police stations such as Wonthaggi when required.

"Police are 100 per cent committed to keeping everyone who lives in, or visits, our region safe, with a 24-hour police response across the entire Bass Coast region, including Cow-

He said Victoria Police constantly reviewed police numbers, level of offending and peak times when police were required.

Anyone in need of urgent police assistance should call Triple Zero (000). Alternatively, if a non-urgent crime has occurred such as a property theft, call the Police Assistance Line (131 444) or report online via police.vic.gov.au

On social media, Amie wrote that anyone concerned about police levels should contact MP Jordan Crugnale and police command.

"Locals need to push for this to change not just for our community but for the poor overworked police members who are wanting to be able to do more but don't have the resources," she wrote.

Tony said it wasn't just Cowes that had a problem, with "plenty of places where cops don't turn up when you call them".

Kaela said she had found the Cowes station desk was closed to walk-ins, but was still staffed by patrols.

Nicole said she had a "great experience with the Cowes police station".

"I had three people looking around my house at 11pm and they triggered my cameras. I wasn't home at the time. I called the station and they arrived within five minutes of me calling. They searched my home for damage and called me back to let me know. I was so appreciative."

Nick wrote because family violence incidents on the island were "well above most metro areas", they can take an entire shift to complete.

Bass Coast crime stats down

The latest statistics from the Crime Statistics Agency recorded no increase in criminal incidents in Bass Coast in the past year.

There was one less criminal incident reported in the year from June 2021 to June 2022 compared to the previous year, and Family Violence incidents dropped by 9.1 per cent.

Recorded offences down 6.3 per cent and Alleged Offender incidents down by one per cent.

The only rise was in the number of Victim Reports, up 2.1 per cent compared to the previous year.

Wonthaggi and Cowes again were the top two areas for criminal incidents, with Cowes seeing a rise from 382 incidents in 2020/21 to 410 in the past year.

The statistics show that charges were laid in 38 per cent of cases. In 25.5 per cent of cases no charges were laid and 36.4 per cent remain unsolved.

A breakdown of the top five crime locations showed a drop in all areas except retail, while Cowes recorded a drop in Recorded Offences from 611 to 578.

Breaches of family violence orders continued to be the top offence, but with a significant drop from 630 to 507.

Overall, the shire recorded a lower incident rate than the Victorian average. However the number of Family Violence incidents per 100,000 population remained well above the state average.

State-wide

Victoria Police said it was incredibly positive to see a steady decline across the majority of offence categories state-wide.

The police said serious and violent crimes across Victoria were also down, with a 3.7 per cent reduction in the overall number of crimes committed against another person.


Robberies were at their lowest rates since 2005, with Family Violence down 3.1 per cent.

Residential burglaries were at their lowest levels since the introduction of the Law Enforcement Assistance Program in 1993.

"There are plenty of encouraging signs - the lowest number of home burglaries since 1993, least robberies since 2005, lowest number of cars stolen since 2011, decreasing family violence rates, less assaults, and reduced numbers

of firearm and weapon offences," said Deputy Commissioner Regional Operations Rick Nugent.

"Our focus will remain steadfast on ensuring the community is not only safe but feels safe."

Concerns

Despite the police reassurances, in recent weeks locals have taken to social media to voice their concerns about the lack of police presence on Phillip Island (see separate story).

However a University of Queensland Researcher, Renee Zahnow recently told the ABC that reporting of minor crimes against property on social media can make residents feel their neighbourhood is

Dr Zahnow's research focuses on place-based patterns of crime and said the posts on

social media can magnify behaviour and create a false impression of crime levels.

She said many people relied on social media to gauge how safe their suburb was, but her research had showed this "virtual exposure" could create a false impression of criminal or deviant behaviours.

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Floating wetlands and improved water security

Harriet Shing visited Cowes to inspect a wetland carbon storage project in Cowes, and officially open the restored San Remo Basin.

The Restorative Wetland Carbon Storage pilot project run by Westernport Water is studying how floating wetlands can be used to manage treated effluent and emissions produced from wastewater treatment.

The state government has invested \$250,000 towards the project as part of the Integrated Water Management grant program, which co-invests in wastewater and stormwater projects that can contribute to water security, public and environmental health, and urban amenity.

The findings of the study being run by Westernport Water will be shared with the broader water industry and community and is one of 11 metropolitan and 17 regional projects to receive funding under the first round of the Integrated Water Management grants program.
Westernport Water said the project

included installing a floating wetland on a wastewater storage lagoon at the Cowes Wastewater Treatment Plant, and testing its function by assessing how it can improve water quality and provide biodiversity while also sequestering carbon.

"The Floating Wetland Pilot at the Cowes Wastewater Treatment Plant will support ground-breaking research into the performance of wetlands for both improving water quality and reducing greenhouse gas emissions," said Westernport Water's Managing Director, Dona Tantirimudalige.

The pilot project will help address a common challenge for the water industry in managing treated effluent and emissions produced from wastewater treatment plants.

The project involves community and industry engagement to refine project co-benefits, and findings from the pilot will inform future

ter's Corinella Wastewater Treatment Plant."

Ms Tantirimudalige said the wetlands used plant species suspended on the water column with roots submersed in the water.

The plants take up nutrients and carbon from the water and the project will assess how effective these plants are at both removing nutrients and improving water quality, at the same time reducing greenhouse gas emissions from the water.

She said the plants will need to be harvested every six months.

The plants will be tested to assess

wetland design at Westernport Wa- if they are suitable to use for restorative programs, such as planting on farm dams, or if it would be more suitable to put them through a thermal drying process (to remove unwanted contaminants) and reuse as biochar product at another site.

San Remo basin

Minister Shing also visited the San Remo Basin, where a new liner and cover has been installed.

Westernport Water said this will ensure the basin can provide consistent and reliable drinking water services for another 30 years

The \$2.6 million project will help

prevent evaporation of the water supply from the San Remo water storage basin. The works were finished three months ahead of time and under budget without any impact to customers.

The San Remo Basin can store up to 30 million litres or about five days of supply and is an important part of the water supply system, providing a safe and reliable storage for Phillip Island and surrounding areas.

'The renewal of the basin ensures that the water future of one of Australia's most popular tourism destinations remains secure," said Minister Shing.

nally constructed in 1961 as an uncovered earthen water storage basin, and upgraded and fully enclosed with a poly-ethylene (PE) liner and floating cover in 1999.

Westernport Water said the theoretical useful life of the San Remo Basin previous liner and the cover was 20 years.

Beyond this point, it was susceptible to deterioration, which could impact the continuity of water supply and quality, and regular maintenance inspections had shown increasing deterioration.

"Long-term infrastructure planning is essential to meet the growing demands for water and wastewater services as we see people moving to the region," explained Ms Tantirimudalige.

"The San Remo Basin is Westernport Water's main drinking water storage in our water distribution system and essential to providing reliable water services to the communities of San Remo and Phillip Island.

"The renewal of the basin will provide Westernport Water with enhanced operational flexibility to cater for the spike in demand experienced during peak holiday sea-

Member for Bass, Jordan Crugnale congratulated Westernport Water on the pilot program and the upgrades at the San Remo Basin.

Nature-based solutions are important to the community and this pilot is just one example of many local innovations that will ensure the Bass Coast is well-positioned to meet future challenges," Ms Crugnale said.

'Renewal of critical assets like the San Remo Basin is essential to the ongoing supply of water services that meet, or exceed customer expectations - meaning reliability for families, businesses and the local community.

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Smiths Beach store's liquor licence curbed

store to become a licenced venue have been restricted, following a ruling by the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal.

And the objector to the VCAT case has called on Bass Coast Shire Council to create a liquor strategy, to ensure an overview of the growing number of alcohol licences on the island and their social impacts.

Earlier this year councillors voted to approve a planning permit for a \$30,000 upgrade to the Smiths Beach store that would see the current café serve alcohol from 5pm to 11pm Wednesday to Saturday and from 11am to 6pm Sundays and public holidays for up to 60 patrons.

The plan received 17 submissions, with objectors saying it could change the family atmosphere of the hamlet and argued against granting an alcohol licence.

"Smiths Beach is a quiet, residential area, not really a place for a pub," wrote one objector.

Another said when a late-night licence had been given to a past owner of the café, it resulted in "police intervention due to unruly behaviour".

Following the approval, one objector took the shire to VCAT

to fight the liquor licence.
This month VCAT ruled the sale of liquor should be limited, between 5pm to 9pm, Wednesday to Sunday.

Objector Bruce Wilson said he would prefer no liquor licence but the compromise was a better outcome than the original proposal.

A shire spokesperson said requirements for liquor licencing were in the Bass Coast Planning Scheme, with the decision guidelines requiring "consideration of the cumulative impact of multiple approvals".

Generous islanders help stranded GP campers

to the Phillip Island MotoGP in October have been thrown into disarray after some camp site bookings were cancelled last week due to waterlogged ground.

However generous Phillip Island residents have quickly responded, offering their backyards to those stranded MotoGP fans for the October 14-16 event.

Australian Grand Prix Corporation (AGPC) CEO Andrew Westacott said the cancellation impacted less than half the MotoGP campers - 1500 campers across 615 affected sites - who were all offered full accommodation refunds.

We had to make the call with time to allow campers to make decisions on whether they seek alternate accommodation or receive full refunds on their ticketing," Mr Westacott said.

"Following a sustained period of heavy rainfall across Phillip Island, a significant portion of event campsites have been relocated and a number of sites are no longer available due to unsuitable ground conditions.

"We appreciate this decision is disappointing. However, our priority is to ensure fans enjoy both a safe and world-class experience.

"AGPC will continue to monitor the situation and provide further updates if required.'

While trackside camping remained unchanged, the bogged sites that saw cancellations included highside north sections and parts of highside south.

Impacted MotoGP fans from across Australia took to social media to call for help.

Western Australian Lisa Hill said

The travel plans of 1500 campers state for the MotoGP "and don't have anywhere to camp with our van. So disappointed".

Queenslander Simone Cook asked if any Phillip Island locals could accommodate a small tent in their front yard.

Shaune Scruffo said he had also paid for motorhome hire "that is not refundable and planned on staying at the track on our booked campground".

"We have booked a whole holiday around this event with my two sons to also do the Great Ocean Road. If any locals have any suggestions it would be much appreciated," Shaune

Response

Following the shout-out on social media, many local residents stepped up to offer their backyard or larger properties, privately messaging through Facebook those who were left without a place to stay.

Cathy responded she had small acreage in Cowes that could take about five self-contained vehicles.

"No power but mains water and a shed to congregate in. Good luck and we hope we can help some of you,"

One of the stranded campers Noel saw the response from locals and thanked the generous response.

"I should have known that the awesome people on the island would find a way to help the bike fans that had their travel plans tipped upside down by the closure of the camp grounds," Noel wrote

"You people are awesome."

Mr Westacott was last Tuesday in she was travelling from her home San Remo for a tourism conference

(see separate story) and hinted that the water-logged ground at the circuit was causing problems.

"There are challenges from the campground because the ground is very, very wet," he said, adding nevertheless "we are very, very ready".

The Motogp.com.au website had a question-and-answer page to address concerns by those impacted campers, explaining the campgrounds were the wettest they had been for decades.

"We are currently unable to access areas to commence the installation of infrastructure and amenities, and many areas will remain off-limits to vehicles for an extended period," the page said.

"This is unlikely to change based on inspections in the last few days, which means that large areas of the campgrounds will not be available for patronage/use at this year's event.

"In some instances, non-affected campsites have been allocated for the use of event marshals, who are integral to the staging of the event."

The website said four weeks before the event accommodation options at Phillip Island - hotels, guest houses, rental properties or local campgrounds - "are few and far between".

"However, we recommend you continue to keep an eye out, as options do come up on an ad hoc basis.

We also suggest you consider other nearby locations such as Inverloch, Leongatha, Kilcunda or Wonthaggi. Alternatively, there may be availability in outer southeastern suburbs, including Cranbourne, Pakenham and Frankston.'

"When they arrive in town it's fun and welcoming.

"We are very, very ready."

A member of the audience asked whether Mr Westacott had leverage to fix the numerous potholes, on the Bass Highway especially around Caldermeade, Koo Wee Rup and Tooradin, to which many in the audience applauded.

"It's unanimous," the audience member said, adding "you don't want a tragedy".

Mr Westacott said he would raise the issue with the traffic and transport team.

Another member of the audience asked whether – "given we live in north Antarctica" – there was scope to move the Grand Prix dates from October to the warmer months of summer.

Mr Westacott said Dorna Sports - based in Madrid – would like a January or February date because 'you need heat in the tyres and if the track is a low temperature it can become dangerous".

"But these events are so big October is where it will stay."

He was asked whether it was pos-

sible to "piggyback" off all the infrastructure erected for the October event to create other events on Phillip Island or at the circuit before or after the MotoGP.

We call that sweating the assets," Mr Westacott said, adding while they supported the concept, on Phillip Island the logistics were more

Mr Westacott told the audience based on the huge success of this year's Formula One Grand Prix in Melbourne, there was "pent up demand" for events and entertainment, with AGPC "trying to one up" other events such as Victorian racing and football.

He said it was important to give customers value for money, and "engineer an event to within an inch of its life" with extra entertainment.

When asked to predict upcoming trends, Mr Westacott said the motorsport industry had responded to environment concerns by creating hybrid internal combustion engines, with fuels 100 per cent renewable by 2026 and by 2030 the industry would be 100 per cent net carbon zero.

Specialist School students get down and dirty

Students from Bass Coast Specialist School worked all term to discover "the dirtiest beach in the Bass Coast"

They used two different tests at each of the 10 different beaches chosen to survey. The test involved doing a surface count of plastic within a one-by-one metre quadrant, then a 50-metre, 20-minute rubbish pick up.

They found that when looking for microplastic in the sand, the Powlett River was the dirtiest beach in the Bass Coast, followed by Phillip Island's Smiths Beach.

The students presented their findings at the Kids Teaching Kids Conference earlier this month, taking sand in tubs from these beaches for their activities when presenting to the other schools.

They used water with the sand to draw the plastic to the surface as it floats, and then collected it with strainers.

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A proud indigenous family history

Many family historians hope to find a convict or someone famous in their heritage, but few find a famous Indigenous ancestor from our colo-

Krishna Methven is a seventhgeneration descendant of Mannalargenna, a leader of the Pairrebeenne/ Trawlwoolway clan of north-eastern Tasmania, near Cape Portland.

He was born around 1770 and was held in high regard by his people for being a great warrior, a wise leader and, in the 1820s, had led his warriors against the European occupation. However, by 1830 he agreed to help British Government officials persuade the remaining First Nations people to move from their country to the Bass Strait islands on the promise that it would protect his people, would be temporary and they could return to their homeland to resume their traditional lifestyle.

He hoped, that by putting his people under the Governor's protection, they would not be indiscriminately killed. He himself moved to the Wybalenna Aboriginal establishment on Flinders Island in 1835.

However, he soon realised that he had been deceived and the move was permanent. In response, and as a symbol of betrayal, he cut his long hair and beard which was coated in red ochre and died of pneumonia within the year. Hundreds of his people suffered a similar fate on these islands.

The lineage of Mannalargenna

and his sister, were exchanged for dogs, seals and flour to European sealers and lived with them on Bass Strait islands. Sealing was a very profitable enterprise in the eastern Bass Strait at this time and Aboriginal women were prized not only as companions and domestic servants but for their amazing ability to catch

Krishna is descended from Mannalargenna's daughter, who was survived as three of his daughters born Wyerlooberer known as Mar-

garet. Her great granddaughter, Viola, married Gus Lindner, who was from Germany. They had met when Gus went to Flinders Island for the mutton bird season. They are Krishna's grandparents.

Mannalargenna is seen as an ancestral grandfather for Aboriginal Tasmanians today and is celebrated as an honoured ancestor and a symbol of unity for all Tasmanians on Mannalargenna Day at Cape Portland every year.

Roadside mailbox history

When I arrived here in 1983, I was asked to see if there was some better method to delivering mail on the

At the time the town delivery in Cowes went from Dunsmore Road to Justice Road and the post office had 137 private boxes. Anyone beyond those points had to come to the post office to collect their mail from Poste Restante.

People in areas like Ventnor, Smiths Beach and Surf Beach used the local shops to receive their mail. The shopkeepers whilst happy to be helpful, receive no payment for this service and often little thanks.

Sunderland Bay and Surf beach residents used either Cowes or San Remo post offices. San Remo delivered to San Remo, Newhaven and a small area of Cape Woolamai. Rhyll had its own post office.

I had whilst working at head office planning branch, read about how the Canadian post office dealt with small, isolated communities.

I suggested to the District Manager the ideal of trialling a nest of boxes at Smiths Beach. He agreed and the trial was put in place letting boxes only to permanent residents (no charges were made at that time). It was gratefully received: so commenced the introduction of boxes across the island.

This changed the method of delivery to all points. The mail contractor delivered the mail into the boxes, only stopping on the roadside for rural properties. His delivery points went from 120 to nearer 800.

In Cowes, delivery was extended to Red Rocks Road and additional private boxes were installed at Cowes. This reduced the use of Poste Restante to travellers passing through town.

On the average mail day, all mail, both town deliveries and contractors around the island was delivered by lpm. A vast improvement for the local people.

But I have to make an apology now to the gentlemen who were complaining in your newspaper recently about RMB delivery. If in 1983 I had known that you were coming to live on the island, I would have installed the gold band service you had at Broadmeadows, Preston and Toorak.

Again understandably, there will be a lot of people leaving the boat in the shed this season but that doesn't mean you have to stop fishing.

For a tank of fuel, you could get yourself a land based set up or even just a decent couple of rods and some gear, use your boat reels, and spend the day fishing off the many beaches or jetties around this area.

We can help with any information you need, what to use and where to go, so just drop in and see us.

Mel and Amanda, together with Women in Recreational Fishing (WIRF) ran another successful information night for the ladies at the shop last week with over 20 attending.

It was a night of information designed to help those who wanted to hone their skills or simply get started in fishing. There will be another night coming up before Christmas and we will put information in our reports or on our social media platforms.

Barrel tuna don't seem to be in too much of a hurry to move on, with several reports still coming in over the last few weeks. They do however seem to have moved to the west with not much east of the Island being found of late.

southern coast which only adds concern to what effect a farm of windmills might have.

What lure colours and type to use hasn't changed a whole lot, with "anybody's guess" still being the only right an-

It's the same with all types of fishing; don't get too hung up on what everyone else is doing and create your own methods.

Good reports of calamari from the beaches mostly this week, with the jetties not quite as successful, or with much smaller calamari.

Ventnor, Cleeland Bight beaches were the most successful from those using baited jigs.

From the land, artificial jigs caught a few but worked much better in the boats or kayaks.

While we did get some reports from the jetties, they were a little quiet despite the water being reasonably clean and weed free.

The rest of the reports came from boats that headed out on the handful of opportunities we had, who were chasing snapper and whiting.

Many that did get out found fish and while they got a feed, that was about it.

The quality of the fish was good, whiting to 42cm, gummies to 8kg and snapper around the perfect pan size.

It was the numbers that were down and very few managed anywhere near their limits.

The weather was having a bigger part to play than anything else, limiting you to fish where the conditions were best.

Much of the snapper and gummy reports did however come from the Elizabeth Island to Lang Lang area, with whiting all over the place.

As the weather settles, the water warms up and more get out fishing the reports start to come in greater numbers and we will be able to get a report together every week.

Most of the new season's stock has arrived.

Whether it's a present for someone else or just for yourself, now is the time to get your laybys sorted for Christmas and give yourself plenty of time to pay it off.

Time is also running out to get your rods or reels repaired, firstly because the time we must fix them becomes less but getting parts becomes The way it's going there will harder as well as we get closer to Christmas.

The shop is now open seven days a week, nine to five on weekdays and eight to five on weekends. As the weather ing some of the healthiest and warms, we will move into our summer hours
